Harvest Assembly will be held on Wednesday 12th October at 2.30pm in the church Please could children bring in their offerings on Tuesday 11th October.



Granny Came Here on the Empire Windrush ages 4-5 & up)

Author: Patrice Lawrence Illustrator: Camilla Sucre Publisher: Nosy Crow



Ava must dress up as someone she admires for a school project, but can't decide who to be, so Granny offers to help. As they search for inspiration in Granny's trunk of clothes, Ava is intrigued when she finds a small, cardboard suitcase, containing four objects: an empty jar, a pebble, a small blue hat and a pair of delicate lace gloves. Granny shares the precious memories evoked by these simple objects with Ava, recounting how she left Trinidad aboard the boat *Empire Windrush* to begin a new life in England.

This poignant tale explores the sacrifices and successes of the Windrush generation, with subtle references to the discrimination many encountered when they arrived in England. It is also a heart-warming celebration of the love between

a child and her grandparent. Atmospheric, full-page illustrations combine emotive colour palettes with a wealth of detail, to provide a rich, visual narrative, which perfectly complements the thoughtful text. This edition features a link to a free audiobook, narrated by Trinidadian actress Martina Laird, with additional sound effects and prompts to turn the page; this will help children to embark on their independent reading journey and adds another layer to this exceptional picture book.

Reception Class Newsletter

Friday 30th September

This week we:

- Learnt how to read and write the sounds /p/, /j/ and /n/. We have had lots of fun learning to segment (write) and blend (read) the sounds together to make whole words.
- Read the story Odd Dog Out by Rob Biddulph. We listened out for rhyming words in the story and thought of some of our own. We also made colourful playdough dogs.
- Drew self-portraits and labelled them. The children were brilliant at hearing and saying the initial sounds in words. For example, /f/ for face.
- Continued to practise writing our names in cursive font.
- Explored numbers to 10 in Maths. We labelled a Numicon number line and worked in partners to completely fill a Numicon base board with the pieces. We also practised our numeral formation.
- Learnt The Story of Creation in our R.E. lesson. We drew all of the things that God created.
- Developed our fine motor skills by making paper snakes. Our lovely shepherds helped us.
- Discussed human growth in our Understanding the World lesson. We ordered pictures of people by age, from birth to old age.

Next week we will:

- Learn how to read and write the sounds /m/, /d/ and /g/ in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Go on our first trip to the Chelsea Physic Garden on Thursday 6th
 October.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 30th September 2022

In English this week we have been writing sentences about the characters in 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea'. We have thought carefully about how the characters look and behave. We used exciting adjectives to describe the 'mischievous and greedy tiger' and to describe how 'kind and generous' Sophie is.

In Maths, we have started our topic of 'addition to 10' we have been adding two numbers together. We have used our knowledge of number bonds to help us add numbers within 10. We have also used the 'counting on' strategy to count on from the greater number. We then created our own addition sentences by drawing pictures and writing numerals.

For Alphabet Code this week we have been looking at the /ai/ code and writing sentences using this code. Next week, we will start the /igh/ code.

In Geography we have been thinking about our journeys to school. We thought about how we travel to school and how long it takes us. We also thought about which features we might see on our way to school and drew pictures to show a map of our journey.

In Science, we looked at our bodies and created skeleton pictures using paper straws! We then identified the different main parts of the body.

In PSHE this week, we looked at our network hands and thought about who we are close to and who we can trust.

Next week, we will be writing our own stories in English! We will using adjectives to describe our characters and familiar settings.

Friday 30th September

This week, Year 2 have had a wonderful week, working hard in so many ways!

Some top quality stories have been produced in English, using all of the terrific ideas from our plans. Here are a few excerpts of our beach adventures: "We walked for one hour until we found a safe place to start our adventure", "I went on a speed boat and saw lots of lovely jellyfish.", "Let's go and find buried treasure!", "When we got home, I had hot, buttered crumpets and snuggled up with my mum." - So many wonderful adventures!

We've also been toiling away in Maths, striving to understand and be able to show addition with regrouping in a clear and logical way. This is an important concept to grasp at this stage so we will be dwelling on it for a few more lessons before we embark on adventures with subtraction!

Elsewhere, we have been carrying on our learning about living things in Science, thinking this week about habitats and why particular animals live in different habitats. In RE, we have focussed on another line of the Lord's prayer as we seek to understand why Christians pray these words, considering what is meant when they say "give us this day our daily bread", seeing that this is representative of God providing for all that is needed. We've also been creating some (early) Christmas artwork in Art, thinking about past and present tense in SPAG, continuing to think about food's journey to our plates in Geography as well as our usual array of Art, Drama, Dance and PE.

What a wonderful week, and there's another one to come next week so rest up over the weekend ready for lots of action!




Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church



In English this week, Year 3 have been learning how to punctuate speech. I wonder if they can remember some of the rules introduced? It would be good practise for them to use these rules when they complete their homework.

