



Nisha's War (ages 9-11 & up)

It's 1942 and Nisha and her mother, Amma, have arrived at the home of her seemingly unsympathetic grandmother in the chilly North of England. They come as refugees, having been forced to flee their life in Singapore by the murderous invasion of Japanese troops.

Haunted by the trauma of bombs, betrayal and the loss of her father, Nisha hopes to find some peace in England. But when Amma is struck down by a life-threatening illness, she is left alone to navigate her grandmother's countless rules and the unhospitable locals. When a ghostly child offers to save her mother in exchange for three truths, Nisha feels she has to agree despite the grave danger she faces.

A spine-chilling and unnerving story about an Anglo-Indian refugee and her family's experience of the Second World War - one story often overlooked. Nisha's harrowing accounts are revealed only gradually through a 'truth journal' as events

in the present resurrect unwelcome memories from the past.

The presence and influence of Nisha's ghosts are so convincing that if you think you don't believe in ghosts, this might just be the book to change your mind.


























This week at school


Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 4th February 2022

This week in English, we finished writing our own stories based on The Enormous Turnip. We separated our stories into three parts: the beginning, middle and end. We wrote a piece each day, remembering to check what we had previously written. We tried to remember to use adjectives for description, time conjunctions and to check our spellings. We then went back, read the marking in our books and edited our work using green pens.

In maths, we began by recapping subtraction strategies. We identified the parts and the whole within a subtraction equation and looked at different strategies we can use to find the answer. In partners, we practised solving missing number subtraction problems and we practised counting back using a number line.





In Alphabet code, we investigated the codes for the /oi/ sound. We discovered oi as in spoil and oy as in boy.

In Art, we experimented with water and watercolours. We experimented with wet on wet and wet on dry to see how these styles changed the colours.

In Science, we continued our investigations into the Polar Regions. This week, we discovered how to identify if an animal is a mammal, a fish or a bird. Can you remember what makes an animal a mammal?

At Forest School this week, we looked at different types of leaves and the trees they come from. We tried to use a variety of leaves to make our Forest School Crowns. Some questions you could ask your child are:

- What types of leaves did you find?
- · What evergreen trees do we see in the woods?
- Why are the leaves at the top of a Holly tree smooth?

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 4th February 2022

In Maths, we began looking at numbers to 100, breaking our numbers up into tens and ones. For example: 85 has 8 tens and 5 ones. 80 + 4 = 84. to number to 100. We then compared numbers to 100 using the terms greater than and smaller than by first looking at the number of tens and, if they were equal, moving on to compare the ones.

In English, we finalised our published stories and they are now proudly in our classroom on display (see right). We also reviewed our spelling and punctuation. This week we even got to read part of our stories to the whole school during special mentions assembly. We reviewed our use of commas and now know we can use commas in a list confidently. Please review this for your homework this week.

During our PSHE we thought about key words which represent our class. We decided that we are kind, resilient, curious and wonderful.

We are continuing to enjoy our moving vehicles unit in DT. This week we have added a body to our chassis using recycled resources. These will be given home when we have completed them next week.

Interesting questions to ask:

Why did our paper rockets fly? Which force is used? What are the key features of a synagogue? When is a comma used in a list?

Learning in Year 3 at Holy Trinity 04th February 2022

In maths we completed our topic of mass and started looking at volume. We learnt about the difference between capacity and volume and how the volume doesn't change between different containers, but the capacity does!

In English we have been learning about how pencils are made. We were really interested in researching all the different steps to make a pencil, where the wood is sourced and how many pencils are made a year! We then went onto designing our own pencil and created some fabulous, bright and colourful posters to advertise them.

In science we got our hands on some real animal bones to give us a real idea of our skeletons inside us. We discussed why we have and need our skeletons and some of the interesting names of our bones. We also looked at our muscles and how they move. It was fascinating learning about our amazing bodies and what they do without us even thinking about it.

In art we focused on working as a team, something that is a class focus currently. We worked, communicated and supported each other to make a giant spider inspired by Louise Bourgeois. Keep up the good teamwork year 3!

Learning in Year 4 at Holy Trinity

Friday 4th February

This week in English, Year Four performed their documentary texts in front of the whole class. They read their text aloud and ensured that the facts they were reading corresponded to specific parts of the videos. They did a superb job, adapting their pace, volume and tone to keep their audience engaged!

