Dear children and families ,

CARNAVAL IS BACK!

From the 6th to the 10th of February, we are going to celebrate a Spanish style Carnival in our two schools.

What is Carnival?

Carnival is a celebration a week before Lent, this year Lent starts on 22nd February.

It is believed it started as a way to celebrate and eat delicious food in preparation for lent when people ate basic food and no meat. You can see the word Carnival has “Carni and va” which is like saying “Meat go away” ...Carnaval in Spain normally means a big street parade when everyone dresses up for a party in their favourite costume. In schools, they often spend the week making their own costumes for the parade, and they have a Carnival King or Queen that visits them each day of Carnival Week to set up a rule that everyone must follow.

In our schools we have our own Carnival Queen, who will be sending us videos to let us know what the “rule” will be for the next day. Furthermore, children will do carnival related activities in class so to prepare for the big fiesta on Friday, when everyone will be wearing their favourite costume. These rules will be easy enough for everyone to follow without putting too much time into them or needing to buy anything.

The first video is coming out today! So, we can tell you that the first rule to follow on Monday, 6th of February is to come to school dressed like an adult from home. You can choose to combine your uniform with one of their favourite items of clothing or just come fully dressed as them. Be creative and most importantly, have fun!

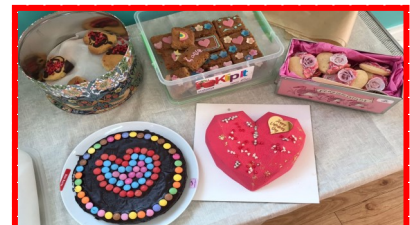
Ms Edgeworth commented:

Yom Hashoah



Last week, we marked the Holocaust Remembrance Day in our schools. The children in KS2 took part in an assembly to learn more about what this day means to us all.

Holocaust Memorial Day is marked each year on the 27th of January in this country. It aims to remember the genocide of millions of Jewish people and other groups of people who were killed by the Nazis during the Second World War. Holocaust Memorial Day also acknowledges the genocide in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. In Israel, the 27th and 28th April are the dates in the Jewish calendar for Jews around the world to mourn the loss of six million Jewish people.

Friday 27th January was the date that the concentration camp Auschwitz-Birkenau was liberated. It therefore is a symbolic date, as it reflects the hope that dark times do come to an end. Each year a different theme is chosen as a way to honour the day. The theme of Holocaust Memorial Day 2023 was **Ordinary People**. We looked at how ordinary people let genocide happen, those who actively perpetrated genocide and the ordinary people who were persecuted. Hopefully, it has prompted us to consider how ordinary people, such as ourselves, can perhaps play a bigger part than we might imagine in challenging prejudice today. In Hebrew, Holocaust Remembrance Day is called Yom Hashoah.

Lunar New Year

Yesterday we celebrated Lunar New Year . This year is the Year of the rabbit.

The children enjoyed a delicious, traditional Sichuan recipe; Gong Bao chicken (minus the peanuts) that they ate using chopsticks.

It was great to see so many children wearing rabbit costumes, the colour red and beautiful traditional Chinese/East Asian outfits, what fun!

Recommended Read

Black Poppies (ages 9-11 & up)

Author: Stephen Bourne **Publisher:** The History Press



This informative and thought-provoking collection of true stories shines a light on the contributions made by Britain's Black community during the First World War. The author explains that, due to racial discrimination, many of their achievements have not been previously recognised and despite their dedicated service, they were often barred from rising up the ranks.

The book opens with a useful timeline, explaining key events during and after the First World War. Each chapter focuses on a different person, episode or theme from this period. The experiences of those on the battlefield are documented, as well as the efforts of other key figures, such as nurses, Red Cross ambulance drivers and musicians who played in wartime concerts. Readers will also learn about the shocking race riots, largely triggered by mass unemployment, which occurred across Britain when ex-servicemen returned home after the war.

Interspersed throughout the chapters are information panels about a range of war-related topics, including Zeppelin airships, the Western Front and the Royal British Legion. Illustrated throughout with black-and-white photographs,

this insightful selection of short biographies and social history commentary would be a valuable addition to any home or school library.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 3rd February 2023

This week we spent our maths and English lessons revising lots of our learning this year and showing how far we have come at the halfway point in Year 1. Miss Dutson is really impressed with how hard everyone worked and showed how capable they were. Well done everyone!

Our reading as class has really blew Miss Dutson's socks off! Well done to everyone who confidently read, showing good understanding of they had read, being able to retell the story and had a go at reading some tricky words. Miss Dutson is incredibly proud of your reading efforts and thank you to parents for supporting so much at home!

In RE we looked at two Jewish symbols in particular, the Star of David and the Menorah. We learnt about what both meant and what they symbolise. This inspired us to create a symbol that represented us or our school. Some of us chose a symbol of our favourite hobby, some our religion and some chose their favourite animal.

In science we learnt about classifying and grouping animals into mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, insects and fish. We looked at the different animal's characteristics and how their different bodies were how we could group them. We then created our own chart where we grouped arctic animals into birds, fish and mammals.

We continued our DT work, making moving pictures and were lucky enough to have a whole DT day! We continued to plan, sketch and create our ideas for the moving picture and can't wait to finish them!

We were very bouncy on Thursday as lots of us hopped into school in red or rabbit costumes. Why? To celebrate the lunar new year, the year of the rabbit! You all looked brilliant.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2
Friday 3rd February 2023

Thank you for a lovely week. We so enjoyed our Luna celebrations and you all made such a wonderful effort with your red outfits!

This week we have developed our comprehensive skills and have worked hard to make inferences from the text. We have enjoyed our story Dread Cat and are using it as inspiration to begin to write our own cat poems. We have explored a range of poems and began to plan our own using adverbs and adjectives, such as 'terribly cunning, immensely evil'.

