

MEDICATION

Please be reminded that the only medication that should be brought into school should be prescribed by a Doctor.



Parents should come into school to complete a School Medication Consent Form before any medication can be administered. Medicine must be in their original container and labelled clearly with the contents, your child's name and dosage information.

If your child uses regular medication, such as Asthma inhalers and Epi-pens, it is important that they are in school and in date. Please make a note of the expiry dates to refresh your memories when the medication needs to be replaced. Where possible, it is advisable that we have two Epi-pens and Asthma inhalers in school for emergency purposes.

For emergency situations, we keep generic Salbutamol inhalers and Epi-pens in school that can be used, but we do need your consent for your child to use these. If you would like to consent to this, please contact Mrs Phillips for a consent form.

Thank you so much for the essential donation of food, we are so grateful. In-kind donations are so important, offering simple yet vital contributions which save Glass Door thousands of pounds each year. Thanks to your gift, more people will have a route off the streets into a safer and more stable future.

Despite the adversity caused by the pandemic and its ongoing effects, we are proud to say that in 2021 we supported 249 guests into more stable accommodation, helped 52 into work, and another 108 to access benefits. Our caseworkers continue to help guests who are both new to the street or who have long histories of rough sleeping to find routes out of homelessness, no matter what barriers they are facing. We would not be able to do this without the kindness of our supporters like you.

The cost of living crisis is a huge cause for concern at our organisation. Though much of our work is focused on those currently experiencing homelessness, we also see many people at our partner day centres who are at risk of becoming homeless, as well as working with people who have been helped into accommodation to ensure they do not become homeless again. With many people being forced to choose between rent, energy costs and food, a huge amount of people are at risk of losing their homes. We are so grateful to have your support at such a difficult time.

A guest supported by our casework service has said that 'it is great to know that we are not alone and that there are people like Glass Door to help people like me who are going through difficult times'. We will always strive to treat our guests with compassion, dignity, and respect. This would not be possible without your generosity, and belief in our vision for a future where no one has to sleep on the streets of London.

THANK YOU again for your support. Together we will help more people to get off – and stay off – the streets of London.

Speak Up (ages 9-11 & up) Author: Rebecca Burgess Publisher: Quill Tree Books



Mia has a huge secret – she's Elle-Q on-line, viral music star and inspiration to many teenagers. She sings about how she feels, which is what they feel too. However, in real life, Mia doesn't have many friends and is bullied because she's autistic. She likes to wear headphones to block out noise, and often sucks on her necklace, which others at her school find weird. When they make fun of her. she finds it tricky to talk back. Luckily, her best friend Charlie gets her, and they collaborate on Elle-Q's music. Charlie writes the music and Mia the lyrics.

When there's a local talent show, Charlie is desperate to enter. They stand a good chance of winning. But is Mia ready to show the world who she really is?

Written and illustrated in colour by an autistic creator, this graphic novel is accessible and deeply heart-warming. There's a sub-plot about friendship and fitting in, which will resonate with any reader. There's also a sub-plot about Mia's mother, who just wants Mia to fit in, and gives her advice, such as looking peo-

ple in the eye. This is shown to be unhelpful, and by the end, her mother – who only wanted the best for her - fully supports Mia being herself. Readers will be cheering Mia on!



Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity

Friday 6th January 2023

Dear Parents and Carers,

Happy New Year! I hope you had a lovely Christmas break. The children have eased back into our school routines and have been super excited to share their beanstalk project with their peers. What a fantastic job they've done!

This is what the children have been up to this week:


English- This week, the children listened to the story of Jack and the Beanstalk and completed the following activities:

- -Retold the story using actions.
- -Acted the story out using props.
- -Sequenced the story.
- -Wrote a holiday recount.

'Over the holiday... I went to my nan's.'

Maths- In Maths, the children have been introduced to the concept of addition by adding two different parts together (two amounts). As you might have seen on this week's homework, the children have also been working out how many different ways there are to make 10. For example: my whole is 10. How can I make 10? One part is 1, one part is 9 and my whole is 10.1 + 9 = 10. We have worked out the answers by giving the children 10 cubes and letting them share the 10 cubes between the two parts (the two circles).

