Lunar New Year On Tuesday 1st February we are celebrating **Lunar New Year** with a simple but delicious, traditional dish called *Hainanese chicken rice*.

All the way from Hainan (an island province of China), essentially it's poached free-range chicken with rice that is cooked in the poaching juices,

along with ginger, garlic and just a little of the chicken fat, to create a deliciously, flavourful dish.



The dish is popular all over South East Asia, including Singapore, where it is considered a national dish and is eaten everywhere from expensive restaurants, to roadside food carts, and


Recommended Read

This charming book for young readers tells the story of John La Rose, the pioneering black activist who set up Britain's first black publisher and bookshop, New Beacon Books, and was also one of the founders of the George Padmore Institute.

The book is the story of John La Rose's early life in Trinidad. He was a child that wanted to learn everything, go everywhere – and always asked loads of questions. He also loved to dance! Little John started to keep his dreams and ideas in notebooks, and it was these notebooks that have helped to form the story in this book...

Ken Wilson Max's beautiful, captivating illustrations make this a lovely and inspiring book to read. It's a beautiful book to make us think about how all great people start life as little children, and therefore that all little children can become great people, whatever their background. It's a great introduction to a really interesting part of our history, which will hopefully lead to children asking more questions themselves.

Acute Art presents | KAWS: NEW FICTION Serpentine North GalleryOnline18 Jan - 27 Feb 2022 FREE

Serpentine start 2022 with a multi-layered global project with the internationally acclaimed artist KAWS developed in collaboration with Acute Art and the online video game Fortnite.

In his first major solo exhibition in London, NEW FICTION, KAWS (Brian Donnelly b.1974) presents new and recent works in physical and augmented reality at Serpentine North from 18 January 27 February 2022. The exhibition is presented in collaboration with Acute Art and curated by Acute Art's Artistic Director, Daniel Birnbaum. A parallel digital version of the show launches simultaneously in Fortnite, a video game developed by Epic Games.

In addition to the Fortnite collaboration, Serpentine and KAWS will use an app developed by Acute Art to offer a bridge between the virtual and the physical worlds. All the paintings and sculptures in the exhibition as well as a miniature version of the entire show will exist as AR works on the Acute Art app and can be placed and viewed at home by viewers globally. They



can also be shared on social media, making KAWS' art visible across the world.



Friday 28th January Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- Learnt how to read and write the sounds the sounds /oo/ (cook), /oa/ (coat) and /ar/ (shark).
- Began our unit focused on addition in Maths. Our knowledge of part, part, whole really supported our understanding. We used concrete objects and pictorial resources to add quantities together. We recorded our answers in an addition sentence (e.g. 5+5=10) and also as a number bond.
- Continued to use Hansel and Gretel as our reading focus in our English lessons. We wrote recounts of the second half of the story. We then created our own fairy tale by changing the characters and the setting. We also read sentences which had been jumbled up and put them in the right order.
- Used photographs of our own houses and drew on top of them using oil pastels. We transformed them into the houses of our dreams.
- Read the Bible story of Jesus Feeding the 5000. We talked about what a miracle is and how people would have felt witnessing such an incredible sight.
- Fossils help to tell us what animals and plants looked like millions of years ago. In our Understanding the World lesson, the children to pretended to be palaeontologists and made their own dinosaur fossils and bones using salt dough. We buried them in the sandpit and carefully excavated them! Our key vocabulary was: palaeontologist, fossils, bones, excavate and evidence.

Next week, we will:

• Learn how to read and write the sounds /or/ (fork), /ur/ (surf) and /ow/ (powder).

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 28th January 2022

In English, we started reading, 'Dog Don't Do Ballet'. We have used question words and question marks to write questions to the character of Dad and then used hot-seating to find out how he felt at the ballet. We then wrote a narrative in the past tense to describe the trip to the ballet. We remember to use 'I', writing in the 1st person because we were writing from the little girl's point of view.

In Alphabet Code, this week we have been looking at the /f/ code and focussing on words such as free, huff, photo and rough. Next week we will be learning the // code.

In Maths, we have looked at related number sentences. We have used our number bond facts to ten to help us subtract and add. We have also been comparing addition and subtraction sentences by using the terms: 'greater than', 'less than' and 'equals to' and the symbols: <,> and =.

In Art, we have been looking at the colour wheel. We predicted what would happen if we mixed two colours together and then tested it to see if our predictions were right!

In PE, we have been doing gymnastics and dance, we practiced creating our own dance moves and performed them to the rest of the class.

Friday, 28th of January 2022

It's been another busy week in Year 2. On Tuesday we went to the Western Marble Arch Synagogue to learn more about Judaism. The Rabbi shared lots of interesting facts with us and even shared one of the special scrolls. It was fascinating to hear him singing in Hebrew!

In Maths we continued our unit on measurement and did a fantastic job of measuring and ruling straight lines using our 30cm rulers. We then thought about ways we could measure curved lines and used string to help us. Next week we will move on to numbers to 100.

