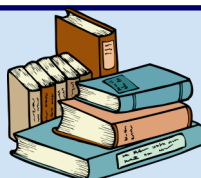

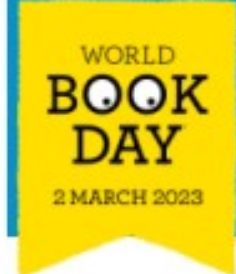

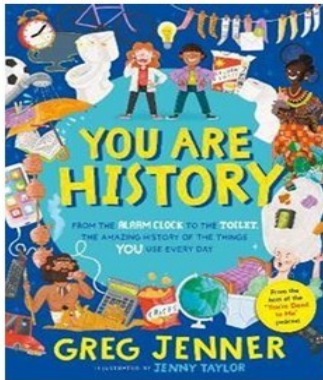

## Recommended Read

### You Are History (ages 6-8 & up)

**Author:** Greg Jenner **Illustrator:** Jenny Taylor **Publisher:** Walker Books



In this hilarious, non-fiction book from writer-historian Greg Jenner, history is made both fun and relevant. History isn't only found in fancy museums, nor does it have to be about ancient royalty, historical figures, or inventors. History is also about *you* and me, and the very things we see and use every day!

Each double page deals with a different everyday object and is loosely structured in order of when they might be encountered in a normal day. Beginning with the alarm clock, continuing into the daytime, and ending with bed, we learn of the fascinating stories behind all manner of mundane things – including soap, cereal, the light bulb, ball games, telephone, sofa, pyjamas and many more. There are fifty objects in total and each one is explored through a combination of jaw-dropping facts, eye-watering jokes, and exciting real-life stories from across the world and centuries.

Some children can find history off-putting because it seems too serious, too boring or too removed from their everyday reality. For the history-avoidant, this book does a brilliant job of making history less serious, less boring, and very applicable to everyday life. The vibrant and expressive illustrations really add to the humour and the text is clear, enthusiastic, and conversational. We absolutely love how this book puts young readers at the heart of history as a way of keeping them engaged and entertained.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 24th February 2023

What a busy week! With settling back into school, forest school and packing in our usual learning - a restful weekend is deserved all round!

In maths we discovered why we learn different methods in maths. We realised that some methods worked better for us and others worked better for different people - which is ok! We then chose our favourite method and concrete resources to help us work out subtraction equations. We enjoyed the independence of choosing a method that works for us.

In English we learnt about the un- prefix and were amazed to find that by simply adding this prefix, it changed the meaning of the root word completely. We discussed how Biff might be feeling when told he couldn't go to the ballet and thought of words to describe him. We came up with unhappy, unfair and lots of others. Then we thought of as many 'un-' words and used them in our own sentences.

In computing we finished our topic of programming robots by putting our knowledge of algorithms to the test. We chose a starting and a destination card, drew multiple routes and then created an algorithm for our Beebots. If we made a mistake, we worked to debug our programme.

This week we had our first visit to Holland Park for Forest School which was a huge success! We got to know the forest by playing hide and seek and hunting for leaves. We learnt about the three plants not to touch, how to identify different leaves and the trees they belong to. Once we had found our leaves, we created magical wands by attaching them to sticks we found. Thank you to our parent volunteers and we look forward to Forest school next Wednesday!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2  
Friday 24th February 2023

Thank you for our beautiful start to our half term. It was fantastic to see so many of you at our book look. It was wonderful to celebrate all our class continue to achieve in their learning and beyond! We are so proud of them. Thank you for your time and kindness.

It sounds as though you enjoyed a wonderful break. This week we wrote detailed recounts to explain our favourite parts of our week. We worked hard to include time adverbials (e.g. First, Next, Then,) along with expanded noun phrases to provide detail. We also started our character description of Finns Grandpa in 'When Ocean Meets Sky'. We used the illustration and beginning of the text to hunt for clues before we wrote our detailed characters description.

In our maths learning we have been making our fractions unit as practical as possible by sharing food into equal parts. We shared a pizza into halves, quarters and then eighths. A jam sandwich into quarters and angel cake into thirds. Please continue to practice sharing in real contexts for your home work. Next week we will begin to explore fractions of amounts e.g. one third of 12.

Our new science unit 'Healthy me' has lots of opportunities for links with cooking, PE and more. This week we learned that all living things need food, air and water. We discussed the difference between wants and needs and created our own animal fact files.

In our Art lesson we were getting ready for our trip to the national Gallery next week by researching our new artist Monet. We hope to see some of his pieces in person and this week we explored his use of shading and light. We sketched and painted our own observational drawing of a plant and focussed on adding depth through shade.

We enjoyed our Dance session and are fantastic at choreographing our own pieces. In PE we are developing our ball skills and practicing through the game of rounder's.

## Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 24<sup>th</sup> February 2023

This week in English, we focused on using conjunctions correctly and punctuating speech correctly. We looked at different conjunctions and how to use them when linking sentences and clauses together. We then used this knowledge to write a short summary of chapter 3 of *Fantastic Mr. Fox*. We then used dialogue from the text to practise writing and punctuating speech correctly.

In Maths, we continued to look at statistics. This week, we learnt to interpret pictograms and we learnt how to read, understand and draw bar graphs.

