# The symbolism of Christingle

Each element of a Christingle has a special meaning and helps Christian's to remember God's love for them:

- The orange represents the world
- The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ
- The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations
- The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.

# Christingle - Fundraising for The Children's Society



The orange represents the world.



The red ribbon indicates God's love wrapped around the world and the blood Christ shed on the cross.



The dried fruits and sweets are symbols of God's creations. For many people, they also represent the four seasons.



The lit candle symbolises Jesus, the light of the world, who brings hope to people living in darkness.

for the Children's Society. We are hoping to send out collecting envelopes next week but unfortunately they haven't arrived yet. 

# The Grumpus and his Dastardly, Dreadful Christmas Plan

(ages 5-6 & up)

Author: Alex T Smith Publisher: Macmillan Children's Books



The Grumpus does not like Christmas. In fact, he doesn't like most things. Apart from Brussels sprouts. He loves those. One day he has had enough of all the festive jolliness in his town. He and his only friend Stick (a stick) come up with a dastardly plan. And he sets off for the North Pole to stop Christmas once and for all.

Naturally, along the way, there is Danger and Adventure. But there are also Unexpected Turns - and the Grumpus must decide what (and who) he really does like and dislike.

Packed with humour and Alex T. Smith's trademark beautiful illustrations (in full colour), and with a casually inclusive Black Father Christmas (spoiler alert!), this is a heart-warming festive treat. Alex T. Smith gives a nod to classic characters like The Grinch and Winnie the Pooh, but makes the Grumpus his own, and in doing so he explores the true meaning of Christmas. Younger children will love cuddling up and sharing this story, and older children will also enjoy reading it and spotting details in the illustrations. A fantastic gift book for primary-aged children.

Dear Parents and Carers,

This is what the children have been up to this week:

English - This week, we have continued learning about: Christmas. The children completed the following activities:

-They wrote a weekend recount.

'On the weekend I went to...'

- -They wrote down the different steps to make hot chocolate.
  - 'Add the milk' 'Mix the cocoa' 'Heat it up' 'Fill the mug'
- They read and matched some captions.

'Santa is big' 'Santa has a red hat'

Maths- In Maths, we reviewed: matching numeral to quantities, ordering numbers to 10/20, comparing quantities up to 10.

'10 is greater than 5'

# Alphabet Code:

This week we have reviewed all the alphabet sounds and the children have been practising how to read and write CVCC words. They have learnt that there are 5 vowels: a, e, i, o, u and that the rest of the letters are called consonants.

# Understanding the World:

The children made some delicious hot chocolate! They designed their own Christmas cups and followed a step by step recipe to make hot chocolate.

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

# Friday 8th December 2022

In English we were introduced to expanded noun phrases, where we use two adjectives separated by a comma to describe a noun. We had great fun thinking of more adjectives to describe the owls and the forest that they live in. We finished our week by making nests for our owl babies - thank you for all the cardboard box donations everyone!

In Maths we looked at numbers to 20. We looked at place value, what 2 digit numbers are and that numbers from 11 to 19 have one ten and then ones added on. We represented the numbers using a 20 frame, discussing making 10 first and then adding the ones afterwards.

We looked at Seurat's pointillism in computing this week. After looking carefully, we noticed his painting were created from a series of dots, we decided to make our own sunflowers just from dots. It took a steady hand but we managed to create some beautiful sunflowers.

The highlight of our week was going to Lambeth Palace to watch the Travelling Crib. Despite our frozen toes, we had a great time meeting significant characters from the Nativity story - Mary, the Shepherds, Zacharius, one of the three kings and a few donkeys along the way! We were also able to share how much we have learnt about Advent and the Nativity in our RE lessons. Thank you to all our fabulous (and frozen) parent

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 9th December 2022

Thank you so much for your wonderful kindness on such a busy week! We have been so proud of you all on our incredible trips.

During our English lessons we have enjoyed exploring a beloved author, Jill Murphy. This week we have read many of her stories in school and shared experiences of her works at home. We worked hard to make predictions based on book covers and even acted out scenes from her book 'The last noo- noo'. We performed our scenes and answered questions in character making inferences from the text.

In our Maths work, we have been exploring division through sharing into equal groups. We need a range of resources and sweet practice dividing. We insured each group was fair and related this to all multiplication facts.

During our science learning, we have consolidated our work on materials through a trip to the National Army Museum. We took part in the workshop

to find the most suitable materials to build a shelter for our own soldiers. These were built with great thought and care, and we can discuss the effectiveness and properties of a range of materials.

As part of our RE learning, we experienced the travelling crib. Actors and animals helped us to re-enact the story of advent, and we asked insightful questions while we learnt about the story of Christmas.

Thank you for your enthusiasm and joy for learning. We have been so proud you all.

