

Luma's best friend in the world is Timir, a very cute puppy-like creature who sometimes turns into a baby dragon. Yet, when Timir gets the hiccups, purple flame starts bursting out of his nose! What will Luma do?

In the second story in this book, Luma takes Timir to a dog show to compete but what will happen when his dragon side comes out?

This is the second book in the Luma series from Leah Mohammed but can definitely be read on its own without having read the first. As well as containing two sweet stories about a girl with a pet dragon - The Hiccupping Dragon and The Prickly Tickle - it's refreshing to see a diverse heroine in a chapter book series of this kind - certainly welcome for many mid-primary aged children who routinely don't see themselves in books aimed at them. Having two stories in the same book is also perfect for children who are just starting with chapter books, as it means that they can get the sense of achievement from having finished a story rather than having to read the whole book.

Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity

Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you for attending to our spring term Class Meeting! I hope you found the information useful.

This week, Reception have focused on:

Literacy- We have continued to listen to the story of Jack and the Beanstalk. The children have practised retelling the beginning of the story 'Once upon a time there was a boy called Jack. He lived with his mum in a cottage'.

Alphabet Code: /qu/- for queen, /ng/- for ring.

Tricky words: please continue to review as many words as possible using the tricky words book. The children need to be able to both read and write all high frequency words.

Maths- we have continued to work on adding two different parts together using objects, numicon and cubes.

I have noticed that some children have regressed with their numeracy skills. Could you please review: number recognition, **number formation**, counting objects up to 10. Thank you

Understanding the World:

This term the children will be learning about different modes of transport. In the next following weeks they will make their favourite mode of transport using junk modelling materials. Could you please donate empty boxes, loo rolls, lids, milk bottles etc. for this project which is linked to our Design and Technology Week! Thank you

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1 Friday 13th January 2023

In English we started our new topic of Traditional Tales, looking at the story of The Enormous Turnip in particular. We discussed what a traditional tale was and thought of lots of examples we already knew. Next, we had great fun acting out the story, focusing on our facial expressions and body language to show how much hard work it was to pull the turnip out. We finished the week by writing a letter to one of the characters asking for their help. We recapped the format and purpose of a letter and then learnt how to use persuasive language to engage and encourage the reader.

In Maths we used our number bonds to 10 knowledge to help us with our number bonds to 20 and adding two numbers within 20. We focused on explaining, if I know..., then I know whilst working out addition questions.

For example - If I know 7 + 3 = 10, then I know 17 + 3 = 20.

In RE we looked at the Ten Commandments that God gave Moses after the Israelites escaped from Egypt. We discussed why it is important to have rules and what might happen if our world had none. Then we worked in groups to create a set of our own ten commandments.

In science we started our topic of Polar Adventures. We started our topic off with sharing any of own prior knowledge and then creating some questions that we would like to learn an answer to by the end of the topic. We came up with some interesting questions and look forward to answering them later in the topic.

In Computing this week, we focused on the importance of commands and instructions being clear and making sense. We explored what could happen if instructions weren't clear by working in partners and trying to direct each other around the hall. We found that without saying how many steps to take forwards, the person would continue to walk into the wall! Then we transferred this learning into inputting clear commands into the Beebots.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 6th January 2023

Thank you for your enthusiasm this week! We are so impressed with your creative story ideas. This week we have been planning and writing our own stories using known characters from 'The Worst Witch'. Mildred goes on quite the adventure on her broomstick and even makes things explode during her potions test. Khumo's fantastic introduction reads: 'Our story starts with a young, curious witch who was known for being clumsy and adventurous.' We are so enjoying the use of expanded noun phrases and have even tried to include adverb such as shockingly, surprisingly, unfortunately.

In our maths learning, we are moving on from time but please continue to practise this skill regularly. We need to read the time to five-minute intervals. We are now exploring measure through height, length and width. We are ensuring we always start at zero to get an accurate reading. We are practicing using rulers and meter sticks.

Our much-anticipated design and technology unit focusses on building a racecar for the driver Ayrton Senna. This week we explored building a range of car models and next week we will need to evaluate a range of car toys to create our own success criteria. If you have a toy car at home could you please bring it in for evaluation on Thursday! We will use them for our lesson and send them back with you on the same day. Once we have made our design choices, we will begin to design our own racecars for Ayrton Senna.

Many adults have commented on our team working skills and this week there was great encouragement for our peers as we developed our throwing and catching skills in PE lessons. In dance, we created our own mirror image dances and responded to our peers kindly.

We travelled to Antarctic in our Geography lesson this week and learnt lots about how emperor penguins are adapted to suit their environment.

Thank you to those who have booked in to read with us in our Monday afternoon slot! We are so looking forward to seeing you.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 13th January 2023

In English, this week we focused on identifying paragraphs and writing paragraphs of our own. We use TiPToP to help us remember when to begin a new paragraph. We have also been looking at the features of non-chronological reports and we began to write our own non-chronological reports on the imaginary creature 'the mallodile'.

