#### UNIFORM LABELLING

A polite reminder to label your child's clothing with their name.



We always do our best to return all your child's

belongings at the end of the day, but sadly, with 30 children in each class this can be difficult if the belongings aren't labelled.

All of their uniform looks the same and often the same size. Please help us to look after your child's belongings by labelling everything.

When we find clothing with names in, we will return it to the child. Thank you for your continued support.

#### **MEDICATION**

Please be reminded that the only medication that should be brought into school should be prescribed by a Doctor.



Parents should come into school to complete a School Medication Consent Form before any medication can be administered. Medicine must be in their original container and labelled clearly with the contents, your child's name and dosage information.

If your child uses regular medication, such as Asthma inhalers and Epi-pens, it is important that they are in school and in date. Please make a note of the expiry dates to refresh your memories when the medication needs to be replaced. Where possible, it is advisable that we have two Epi-pens and Asthma inhalers in school for emergency purposes.

For emergency situations, we keep generic Salbutamol inhalers and Epi-pens in school that can be used, but we do need your consent for your child to use these. 



## Luma and the Hiccupping Dragon (ages 6-8 & up) Author: Leah Mohammed Illustrator: Loretta Schauer Publisher: Welbeck Flame



Luma's best friend in the world is Timir, a very cute puppy-like creature who sometimes turns into a baby dragon. Yet, when Timir gets the hiccups, purple flame starts bursting out of his nose! What will Luma do?

In the second story in this book, Luma takes Timir to a dog show to compete but what will happen when his dragon side comes out?

This is the second book in the Luma series from Leah Mohammed but can definitely be read on its own without having read the first. As well as containing two sweet stories about a girl with a pet dragon - The Hiccupping Dragon and The Prickly Tickle - it's refreshing to see a diverse heroine in a chapter book series of this kind - certainly welcome for many mid-primary aged children who routinely don't see themselves in books aimed at them. Having two stories in the same book is also perfect for children who are just starting with chapter books, as it means that they can get the sense of achievement from having finished a story rather than having to read the whole book.



## Reception Class Newsletter

#### This week we:

- Learnt how to read and write the sounds the sounds /ch/(chip), /sh/(fish) and /ai/(rain).
- Continued to explore number bonds to 10 in our Maths lessons. We dropped double sided counters and counted the red and blue parts. We also used numicon pieces to add two parts together and find the whole number.
- Continued to use Jack and the Beanstalk as a focus for writing. The giant visited our classroom! We wrote him a letter to cheer him up, as he was sad without his hen and harp. We also wrote the second half of the story and drew pictures to match sentences that we had read.
- Made papier-mâché eggs which we painted gold. We also made harps and hens from junk modelling.
- Read The Big Orange Splot in Art. It is about a man who decides to change his grey, dull house to one which is covered in beautiful colours and patterns. We designed our own dream houses. Next week, we will design the inside.
- Listened to the story of the Lost Sheep in our R.E.
  lesson. It taught us that God is like a shepherd and He
  looks after us, like a shepherd looks after his sheep. We
  role-played and took turns pretending to be the
  shepherd and the lost sheep. We also created a large
  sheep, each adding one cotton wool ball.

## Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

### Friday 13th January 2023

In Maths, we looked at addition to 20 by making ten. We have been focussing on our place value recently and grouped our tens together and then added on our leftover ones. Next week we will start subtraction within 20.

In English, we have read the traditional story 'The Enormous Turnip', which is a traditional tale in Russia. We then discussed how the story teaches us an important lesson of how we have to work together and keep trying to succeed. We then wrote a letter to a character from the story.

In Alphabet Code, this week we have been learning the /oi/ code. Next week we will learn the /j/ code.

In Science, we started our new topic of Polar Adventures! We talked about the polar regions. We discussed how polar mean opposite, so learnt that the two polar regions are on opposite ends of the world. We then looked at the different animals that live in the different polar regions.

In Geography, we continued learning about The United Kingdom. We learnt about the capital cities of England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. We then thought about key landmarks in all of these cities, such as:

In Spanish, we have been learning about the Spanish numbers.

In Computing, we have learnt how to give our BeeBots different commands. We decided to command our BeeBots to move in a circle and as a class discussed how we would make this happen.

#### Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

13th January 2023

In Maths, we have had a wonderful week measuring everything in sight! We have thought carefully about the different units that we use to measure length and their abbreviations (mm, cm, m and km). We have thought carefully about which of these would be most appropriate for measuring different items, estimated measurements and then checked using rulers and metre sticks and even been outside to measure the dimensions of the playground.

In English, we have continued to use Jill Murphy's stories of Mildred Hubble, The Worst Witch to help us to create of own adventures. The children have come up with some very creative ideas for what Mildred might do to get her into trouble and what her strict teacher's punishment might be for her!

In SPAG, we have begun to think about strategies for learning **new spelling words** and discussed the fact that our brain needs regular exercise just like our muscles to help it to grow stronger connections. The list of words that they are practicing in school each week this half term is in the back of their homework books for you to see and to practise if you'd like but please note that with this new scheme, there will be no weekly or fortnightly testing for the children as we want the focus to be on applying spelling in our writing. There are currently three groups for spelling, which have been decided on which sounds they were weaker on in the baseline test. Each group will look at a variety of sounds and spelling patterns as we move through the year.

