



Mummy Time (ages 4-6 & up)

Author: Monique James-Duncan Illustrator: Ebony Glenn Publisher: Walker Books



This warm and joyful picture book charts a day in the life of a stay-at-home mother and her two energetic children. When morning time arrives, a day of marvellous mummy time begins for the youngest boy sibling (and a lot of busyness for mummy).

Written through the eyes of the little boy, it captures both the precious and - at times chaotic -moments of the everyday routine. From moming wake-up call and getting ready, dropping big sister off at school, stops at the library, supermarket and more, mummy time is the best of times for the little boy.

The rhythmic and pacy text is great for reading aloud and gives a real sense of both the happy haze of the children's world, as well as the tiring but loving work involved in busy mother-hood. The yellow colour palette captures the warmth of everyday bonding moments between mother and children. We particularly love the subtle details in the mother's facial expressions which parents will be

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 10th March 2023

This week in maths, we looked at measurement. We used vocabulary like taller, shorter and wider to compare different objects. Then using non-standard units of measurement (we chose paperclips and cubes), we measured items in our class. This gave us good practice in learning how to measure from the same spot at the end of the object, so when we moved onto measuring with a ruler, we were excellent at putting 0cm at the end of the object before we started measuring.

In English we came to the end of focusing on Dogs Don't Do Ballet by looking at what plurals are and then using them when writing a narrative. We learnt that when we are talking about more than one object, we have to add an s or es to show it. We identified the singular form first, then discussed whether we add s or es - t if the end sound of the word is 'ch', 'sh', 'ss', 'x' or 'zz' then add '-es'. We also spoke the word aloud to double check we had added the right suffix.

In RE we started looking at Easter, in particular Holy Week. We started with Palm Sunday, learning how people acted to welcome Jesus into Jerusalem and why. We spoke about how the palm tree is seen as the tree of life and its many uses. Then we made our own palm leaves, writing a welcome message to Jesus as he rode the donkey into the city.

Despite the rain, snow and sleet we had a great time at Forest School, making nests for birds to live and keep warm in. We worked hard on our teamwork skills, communicating which sticks would be best for the nest and supporting each other carrying larger sticks. By the end of the session, we had made a beautiful nest and even had some bird friends to test it out. Everyone did so well on such a wet day, you should all be very proud of yourselves!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 10th March 2023

Thank you for your time and effort to make our parents meeting appointments. It has been so lovely to talk through the reports, targets and give an overview of the wonderful learning your children enjoy.

To consolidate our learning on habitats, this week we have enjoyed a trip to the Chelsea Physic Garden. They were so impressed with your excitement and engagement. We learnt about a range of habitats animals have and how they are adapted to these. We had a tour to view the range of plants and flowers they have and discussed the value of composting and the role insects such as worms and wood lice play in this. We also went pond dipping to explore the animals that live there. Later we made our own mini beast hotel which are now proudly in our school garden.

We also explored our diets and how we can make healthy food choices. We researched a healthy plate and designed our own that included protein, carbohydrates, vegetables, dairy. After we designed these, we ate a range of healthy snacks including peppers, cucumber, celery, carrots and tzatziki!

In our English lessons we have been focusing on using interesting and descriptive vocabulary to extend our writing. If you read anything wonderful please note it down for our class vocabulary wall. We will write phrases and words to magpie during our writing sessions. We have also been using the conjunctions 'as' and 'when'. Khumo wrote 'his beard was as soft as a cloud'. Max wrote 'As Finn slowly glided past the wise whale he saw his smile.'

In our Mathematics we are interpreting data through pictograms. This graph should information using pictures. It requires a title, label, and key. Please continue to practice these skills for this week's homework.

Following our trip to the National Gallery to observe Monet's Water lilies we created our own inspired art. These were painted with great care to give the viewer an 'impression'. Thank you for your detailed research at home it was incredible to hear the classes presentations and reflections on our key artists.

In RE we are continuing our unit on symbolism and explored key symbols in the Easter Story. We are looking forward to asking our questions on our tour of St Pauls Cathedral next Friday.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 10th March 2023

This week in English, we looked at a new visual story called "The Black Hat". We took inspiration from the story to create our own drama piece. We pretended to take a walk through the dark woods where we found a strange, black hat. We could only convey our emotions through the use of our bodies and facial expressions. We then learnt about prepositions and tried to use a range of prepositions in our writing.

In Maths, we continued looking at length and parameter. This week we focused on adding and subtracting lengths. We practised converting measurements into centimeters and millimeters in order to make the calculations easier to solve.

In PSHE this week, we talked about the PANTS rule, and we discussed the importance of consent when touching others for example: when hugging, high-fiving and holding hands. We also read the story 'Don't Hug Doug' alongside this lesson.

