

## Windrush Day

**On Wednesday, it was Windrush Day. This special day takes place on 22nd June, and is a day to remember and celebrate the contribution of the Windrush generation and their descendants. Windrush Day is named after the Empire Windrush Ship that sailed from the Caribbean Islands to Britain on 22nd June 1948 with over 500 migrants from the Caribbean.**



During World War II, thousands of buildings had been bombed in Britain, including houses that all needed to be rebuilt. In the Caribbean, lots of young men and women had served in the British armed forces because at the time, many Caribbean countries were still under British rule and not yet independent..

After the war, some of these people answered an advert to come to Britain where there were lots of different jobs for them to do. Other people just wanted to see Britain, which they had heard so much about. It was the first time that so many people from the Caribbean had come to live in Britain.

When the passengers arrived, they didn't always get the friendly welcome they had hoped for. Many of them experienced horrible racism and discrimination and often found it hard to get proper homes to live in or to find work. In fact some companies openly said they didn't want black people to work for them. Many of their children were even bullied at school because of the colour of their skins. It is hard to imagine that people were treated so badly because of the colour of their skin! We are so lucky at Holy Trinity, we are so accepting, kind and loving to one another.



This year, a statue designed by Jamaican artist and sculptor, Basil Watson was unveiled at Waterloo Station to mark the Windrush generation. The statue shows a man, woman and child standing on top of suitcases and pays tribute to the thousands of people who arrived in the UK. It aims to symbolise "the courage, commitment and resilience of the thousands of men, women and children who travelled to the UK to start new lives from 1948 to 1971."

## Noyes Fludde Performance

Friday 17th June 2022

CCHT School Choirs and Year 4 classes had the privilege of being invited to take part in Benjamin Britten's Noye's Fludde at Holy Trinity Church on Friday. Conceived as a community opera to be performed by children with one or two adult speaking parts, the performance was conducted by William Vann and the voice of God was played by Mr Tolley. The children sang and played in the orchestra alongside professional opera singers and musicians with the church being the ideal venue for this piece as Britten had intended it to be performed in a church, rather than a theatre. They were all outstanding!



## ST LUKE'S SUMMER PROGRAMME 2022

The Summer Programme will again run across three consecutive weeks in July and August and we are planning a spectacular range of activities.

In 2021, over 140 children, aged between 8-15, attended the three-week programme. Daily, up to 80 kids participated in activities ranging from indoor and outdoor games, jewellery making, t-shirt designing, mini-Olympics, dance classes and much more! The food provided by the programme was "fantastic," according to one of last year's participants.



In addition, there were group trips to Go Ape in Battersea Park, Chessington World of Adventures and the beaches and rides at Adventure Island in Southend.

Supporting those leading the programme were the parish's Youth Group. The group assisted with day-to-day tasks and running the various activities, as well as generally offering support and encouragement to the younger children throughout the programme.

The Summer Programme will again bring together children from the local community, from different schools and from different backgrounds to have fun, make new friends and grow in confidence.

This year the annual summer fair, taking place on 11th June 2022 will be fundraising for this amazing cause. We hope to see many of you there.

Wednesday 22nd June






## Recommended Read



### While the Storm Rages (ages 9-11 & up)

It is September 1939 and with war looming, Noah's dad goes off to fight. Noah promises to take special care of Mum and their beloved dog Winn, as Dad says that knowing they are okay will help him to stay safe too.

When he learns of the government recommendation to have pets put down before the bombs start falling, Noah is devastated. He adores Winn and is terrified that, if he breaks his promise to keep her safe, Dad may not return from the war. Noah hastily devises a plan to transport Winn – and as many other animals as he can – to safety. Thankfully, he is accompanied by his best friend Clem, whose unwavering loyalty, quick thinking and practical suggestions help keep them on track. They are joined on their eventful journey by an eclectic mix of creatures, including a hat-wearing donkey, two mischievous kittens and an alarmingly large python.

Inspired by true events, this poignant tale is full of heart. It provides a moving insight into the everyday effects of war on young children and demonstrates the importance of compassion, friendship and determination. Beautifully balanced with moments of humour, this compelling historical novel is a joy to read.




## Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 24<sup>th</sup> June 2022

In English, We wrote our non-chronological reports on mammals of North America. We used our research from previous lessons to write our reports and included key features such as subheadings.



In maths, we finished our unit on time. In our maths meetings this week, we continued to focus on date, time, halves, quarters, shape and multiplication. This week, we looked closely at arrays and practised drawing arrays to help us solve division problems.



In Alphabet Code, we finished investigating the different codes that make the /z/ sound. We discovered **z** as in **zip**, **zz** as in **buzz**, **ze** as in **freeze** and **se** as in **please**.

In RE this week, we read the parable of the lost sheep. We thought about what the story of the lost sheep represents and why God cares for people who are like the lost sheep.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2  
Friday 24th June 2022

This week we had a fantastic time at Sports Day. Thank you to the Parents and Careers who could celebrate with us. We were blown away by the kindness and encouragement our class shared. We even got some medals for our incredible sprints. A very big well done for competing in all the activities, it was a wonderful day. I cannot wait to read your detailed recounts for your homework.



In English we have been inspired by 'When Ocean meets Sky' and have begun to plan and write our own stories. These have focused on a journey to a memory-inspired land. Y2 have worked hard to ensure their plans are detailed and follow the structure of our story. The memory lands sound fanciful such as Eufemia's 'Popcorn world' and Aurora's 'Art town'.