We have also revised the basics of addition and subtraction – using base 10 blocks to exchange 10 ones for 1 ten and then write the calculation down using column addition. Next week, Year 3 will use the written methods more and have base 10 blocks nearby for support when needed.

On Thursday morning, we had the very exciting opportunity to take part in a photography workshop with Alison Jackson who is running the competition 'A Day in Your Life'. More details will be sent about this. This session linked very well with our Art unit 'changing places' as the children thought about taking photographs from different perspectives. The children loved meeting a Chelsea pensioner who was thrilled when they asked to take a photograph of her!

We have managed to read a lot more of our class book this week and started to fill in inference grids to identify what we know about the main character and what we can infer about the character using evidence from the text.

Friday 30th September

This week in English, we wrote a diary entry from the perspective of Tadeo Jones. We used our story plans to ensure that we described the key events in chronological order. We knew we needed to include the features of a diary, including; the date, a greeting, writing in the past tense and using the first person. We also challenged ourselves to use ambitious synonyms to share how Tadeo Jones was feeling throughout his adventure. We then reviewed our writing and used our green pen to improve our diary entries.

In Maths, we have been using the CUBES ($\underline{\underline{C}}$ incle the important numbers; $\underline{\underline{U}}$ nderline the question; $\underline{\underline{B}}$ ox key maths words, $\underline{\underline{E}}$ liminate unnecessary information; $\underline{\underline{S}}$ olve the question) strategy to solve two-step word problems. We used this method to help us decide which mathematical operation to use. Then, we used column addition and column subtraction to find the answer.

In History, we travelled back to the Victorian period and experienced what school life would've been like for a Victorian child. We learnt about the 3 R's (aRithmatic, writing and reading). We then practised some dictation and even had a try at doing drills for a mini PE lesson! In PSHE, we looked at personal qualities and sorted different qualities into a diamond nine diagram to decide which qualities are most important and why.

In RE, reviewed the story of Moses and the burning bush from the Old Testament. We considered how Moses felt about following God's call and what God did to help Moses follow his vocation. We were curious to discover how a believer's faith in God might help them to follow their vocation in life. We then decided to generate some interview questions for Father Brian!

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- In Maths, what does CUBES stand for when solving word problems?
- What are two synonyms for addition?
- Which personal quality do you admire most in a friend?
- What kinds of subjects did boys learn at school in the Victorian period? What kinds of subjects did girl learn?

Learning at Christ Church

Friday, 30th September 2022

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. During Special Mentions Assembly this week, Year 5 shared some of the facts they have been learning about in our history topic: the Victorians. The children prepared their facts very carefully in class and it was great to see them take pride in their learning during assembly.

In English, children learned how to use literary devices to build suspense in their writing. Children also imagined, rehearsed and performed a short play to give some information about the barber's background, the main character of the *Swing of Change*. Children started planning their narrative unit recounting the story of Harry the barber.

In Maths, children used their rounding skills to estimate the result of a variety of operations: multiplication, division, addition and subtraction. We have started a new Maths topic this week: factors. Children have learned how to list all the factors of a given number, how to determine if a number is a factor of another number, and how to identify common factors.

In Science, children learned about different types of scientists such as palaeontologist, chemists, physicists and naturalists. Children learned about famous scientists in these 4 fields of science and used their knowledge to create a timeline of famous discoveries.

In Art, children learned about a famous artist called Joseph Cornell. They found out about his life and what inspired his art.

In RE, children learned about the miracle of the healing of the paralysed man. They used their knowledge of miracles to answer questions about Jesus's human and divine nature.

Friday 30th September 2022

This week in Maths, we have been comparing numbers by looking at their digits. We have decided which is larger and smaller by checking the digits with the largest value and comparing. We looked at increasing and decreasing number patterns and figured out the rule for a pattern but deducting the difference between terms. We have been using vocabulary such as increasing, ascending, decreasing and descending to describe the pattern. We had a mini assessment on Place Value to see how we are doing and the children completed it with flying colours.

In English, we planned and wrote our narrative based on Great Expectations. We made sure to show off our new writing techniques such as embedded clauses, pathetic fallacy and 'show not tell'. Once we had written, we spent some time analysing and editing our work. We changed and improved sentences and read our work to a partner to check for sense. In Reading, we have continued to read the Boy in the Striped Pyjamas.

In R.E., we looked at the Buddhist story of the Monkey Kind and acted out the story in groups. We then re-wrote the story from the perspective of the Monkey King. In Art, we drew our self-portraits and made sure to get the colours and shading correct. In Spanish, we learnt about the names for the different parts of the body. We also made a visit to Reception Class and practised our fine motor skills by creating coloured paper snakes.

On Thursday, we went on a trip to the Royal Army Museum to learn about the Blitz in more detail. Finally, we dissected a heart in order to put our learning on the circulatory system into a real-life context.
