



Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity

Dear Parents and Carers.

This is what the children have been up to this week:

English- This week, we learnt all about Holi Festival. The children listened to the story 'The Festival of Colours' and completed the following activities:

- -Letter formation
- -Sentence building: 'Holi is messy and fun.' and 'Holi is in the Spring.'

Next week, we will be learning about Hanukkah.

Maths- In Maths, we focused on 2D shapes: circle, triangle, square and triangle.

- -Recognising the shape.
- -Counting the number of sides.
- -Making patterns.

Some children learnt: oval, semicircle, pentagon and hexagon.

Alphabet Code:

This week's new sounds are: /f/ /ff/ /I/.

Tricky words (words that we have to remember): I, the, my, to, said, you.

Outdoor learning: Reception class were very excited to make their own playdough by themselves. They used flour, salt, oil, water, paint and a measuring cup to make the playdough. They loved the gooey, sticky sensation while mixing all the ingredients. They also realised the importance of being precise with the ingredients so the texture of their playdough was perfect. If it turned out too sticky, they added more flower to the mixture (problem-solving skills).

Tooth brushing for Reception

The oral health promotion team are visiting holy Trinity school on 22nd November to carry out tooth brushing and fluoride application with the children. All children taking part will require parent consent and will receive a free toothbrush and fluoride toothpaste.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 18th November 2022

We have had a wonderful week in Year II We have all had such a positive attitude towards our work, each other and striving to do our best. This was well timed as we focused on Friendship Week this week, looking at being a good friend and celebrating each other's differences.

This week in English we continued to focus on adjectives and vocabulary that could best describe what a person might have seen, heard and smelt during the fire. We created our own word banks, ready for our extended writing next week where we shall be retelling an account of the Great Fire of London.

In maths we combined our addition and subtraction learning together, to help us create number families. Using two parts and a whole, we looked at their relationship s adding the parts to find the whole and starting with the whole when we subtract.

Then we moved onto shapes where we recapped how many 2D shapes we knew, how to define them and how to differentiate them. We had fun sorting them into groups, making shape pictures and using them to create patterns.

In RE we learnt about the good news that Mary learnt from Angel Gabriel. We looked at Luke's gospel and picked out the words or sayings that showed us how good this news was and how this baby was not going to be any ordinary baby.

In Alphabet Code, we continued to investigate all the codes for the /e/ sound. We discovered e as in bed, ea as in bread and at as in said and a as in any.

To kick off our history topic looking at the Gunpowder Plot we had an exciting trip to the Tower of London. It was such a great experience to visit the Tower, learn a little bit more about why we remember Guy Fawkes and what he tried to do.




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 4th November 2022

Thank you for a wonderful week! It has been jam packed and it was wonderful to see so many of you for our Parent Meets ©

On Tuesday we enjoyed our 'into film festival' cinema trip and watched The Bad Guys. We laughed through our film and it was a great treat.

In our English lessons we have been using first person to write our own something fishy stories. These have been full of expended noun phrases such as Alex's introduction 'One late evening, I was sitting in a quiet laundrette yawning when suddenly I saw a blue shining light.' To increase our vocabulary choices please explore synonyms for our homework.



In Maths we are developing our 'making ten' strategy to solve equations with two digit numbers. This involves a confident understanding of our number bonds and place value. We are developing our fluency with this.

In History, following our research on our local hero Brunel, we made our own inspired Clifton Suspension Bridge. These were wonderfully engineered and required great teamwork.

In Art we are exploring the works of Kurt Schwitters and created our own-layered collages. We used rubbings, newspaper and tissue paper to create our art.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 18th November 2022

This week was a busy week for Year 3! Early in the week, we went to Fulham Palace to take part in a Stone Age workshop as part of our History unit. We learnt about the history of the site as an early settlement for Stone Age people where many artefacts have been unearthed. We then had the chance to handle some of these artefacts and discuss their uses. Some of them were over 7000 years old! We also separated into small groups and imagined we were Stone Age people. We built shelters, foraged for food and set traps for animals.

We also had our trip to the cinema this week. We went to the cinema in the Arches, we sat back, relaxed and watched Asterix: The secret of the magic potion.

In Maths, we focused on our three times tables this week. We practised counting in threes and solving multiplication and division sums within the three times tables. We looked at the relationship between multiplication and division and we looked at how we can use our multiplication facts to solve division sums.

