Sunflower and Olive oil


Long-life Juices and Milks - including dairy-free



Stupendous Sports: Fantastic Football (ages 6-8 & up)

Author: Robin Bennett Illustrator: Matt Cherry Publisher: Firefly Books



According to FIFA, there are over 250 million people playing football in 200 countries, and an estimated 3.5 billion fans: nearly half the people in the world! All the more reason for there to be plenty of books about football for young fans who want to know about how football came about, the amazing stories connected to the sport and all the facts about how it's played and who plays it.


Stupendous Sports: Fantastic Football begins with the origins of football in China more than 2000 years ago, followed by its existence later in England as "foteballe" – a rough, violent game which could feature hundreds of players, with goals miles apart and with so much fighting that King Edward II banned it in 1314. Fortunately, of course, football is very different nowadays, and the book also charts the rise of women's football which is, today, rapidly growing into a very successful sport.

Following this with chapters on the positions of the players within a team, how a match works, skills and tactics and the future of the game, this amusing and well-written guide to football is a really enjoyable read, even for people who aren't fans. However, its main appeal will be to die-hard football enthusiasts, who will find an awful lot to enjoy.

Why learn Spanish?

The importance of the Spanish language is undeniable. Spanish is the official language of 21 countries and is spoken by over 420 million native speakers. Once children learn Spanish, they will find it easier to understand other Latin based languages and it can further their career opportunities. Learning another language helps children with communication skills and it opens up their minds to the world.

Why learn Spanish online?

There's no beating online lessons for convenience. Your child can take a lesson with a native professional Spanish teacher while they're sitting at home. Online lessons help students to gain confidence through the opportunities they are given to practise at their own pace. It is a very important part of our strategy to keep children active by not just sitting for an hour in front of the computer but by doing activities that involve moving around. The parents can, if they wish, participate in some of the tasks. It can be fun!

How does it work?

Our online Spanish courses take place on Zoom. You can connect from a computer or mobile device. The classes are conversation-based taking into account all four language skills: speaking, listening, reading and writing. The students are placed into a group according to their age, level of Spanish and whenever possible with their friends from the same school where they can interact in a virtual Spanish environment. They will have access to unlimited resources using videos, podcasts, reading, grammar exercises and games. The variety of activities we use keeps children motivated.

Who are we?

Escuela TALK is a traditional classroom-based language school for children 3 to 18 years old, in Spain. However, the age of the pandemic moved almost all our courses online. Puri Black (Perez-Castro), MA Ed London University, was born in Spain and moved to London where she studied, and worked for over 30 years. She started her career working as a Spanish University Lecturer and then set up her own company, Global Languages, providing language training for thousands of students from the public and private sectors. Puri moved back to Spain and set up Escuela TALK, as a Director, in association with Silvia Perez-Barco. Silvia is a Spanish/English teacher, Pedagogy degree holder, UNIR, Universidad Internacional La Rioja, Spain. Silvia is a CELTA qualified teacher (Cambridge) and she also holds a Certificate in Educational Neuroscience by the Montessori Institute, Barcelona.

Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity

Dear Parents and Carers.

This is what the children have been up to this week:

English - This week, the children have worked on:

- -Building CVC words (pig, mat, peg, tap)
- -Writing short words using their sounds and codes.
- -Writing short sentences: The cat sat. / The pig is big.

Maths- The children have been working on:

-One more/ one less than a given number. They used a number line to spot the answers.

Alphabet Code:

Sounds that we know: /s/, /a/, /t/, /p/, /i/, /n/, /m/, /d/, /g/, /c/, /k/ and /o/ /ck/ /e/ /u/ /r/ /h/ /b/.

Tricky words (words that we have to remember): I, the, my.

Reading and writing progression:

- -First I need to be able to recognise and say the sounds for each code.
- -Next, I should be able to spot the initial sound in words.
- -After, I should be able to blend CVC words such as tap, dog, pig etc.
- -Lastly, I can begin to write short sentences using tricky words and CVC words that I know.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 4th November 2022

What a wonderful week back to school! I hope you all had a restful half term break, we were all certainly raring to go this week and worked our socks off!

This week in English we started learning about the Great Fire of London. We started the week by sharing all our amazing facts that we had researched over the half term holiday. This gave us good practice in reading aloud and to an audience. Then we discussed what other information we would like to find out about this historical event. This led us into looking at questions, the importance of using the 5 Ws - what, when, why, where and who and using a question mark at the end of our questions.

It was times tables week this week so in maths we focused on counting in multiples of 2s, 5s and 10s. We looked at the patterns created by the skip counting on number lines and used cubes to add 2,5 or 10 each time to see what was physically happening.

We were each assessed on counting in multiples of 2,5 and 10 and really impressed with how much we already knew. The times tables target card shall be stuck into the back of the homework books and come home next week.

In science this week we concluded our Who am 1? topic with looking at our final - sense. We touched different materials and described how they felt. We worked hard to think of interesting and different adjectives.

In Alphabet Code, we continued to investigate all the codes for the /or/ sound. We discovered or as in fork, aw as in paw, ore as in more, our as in door and al as in ball.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 4th November 2022

Thank you for a lovely week it has been great to have you back so refreshed and ready to learn.

In English we have been enjoying a visual story called 'Something Fishy'. We drew our own visual story maps and retold the tale to our partners. We also generated interesting expanded noun phrases around the laundrette and underwater adventure our character went on.

This week has been times table week and we have been revising counting and recalling our multiplication facts for our 2's, 5's and 10's. Lots of us are happy to count and use our fingers to count in multiples; we now need to recall key facts from memory. I have put a times table target sheet at the back of your homework books. Please keep practicing these throughout the year.