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 6th January 2023

Happy new year and welcome back to school everyone!

In English we finished our topic of Owl Babies with writing a retell of the story. We focused on use time conjunctions and expanded noun phrases to order our story and make it more interesting. Then we had lots of practice in reviewing our writing by checking for punctuation, checking what we had written made sense and making any changes in green pen.

In Maths we continued to work with numbers to 20. We looked at comparing numbers, using vocabulary such as more, less, greater than and less than. We also looked at finding one more and one less than a given number.

We had a first Dance lesson in Year One this week which we thoroughly enjoyed. We certainly have some movers and groovers in our midst!

In Computing this week we started our new topic of working with robots. We were introduced to Beebots, we looked at their buttons and what each one might do. Then we learnt about the different commands and importance of each button. Then we had a go at making our own sequences and even tested our partner's button knowledge by making secret sequences!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 6th January 2023

Thank you so much for returning to school with such excitement and eagerness to learn, we have had a very busy week.

A big thank you to those who were able to join us for our parent meeting introducing the upcoming term. Lots of our upcoming units lend themselves well to visitors- if you have any areas of experience please let us know, we would love to have you as a guest speaker. Please also feel free to sign up to an available reading slot with Mrs Sheehan. Each Monday from 2.45 we would love a parent to come and read to our class. It would be wonderful to hear a range of languages, stories and favourites from home.

As part of our maths unit we are learning how to read an analogue clock to five minute intervals. We have a big focus on using the key vocabulary o'clock, quarter past, half past and quarter to. Please continue to practice this for homework and if you can incorporate it into your daily routine, for example reading the time before coming to school.











In English we are comparing Jill Murphy's later works of 'The Worst Witch'. We have begun to compare the character of Mildred Mubble to our monster Marlon in 'The last noo-noo'. We have also completed some spelling assessments so that we can incorporate daily targeted spelling strategy practice. Rather than our previous spelling homework. A copy of these will go home in your HW books next week for reference. Please don't feel you need to learn these all, we are focussing on a set each week in school. Our joy book this week has been Alice in Wonderland and we have enjoyed travelling with her down the rabbit hole.

In Geography we have began our new unit deepening our understanding of the seven continents and the animals that are adapted to each environment. We enjoyed listing the counties we knew of the available

During our RE unit we have began to learn about Judaism through the religious celebrations and festivals. We are looking forward to developing our understanding of Yom Kippur next week.

Our PE unit this half term will be developing our throwing and catching skills through netball!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 6th January 2023

Welcome back! We hope you all had a lovely Christmas break, It was fantastic to see so many children back to school at the start of the week, ready to learn.

We jumped straight back into lessons on Tuesday, starting with Maths. This week, we continued to work on multiplication and division. We used part-wholes to help us break down and solve larger division sums (without an exchange). We know that we can partition a number into tens and ones, and then divide each individual part. We have been practising using related facts to help us solve problems with larger numbers for example, if I know 3 divided by 3 is 1, then I know 30 divided by 3 is 10.

In English, we started a new unit called Marshmallows. In this unit, we will be learning how to structure and write a non-chronological report. We began by watching a short clip about a creature; we then used the visual clues to build a description of the creature using exciting adjectives. We then had a go at writing a character description. We tried to include similes and apostrophes for possession within our writing.

In Geography, we began our unit called 'Where in the world are we?' In this unit, we will be exploring location and the uses of different types of maps. We began by looking at where we are in London, before zooming further out to look at our location in relation to the UK and the wider world.


In RE, we started our unit 'What does it mean to be Jewish?' In this unit, we will be exploring Judaism. We began by recapping any previous knowledge, before looking more closely at the story of the covenant between God and Abraham. We discussed why it is important to keep promises.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 6th January 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week the focus has been on mental calculations. Pupils used their knowledge of number bonds to carry out strategies to work out these calculations. This involved using:

- The 'add tens followed by add ones' strategy.
- The 'add tens and subtract a number' strategy.
- The 'subtract tens followed by subtract ones' strategy.
- The 'subtract tens and add a number' strategy.

