




Recommended Read



Tyger (ages 9-11 & up)

Author: S F Said Illustrator: Dave McKean Publisher: David Fickling



Adam is a boy living in London, but not as we know it. In this alternate universe slavery was never abolished, which has left the UK in a sorry state with rich overlords ruling over a sprawling poor and people with origins anywhere apart from the UK particularly vulnerable to abuse and exploitation. That includes Adam's family of shopkeepers. Then Adam meets an awe inspiring talking tiger, called Tyger and experiences mysterious powers. A truly evil baddy Sir Mortimer Maldedye wants to capture Tyger for his horrible Menagerie and threatens the whole world. Can Adam and his friend Zadie (short for Scheherazade) harness the powers of their imagination, find The Guardian and actually change the devastating course the world is set on?

This is a thought-provoking, profound, political and spiritually profound book. The myths, legends and violence of real life history, woven into the fabric of the story trigger lots of thoughts and perhaps further investigation by young readers, as will the vocabulary used. This book will most suit confident readers, and would be a perfect book for a

child who has enjoyed Philip Pullman's His Dark Materials trilogy (Northern Lights and beyond) or perhaps The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe (perhaps Aslan and Tyger would have been friends). For an engaged reader this will be a rich experience. A book to cherish and read again.


Wraparound Care at Holy Trinity

Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity Friday 14th October 2022

Dear Parents and Carers,

This is what the children have been up to this week:

English - This week, we listened to the story The Colour Monster by Anna Llenas.

- -The children sorted the emotions: happiness (yellow), sadness (blue), anger (red), fear (black) and calm (green) into different jars.
- -They drew out things that make them happy, sad, angry, scared and calm using the correspondent colour to match the emotion. It was amazing to see how they represented each emotion, some children used scribbles to express their fears and some children drew smiley faces to represent happiness.
- -They planned what materials they would use to make a 'sensory bottle'. They cut out different images such as glitter, petals, pompoms etc. and stuck them on a bottle. Then, they had a go at labelling the different materials. Some children wrote the initial sound in words and other children attempted to write the words.

"'p' for petal"

"I can hear 'p..t..l' in the word 'petal'"

- -Some children have started making their sensory bottles and they look amazing!
- -We have worked on building CVC words (pig, mat, dog)

Maths- Reception have compared quantities to 10 and have used the following vocabulary: more than, less than, greater than, smaller than, fewer than, the same. They made 'number trains' using cubes to compare two quantitates.

'5 is greater than 3'

"Can you make a number train with fewer than 7?"

Alphabet Code:

Sounds that we know: /s/, /a/, /t/, /p/, /i/, /n/, /m/, /d/, /g/, /c/, /k/ and /o/. This week we have introduced to the children to tricky words (words that we have to remember). The first word is: I.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 14th October 2022

What a great week, we have been working especially hard on our listening skills and improving our retrieval practice.

This week in English we looked at planning our own version of a Tiger Who Came to Tea, thinking of a new animal who would visit us for tea at our house. We thought of a whole new bank of adjectives to describe our animals and how they would behave and move around our homes. We are looking forward to writing our stories up in neat next week!

In maths we looked at subtraction and what it means to take away. We looked at subtraction number sentences, how to cross out objects when we are taking away and how we always start with the whole when we subtract.

In science we looked at one of our senses in more detail, using our ears to hear. We learnt about how our ears pick up sounds and how sound moves in waves. Then we listened to a range of different sounds, first predicting what they were and then deciding whether we liked the sound. It was interesting to find out that some sounds we liked, other people didn't. We finished the lesson by finding out what actually made those sounds, some of them took us by surprise!

In PSHE we spoke about how we are all unique and because of this, we all show kindness and recognise kindness in different ways. We read the book 'I Am Almost Always Kind' which helped us realise that sometimes something that might seem funny or a joke to us, might come across as unkind to others. We spoke about how we can show kindness and to think before we say or do something just in case it causes upset.

In Alphabet Code we looked at all the different codes for /l/ sound. We discovered l as in leg, ll as in bell, le as in bottle and el as in camel. Next week are going to be investigating all the different for the /s/ sound.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 14th October 2022

This week we had a fantastic trip to Goodwood farm, a huge thank you to the parents who were able to come with us and to those who offered to help. We have lots of wonderful trips coming up and we can't wait for you to join us. We had a fantastic day learning about where our food comes from. We met cows, calves, pigs, sheep and saw cows getting milked. We also made our own butter and enjoyed eating this on a cracker and trying organic milk from the cows. Our brilliant day lead to some fantastic recount writing.

In English we enjoyed exploring our understanding of traditional tales. I hope this goes well for homework. We found that lots of traditional tales repeat key phrases such as 'I'll huff and I'll puff or 'run run as fast as you can'. We acted out our favourite traditional tale in groups and performed them to our class. Later in the week we explored our new text 'Princess and the frog'. We asked the frog some insightful questions such as 'Why were you turned into a frog?' and 'How did you feel when you met the princess?'.

