

# Black in Time ages 9-11 & up)

Author: Alison Hammond and Emma Norry Illustrator: Tinuke Fagborun Publisher: Puffin

This fabulous non-fiction book showcases the achievements of an array of remarkable Black Britons, from the Roman Empire to the twentieth century. While some names may be familiar, many are not, demonstrating that people of colour are woefully under-represented in the history books. This volume seeks to redress the balance, and readers will learn about extraordinary figures, including John Blanke, a talented musician in the court of King Henry VIII; eighteenthcentury poet, Phillis Wheatley; and Pablo Fanque, a Victorian circus owner.

Interspersed between stories about these awesome individuals are interviews with inspirational people from present-day Britain, such as author and former Children's Laureate, Malorie Blackman and TV presenter Andi Peters. Also included are informative 'Fact File' sections, which provide overviews of key aspects of Black British history, such as the slave trade and the Race Relations Act.

The stories are arranged chronologically, helping readers to build up a picture of the changing face of Black Britain, and a comprehensive contents page makes it easy to dip in and out. With a chatty, informal style, illustrations throughout and a varied mix of narrative, interviews and facts, this is an accessible, engaging and ultimately uplifting read.

Dear Parents and Carers,

What a busy week we have had! We finished with our baseline assessments last week and we have now commenced our lessons: Alphabet code and Maths.

Maths- The children were introduced to our Numicon shapes (1-10). They also worked on their counting, ordering and number formation skills.



We have been working on number formation with this song: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DzKqCmjVXLI

Alphabet Code - This week's new sounds are:

/a/ for apple

/s/ for snake

/t/ for tower

The children have worked on recognising the codes for the different sounds, practising their cursive letter formation and spotting the initial sound in words.

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 23rd September 2022

What a busy week! The highlight of our week was most certainly our trip to Pizza Express. We each got to make a delicious pizza with careful guidance from the chefs. Even though we are in our early days in Year 1, we behaved so beautifully and followed instructions so well. Everyone in the class should be very proud of themselves for a fantastic trip. In English this week we started to look at the book The Tiger Who Came to Tea by Judith Kerr. Quite a few of us were familiar with the story so we discussed what the word familiar means and whether we knew of any other familiar story settings. Then we read the story and acted it out in groups. We have got some future acting superstars on our hands!

In Maths we continued looking at number bonds, in particular bonds to 10. We explored different pairs of numbers that make 10, represented them using cubes and pictures and finally put them into part-part whole models. We practised logging into Numbots on Friday, so we are raring to go with our number bonds practice!

In RE we were busy making posters for our school, reminding children and adults how to take care of each other and the school. This was inspired by a class discussion about looking after God's creation and looking at the instructions he gave Adam and Eve so they could take care of his creation.

We continued with our Alphabet Code lessons where we looked at the different codes making the /igh/. We discovered igh as in high, ie as in pie, i as in kind, y as in by and i-e as in like. Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for /oa/.

In science this week, we talked about our senses, in particular sight. We looked at the eye in detail, the names of each part and what their functions are. We spoke about the amazing pupil that dilates and reduces in size due to the amount of light. Then we drew and labelled diagrams of our own eyes, making sure to check the colour of our own iris before colouring in. To finish, as a class we investigated what the most popular iris colour was.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2022

Very well done Year 2, our shorter week was still jam-packed and you showed great focus and effort in all activities. It has been wonderful to see you settle so well into the routines of Year 2.

In English we have written our own story plan. We are excited to write our own story inspired by our detailed setting and character work on the 'Big big sea'. We planned and began our own story set at the beach and have thought through interesting adventures we can go on. As you are reading this week, continue to spot key adjectives and note down any interesting vocabulary you find as we could use this in our story writing.

This week in Maths we are beginning to add numbers to forty using vertical addition. We are focussing on the importance of our place value columns and remembering to 'always start with the ones'. We are practicing a range of addition methods such as counting on from the larger number and holding a value in our heads.

In Science we defined a living thing using MRS GREN. Understanding that features of living things include movements, respirations, sensitivity, growth, reproduction, excretion and nutrition. We sorted a range of items between living, dead and never been alive. We had interesting discussions around paper, fallen fruit and fossils.

In Art we looked at our next artist as part of our Mother Nature unit, Georgia
O'Keeffe. First, we learnt a range of interesting facts about her then looked at some of
her famous artworks and had a go at creating our own flowers like her designs. I am so
looking forward to hearing your research for homework, Tate kids has lots of helpful
resources.

In Geography we looked at the processes that different foods go through before they get to our plate. This week we looked at the process of making crisps. We discovered that crisps usual take 30 minutes to be made and that packets are filled with nitrogen to preserve the flavour.