In Maths, we have been looking at area and perimeter. We have recapped how to calculate the perimeter of a shape, you need to add the length of each side. Where as to solve the area, you need to multiply the length by the height.

This week Year Four were visited by a sculptor and spent an entire day learning how to build chairs out of newspapers! They had a tremendous time designing and making different chairs in teams.

In Art, we have started a project called 'The Superpower of Looking' and this week we reflected on how we felt towards viewing different artworks. We then looked at a still life painting and chose three sections to observe and draw.

In RE, Year Four learnt about different Hindu festivals including; Holi and Diwali. They then created a fact file showing why and how Hindus celebrate Holi. This festival represents good overcoming evil and is a time for forgiveness. Hindus mark the festival by building bonfires which they believe purify the air of anything evil.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- Which materials and tools did you use to build your chair in DT?
- Why do we use time conjunctions in our writing?
- How can you calculate the area of a shape?

Reminders:

- Reading Records are due on Tuesdays and will be sent home on Mondays. Please listen to your child read every night and then comment in their records.
- Homework is due in on Mondays and will be sent home on Tuesdays.
- Homework club takes place on Tuesday after school.

Word of the week: Still Life - A still life is a work of art, most often a painting. In a still life, objects like flowers, fruit, or glasses are arranged in a certain way, and then painted.



Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 4th February

This week in English, we have been planning and writing parts of our diary entry. We have had to make sure that we use fronted adverbials to give our diary a sense of time, contractions to create an informal tone, and show-not-tell to add extra information about how we are feeling.

In maths, we started to apply our skill of calculating area of rectangles to find the area of compound shapes (shape consisting of multiple rectangles). We have also been revising previous skills and concepts in place value, calculations and fractions.

Our main question in Geography this term is 'How does water go round and round?' So far, we have learned the steps in the water cycle and features of mountains and rivers. This week, we investigated how rivers are formed and landscape changes through the process of erosion. We created a simulation using soil as mountains, and dripped water down. We saw that the water carried some of the soil away, changing the shape of the mountains and rivers.

In Science, we continued to be forensic scientists. This week, we took our own fingerprints and analysed the different patterns. We also learnt about DNA and its usefulness in solving cases. We then completed an investigation where we extracted DNA from a strawberry.

In Religion, we learnt about Sikh wedding traditions.

Learning at Holy Trinity Friday 4th February 2022

In Maths this week, we began the week immersing ourselves into fractions. Looking at equivalent fractions and simplifying fractions by finding common multiples (something we have spent much time on over the year). Then we used this knowledge to help us compare and order fractions on a number line. Tuesday's geometry lesson, we looked at angles in a special triangle. Looking at equilateral triangles (3 equal sides, 3 equal angles) and isosceles triangles (2 equal sides, 2 equal angles). Following this rule, we were able to calculate missing angles in a triangle, recognising which type of triangle it was.

In English, we completed our reports on graffiti, ensuring that we could check off each box on our success criteria. Our next task was to read a partner's report and give them constructive feedback using a star and a wish (one positive thing, with a reason and something that could be improved on). We made sure that feedback was specific so our partners could further edit their reports. Then we returned to the question, 'Is graffiti art or vandalism?' We worked together to conjure up arguments for both sides and prepared for a debate. The class was divided into two groups, one for graffiti and the other against. Working as a team we were able to come up with arguments and counter arguments for a formal debate, which will continue next week. In DT, we have been learning about shelters in other parts of the world. We engaged in a lengthy discussion about the differences between our shelters and shelters that can be found in the Americas. Wigwams (tepees), waddle and daub, igloos, grass houses, straw houses were just some of the structures we looked at. In our books, we analysed each one, focusing on the materials used in each shelter and whether it is effectively serving its purpose. Then we thought about some of the defects that these shelters may face and how they could be solved or overcome by reinforcing the materials.

In Geography we have been learning about a capital city in South America, Manaus. In the ICT suite, we have dove into researching this city to make a rich information report, including: its location, climate, landscape, population, tourism, food and other interesting facts that we look forward to sharing with you at home.

In Science, we completed our dinosaur model making and wrote a fact file about each, including information; height, weight, length, diet and a fun fact. Check out the newsletter for a closer look!

In Shepherds and sheep, we played dinosaur bingo to make sure that reception class could recognise the different dinosaurs and then spent a little time reading a dinosaur book with our sheep.