Elsewhere, we have looked at Rosh Hashanah (Jewish New Year) and thought about how this celebration is marked, started looking at the inhabitants of Antarctica and how emperor penguins are adapted to live there in Geography. We have looked at some of the people who work in our local community doing jobs to keep us safe and to keep things moving in PSHE, designed cars according to a design brief in DT and practiced some songs and rhythms in Music.

There is lots of fun to come this term with trips and we'd love to have lots of visitors - do let me know if there are any areas of expertise that you can help with, or if you'd like to come in for a 'careers afternoon' later this half term. Thank you to those who have already offered help!

#### Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

#### Friday 13th January 2023

Year 3 have been working hard to complete a factual report on their choice of hybrid animal and have been asked to repeat a similar task for their homework this week. They should be working towards their personal writing target – though some may be more suited to the next writing unit based on Fantastic Mr Fox.

In maths, year 3 have been using the bus – stop method (short division) to solve division problems. We have focused a lot on vocabulary (sharing, splitting, equal sharing, dividing) and using the understanding of multiples to check if a division will equate to a whole number. Their homework is to complete the division problems using this method and we will continue with this next week.

On Monday, we trekked over to Camden Town to visit the Jewish Museum which kick-started our RE unit this term — to learn about Judaism. The children were AMAZING throughout the day, considering we took all methods of transport, and represented their school with pride. We spent the afternoon reflecting on the different words/objects we were introduced to including Synagogue, Kippah, Yad, Hebrew, The Torah, Shabbat etc.

In SPAG we have been thinking more about apostrophes for contraction/possession and taken the time to consider how cohesive our sentences are. Together we have played games to explore different word classes and it's very clear that all children are getting much better at identifying verbs, nouns, adjectives, adverbs and conjunctions. We often use our class book to spot different word types as well as descriptive devices such as similies, metaphors and personification.

#### Friday 13th January

This week in English, we have written reports for our documentaries on giant pandas. We gathered our facts and organized them into themed paragraphs. We then worked in pairs to generate catchy and relevant subheadings. The, in order to add more detail or provide a context or contrast to our writing, we used subordinate clauses. For example: 'Despite panda bears being carnivorous, 99% of their diet consists of bamboo.' We also challenged ourselves to include statistics to make our report more reliable and interesting!

In Maths, we have been using mental maths strategies to solve multiplication and division calculations. We have practised swiftly recalling multiplication facts to help us solve more complex questions.

In RE, we looked at how Hindus pray at home. This act of daily worship is called 'puja'. We drew and labelled a shrine. We also looked at a puja tray and thought about the significance of the objects found on a puja tray. In D &T, Year Four have been working towards making a pop-up book for Year Three all about their residential trip to Hooke Court. After sending Year Three a detailed questionnaire, we read through Year Three's answers in order to help us know what their wants and needs were for the product. We then created a design brief, using drawings and text to design our books with a range of mechanisms.

#### Good questions to ask your child this week:

- When designing and engineering a product (like our 3D pop up books), why is it important
  to ask the client what they would like to use it for?
- Why do we use subordinate clauses in our writing?
- What is a murti and how does it help Hindus to worship?
- What is the collective name for a group of panda bears?

#### Learning at Christ Church

### Friday 13th January 2023

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, children have been writing their persuasive letters in the role of Adao. Children have practised writing a paragraph that contains a main argument that is subsequently developed by precise examples. Children have considered how to use emotional language to persuade people to change their minds about a specific issue.

In Maths, children have been learning how to add and subtract fractions from each other. Children have learned that it is sometimes necessary to change one fraction into an equivalent fraction before you can add or subtract them from each other. Finally, children have learned two methods to add and subtract mixed numbers from each other.

In Computing, children learned about databases and the difference between a database, a record and a field.

In Geography, children learned about the main mountain ranges and rivers in the UK and where to place them on a map. Children learned about geographical conventions around map making and they are using these conventions to design their own maps of the UK.

In RE, children learned about the Sikh naming ceremony and about a very special Guru (teacher): Guru Granth Sahib, which is a book.

In DT, children are starting a new unit on the topic of instruments. Children are going to be designing their own instruments and as a result, this week children pooled their knowledge of musical instruments together to create a class mind map.

In Art, children learned about an artist called El Anatsui and considered how his life and culture influenced his art.

## Friday 13<sup>th</sup> January 2023

This week in Maths, we have been finishing our learning on division. We have learnt how to divide numbers by 2-digit numbers using the bus stop method or dividing by that number's factors. E.g.  $275 \div 14 = 275 \div 7 \div 2$ . We have learnt how to divide a decimal by a whole number and then practised all of the skills that we have acquired. Finally, we have moved onto our new topic of coordinates and revised how to read and plot vertices onto graphs.

In English, we have made edits to our balanced argument in response to feedback marking given. We looked at three topics for improvements:

- Quality of Evidence
- Formal Language
- Use of Synonyms

We looked at each area in depth and made improvements to pieces of work that were not their best. This will be incredibly helpful as we will be writing another balanced argument as to whether school uniform should be mandatory.

In Science, we started our new topic on inheritance and evolution. We looked at key vocab and definitions that we will be learning over the year. In Geography, we learnt about the location of the Amazon rainforest, river and basin and which countries they were in. In Art, the children started to draw their Pop-Art inspired designs onto canvases to be painted. In R.E., we looked at the importance of Baptism in a believer's life and how it can occur when you are an infant or later in life. In Computing, we looked at formatting data on excel spreadsheets to make them easier to read.