In our maths learning we have revisited our understanding of 2D shapes and built on our vocabulary to explain key characteristics of shapes. Please continue to practice this at home particularly with octagons, pentagons and hexagons.

In science, we conducted a rocket flying experiment using the push force through a straw. We so enjoyed launching our rockets and recording the distance travelled. Later we shorted the body of our rockets to compare distances. We used our data to discuss conclusions and evaluate our predictions.

Miss Aina has been so impressed with our eagerness to extend our Spanish vocabulary. Our Spanish lessons are filled with short phrases and even some short sentences.

We have painted our beautiful race cars and look forward to adding outlining details. After we will be able to race our cars and celebrate our hard work. We have been asked to display these in school, as they are so wonderful. After this, they will be sent home to enjoy together.

Our tour of the continents continues this week as we visited Namibia in Southern Africa to meet the African Elephants. We learnt lots of facts and confidently presented our fact files.

Next week is our final lesson exploring the **continents** and I would love to give the class an opportunity to taste a *small* bite of food from each continent. If you are able to donate some food for us to try on **Tuesday afternoon** please let me know :) It would be wonderful to celebrate the brilliant range of cuisines we enjoy in our homes.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 3rd February 2023

This week, the children have been completing independent assessments as part of assessment week.

In English, we independently wrote a retelling of Jack and the Beanstalk. We tried very hard to include many of the skills we have learnt in Year 3 such as; fronted adverbials, paragraphs, apostrophes for possession and the correct use of a and an.

In Maths, we completed our independent assessments for both reasoning and arithmetic.

In computing this week, we continued to use Scratch. We explored sequences and experimented with how these are implemented in a simple program.

In Geography, we continued learning about different types of maps and the features of different maps. This week, we looked at the importance of colour coding on maps and practised colour coding our own map of our local area.

In Science, we explored food chains.

Last week, we had a very exciting trip to the Natural History Museum where we took part in the Mission to Mars workshop. We worked in small teams to build small scale Mars Rovers. We needed to think about the weight of our Rovers, as well as their durability on different terrains and we needed to think carefully about the features of our Rovers.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 3rd February 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

Harry is travelling in a plane.
The plane is flying at a height of 2790 m above the ground.
What is the height of the plane above the ground in kilometres and metres?



$$2790 \text{ m} \begin{cases} 2000 \text{ m} = 2 \text{ km} \\ 790 \text{ m} \end{cases}$$

$$2790 \text{ m} = 2 \text{ km} + 790 \text{ m} \\ = 2 \text{ km } 790 \text{ m}$$

The height of the plane above the ground is 2 km 790 m.

This week Year 4 carried out conversions between kilometres and metres which included solving simple word problems. We went on to estimate weights of objects using kilograms and grams. Finally, Year 4 completed conversions between kilograms and grams.

English

In English, we started a new unit based on Phillip Pullman's *The Firework-Makers Daughter*. Year 4 engaged with the text by learning to work out the meaning of words in context. This involved reading the words surrounding an unknown word, to work out its meaning. We went on to analyse the main character, Lila, and used evidence from the text, to support our views. Using the same text, we then practised answering retrieval and inference questions.

DT

Children began to plan their designs for their torches, which we are making as part of our new DT unit. Planning involved considering what they want their torch to do, who is it for, what will it look like and any extra features they have in mind.

SPECIAL NOTICE: to support the torch making, please could you give children some items from home: plastic yoghurt pot tops, clear plastic bottles (best one that hold around 500 ml) reflective items (such as an old disposable tin take-away container):

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity
Friday 3rd February

It is assessment week here at school, and we have been working very hard to show the progress we have made this year. Students have completed assessments in maths, arithmetic and reading.

In Science, we learnt the word 'dissolve' which is when a solid mixes with a liquid to create a solution. We then investigated which materials were soluble (can dissolve) and insoluble (cannot dissolve) by mixing them into water and observing what happens.

In PSHE, we learnt about the different ways people can pay including with cash, debit cards and credit cards. We then thought about advantages and disadvantages for each method of paying.

This week, we have been concentrating on making our musical instruments in DT. We designed our instruments, based upon different instruments we have looked at from around the world. We thought about who would play them, the sounds they would make, and what materials we would need to make them. We also tried to predict any problems that could arise and how we could solve them.

The next day we assembled our instruments from recycled materials and painted them. We demonstrated them to the rest of the class and reflected on whether we felt the finished instrument was how we had planned. Some of us discovered that we had to modify our plans to make them more practical. We are now ready to evaluate and reflect on our finished products.

In RE, we learnt about the fifth guru and the beautiful temple he built in the Punjab. We looked at the symbolism of different parts of the temple. We also learnt that one of the Gurus was a child younger than us!

**Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity
Friday 3rd February 2023**

It has been a busy week this week, putting our learning to the test we tackled several assessments in maths and reading.

In English, we learnt about semi-colons and how we could use this in our writing. We practised using a semi-colon in 3 ways: a list, to join clauses and to join closely connected ideas. Following this, we looked at effective introductions. Analysing a range of introductions written by others, we pulled apart, what was effective and ineffective in each one. A good introduction should; clearly signal to the reader the topic and nature of the report and highlight why there is a discussion, hook our reader in with rhetorical questions. We then had a go at writing our own. On Geometry Tuesday learnt about angles in a triangle, learning that they always add up to 180° . Using this knowledge, we were able to calculate unknown angles. Remembering the different types of triangles, right-angled triangle, equilateral and isosceles and scalene. We will practise this much more over the coming weeks.

Wednesday was our screen free learning day; it was a challenge but many of us were successful! In Geography, we have been learning about the city of Manaus in Brazil. Conducting research to create an information website (in computing) and travel leaflet in the lesson.
