What to expect

The Royal Hospital Chelsea has secured a grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to undertake development work to restore the listed Soane Stable Yard at the Chelsea Gate Entrance of the site. Sir John Soane was the Clerk of Works at the Royal Hospital for 30 years (1807-1837). On taking up this role, he found the stables designed by Sir Christopher Wren in 1692 to be dilapidated and rebuilt them. These are the buildings you can see today. This project will restore the Stable Yard which will house a free exhibition and displays, cafe, the Royal Hospital post office and shop. It will also open up access from the National Army Museum.



We are reaching out to our local community via this survey to obtain your feedback on our initial ideas for the stables and a public programme of heritage activities. The survey will be open until midnight on Monday 28th March 2022 and takes less than 10 minutes. All responses are anonymous unless you choose to identify yourself. 


Bake Off winners




We had a week of fun sporting activities this week! The children were excited to practice new and old skills and show case their sporting talents.






Recommended Read

Brother and sister Hack and Whack are two of the worst Viking children in the village. They're rude, noisy, messy, and the rotten apples of their parents' eyes... but one day, someone even worse moves in right next door.

Grunt the Berserker is massive, fearsome, and very, very smelly, and he's making life hell for all the villagers! With the help of their friends and a couple of lessons from the brand new Viking school, it's up to Hack, Whack, and Muddy Butt the dog to chase Grunt out of town.

You might know Francesca Simon from the fantastically popular Horrid Henry books – and somehow, the Two Terrible Vikings manage to make Henry look like an angel. Packed with super-silly toilet humour, madcap action, and lively cartoonish illustrations from Steve May, the hilarious adventures of Hack and Whack are bound to be asked for again and again – though the simple text and short chapters mean they're also perfect for children beginning to read independently.

Learning in Reception

Tricky words	Please continue to go through the tricky words in their tricky words book. Thank you
Literacy	<p>We have continued with our journey around the world and this week we have listened to the story 'Tortoise's Dream'.</p> <p>In the story, the tortoise has a dream. She dreams of a tree full of fruits. Then, the tortoise and the other animals work as a team to find the tree of her dreams. Grandma Koko tells them that if they remember the name of the tree 'Omumbo Rombonga' they will find it. On their way, some of the animals come across different challenges but they persevere and finally find the tree of the tortoise's dream!</p> <p>This week's activities: the children drew their dreams on a tree. Then, they wrote a sentence describing their dreams. We also learnt about the Life Cycle of a Plant.</p>
Maths	<p>In Maths, we have focused on capacity.</p> <p>Vocabulary introduced: full, nearly full, half full, nearly empty and empty.</p>
History	This week, the main focus was futuristic toys. The children redesigned their favourite toys and added some special features to make it futuristic.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 18th March 2022

This week in English, we looked at a visual story called 'The Clock Tower'. As we watched the story, we discussed why different things were happening, we predicted what might happen next and we thought about how the mood of the story changes throughout. We began by orally retelling the story in pairs and sequencing the events in the story together. We then focused on generating expanded noun phrases such as 'the big, golden tower'. We also looked at using antonyms to show how the mood of the story changes throughout.

In maths, we continued learning about numbers within 50. This week, we compared numbers and objects within 50 using the language of more, fewer, greater than and less than. We learnt that when comparing two 2-digit numbers, first, we can compare the tens and then we can compare the ones. We then looked at placing numbers within 50 in order and completing number patterns. Towards the end of this week, we started to look at length.

In Science, we continued our topic 'Treasure Island'. This week, we discussed the properties of a good shelter. We thought that a shelter would need to be waterproof, windproof and strong. We then used a range of different materials to try to construct a shelter that would be able to withstand a storm. We discovered that using a soft plastic such as Clingfilm was waterproof, but not strong enough to keep the shelter standing.

In Alphabet Code, we investigated all of the sounds for the /f/ code. We discovered **f** as in **fun**, **ff** as in **huff**, **ph** as in **phone** and **gh** as in **tough**.

In History, we continued our investigation into food over time. This week, we looked at different cooking appliances that have been used throughout the ages. We began by discussing in small groups what we thought each appliance was. Once we had discovered what they were, we tried sorting them into chronological order.

This week, we went to ChristChurch School gardens to do some planting with Mr Wells. We looked at the different herbs, fruits and vegetables that are being grown. We learnt about pollination and germination and planted some of our very own pea shoots to keep in our classroom.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2
Friday 18th March 2022

Thank you for a wonderful sports week, You have shown fantastic teamwork skills and shown great kindness to each other and the adults you work with. This week we have enjoyed a range of sports activities including volleyball with coach Mark and circuit training with Mr Bandous. This links with our 'Healthy me' science unit and we enjoyed measuring the effect on our bodies by observing the changes and measuring our heart rates. For homework, you will be exploring a range of exercises and plotting your own bar chart. In science, we also enjoyed making our own balanced food plates. After trying a range of foods, we designed and made our own food plates.



In Maths, we have moved onto subtracting numbers to 100 using exchanging with vertical subtraction. We can now demonstrate this using dienes resources and pictorial representations. We have also consolidated our understanding through word problems.



In English, we have begun to plan our own stories based on the structure of Zahra. We drew our own story map and used a story mountain to help us plan our own pieces.