In Maths, we have been developing our understanding of place value within 3 digit numbers and revised our vertical addition and subtraction strategies. This is something we are continuing to work on, particularly carrying over into the tens and hundreds column. Please continue to practice this at home.



Our Science unit, Little Master Chefs, has started with delicious fruit smoothies. We reviewed the health and safety expectations while preparing food and worked carefully to cut and prepare the fruit. These went down very well and most of us asked for seconds!



Our Art unit has progressed from Schweitzer's collages to Matisse abstract shapes. We are working hard to use scissors precisely to create interesting shapes. Please come and see our art exhibition after school on Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> June.

## Learning in Year Three

24<sup>th</sup> June 2022

This week in year 3 we have had a great week celebrating each other's sporting achievements, assuming the roles of Roman soldiers and creating our own traditional tales with a twist.

In maths we continued to look at shape, how to calculate and measure the perimeter and how to identify right angles. We finished the week with a direction challenge where we competed against each other to write the best set of directions using right angle turns to find the finish.

In English we looked at creating our own traditional tale with a twist. We looked at how we could alter the story of Little Red Riding Hood and we came up with some very creative ideas. We planned our story on a storyboard, planned the paragraph where the twist happened and wrote up our story to finish.

In history we looked at what life would have been like for a Roman soldier. We learnt that they had to be in the army for 25 years and that life was pretty hard. We assumed the role of a new starter in the army and wrote a diary entry of our first day. It was great to see how many facts we could all include in our writing.

We also learnt the Latin names for the parts of a Roman soldier's armour.

We had a fantastic day at sports day, thank you for all the parents who came and supported us. Everyone showed great sportsmanship, joined in and most importantly had fun. Well done to you all and a special shout-out goes to our finalists - Teo, Sanidhya and Enrique.

It was great to speak to some of you at parent meetings this week and speak about how well your superstars are doing!

## Learning in Year 4 at Holy Trinity

Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June

This week in English, Year Four have innovated an alternative ending to Chapter Fourteen in 'Mr Penguin and the Lost Treasure'. After brainstorming different possible resolutions, we worked collaboratively to act out possible endings to the adventure. We used our body language and facial expressions to show out the Mr Penguin, Montague and Colin were feeling. This use of role-play helped us to write our own versions of the story. In Maths, we have telling and writing the time from an analogue clock. We have recapped counting past and to the hour. We then used our 5 times tables to help us tell the time past the hour in five-minute intervals.

In RE, we continued to look at the differences between liturgical and non-liturgical worship within the Christian faith. We thought about how Quakers worship in a contrasting way to some liturgical forms of worship; Quakers sit in silence, do not worship in a church building and do not follow a set structure. In Geography, we have started our unit on Volcanoes and Earthquakes. We have learnt about the structure of the earth. The earth is made up of different layers, including; the crust, mantle, outer core and inner core. We now know that the earth's crust is formed of tectonic plates. We learnt that divergent boundaries are where plates move away from one another, and convergent boundaries are where the plates move towards each other.

### Good questions to ask your child this week:

- What is the different between a divergent and convergent boundary?
- What is the name of the location where Quakers meet?
- On an analogue clock, which hand tells you the hour and which hand tells you the minute?

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity  
Friday 24<sup>th</sup> June

In English this week, we wrote up the good copy of our own Greek myth. We have some truly creative ideas, which is a testament to the amount of reading we have been doing this year!

In Maths, we learnt that a tessellation is a pattern of a unit shape that repeats without overlapping or leaving gaps. We practised making tessellations and creating some artwork with them.

This week in History, we learnt about three very important philosophers from ancient Greece - Socrates, Plato and Aristotle. We discovered the effects of their contribution to society, and tried to answer some interesting philosophical questions ourselves.

On Monday, Year 5 went to the British Museum for a presentation on Greek myths. We recognised particular characters drawn onto ancient Greek pots including Herakles (a.k.a. Hercules), Hermes, Medusa and Athena. We learnt how the stories were told chronologically without using words.

On Wednesday, we had Sports Day! What a great day that was. All the students tried their best in team activities and individual running events. Thank you to all parents and carers who were able to help us out on the day - your efforts are greatly appreciated.

On Friday, we celebrated the Midsummer Party. Year 5 joined Year 1 in the morning to create flower garlands - a great opportunity to practise our Shepard & Sheep skills for next year. In the afternoon, we walked to Christchurch where we sang and danced around the maypole.

## Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity Friday 24<sup>th</sup> June 2022

With the Shakespeare performances approaching quickly (next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday), we have been very busy rehearsing and getting things ready for next week.

Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> June 9.30/2.30pm

In addition to lots of acting, we have also been preparing in other ways through artwork that will support our performance, creating an installation, which will be displayed in the hall.

In maths, we completed our learning on ratio, solving more complex word problems.

In English, we have continued with our learning on biographies, preparing to write a biography on Barrack Obama. We took part in some role play, taking turns to take on the character of the former President, this helped us understand his character a little better. Using our previous research (videos and quotes) we found it much easier to get a feel for his character and humour.

In History, we have been learning about where the Vikings raided, traded or settled across the globe from the UK to the Americas.

In shepherds and Sheep this week, we set up some circuits for Reception class to help prepare them for their very first sports day.