Thank you for your wonderful half term homework we enjoyed sharing your acts of resilience, kindness and bravery. We are noticing these in our classroom and they are fantastic to see.

In Art we are exploring the works of Kurt Schwitters abstract collages and began to create our own rubbings to use in our collage work next week.

In RE we have been exploring our new unit Jesus as the 'light of the world' through art work. We reviewed the symbol of light and reflected on why Christians believe Jesus is the light of the world.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 4th November 2022

In English this week, we began our new unit on bedtime stories. We started by reading a story from a text and then listening to a story being told orally. We thought about the key features of oral storytelling, such as intonation, pausing and using a clear voice, and we discussed the impact this has on the listener. We then read the story again ourselves and answered some questions based on the texts. Our goal was to be able to infer meaning using evidence from the text.

In Maths, we continued to practise subtraction within 1000. We practised solving subtraction sums with regrouping in hundreds, tens and ones


In RE, we discussed the meaning of Remembrance Day. We discussed what remembrance means and we looked at the different days of remembrance in November. We then made our own poppies to wear for Remembrance Day.

In PSHE, we continued our topic on Growth Mindsets. This week, we looked at the Amygdala. We learnt that when this part of the brain senses danger, it can overrule the upstairs part of our brain and take over. This is why we can find it hard to regulate and think before we act. We then looked at some strategies to help us when we "flip our lids".

As it has been Times Tables Week this week, we have been practising counting in 4s and using Times Tables Rockstars in the computer suite. Please continue to practise 2's, 5's, 10's, 4's, 3's and 8's at home.

- Who are we remembering on Remembrance Day?
- What is the Amyadala?

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 4th November 2022

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week was 'times-tables' weeks at CCHT. All children took a times-tables test to identify which ones they need to focus on. They then filled a 'target' card which they glued into their homework books. Throughout maths this week, we have focussed on 'sixes', 'sevens', 'eights' and 'nines'. Our working memories had a particularly strenuous workout!



English:

We contrasted two texts: The Storm and The Storm Cat by examining their similarities and differences. Pupils then 'magpied' their favourite sentences from these texts and went on to adapt the sentences – to make them their own.

Science:

Year 4 began a new unit in Science: Sound. Using rice placed on a drum, we were able to see how rice behaves like air molecules when the drum is struck. The skin of the drum vibrated and made the rice jump. We learnt that as air molecules vibrate against each other, sound waves are formed, and the sound of the drums can be heard.

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 4th November

Welcome back to another term in Year 5! This a busy term with lots of trips, learning and festive fun.

In English, we started our new unit called *The Lighthouse*. We watched a clip about an incident a lighthouse, then ordered and retold the story. Our final product for this unit will be to write a news article, so this week we learnt about two features - headline and orientation - and practised writing both.





It is Times Table Week at school, so we have been busy practising our times tables and multiplication skills. Times Table target cards have been sent home which outline which multiplication facts your child is currently needs to focus on. Please ensure they are practising their times tables at home.

In History, we learnt about all the amazing inventions of the Victorian Era including the flushing toilet, automobile, dynamite, bikes and the camera (and so much more!)

This week in RE we thought about our new virtue: wisdom. We discussed what wisdom is and how being wise is different to being clever. We learned about King Solomon, and how he used wisdom to make good decisions.

In Science, we started our new unit on Forces. We discussed vocabulary and dived straight into learning about gravity! We went into the playground and dropped two different sized balls to see how gravity affected them and explored how to use a Newton Meter.

In Computing we reminded ourselves of the importance of being safe online. We looked at some examples of people who need our support, and what we could do to help, including the best place to report online problems.

Learning at Holy Trinity Friday 4th November 2022

It has been Times tables week in school this week, so we have been busy practising our times tables in class, assessing our knowledge as well as coming up with fun tips and tricks that have helped us with our learning. It is essential that we know our times tables in Year 6 and can recall them quickly as this will help us with our learning in maths.

In Maths, we consolidated our learning on negative number, putting this knowledge into practice, we were able to answer a number of word problems and reasoning questions. This is something we will need to continue to cover over the course of the year. We then began our new topic, decimals! Revising the place value of tenths.

In English, we have jumped straight back into our Hunger Games unit, deconstructing a text, looking at how the author has created suspense and used several writing techniques to describe the fire scene. As a class, we were able to recognise the use of personification of fire (and how this made for a more exciting read), adverbials and 'show not tell'. Then we had a go at writing our own section describing what our character might have been able to hear whilst being chased by the fire.

In Science, we have started our new topic, the heart and circulatory system. Using non-fiction books, we answered initial questions about the heart and created questions which will guide out research for the topic.

In SPAG, we put our spellings to the test and learnt about silent letters, 'bile' and 'able' suffixes.

In Art this week, we have been learning about the famous Pop artist, Yayoi Kusama. Analysing her works on pumpkins, we looked at how she used form, colour and repeating pattern. This set the foundation for our very own still life sketches of munchkins. We will be working on these over the next couple of weeks to create a canvas painting of our very own Kusama inspired pumpkin art piece.

In History, we learnt about Evacuation during WW2. In 1939, thousands of children had to be evacuated to the countryside, away from bombings in major cities across the UK. We learnt what this experience would have been like from the eyes of a child. Asking some interesting questions, we were able to use real life news footage and iPads to further research about evacuation. Then we watched a clip from the story, Carrie's War, which is about a 14-year-old girl and her brother who are evacuated from London to Cardiff in Wales. This helped us understand the process some of these children went through.