This week in Maths we have been developing our accuracy when it comes to reading the question carefully to make sure the correct operation is being used - a very important skill! We have also been dipping in to lots of applied topics in our Maths Meetings, from money to shape and time!

In RE, we considered why Jesus asked his followers to forgive. We thought about what forgiveness is and why it is asked of Christian.

This lead to a great discussion on intent and kindness. Our class kindness wall is overflowing with examples of our kind play.

During our Music lessons we are preparing for a range of songs and look forward to sharing these with you in special mentions assembly next week.


Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 14th October 2022

This week has been a busy week of outdoor learning for Year 3! On Wednesday, we went on a wonderful sculpture tour around Battersea Park with our blue plaque guide Nadia. Nadia showed us many interesting sculptures and features of Battersea Park, as well as sharing many interesting facts. We also went to the Science Museum this Friday!

In English this week wrote the rest of our versions of Taking Flight. We thought carefully about details of the story that we know, but that the reader wouldn't know and how to include these. We made sure to read and check our work to check for spelling mistakes, missing words and correct tense.

In maths, we focused on subtraction with regrouping in tens. We know that first we subtract the ones. If we do not have enough ones, we need to regroup from the tens and exchange one ten for ten ones.




In RE this week, we looked at parables. We discussed what parables are, which parables we know and why Jesus used them. We then had a go at creating our parables with a message for people today. Some of our messages included: taking care of nature, looking after each other, being grateful for what we have and not spending too much time on technology.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4 Friday 14th October 2022

Highlights of Year 4 this week include:

Maths

This week pupils:

- Reviewed learning from this term's maths lessons.
- Revised place-value.
- Consolidated column addition and subtraction.

Times tables

Using a times-table grid, the class worked hard at practising their times-tables. Importantly, children identified the times-tables they are unsure of.

English

This week pupils:

- Answered literal questions about a text (The Storm).
- Learnt how personification is used by authors (to paint a clearer picture of something, using words).
- Identified the use of personification in The Storm.
- Described the weather, using personification.

Art

Year 4 explored the life of the artist Frida Kahlo. Pupils also considered how artists use their art to reflect their own feelings and life experiences. Finally, pupils created a drawing, using colours, inspired by Frida's work.

Spanish:

The class reviewed their knowledge of colours, numbers and the weather.

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 14th October

This week in English, we started innovating our model text. Our model text is a diary entry from when Oliver asked Mr Bumble for more, now we are going to write about Oliver meeting Artful Dodger and Fagin. We planned our new text and next week we will try to incorporate all the skills we have learnt – fronted adverbials, show not tell and contractions.

In Maths, we learnt how to multiply using column method. First, we multiplied numbers by a 1-digit number and then moved on to multiplying by a 2-digit number. We discussed how important it was to put the 0 down when multiplying by the tens column, so that all our digits are correctly aligned.

In Art, we read a book about an artist called Joseph Cornell. Joseph Cornell liked to collect things that he saw and he would incorporate them into his shadow boxes – this is why his art is referred to as **cclectic**. Next term, we will create our own shadow boxes about endangered animals.

On Wednesday, Year 5 went to the Science Museum to watch a live show called, called Feel the Force. In the show, we learnt about different forces (including friction, gravity and air resistance) and saw them in action.

From Mr Link

In RE, we looked back at the miracles of Jesus that we have covered this term. We compared and contrasted the Wedding at Cana with the Feeding of 5000, and explored what these miracles tell us about both the humanity and divinity of Jesus. In Science we decided to research the life and achievements of Nikola Tesla, who discovered how to use AC electricity. We learned about all the ways his discoveries and inventions have benefited our lives, even today. In Computing, we collaborated on an online presentation and discovered both the advantages and disadvantages of working together online. We also enjoyed adding transitions and animations to our presentations.

Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity Friday 14th October 2022

In English this week in year 6, we have completed our gripping story openings. We made sure that our stories were gripping and full of suspense for our reader. Then we had a look at the editing process, understanding how to evidence where we had used the different writing tools we have learnt about. In addition to editing to include any that we had missed to further improve the quality of our writing.

In Maths, we have been busy as it has been assessment week! We have put our knowledge to the test to complete 3 assessments.

In Science, we completed our bread experiment, evaluating our results in the table. We found that the bread stored in different places, produced different results. Ones kept in the fridge were mould free but those in darker places had a significant amount of mould. However, one group had mould free bread for each of their samples!

In PSHE this week, we have been discussing positive body image. Body image is how we think and feel about our body. It can be about how we see ourselves physically or how we think others see us.

During Shepherds and Sheep this week, we had a go at producing leaf rubbings for a wonderful display.

In SPAG, we have been looking at the active and passive tense.

In Art this week, we began to explore the art movement, Pop art. Starting off by looking at some of the key arists, Andy Warhol, Jasper Johns, Roy Lichtenstein and Jean Michel Basquiat. Before we can begin produce our own pop art inspired work, we revisited the colour wheel, reminding ourselves of the primary and secondary colours. This will help us when we look at more pieces of artwork, understanding how the artist has used complimentary colours in their work to make it POP!
