On **Thursday 20th April**, ChildNet will be running a parent workshop at **Christ Church in the School Hall at 7pm** for anyone who wishes to attend.



This session will focus on the key areas of online risks whilst offering practical tips and useful tools to support young people online. It will begin with conduct: the kinds of behaviours we see from young people online, including screentime and sharing. They offer specific advice around privacy settings and time management strategies. Then they consider online content including topics like fake news, adult content and the perfect lives children might see online. The advice incorporates guidance around parental controls, critical thinking and age ratings. Finally, they explore contact with others online including online bullying and grooming. The sessions will finish by highlighting key reporting tools and signposting to sources of further help and information.







Think you know about space? Think again! You might not have read about it in quite this way before...

The book features three sections: The Solar System, Outer Space and Space Travel, each containing a plethora of information within them, presented in the form of comics, comic-style illustrations and Secret Diary and A Day in the Life Of... features.

The Secret Diaries are a particular joy, showcasing the key movers and shakers in the realm of space travel, technology and science. If you expect these all to be humans, though, think again: we get an except of the diary of Miss Baker, one of the first monkeys in space, A Little Bit of Sunshine, A Hairy Star and Rosetta, a Comet Catcher built by the European Space Agency.

Plus, we get an insight into A Day in the Life of space features such as copycat planets, UFOs, a Galaxy and a Northern Star among many other fascinating things.

The third in the series from Mike Barfield and Jess Bradley (The first in the series, *A Day in the Life of a Poo, a Gnu and You*, won the Blue Peter Awards 2021 Best Book with Facts), *A Day in the Life of an Astronaut, Mars and the Distant Stars* is just as zany, smart and fun as the previous two titles, and guaranteed to entertain even the least bookish kid with its immersive cartoons, clear layout and brilliant sense of humour.

EARLY BIRD PLUS PROGRAMME - TRESHAM CENTRE FOR DISABLED CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

The Early Bird Plus Programme is a three-month programme for Parents/Carers of young children (4-9yrs) with an autism spectrum disorder and for the professionals supporting them. It aims to

- · empower parents/carers
- help parents/carers to learn about and understand autism
- help parents/carers to learn and understand their child's behaviours
- help parents pre-empt problem behaviours and handle those that do occur

The programme involves 8 group sessions and 2 home visits. This programme does not replace our traditional pre-school programme but offers support for families who receive a later diagnosis. Each group session lasts two and a half hours and a different topic is discussed each week.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 24th March 2023

This week in maths, we looked at numbers to 50. We did lots of revision of place value, talking about how many tens and ones there are in a number. We then used this understanding to talk about what happens when we count in ones, compared to counting in tens. We finished the week by comparing numbers, using ten frames to describe how we know if a number is bigger or smaller than another.

In RE we looked at Good Friday, what happened that day and why it is called 'good'. We spoke about the huge sacrifice Jesus made for Christians and why he had to die. We then created some beautiful artwork showing the dramatic change in the sky the moment Jesus passed, with the silhouette of the three crosses in the background.

In alphabet code we looked at the /w/ sound. We found there were two ways of writing it, /w/ as in **w**hat.

Our artistic talents were also used in Forest School this week. We used the forest to create some beautiful pictures of our favourite animal, plant or part of the forest. We carefully chose twigs to make a frame and then used leaves, bark and whatever else we could find to create our art. To finish, we came together as a group and made one big picture showing the whole forest.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 24th March 2023

This week we have so enjoyed publishing our inspired 'Flotsam' stories! We read these so proudly during our Special Mentions assembly this afternoon. We used the original story to plan, write and publish our own alternative endings! These are full of interesting underwater worlds! We will send a photocopy home so you can enjoy them together.

This week's homework continues to practice our spelling and grammar rules. We have been working hard to edit our own writing and spotting our beautiful mistakes, these help us learn.

In our maths learning, we are working hard to use a number line and part part whole model to solve inverse operation problems. We have been using our number facts to find missing values. This involves using opposite operation to find a missing value.

In Art, we focussed on Monet's use of light and reflection in water. We were inspired by his 'Impressions, Sunrise' and worked hard to layer our brush strokes to create depth and a range of perspective.

In RE, we began our preparation for our Easter Assembly next week. If you are free please join us on Wednesday at 10 am. We will be focussing Jesus's last supper. We wrote a detailed recount following our beautiful trip to St Pauls Cathedral- a big thank you to our parent volunteers.