We also revised learning from the Autumn term, included place-value, column addition and subtraction.

English

Our lessons this week involved researching information about animals and their habitats. Pupils were given information sheets about one type of animal and were set the task of choosing the 3 most important facts. They had to justify why they felt their chosen 3 were the most relevant. These facts and justifications were written down and then presented to the class. Year 4 went on to practise retrieving information from a text while answering literal and deduction type questions. Finally, pupils had the opportunity to generate their own questions of this type.

Spellings

Year 4 have really honed their spelling skills this week as we had a spelling test on the words learnt over the holiday. In addition, we have focussed on many of the words we use every day, but can be tricky to spell.

RE

We started our new RE unit 'Hinduism' and explored what Hindus believe about God, the Aum symbol and simple patterns used in Hindu art.


Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 6th January

Welcome to Spring term! After a nice long Christmas break, we've all come back to school ready to learn and have some fun.

In English, we started our new unit based on the Brazilian fable, How the Brazilian Beetles Got Their Coats. To start our unit, we first learnt what is 'culture' and our own cultural identities. We used the iPads to research Brazil and find facts about its culture, then read our fable and identified unknown vocabulary.

In Maths, we have started our unit on Statistics. We started off by practising reading pictograms varying keys, interpreting tables and matching these with bar charts. We are also learning how to solve reasoning problems by applying the skills we have learnt and using problem solving.

This week we started new topics in RE and Geography! In RE, we began our unit on Sikhism by looking at the history of the area where Sikhism started, and learning about the life of the first Sikh Guru, Guru Nanak. In Geography, we combined our knowledge of the states of matter with our knowledge of water. We remembered that there are three states of matter: solid, liquid and gas; and we learned new vocabulary to describe changes from one state to another. Next week, we will apply our knowledge to our learning about the water cycle.

In Computing, we competed in a quiz about online safety. It was a very close quiz, but The Gaming Quivers team won by one point! We also looked at our new Google Classroom for the very first time!

Swimming is on every Thursday of Spring term. Students will need to wear their swimming costume/trunks (plain navy blue) under their PE uniform. They will need to bring with them: a towel, a pair of goggles, a swimming cap, a pair of easy slide off shoes and dry underwear.

Please ensure <u>all</u> of their school clothes are clearly labelled - we share the changing rooms with other classes and other schools. If your child's uniform is not labelled, it is very easy to get it mixed up.

Learning at Holy Trinity Friday 6th January 2023

It was lovely to see everyone return to school this Tuesday fresh faced, we jumped straight back into learning this week.

In English, we have begun a new unit; persuasive arguments. We started off by analysing a script, where a child was trying to persuade her mother that she needed a new game. We noted devices that had been used: technical language, flattery and emotional arguments, statistics and the 'many' people argument (running with the crowd). Then we had a go at writing our own playscripts in a group, where children set the scene of a child presenting a persuasive argument to a family member that they need a mobile phone. Ensuring that we used the persuasive devices we had learnt about, we came up with some very well made points both for and against children having a mobile phone. To end the week, the children performed their scripts and provided positive and constructive feedback to peers.

In Maths, we have begun looking at multiplication in its written form, multiplying by both 1 and 2 digit numbers. Please refer to the maths calculation policy that can be found on the school website to support your child at home. https://www.ccht.rbkc.sch.uk/articles/maths/
On Tuesday, we looked at calculating missing angles on a straight-line using a given angle. We learnt about adjacent angles and will be using this more in our next geometry lesson.

In RE, we have started our new unit, Buddhism, we had an intro on the faith, learning about Siddhartha and how he became Buddha, in addition to the main beliefs. In history, we caught up on our final lessons on WW2 before we begin our new topic for this term. We learnt about three major bombings that happened during WW2, the bombing at Coventry, Hiroshima and Hamburg. Reading a newspaper article on each, we were able to highlight key facts from these sources, recording this into a table, we could then compare the three events and the devastation each had caused.

In Science, we have been learning about