In English, we looked closely at the features of a narrative then completed story maps for The Last Noo-Noo. We then completed the first two steps of the writing process by planning then drafting our own story based on The Worst Witch. Next week we will revise, edit and publish our stories. Important note: Our stories will be sent home on Wednesday afternoon and the final copy needs to be either typed up on the computer then printed off or written out neatly. Please be careful to include any changes made during the revising and editing stages and <u>please return</u> to school the next day (Thursday).

In DT we began creating the vehicles we had planned and will continue to work on them next week. There are lots of fantastic creations in the making!

In Science we created flying fish using paper with different widths. We then experimented to see which fish flew to the ground quickest.

Miss James is in our classroom for just one more day next week then we sadly have to say goodbye to her as she will return to Year 6. She has taught us so much and we have helped her to learn lots too!

Learning at Christ Church in Year 3

Friday 28th January 2022

This week in Maths, we've been extending our work on measuring by thinking about mass. We've been getting to grips with how much a kilogram and a gram weigh and what that feels like and then comparing items in real life and in calculations. Over the weekend, try finding things around the house that weigh less than, more than or equal to 1kg. Estimate their weight, then check it using scales! Next week we'll be continuing with measurement as we look at volume.

In English, we've started a new unit of work this week all about how pencils are made. We've been doing research through text and videos to investigate the raw materials, the process and invent our own pencils. Next week, we'll be doing some creative writing looking at the life of pencils beyond the factory...!

In other areas, we've been looking at how energy passes up the food chain in Science, understanding why the story of Passover gives a reason for Jewish people to celebrate, talking about about how we share responsibility in families to make sure everyone is looked after in PSHE and comparing different kinds of maps and different address systems in Geography.

Thank you to all who came with us on our trip to the Royal Observatory last Friday, as well as all those who waited patiently for our return! We had a lovely time refreshing our knowledge about our solar system.



Our next trip is on Friday 11th February to the Jewish Museum as part of our current RE topic - the sign up sheet for helpers will be in the office! There will be other trips next half term too (dates TBC).

Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 28th January 2022

This week, Year 4 have been learning how to punctuate speech. They started the week by looking at how other writers, like Philip Pullman and David Walliams, incorporate speech into their stories and how different authors have their own unique style. Year 4 were then tasked to edit and improve sentences, and finally, write their own dialogue, which referenced a passage from The Firework Maker's Daughter. They will be using speech to write an extended writing piece next week.

In Maths, Year 4 continued to learn about measurement, rather than start fractions/decimals – they have been focusing on money problems, which required them to find the sum of an amount or find the difference. They also had to order and compare different measurements of money. They will revise this at the end of their fractions/decimals unit – which we will definitely start next week!

Year 4 prepared for their Geography trip to Brompton Cemetery next week by learning about the points of a compass and using a compass to compare the cities of the UK by describing their position on a map, in relation to each other. Their fieldtrip next week will focus on orienteering skills.

Learning at Christ Church

Friday, 28th January 2022

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. This week, we welcomed one of our very own parents in the classroom to talk to us about the King's Road during the Victorian Era. The children found it very interesting! We also had an amazing time on our trip to the Cabmen's Shelter with the Heritage London Trust.

In RE, we discussed our trip to the Gurdwara and pooled our knowledge about Sikhism together.

In Maths, we learned how to define and calculate the area of a square and rectangle. Children also learned how to calculate the area of composite rectilinear shapes by breaking them down into smaller squares and rectangles.

In English, children started writing a persuasive letter based on *The Legend of the Mafumeira*. They are writing in the role of the main character Adao, trying to persuade his two friends to stop cutting down all the trees in the forest.


In Geography, we learned about the main rivers and mountains in the UK. The children learned how to annotate and label a map following appropriate geographical conventions and colour coding.

In Science, we learned about the Moon and how it moves around the Earth. We learned that the Moon rotates at the same speed it revolves, which is why we only see one face of the Moon from Earth. We also learned about the different phases of the moon and created our own models to explain these movements.



Friday 28st January 2022

This week in Maths, we have been carrying on our work on fractions. We have revised equivalency and simplifying fractions and applied it to a reasoning context. For example: Shade ³/₄ of this shape.



After, we revised

adding and subtracting fractions where we need to change the denominators so that they are the same. We found common multiples of both the denominators and then decided what we needed to multiply the top and the bottom of the fractions by to reach that denominator.

In English, we have continued to look at graffiti and completed a comprehension about it including retrieval and inference questions. We created a glossary of impressive words related to the topic (graffiti) and practised our skills of using the dictionary to find a definition. Finally, we started to create an information report by synthesising information from different sources in order to find concise yet essential information.

In Science, we finished creating our graph and compared the different colours and their effectiveness at holding onto heat. We also discussed how we could improve our experimental design. In Geography, we created a research report on a city called Manaus in South America looking at its human and physical geography. In RE, we learnt about the story of Siddhartha and the swan and discussed the importance of being kind to animals in the Buddhist faith. In DT, we created a paper bridge and found out how difficult making structures can be!
