Make sure your device is muted unless your teacher asks you to switch it off





5. Behaviour and Attitudes






Recommended Read



All Because You Matter (for ages 4-5 & up)



Author: Tami Charles Illustrator: Bryan Collier Publisher: Scholastic

A longed for and loved baby is born to its parents: even before he takes his place in the world, he has been dreamt of and wished for by them and by his ancestors. This new child's life is mapped with stars and blessed by the cold moon and hot sun. Yet, as he grows up, there may be times that the young boy questions his place in the universe. He may wonder, as a young black boy, if he really matters. Fortunately, his parents are there at every stage to guide and empower him through his life.

The poetic text of this picture book, written by a mother to her son, seeks to reassure him that he does matter. Since the beginning of time he has mattered, and been thought of and dreamt for like a knapsack full of wishes, and as vital as the moon and the stars.

A poem of a mother's love in the age of the Black Lives Matter movement, stunningly illustrated by Bryan Collier, this book seeks to remind children that regardless of their background, they are important and valued. It's also a great book to use to talk to children about racism and to help answer any questions they might have




This week in English, we started our new unit about Traditional tales. We thought about some different traditional tales we already know and we wrote some sentences to explain why we like certain traditional tales. We have read different versions of 'The Enormous Turnip' and compared them to find similarities and differences. We then wrote a letter to one of the animals explaining why we need their help. We worked hard to use expanded noun phrases and to use joining words in our writing.




In maths, we looked at adding by counting on and practiced using our number bonds to 10 to help us solve larger addition problems. For example, if we know $6 + 2$ is 8, then we know $16 + 2$ is 18.

In Science, we went on a material hunt and looked for different materials around our classroom, and at home. We also thought about the properties of different materials.

In RE, we thought about what we are thankful for. We thought about five things we are happy to have in our lives.

In Geography, we thought about the features of our local park. We discussed how we could improve our park and had a go at designing our own. We thought carefully about who would be using these features and included this in our designs.

Learning in Year 4 at Holy Trinity
Friday 8th January

Happy New Year and welcome back! I just wanted to say a massive 'well done' to all students that have been working hard both at home and in school.

In English, we started our new writing unit focusing on non-fiction reports. So far, we have learnt about the polar bear, gorilla and crocodile. You will have to wait and see what animal we learn about next...

In Maths, we learnt how to represent multiplication in an array and how to multiply three digits. We also learnt what a factor is and found factors of different numbers.

In RE, we started our new topic on Islam by completing a brainstorm on everything we already know about Islam and a *see, think, wonder* activity. In Science, we revised the four different type of teeth and what they are used for. In Geography, we mapped the major rivers in the UK and the oceans around.

Good questions to ask your child this week are:

- What type of teeth would carnivores mainly have? What type of teeth would herbivores mainly have?
- What is the longest river in the UK?
- What is a fact that you learnt about the polar bear, gorilla or crocodile this week?

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 5

8th January 2021

Well done for everyone's great efforts both at home with remote learning as well as learning in school. The independence you have all shown is incredible. Let's recap a few things that we've done...

Math:

This week we have focused on the multiplication operation. Multiplying two, three and four digits by one digit. We focused primarily on two strategies and then the students were able to really zone in and discover which one suited their learning style best. It was a pleasure to see the in-school learners really engaged during our Math sessions this week, the classroom was as quiet as a mouse with everyone concentrating extra hard! Don't forget to logon to Times Table Rock stars in between and keep up your high scores.

English:

We have jumped straight into our new English unit based on the book *Wonder* by *RL Palacio*. Many of the children have read the book or have watched the movie which has brought great excitement to their learning. We focused this week on getting to know the main characters of the story. In particular, how the writer has cleverly used certain stereotyping to help generate preconceived ideas of a character. The children did a fantastic job at analysing these characters carefully, including their appearance, body language, personality and the dialogue chosen. We're looking forward to seeing if our opinions of certain characters change as we dive deeper into the book. We also had a look at different viewpoints in the story. We spoke about the importance of understanding two sides of a situation in order to understand the reactions and thoughts of others.

RE:

This week we started our next unit of study, Sikhism. It was fascinating learning all about the beliefs and customs of this religion. Looking at the similarities vs differences of Sikhism and Christianity was very interesting too. The students were very reflective, this helps to develop their understanding of others and the world around them. We are looking forward to learning more and perhaps even turning into gurus about Sikhism!

Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity
Friday 8th January 2021

An unfortunate way to start the new term but Year 6 have embraced this new way of learning and have been very busy this week!

In English, we have been busy recounting our Christmas break. We worked hard to make our writing interesting, showing the reader our sheer excitement for the lead up to Christmas morning. Then we returned back to our writing topic on graffiti. Researching, gathering lots of information ready for a report we will be writing next week. We practised our inference skills when completing a comprehension and then extended our vocabulary and technical language in the area of graffiti by creating a dense glossary of words that will most definitely make for a well written information report.

In Maths, we have revised our knowledge of multiples, factors and prime numbers, something we are now very confident with. Moving on to practicing squaring and cubing numbers using counters to represent the problem. When learning about the order of operations, we used BIDMAS (Brackets, Indices, Division, Multiplication, Addition, Subtraction) to help us remember how to solve a question. We will be revisiting this topic soon to get some extra practise.

In science, we have begun a new topic, looking into the features in our families. Researching the difference between inherited and environmental features. We used a dictionary to find definitions, creating a glossary of key vocabulary on our new topic.

In History, we started a new topic on the Vikings, which we will be continuing to learn about this term.

In Geography we have started a new topic on 'Natural Resources'. We found out about the key resources; gas, oil, clay, sheep's wool, chicken eggs and wheat. Thinking about how each of them are used, what threatens our natural resources and began to discuss if there are any alternatives. Could we live without them?

Please remember we have English zooms daily at 9.30.

Tutor group tutorials will be held in groups. Each group will be assigned just one day a week for a zoom meeting from 3.00-3.20.

Please continue posting your work on dojo, it has been great receiving so much learning, you have all been so busy.