In PE, we are developing our bating and fielding skills through the game of Cricket.




'A wish from year 2'



Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 24th March 2023

This week in English, we generated expanded noun phrases, adverbs and rhyming verbs to describe the creatures from 'The Black Hat.' We then used these words and phrases in our own retelling of the magical event witnessed by the boy in the story. Next, we designed our own creature and we thought carefully about the features and movements of it. Next week, we will be including our made-up creature in our own writing.

In Maths, we continued learning about fractions. This week, we have focused on non-unit fractions (when the numerator is larger than 1), counting in fractions and finding the whole.



In RE, we recapped the key events of the Easter Story and we thought about what we can learn from each important person. We then wrote about who we think the most important person in the Easter Story is and why.


In Geography, we continued learning about climate zones. This week we used atlases to help us identify which climate zones different countries are in.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4


Friday 24th March 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week Year 4:

- Identified and marked angles on 2D and 3D shapes.
- Associated the number of sides with the number of angles in geometric shapes.
- Recognised if an angle is bigger or smaller than a right angle.
- Learnt the symbol for perpendicular lines and practised drawing these lines.



English

During English this week, Year 4 produced instructional texts 'How to build a robot' which involved the children writing a set of instructions. We considered how information texts are presented such as the use of a passive voice, imperative (bossy) verbs, adverbs and technical vocabulary. It was a great exercise in writing clearly and concisely and taking a formal (impersonal) tone.

Science

This week in Science, we were joined by Ms Edgeworth for our latest lesson in our States of Matter unit. This involved looking at the 3 states that water can take and the processes that change one state to another. We started with the whole class together and children were given a list of questions and answer cards which they had to match up. The class then split into two groups (split between Ms James and Ms Edgeworth) with one group in the outside classroom to observe the processes of evaporation, condensation and melting. We also observed how these processes are reversible. The theory of these processes was presented in the classroom. The two groups then swapped locations.

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity 24th March 2023

In English, we analysed a good piece of writing to find the language features we have been learning about including brackets, relative clauses, meaning words, expanded noun phrases and modal verbs. We also discussed the features of a non-fiction text such as a title, headings and paragraphs. We then combined all of this knowledge together in our final piece of writing.

In Maths, we have been whizzing our way through percentages! We learnt that 'percent' means out of 100, which is another way of writing a fraction. Then we found the equivalence between percentages, fractions and decimals, and have been committing to memory some important percentages – $25\% = \frac{1}{4}$, $60\% = \frac{1}{2}$ and $75\% = \frac{3}{4}$.

In Science, we have been learning about the movement of the moon and Earth and how this causes day and night. We extended our knowledge this week to learning about time zones, so when it is 12:00pm in London it is 8:00am in New York, 4:00pm in Dubai and 11:00pm in Sydney.

In RE, we finally reached Easter Sunday on our exploration of Holy Week! We learnt about the resurrection of Jesus and examined evidence both for and against it. We held a respectful debate over what we believe and each of us drew our own conclusions.

In Geography we started looking at maps of Dorset. Next week we are going to add physical and natural features to our maps.

In Computing, we designed a doorbell! We also designed the circuit diagram we will need to run it and began to code the program we need to make it work. Next week, we will give our program a try!

Learning in Year 6 at Holy Trinity 24th March 2023

Year 6 have not had the week they were expecting as poor Ms. Moros has been feeling very unwell. They have had lots of different teachers and cooed brilliantly. Their visiting teacher Ms Flockton who taught them yesterday said what a wonderful day she had had. She said have carried on with all their learning with maturity and a positive spirit - well done Year 6.

Here is a run through some of their key learning:

In English, students continued learning about effective dialogue. We analyzed a piece of text with dialogue and thought of ways to improve it, making it more interesting for the reader. We changed the dialogue, described how the characters spoke using adverbials and added exciting action in-between.

Year 6 followed the clues to find rectangle and squares using all four quadrants and developed their understanding of grids with negative numbers and use language such as 'vertex' and 'axis' accurately. Children learnt from each other and were encouraged to share answers and strategies for conquering coordinates.

During Shepherds and Sheep, children worked together to order numbers by creating sequential numerical paper chains from Reception's book, The Great Race, which featured characters from the Chinese Zodiac - Shepherds guided sheep with cutting and sticking, helping Reception to practise their fine motor skills whilst also doing Maths!