In English, we began the planning process for our own bedtime stories based on 'The Dragon's Egg'. First, we generated ambitious adjectives to describe our dragons before moving onto a story plan where we detailed the key events.

In RE, we started our Advent unit. This week, we looked at what Advent and Epiphany mean and how these terms relate to the Christmas Story. We then looked at some excerpts from the Bible, which foretold the coming of Jesus and what he would do on Earth. We then thought about what we think are the most important jobs to be done in the world today.

Good questions to ask your child this week are:

- What does Advent mean?
- Who used to live at Fulham Palace?

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 18th November 2022

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week Year 4:

- Learnt how to carry out multiplication with and without regrouping by multiplying a 2 or 3-digit number by 2,3,4 or 5.
- Worked on multiplication word-problems.

English

We continued with writing descriptions of a storm which includes the use of personification, fronted adverbials, simile, powerful adjectives and adverbs. This week we paid particular focus on creating atmosphere for this descriptive piece and considered what we wanted our reader to experience.

History

In preparation for our trip to Hooke Court next week, Mrs Johns explored The Tudors. Year 4 considered when this period took place and what it means to be a child during this time. All this learning will be reinforced during our trip next week when we immerse ourselves into everything Tudor!

Science

On Monday we walked to the Chelsea Physics Garden to explore an exciting range of habitats, including a pond and log pile. Year 4 learnt to identify a variety of plant and animal species and discovered how different species have become well suited to unique habitats.









Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 18th November

In English, we used the answers from our interview activity last week to form quotes for our newspaper article. We also explored the difference between informal and formal language and found formal alternatives for words including responded (answered) and assisted (helped). In Maths, we all worked our hardest to learn long division. It is a long process but by the end of the week, we were feeling much more confident.

In Art, we applied our understanding of texture to draw our endangered animals and draw the texture of their skin (fur, scales, feathers etc.) Next week, we will be planning the habitat portion of our project ready to be made using materials.

We also started looking at Christmas and what it means. We discovered which Christmas traditions are in the Bible and which have grown up in later years.

In Science, we started making parachutes to test air resistance. We managed to do two lessons in one because we also recorded video of our experiment for our computing lesson! We had our first go at making a video using the different types of shots we learned about last week.

We had an exciting time this week in Year 5! We went to see Chef Katie in her kitchen and made chutney out of apples, raisins, onions and vinegar. We had a lot of fun chopping, mixing and stirring!

Reading

As discussed with many parents over the last two weeks, it is really important we raise the profile of reading and encourage our children to read for enjoyment. Children who read and are supported as readers, develop strong reading skills and do better at school.

The Book Fair will be at Cadogan Gardens from Friday 18th - Thursday 24th November. Year 5 students will be attending the book fair on Wednesday 23rd November to browse and buy, so please send your child with their money clearly labelled.

Money raised at the Book Fair goes back into the school which helps us purchase new books for the children to enjoy.

Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity Friday 18th November 2022

In Maths, we continued our learning on decimals. Comparing and ordering decimals in ascending and descending order. On Geometry Tuesday, we began revising angles, reminding ourselves of the different types of angle; acute (less than 90°), right angle (90°), obtuse angle (between 90° and 180°), straight line (180°), angle and reflex (more than 180°).

In English, we have completed our writing on the Hunger Games, editing and improving our action openings. We worked very hard to make these gripping for our reader and they did not disappoint! Then we had a free writing activity, creating a diary entry from one of the characters points of view, recounting the reaping (where the Games contestants were selected). These were fantastic, full of 'Show not tell' and emotive language. On Thursday we began our new writing unit, focussing on letter writing. We read a letter from a WW2 evacuee back to their mother. Focusing the volume, expression, tone and inflection of how we read a text.

In SPAG, we practised our spellings.

In History, we went to the Poppy museum in Richmond. We learnt about how the Poppy factory was set up and the meaning behind this symbolic flower. We learnt about Major George Howsen, the founder and his experience and journey. The Poppy factory is still making handmade poppies and wreaths today (although many of the poppies we wear are produced by machines outside London). After our talk, we were able to explore the museum space, looking at how the poppy has changed over the last few decades. To end our trip, we had a go at making our own poppy wreaths and individual poppies! We had a lovely lunch in Richmond in the gardens before heading back to school on the tube.