In RE, we began our Easter unit. Our big question for this topic is Salvation: Who is the most important person in the Easter Story? We began by reading the Easter Story before focusing on Judas. We discussed what Judas did to betray Jesus and why he did it.

We had an Ash Wednesday assembly this week where we discussed the meaning behind Ash Wednesday, what we are remembering and what Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of.

In Geography, we continued to look at maps. This week, we looked at coordinates and how they can help us to pinpoint locations on a map. We practised finding places and writing the relevant grid references before drawing our own maps and creating our own coordinates.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

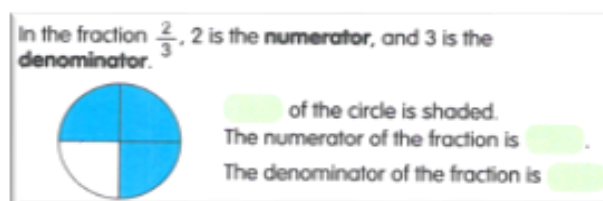

### Highlights of this week include:

#### Maths

This week Year 4:

- Explored bar graphs which included plotting, reading and interpreting data on a bar graph.
- Reviewed learning from last half-term (measurement).
- Recalled knowledge of fractions learnt in Year 3.



#### English

In English, we continued with our unit based on Phillip Pullman's *The Firework-Makers Daughter*. Year 4 demonstrated their understanding of a character's behaviour and actions through writing a letter. Taking the perspective of Lila (the lead character), they wrote a letter to her father explaining why she left home with no warning. Judging by these emotive letters, Year 4 showed how well they can express their views in writing.

#### Science

We began our new topic 'States of Matter' by considering the terms 'solids', 'liquids' and 'gases'. Pupils went on to think about how these states may change and thought of examples in everyday life. These included, melting ice-caps, water freezing and evaporating and water vapour condensing. We also had a fun quiz revisiting learning from last half-term (Electricity). Working in groups at tables, pupils answered multi-choice questions. Points were given for correct answers and scores were totalled. It was a fiercely competitive session with plenty of thinking about how electrical circuits work.

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity  
Friday 24<sup>th</sup> February

Welcome back to Spring Term 2! We are officially half way through Year 5.

This week in English, we were introduced to our new unit *Curiosity* which focuses on NASA's Curiosity rover. In this unit, we will be learning about relative clauses, expanded noun phrases, parenthesis and adverbials and use all of these skills to write descriptive labels. In Maths, we have continued with our learning of fractions. This week, we learnt how to subtract fractions with the same denominator and how to subtract fractions with different denominators.

In Science, we started our new topic on Earth and Space. We reflected on what we think we already know about this topic and related vocabulary, then used our reading website, GetEpic, to research more facts. In RE this week, we started our new unit in preparation for Easter. We looked at the significance of Lent, which began this week, and we learnt how Christians sometimes fast an activity or food in order to spend more time with God. We also discovered what happens in churches on Ash Wednesday. In Geography, we moved from learning about rivers and the water cycle, to learning about coasts! We focussed on the Jurassic Coast in Dorset and Devon and learnt about what makes it special. In Computing, we were very excited to connect Crumbles and Sparkles to our computers so that we could programme them using code. We managed to make them flash different colours! Next week we shall add buzzers to our circuits!

On Thursday, students from the Royal College of Music came and did a workshop with Year 5 where we learnt all about *West Side Story* and music associated with it. We will see all of this in action next week when we visit the concert!

Please continue to assist your child with their **homework** when needed as there are activities which may require some adult guidance. If you or your child are unsure of how to complete any activity, please see me before Monday so that I can assist. Reading records also need to be completed. As a class, this is a big area of improvement this term. Year 5 students should be reading (assisted or independent) for at least 15 minutes a day and this must be recorded in their Reading Record book with the title, pages read and a small comment summarising (one or two sentences) what they read.

**Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity  
Friday 24<sup>th</sup> February 2023**

Straight back into learning this week in Year 6.

In English, we have been busy completing our in depth plans for our balanced arguments, including adverbials and supporting each point with realistic evidence and statistics. Then we began writing, our introductions have given a brief overview into the topic of our argument, in addition to hooking our reader in and getting them thinking of the issue (school uniform, yes or no?) We made sure that our points were relevant to our topic and each piece of evidence was realistic, stating where our statistics had come from and when studies had been conducted. We have been discussing how to make these as believable as possible.

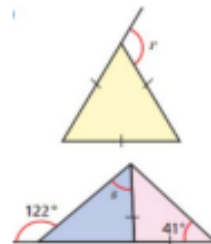
On Geometry Tuesday, we continued our learning on calculating angles in a triangle. Attempting some more complex questions, using our knowledge of angles.

In maths, we have been revising dividing by 2- and 3-digit dividends.

On Thursday, we continued with our SATs practise, working in small groups to complete past papers, looking at skills that can help us with answering questions so we feel ready for May!

In Geography, we have continued our learning on the Amazon rainforest, preparing to conduct an interview on the impact of deforestation on the Amazon rainforest. But first, we needed to gather information on the issues and the effects of this, as well as how it can be prevented. We began gathering information from a range of sources; data gathered, video evidence and reports.

In RE, we have begun our Easter unit, starting our learning off by beginning to understand how Christians believe the Easter story helps people to understand the meaning of forgiveness.