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

# Friday 9th December 2022

This week in English, we continued our Christmas Poetry unit. We answered questions about Talking Turkeys and we looked at the features of acrostic poems. We then had a go at writing our own acrostic poems all about turkeys.

In Maths, we continued working on multiplication and division. This week, we consolidated our knowledge of the 2s, 4s and 8s. We then looked at multiplying larger numbers by 10 and using our knowledge of the ten times table facts to help us.

We also had our trip to the Jewish Museum this week! We took the tube to Camden and visited the Jewish Museum where we learnt all about Judaism. We discovered the meaning behind Shabbat, and we even got to taste some Challah bread and grape juice. We also learnt about the Torah, Hebrew and we even tried writing in Hebrew ourselves.

In PSHE, we thought about how to manage our emotions. We discussed what it means to 'listen to your emotions' and talked about positive ways to handle our emotions, which can sometimes be tricky!

We are looking forward to seeing many of you at the Christchurch and Holy Trinity Christmas Fair this Saturday!

# Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4



# Highlights of this week include:

### Maths

### This week Year 4:

Learnt how to solve one and two-step word problems by drawing bar models. Children had to decide whether to use multiplication, division, addition or subtraction at each step of the question. Here is an example of the questions and models they were answering and constructing.



# English

We continue our unit 'persuasive writing' and put the spotlight on the finer details of what goes into a successful written advert. Pupils identified and used (in their own writing) adjectives, exaggeration, conditional and modal verbs to write persuasively. Children also practised varying sentence lengths so give their writing more impact.

### Science









We continued our Sounds unit and explored the reasons sounds become quieter the further we are from the sound source. Year 4 then went on to build their own 'string' telephone to put into practice everything they had learnt (see the above photos).

# Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 9<sup>th</sup> December

This week in English, we put together all the parts of our newspaper article by writing a draft copy. We will be editing these and publishing a good copy next week.

In Maths, we have been practicing our skills of finding equivalent fractions by multiplying the numerator and denominator by the same number. We then applied our skills to solve reasoning and problem-solving questions.

Multiply 
$$\frac{2}{3} = \frac{4}{6} = \frac{8}{12}$$

This week in Art, we went down to the lab to paint parts of our animal habitats. Next week, we will be finalizing our designs, gluing all the pieces down and incorporating our endangered animal.

In History, we revised all the learning we have done on the Victorians. We went through our books and wrote down all the topics we have covered (Queen Victoria, transport, jobs, health, crime and so much more) and shared this with each other.

This week we did a double catch up of RE! We discovered what makes Christmas Carols different to other Christmas songs. We listened to some of the most popular and decided which one spoke to us the most and why. Some of us liked the beautiful words, and some of us loved the way a certain song evoked fond memories of Christmases past. We also looked at the symbolism of the Christmas story, including the stable, the shepherds, the Wise Men and their gifts.

We also finished and evaluated our videos in Computing. We watched each other's videos and gave each other stars and wishes!

In PSHE, we discussed needs and wants and sorted items into those categories. We realized that this was not as easy as we originally though. For example, shoes can be both need (need them if you don't have any or if yours are broken) and want (you have enough shoes but you want more).

# Learning at Holy Trinity Friday 9<sup>th</sup> December 2022

In Maths, we continued our learning on addition and subtraction. We began by practising adding larger numbers using the column method, including decimals, ensuring that we carefully lined up the value when adding. Following this, we practised subtracting a small number from a larger, understanding that subtraction is not commutative like addition. In English, we have been busy writing a letter home as an evacuee. Writing in the first person, we reflected on our learning n evacuation drawing on facts we have learnt in History to make our letter believable. We tried to include several writing tools that we have learnt over the last few months; embedded clauses, passive tense, ing verbs and fronted adverbials. Our letters were full of description; describing the journey and experience to the countryside and the emotions that children would have felt throughout this time. In Science, we had an exciting lesson this week, dissecting a sheep heart. We have been learning about the effects that drugs and alcohol can have on our organs, particularly the heart. We were very mature in this lesson, bravely feeling the heart and explored the ventricles and aorta.

In history, we learnt compared the bombing in Coventry (1940), Hiroshima (1945) and Hamburg (1943). We looked at the differences and similarities between each of these catastrophic events.

In RE, we looked at whether Christmas advertisements deliver the Christian message and values of Christmas. Analysing a range of John Lewis and BBC adverts from the last few years. Although they may not have directly delivered the Christian message, we found that many do represent some of the Christian values of generosity and love.

In Art, we have continued with our Yayoi Kusama inspired munchkin canvasses.

Next week: Please ensure that your child brings their Christmas costume to school in a named bag on Monday. Unless your child has been told otherwise, Year 6 will be wearing a Christmas jumper. If you do not have one a Christmas coloured jumper and winter hat will be perfect. Children will be wearing PE kit on Tuesday.