In Maths, we continued practising division. This week, we looked at dividing a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number, with an exchange. We practised borrowing and exchanging one ten for ten ones when the ones could not be divided equally. We also explored division with remainders.

In RE, we continued our exploration of what it means to be Jewish. This week, we looked at the importance of the Shema and we made our own Mezuzahs.

In Geography, we looked at the meaning of latitude and longitude and we plotted the key lines of latitude on a world map. We also discussed the meaning of climates and we discussed why different places in the world have different climates.

In PSHE, we started our families topic. We discussed what family means and what different families look like. We learnt that families come in all different shapes and sizes, but the most important factor is that people in a family care for each other.

Good questions to ask your child this week are:

What is latitude?

What is the Shema?

What does TiPToP stand for?

Reminders:

For DT week next week, we will be making our very own photo frames. We are asking each child to **bring in one photo** to go inside their frame. This could be a family photo or a photograph of someone/something special.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 13th January 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week Year 4 have continued with our Mental Calculations unit. We have:

- 1. Used the 'add 100 and subtract a number' strategy to do mental addition.
- 2. Used the 'add 200 and subtract a number' strategy to do mental addition
- 3. Used the principals of 'commutativity' to work out multiplications
- 4. Applied number bonds to work out multiplications
- 5. Recalled related multiplication facts to find division facts.

English

This week Year 4 started a new project: writing a script (voiceover) for a documentary film about an animal. Children chose an animal from one of five films and their task was to search for information that would work well as a voiceover to support the film. We then went onto to consider what is the best way to organise the information using headings and subheadings.

Science

This week we continue our unit on electricity 'Power It Up'. Year 4 identified common appliances that run on electricity and compared items that are powered by a mains supply and those that are battery-operated. We then learnt how to keep safe when working with electricity.

RE

In our Hinduism unit, Year 4 explored the purpose and significance of Puja which included looking at the objects on a Puja tray. Pupils also drew a shine and labelled the key features.

It was great to see many of you at the Year 4 class meeting this week.

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 13th January

This week in English, we have dived deep into the story of How The Brazilian Beetle Got Their Coats. We reviewed what we know about speech marks and highlighted the speech in the text using a different colour for each character, then used this to perform a puppet show of the story. We also analysed the characters in the story, thinking about what they are like and what evidence the text gives us.

In Maths, we have continued learning about Statistics. We have been comparing data and finding the difference (using subtraction) when looking at pictographs and bar graphs. Then we moved on to learning how to read and draw line graphs – which involves us being very focused and precise.

This week, we started our new Science unit called *Material World*. In groups we thought about and came up with definitions for the words 'object', 'material' and 'properties' which will come in handy throughout the unit. In RE this week we learned all about Guru Nanak's successor, and about how important names are for Sikh people. We learned that all boys have the middle name Singh, which means lion, and all girls have the middle name Kaur, which means princess.

In Geography, we continued our learning on the water cycle, connecting it with our science learning on changes of state. We learned words like 'precipitation' and 'condensation'. We also learned that the water we drink now is the same water the dinosaurs drank!

In Computing, we logged on to our Google Classroom and learned how to post comments. We enjoyed reading each other's comments, and we discussed how we can make sure we have a safe online classroom.

DT Week(s)

Over the next few weeks, we will be participating in a DT project titled Musical Instruments where students will learn about different types of musical instruments and create their own using found objects. In order to complete this unit, students will need to contribute some items that can easily be found at home:

Margarine/butter pots, plastic bottle lids with ridges, empty food containers, empty tins, rolls (toilet or kitchen), tissue boxes, rice, paper plates etc.

Reminders:

- Swimming is on Thursdays.

Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity Friday 13th January 2023

In English, we have continued our learning on balanced arguments, focusing on how we would use

formal language in an argument. In our following lesson, we looked at how we can use the PEE (point, evidence, explain) structure to help form our arguments making sure that each point is evidenced. We learnt that in a balanced argument, you will always have equal number of for points as against. Then we were ready to conduct our very own balanced argument, titled, 'Mobile phones; should children have

them in school?' We have come up with some persuasive points that have been thoroughly justified on either side of the argument, ending with our personal views on the subject. We drafted an introduction and conclusion and added in sentence starters such as 'moreover' and 'on the other hand' to make our writing flow.

In Maths, we practised word problems and reasoning questions including multiplication. Finally, we moved onto long multiplication where you are multiplying numbers by 2-digit numbers (see below). In these questions, we must take into account the value of the digit in the tens column by adding a zero on the second line. Finally, we must add the two multiplication sums together. On Geometry Tuesday we practised finding a missing angle around a point. Reminding ourselves that a full turn (angles around a point) is equal to 360°, the known angle is then subtracted from the total to calculate the missing angle.

In Geography, we have begun a new unit on the Amazon. We learnt that the Amazon is located in South America. The Amazon rainforest is a biome that covers most of the Amazon basin of South America. The Amazon River is the largest river in the world and stretches across a number of countries. Using Atlases, we mapped out the borders of each country in South America; Amazon basin and Amazon river.
