The children will be colouring in a specially drawn picture for King Charles III as part of the morning's activities, which we will then send by special delivery to Buckingham Palace.








Recommended Read



Black in Time ages 9-11 & up)

Author: Alison Hammond and Emma Norry Illustrator: Tinuke Fagborun Publisher: Puffin



This fabulous non-fiction book showcases the achievements of an array of remarkable Black Britons, from the Roman Empire to the twentieth century. While some names may be familiar, many are not, demonstrating that people of colour are woefully under-represented in the history books. This volume seeks to redress the balance, and readers will learn about extraordinary figures, including John Blanke, a talented musician in the court of King Henry VIII; eighteenth-century poet, Phillis Wheatley; and Pablo Fanque, a Victorian circus owner.

Interspersed between stories about these awesome individuals are interviews with inspirational people from present-day Britain, such as author and former Children's Laureate, Malorie Blackman and TV presenter Andi Peters. Also included are informative 'Fact File' sections, which provide overviews of key aspects of Black British history, such as the slave trade and the Race Relations Act.

The stories are arranged chronologically, helping readers to build up a picture of the changing face of Black Britain, and a comprehensive contents page makes it easy to dip in and out. With a chatty, informal style, illustrations throughout and a varied mix of narrative, interviews and facts, this is an accessible, engaging and ultimately uplifting read.


Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- Began our Alphabet Code lessons. We learnt how to read and write the sounds /s/, /a/ and /t/. The children really impressed with me with their determination and perseverance when learning how to write the codes in cursive.
- Explored numbers to 10 in our Maths lessons. We focused on a different numeral
 each day and were challenged to gather the correlating quantity from the beach.
 This helped to develop our 1-1 correspondence, or accurate counting. We were also
 introduced to the counting resource, numicon. We drew around the numicon pieces
 to create fantastic pictures.
- Had lots of fun completing challenges during Excellent Learner Time. We matched
 quantities to numerals, built our homes from Lego and junk modelling, and collected
 objects beginning with the sounds /s/, /a/ and /t/. We also found out facts about
 our new friends and even took turns performing songs on our special stage.
- Had our first R.E. lesson. We discussed the meaning of the word precious and shared items from home that are precious to us. Christians believe that God created us and so we are precious to Him.

Next week we will:

- Learn how to read and write the sounds /p/, /i/ and /n/. We will start to blend the sounds together to make CVC words.
 - Use the story Odd Dog Out as a focus for our writing.
- Introduce the Zones of Regulation scheme and begin to use it as a means to discuss and regulate our emotions.



Continue to explore numbers to 10 in Maths.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 23rd September 2022

In Maths this week we have started looking at number bonds to 10. We have thought about how **two parts** always make a <u>whole</u>. We have even challenged ourselves to do number bonds to 20!

In English, we began reading 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea'. We have had great fun using drama to retell the story. We used role-play to act out the story, sequencing the main events from the beginning, to the middle and then the end. We also used hot-seating to explore how the different characters felt in the story.

In Alphabet Code, this week we have been looking at the /l/ code and writing sentences using this code. Next week, we will start the /ai/ code, so it would be helpful to practice saying and writing words such as; day, play, snail, safe and lazy at home.

In Science, this week we began learning about our senses in particular hearing, we had fun doing an experiment in the playground where we tested our hearing and how different things affect us being able to hear. Next week in science we will be looking at the sense of taste.

In Art, we began looking at Leonardo Di Vinci, we learnt lots of facts about Leonardo Di Vinci and how he was born many years ago! This week in art we began drawing different lines just like Leonardo Di Vinci did in his pictures, next week we will put this into practice!

Next week, in Maths we will be moving on to look at addition within 10. In English we will continue reading 'The Tiger that Came to Tea' and start to describe the characters in the story in more detail.

A fantastic week in Year 1



Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church 23rd September 2022

In English, we have been continuing to explore our story The Big Big Sea. This week we've been preparing ourselves to write our own versions of the story by planning our own beach adventures. Ideas have ranged wildly from people going to the beach with their siblings to eat ice cream to people finding giant sea creatures to take them on submarine adventures! We are looking forward to using our plans to help us write some sensational stories next week.

This week in Maths we have been starting to think about addition and the most efficient strategies we could use. We have though about the merits of various counting on methods (using number lines, hundred squares and place value charts) and then though about column addition and how important it is to have the numbers arranged correctly to make sure that we are adding the correct values. Year 2 have been super neat and tidy in their presentation of strict tens and ones columns, being careful to check their work back. This will stadn us in good stead as we move on to looking at addition with regrouping next week!

Mrs Hermes has been particularly impressed at Year 2's sorting abilities in Science this week. We have started to think about things that are living and non-living and how we prove the difference. Year 2 showed a very mature understanding of some of the life processes which prove that things are alive. They were able to sort many objects accordingly and have an indepth discussion about the fact that many natural materials which have been alive are used to make things which we would no longer consider to be alive, like paper being made from wood.

We have also looked at some more stories about friendship this week in PSHE, looked at the opening words of the Lord's prayer in RE and though about what they mean for Christians around the world, thought about different types of digital devices in Computing as well as enjoying PE, Dance, Music and lots of Reading together!

I look forward to seeing you for another week of fun and hard work next week!