Questions:

- Why do we need a balanced diet?
- How do you insert an image into a power point presentation
- What do bread and wine symbolise to Christians celebrating Easter?
- How did Monet create his famous water lilies?

Learning in Year Three

18th March 2022

We had a great sports week this week, starting with a volleyball session with Coach Marc. It gave us the best opportunity to improve our communication, being a team player and making sure everyone has a turn. On Thursday we had circuit training which we also enjoyed. This week tied in well with our final science lesson of our topic, food and our bodies as we talked about how exercise keeps our body healthy.

In English we finished looking at The Black Hat with creating our own creature, describing its appearance and how it came out of the hat. We enjoyed getting creative in our drawing and writing

In maths we looked at comparing and finding equivalent fractions and finding fractions of amounts. Although this sounded tricky at first but by using concrete resources, looking at pictorial representations and drawing our own diagrams we finished the week with a good understanding of both methods.

In geography we finished our maps topic with adding continents and capital cities to a world map. We used atlases and discussed our learning with each other to help us complete the task. We will use these maps for the first lesson in our next topic - is climate cool, where we will add the climate zones onto them.

On Friday Mrs Davies took us on an art trip to the V & A Museum to have a look around and take part in a pattern workshop. We really enjoyed our day, spotting patterns all over the gallery and seeing some fantastic pieces of art in the galleries.

Learning in Year 4 at Holy Trinity

Friday 18th March

This week in English, Year Four finished their chapters for the story: 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' and carefully edited their work. They worked in pairs to offer useful feedback to their friends and then looked to see how they could improve their writing using their green pen.

In Maths, we have continued looking fractions and now started looking at decimals. We used a fraction wall to help us match equivalent fractions. We then thought about all the different ways we can represent fractions, including use plasticine, shapes, number lines and decimals.

Year Four had a fantastic time visiting The Southwark Cathedral on Wednesday to celebrate RE week. We went on a guided tour around the cathedral, learning about many meaningful Christian symbols. We noticed how often people light candles as a way to pray and feel close to God and even practised a baptism at the font. In the afternoon, we created impressive clay tiles showing our chosen symbols.

In RE, we have read the parable of The Prodigal Son and were moved by the depth of the father's forgiveness and love for his son when he returned home. Our class virtue is 'forgiveness' and we wrote prayers about how this virtue is important in our lives. We created watercolour illustrations for these prayers and they look very beautiful indeed!

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- What is special about the shape of Southwark Cathedral?
- Can you share a time when you have forgiven someone?
- Why is editing such an important part of writing a story?

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity
Friday 18th March 2022

Another learning filled week has come to an end! This Friday, Year 5 went on a trip to visit Westminster Abbey. Each year group at Holy Trinity has visited a place of worship this week as part of RE week. This week was also Sports Week! Year 5 was lucky to enjoy a boxing lesson by a professional boxer on Tuesday and completed a circuit to raise money for Sports Relief on Thursday.

This week in English, we read about the Curiosity rover's landing on Mars. We practised writing each step in the passive tense i.e. **The parachute slowed down the rover** → **The rover was slowed down by the parachute.**

In Maths, we continued with decimal numbers. We now know how to count in tenths, hundredths and thousandths and able to identify the value of each digit. Then we moved on to ordering and comparing decimal numbers by looking from left to right and comparing each place value (e.g. 0.3 is greater than 0.291 because 3 tenths is greater than 2 tenths).

In Art, we learnt about a new artist, Yinka Shonibare, who relates to our textile unit. We saw how he uses different patterns, cultures and histories and merges them together to create a "connected world".

In Science, we created a model to understand the movement of the moon in relation to the Earth. We learnt that the moon revolves around the Earth and this takes approximately 28 days. The moon revolves and the same rate it rotates, this is we always see the same face of the moon.

In Religion, we continued with our Easter unit. This week we focused on the significance of Palm Sunday and Maundy Thursday, and how these days are celebrated in church.

**Learning at Holy Trinity
Friday 18th March 2022**

In English this week, we have continued with our learning based on the Boy in Striped pyjamas, starting by revisiting the active and passive tense and how we could use this in formal writing and narratives. We looked at dialogue and reminded ourselves of how to correctly punctuate speech and change the tone of speech, depending on the character. To end off some busy learning, we planned our big write, ensuring that we made sure to use all the writing features requires; passive tense, meaningful dialogue, correct punctuation etc. We were then ready to begin our writing, which we will continue next week.

In Maths this week, we have been multiplying fractions by integers and fractions by fractions. On Tuesdays geometry lesson, we continues with position and direction, focusing on the four quadrants, plotting and recognising coordinated placed on a grid. We spent some time discussing whether the coordinates had positive or negative axis in each of the quadrants.

On Thursday, in small focus groups, we practised a passed SATs paper in Maths and Reading, zoning on what each of the questions was asking and how to answer a question in full.

In Science, we have continued our learning on evolution, started off by writing questions that we would like to find out. From this we began to look at some of the similarities and differences that we have with family members, carefully making comparisons.

In RE, we continued our learning on the crucifixion and resurrection, analysing evidence and reflecting on the challenges. We then thought about how the Christian festival of Easter offers hope.

In Geography, we have been looking at deforestation in the Amazon rainforest and the effects this is having. We will continue our research into next week.