During our RE lesson, we reviewed the beginning of the Lord's Prayer and considered why Christians refer to God as 'Our Father'. We understood that some Christians believe that God is a caregiver. We thought about the adults in our lives who care for us.

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 23rd September 2022

In Maths, we have been comparing three-digit numbers using both concrete and pictorial representations. We then compared and arranged numbers up to 1000 on a number line. When looking at a blank number line, we thought about which numbers are helpful to add first. We discovered that adding multiples of 100 and 10 was a helpful starting point. We also practised counting in multiples of 50.

In English this week we continued to practise writing sentences with fronted adverbials to add extra information. We then looked at direct speech and how this is punctuated within texts. We practised punctuating speech correctly within our own writing using our speech sandwhich.


In History, we continued to investigate the Stone Age. This week, we looked at the three periods within the Stone Age: Paleolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic. We compared each period and discussed significant changes that occurred between each one.

In RE, we continued looking at our big question this term, 'What is the Bible's Big Story?' This week, we learnt about the fourth concept -'people of God'. We discovered that God often chooses people who are

weak, have made mistakes and have had a difficult life. It is important to remember that everyone makes mistakes and that is OK! Mistakes help us to learn.







Good questions to ask your child this week are:

- What is included in a speech sandwhich?
- What are the three periods of the Stone Age?
- What Bible stories show us that God's people had to go through challenges and weren't always obedient?

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

# Friday 23rd September 2022

# Welcome back after the Bank Holiday weekend.

Highlights of Year 4 this week include:

#### Maths

This week pupils:

- · Learnt to interpret the difference between two numbers by using column subtraction.
- Carried out simple subtraction within 10 000.
- Revisited subtraction using regrouping (exchanging)

#### English

This week pupils:

- Learnt what the features of a diary entry consist of.
- · Wrote a diary for themselves, describing what happened over one day.
- Practised using a thesaurus to find synonyms.

#### Handwriting:

Pupils continued to practise their handwriting skills with a focussed session on this art. We are using 'high frequency' words to practise handwriting. This means pupils refine their spelling skills at the same time.

#### Science:

This week we explored how changing environments impact living things. We examined natural causes for changing environments and the effect of human activity. Pupils made a link between human activities and natural causes and how these activities have influenced global warming.

## Reading:

Year 4 continued with our class book George's Marvellous Medicine. In addition, the class answered comprehension questions on a text about a tortoise, also named George!

# Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> September

In English this week, we looked at the underlying structure of our model text. We discussed the features of each paragraph and examples from Oliver Twist's diary entry. This will help us when we start to innovate/change the text.

In Maths, we continued learning how to round numbers - now to the nearest hundred and the nearest thousand. We applied our rounding skills to estimate answers to addition, subtraction, and multiplication questions.

Estimating by Rounding

Next week, we are moving onto multiplication so please ensure your child is continuously practising their multiplication skills!

In History, we started to delve deeper into the Victorian Era by learning about the different jobs children had. First, we analysed photos and discussed what we could see, what we thought was happening and any questions we had. One thing we all noticed - all the children were very dirty and didn't look very happy. We then explored the details of each jobs and the dangers that were associated.

In PSHE, we discussed how *identity* is how you see yourself and how other people perceive you. For example, I identity as a teacher/educator, yet if I walked down the street people might not see that. We then compared our identity with our classmates - what is similar between us and what is different.

## Snack

Please ensure your child brings a snack to school. Students who are not hungry and are well hydrated perform better n the classroom, show increased concentration and are less likely to be irritable and disrupt their own learning.

# Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2022

In English this week in year 6, we have been looking at building a character using a range of descriptive language. We then used personification to 'show not tell' a character's fear. In our following lesson we learnt about a technique writers use called pathetic fallacy where an inanimate object i.e. weather can be given a human emotion or action. We discussed how the boy would feel as he walked through the graveyard, learning how to describe how his body and face looked.

In Maths, we have continued our learning on Place value, focusing on ordering number, comparing the digits in each place. We then moved on to sequencing number, recognising the difference between them and begun to use the nth term. To consolidate our learning so far, we completed an activity, putting our knowledge of place value to the test!

In Science, we have continued our learning on vertebrates (spine) and invertebrates (no spine). We explored the similarities and differences between the different species.

In PSHE, we began learning about mental health. As a class we looked at how mental health is defined. We recognised that we can have positive mental health and that our bodies and mind are closely linked – we found ways of keeping our minds and bodies healthy.

In Art, we completed our self-portraits, taking particular care in the proportions of our face. In RE this week, we took a trip to Holy Trinity Church, where Fr Yarislav taught us about the first holy sacrament, baptism.