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

Friday 23rd September 2022

Year 3 have made good progress in all of their learning this week, especially in English. Building on from last week's learning of writing simple and compound sentences, they were introduced to fronted adverbials. Fronted adverbials can be used to change the structure, and rhythm, of a passage of writing. Some children thought carefully about which description they could add by using adjectives.

In Maths, we continued to focus on place value – comparing, ordering and building 3 and 4-digit numbers, as well as practicing the 2, 3 and 4 times tables. Next week, this knowledge of place value will help them to add using column addition.

In PSHE, we continued to think about our amazing brains including three important parts called the Hippocampus, Pre-Frontal Cortex and Amydala. This could be a good discussion at home — I wonder if they can remember what these parts help us to do? We also talked a lot about our 'zones of regulation' and how our feelings in one zone may be different to the person sitting next to us.

We began our first Art unit 'Watch this Space' by thinking about how our perspective of objects/places/people/landscapes can change depending on the way we look at it. Lots of sketching from different angles ensued, before we learn about Anthony Gormley next week and take part in a Sculpture walk with Nadia Marchant.

A lot of interesting discussion was had about the many phases of the Stone Age, and the fascination around just how long ago it was/how long it lasted has certainly left the children with a need to know more! A Stone Age workshop at Fulham Palace has been confirmed for next term so please keep an eye out for the info.



Friday 23rd September

This week in English, we looked at the features of a diary entry. We recapped how diary entries are: written in the first person, written in the past tense and recount events in chronological order. We then used a thesaurus to look up synonyms to make our writing more adventurous. Synonyms are words with the same or similar meaning, such as; happy, merry and cheerful. Next week, we will start writing a diary entry from the perspective of Tadeo Jones.

In Maths, we been working out the difference between 4-digit numbers. We know that in order to find out the difference, we need to subtract the smaller number from the greater number. We used bar models to help us solve subtraction problems. We then moved on the answer subtraction word problems.

In History, we learnt about how the Wars of the Roses were a series of battles that took place between the years of 1455 and 1487 in England. The battles were between two families who both claimed the right to the throne. After many years of fighting, Henry VII combined the emblems of the white rose of York and the red rose of Lancaster. This became the Tudor rose.

In Computing, we learnt how the internet is a network of networks. We looked at the main parts of a network, including; a switch and a router. We then acted out how information is shared across the internet and role played how a message moves between networks. In RE, we have looked at the story of Moses and how he was called by God to share an important message with God's people. We reflected on how Christians may feel called by God to a certain role or career. We then discussed how the word 'vocation' can refer to a job that suits a person best. It is also the desire to do a particular job, especially a religious career like being a priest.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- Which punctuation mark do you need to use after a fronted adverbial?
- What does the Tudor Rose represent?
- · What is the difference between a vocation and a job
- What is an antonym?

Learning at Christ Church

Friday, 23rd September 2022

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, children learned how to use cohesive devices to show the passage of time and to sequence the events of our short story *The swing of Change* in chronological order. They have also learned how to use figurative language such as personifications to add description to their writing and how to convey a character's emotions by using emotive language.

In Maths, children have been learning how to round 3 to 5-digit numbers to the nearest 100 and how to make a list of whole numbers that can round to a given number. Children have also been learning how to use estimations to check the answers of additions and subtractions.

In Science, children learned about scientific methods such as fair testing, comparing, classifying, and investigating. They learned that certain scientific methods are more appropriate to conduct specific types of experiments than others.

In History, children learned about the Industrial Revolution, which greatly changed the way people lived and how society functioned during the Victorian Era. The learned about a variety of inventions that were invented during the Victorian Era and about new laws that were passed during that time period.

In Art, children learned about colour and scale and how artists use them to create different types of atmospheres. Children used their knowledge of scale and colour to discuss their use in Grayson Parry's art and they created their own piece of art thinking about the role of scale and colour.

In RE, children learned about the miracle of the woman who touched Jesus's garment and discussed what this miracle tells us about Jesus.

Friday 23rd September 2022

This week in Maths, we have been continuing to look at Place Value. We are now able to read and write 7 digit numbers. We also understand the value of each digit and how we can split numbers into their different parts depending on their value.

E.g. 345, 692 = 300,000 + 40,000 + 5000 + 600 + 90 + 2

In English, we have learnt how to use embedded clauses e.g. The girl, who had brown eyes, swam in the sea. We are working hard on varying our sentence types in order to make our writing interesting to the reader. We also learnt about pathetic fallacy which is a type of personification specifically used for weather to set a mood. We looked at how we can use adjectives, verbs and adverbs that have human connotations to them to create sentences including this imagery. We looked at how we can use our five senses to paint a very clear picture of a setting and immerse our reader. We also wanted to put ourselves into the shoes of our character and so ran around the playground until we were out of breath and then wrote down how we were feeling using chalk e.g. gasping for breath.

In Computing, we looked at variables on Scratch as a start to a game creation unit. In RE, we looked at what suffering means to a Buddhist and the 'Four Noble Truths'. We also learnt about the 'Eightfold Path' which is how a Buddhist believes that you can be without suffering. In Reading, we have continued to look at the Boy in the Striped Pyjamas and wrote a diary entry from the perspective of Bruno about his feelings about moving house.



We ran around the playground and wrote how we felt afterwards using chalk. E.g. lungs burning