In RE, we continued our Easter unit. This week we focused on the women who were present at Jesus' crucifixion. We thought about why those women were there considering it would not have been the cultural norm for women to be at a crucifixion. We then thought about how Mary would have been feeling throughout Easter Sunday, and we planned a diary entry as her. Next week, we will be writing our diary entry.

Remember to keep practising your Times Tables at home! In Year 3, we need to be confident with our 3s, 4s and 8s.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4 Friday 10th March 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week Year 4:

- Learnt how to subtract two fractions, having found a common denominator.
- Read the time (e.g., 7:20 a.m.) as a) seven twenty
 b) twenty minutes past seven.
- Read the time (e.g., 5:40 p.m.) as a) fine forty b) twenty minutes to six.
- Drew the minute hand on a clock face when given the time.




In English, children wrote their fictional stories about Razvani, the Fire-Fiend. The stories included an introduction paragraph followed by three others describing the setting, characters and plot. Year 4 took care to include fronted adverbials, adverbs, exciting adjectives and conjunctions. They then went on to edit their pieces having had feedback from a peer.

Science

This week in science, we investigate how much carbon dioxide (gas) is contained in carbonated drinks. 8 different drinks were tested. We first weighed the unopened bottles of drink. Next, the bottles were given a shake and the lids were opened, taking care not to spill any liquid. Once the gas had escaped, the bottles were weighed again and the difference in weight was recorded. Year 4 discovered how challenging carrying out experiments can be. Issues arose from misread scales, one set of inaccurate scales and liquid escaping with the gas. However, we had some sound data and a lot of fun opening each bottle.





Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 24th February

This week in English, we have been putting into practise some of the skills that we have been learning

in class. We wrote descriptive labels about parts of the Mars rover and tried to include modal verbs, meaning words and relative clauses. Next week, we will learn more skills which we can use in our labels.

In Maths, we have made the small shift from fractions to decimals - both are ways to represent numbers. We learnt how to represent decimal numbers up to two decimal places (up to the hundredths column). We looked at the relationship between tenths and hundredths - knowing that 1/10 is the same as 10/100 and this is written as 0.1

In Science, we learnt that the Earth rotates (spins around axis) and revolves (moves around) the sun. We then applied these words to our understanding of how day and night occur - As the Earth rotates, one side will face the sun (day) and the other side will face away from the sun (night) and

In RE this week, we learned about Maundy Thursday, when Christians remember the Last Supper. We learnt about how the Last Supper began the practice of Holy Communion, and we learnt how Jesus washed the feet of his disciples to show humility and servant leadership.

In Geography, we revised the difference between physical and human geography, with reference to the Jurassic Coast.

In Computing, we stretched our brains to learn about conditions in programming, including 'do until' loops, and we started programming our Sparkles to respond to a switch.

In PSHE, we learnt about the different types of relationships we have in our life - friends, family, pets and proximity - and discussed what makes a healthy relationship and what makes an unhealthy relationship.

Thank you to everyone who signed up for a parent meeting. These are now finished and the next slots will become available in Summer term.

Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity Friday 10th March 2023

In English, we started off the week, creating dialogue, revising how to punctuate speech correctly using quotation marks and commas. Some of us extended ourselves by using split dialogue and remembered to use a new line for each speaker to sign post our reader to a new speaker. In our following lesson, we revisited 'show not tell', presenting a character's emotion through their body language, rather than simply stating how they are feeling. We also used this opportunity to discuss a character's feelings and how this could be presented in dialogue through using synonyms and verbs for 'said'. Following this we practised using the passive tense for formal dialogue between a Lieutenant and soldiers. "I have seen the soldiers' (active tense)

'the soldiers have been seen' (passive tense). On Geometry Tuesday, we have been learning about the internal angles in a polygon. We learnt that shapes with more than 4 sides can be split into triangles. For example, a pentagon can be split into 3 triangles, so the internal angles in a pentagon are equal to $3 \times 180 = 540^{\circ}$. We then noticed a pattern the number of triangles will

always be 2 less than the number of sides. A hexagon, that has 6 sides can be split into 4 triangles, so the internal angles in a hexagon = 720°. Using this knowledge we could calculate the missing angles in a range of shapes.

In Maths, we have put our learning into practice, tackling word problems. Breaking down each question to understand what operation is required.

On Thursday, we continued with our SATs practise, working in small groups to complete past papers, looking at skills that can help us with answering questions, so we feel ready for May! In Art, we have started our new unit, moving figures. We all took part in an in-depth discussion on whether street art is art or vandalism, each of us coming up with some fantastic arguments for both sides (exercising our knowledge in debates). Then we researched all about the artist, Keith Haring.

In Science, we have continued our learning on adaptation, looking at how different moths can camouflage and even conducted an experiment.
