On **Thursday 20th April**, ChildNet will be running a parent workshop at **Christ Church in the School Hall at 7pm** for anyone who wishes to attend.



This session will focus on the key areas of online risks whilst offering practical tips and useful tools to support young people online. It will begin with conduct: the kinds of behaviours we see from young people online, including screentime and sharing. They offer specific advice around privacy settings and time management strategies. Then they consider online content including topics like fake news, adult content and the perfect lives children might see online. The advice incorporates guidance around parental controls, critical thinking and age ratings. Finally, they explore contact with others online including online bullying and grooming. The sessions will finish by highlighting key reporting tools and signposting to sources of further help and information.

On Friday the 21st April it will be Fruity Friday at Holy Trinity!


The children will get to try a wide variety of different fruits, some fairly familiar and others that might be less familiar.







In addition to the fruit tasting, Children are invited to wear colourful/rainbow clothing for a £1 donation - Payment can be made on the School Gateway.




























School Uniform

Not Now, Noor! (ages 4-5 & up)

Noor is a curious little girl, her head is always full of questions. The biggest question on her mind is why her Ammu (mum) and the other women in her family wear a hijab (headscarf).

Is it so they can hide snacks for later? Or because they're a super spy and hiding their secret identity? Or maybe it's to protect them from catching nits?

Determined to finally know the answer, Noor sets out to investigate. First, she asks her sister, but she's too busy being cool with her friends. So, Noor heads to her aunt and her two grandmothers instead. But the women in her family are all busy and have no time to answer this important question. They all send her away, leaving

Noor confused and frustrated. Just as Noor is ready to give up on her hijab quest, her Ammu arrives home and knows just the thing to say.

A heart-warming story, Not Now, Noor! is a celebration of Muslim women and gently approaches the religious reasons for wearing a hijab in a light-hearted way for children.

Using a vibrant colour palette of reds, yellows and purples, the beautiful artwork is full of emotion and movement. Noor's facial expressions, from excitement to dismay, are brilliantly funny and work well along-side the text.








Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 31st March 2023

This week in maths, we continued looking at numbers to 50. We were introduced to the column method for addition where we placed the tens and ones of two numbers into a place value chart and added the columns together. We made sure to always start with the ones column, add those and then we added the tens column.



In English we focused on creating expanded noun phrases to describe the clock tower and how it changed with the mood throughout the story. Then we moved onto including conjunctions in our writing. We focused on using 'but' to compare two contrasting elements of the story. For example, the lonely, beautiful girl went outside happily but the town had turned dark and gloomy.

To conclude our time of Forest School we were given the choice to return to our favourite activity from the last six weeks. We also had the exciting opportunity to use fire starters to create a spark.

A huge thank you to all the wonderful mums, dads and nans who joined us on our trips, we loved having you with us and would be lost (in the forest) without your support!






Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 31st March 2023

Thank you all for a lovely spring term. We are **so** lucky to get to spend our time with your beautiful children; their love for learning and each other is wonderful to be part of.

We hope you enjoyed our 'Last Supper' performance. As only a few were able to support with the re-enactment, we all painted our own inspired artwork and displayed these on the dinner table cloth. It was wonderful to have so many parents with us.



I have provided lots of reading books, please let me know how you get on with these and where possible continue to read little and often. This is the priority over other homework tasks.

In Mathematics we have consolidated our use of a number line strategy to support finding a missing value. Inverse question can be a bit tricky, we need to remember our number line always starts with the lower part and works towards the whole. We have also completed a range of maths arithmetic problems to review our addition and subtraction strategies.

In art we completed our final Monet inspired reflective piece. We focussed on the reflective trees in the water. This work used a sponge and paint strokes to create depth.




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 31st March 2023

This week in English, we rewrote the beginning of 'The Black Hat.' We included our made-up creature in the story and we made sure to try and use expanded noun phrases, alliteration and similes to build description. We have all been working hard to improve our handwriting and we will hopefully have more pen licenses in Year 3 next term!

In Maths, we continued learning about fractions. This week, we have looked at tenths as decimals, comparing fractions and finding a fraction of a set of objects.



In Science, we continued our topic on rocks and soils. This week, we explored different rock families, and we looked at how rocks are formed.

In Geography, we looked at climate graphs, we recorded data on a weather chart and we compared a weather graph of London with a weather graph of Liberia.

This week, we also took part in the Easter assembly at Holy Trinity Church. A big well done to all the children for retelling the Easter story so beautifully.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4


Friday 31st March 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week Year 4:

- Identified parallel lines and the symbol that represents them.
- Learnt how to draw parallel lines along and across the lines of a grid.
- Worked out the perimeter of different shapes by counting squares.
- Worked out the perimeter of different shapes by doubling the width and length.



English

During English this week, children wrote a description of the ending of the animated film 'The Girl and the Robot'. This included writing in the 3rd person, using prepositional words and phrases and using commas to create a list. Year 4 did a fantastic job at managing the technical aspect of this piece alongside bringing in plenty of creativity.

Science



Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity 31st March 2023



In Maths, we have moved onto Measurement and this week we recapped how to calculate the perimeter of rectangles and rectilinear shapes (shapes made of rectangles). To calculate perimeter, you must add all the sides together but it can be more complicated when we have to find the length of a missing side.



This term, some of us have been reading the book The Windrush Child by Benjamin Zephaniah. This is a historical fiction story that is inspired by Zephaniah's personal experience of immigrant parents and the challenges his family and others encountered as part of the Windrush generation. We really enjoyed reading this book together and having insightful conversations about equality, race and identity as well as learning about the history of the Windrush.



In Science, we reviewed all the learning about Space that we did this term.

We looked back through our book and discussed what we learnt and how we learnt it, and also thought about all the new vocabulary we learnt including 'rotation', 'revolution', 'heliocentric', and 'time zones'. In RE, we finished our unit on Easter by looking at the reasons why people all over the world engage in community-building religious activities, and what those activities mean to them.

We also completed our maps of the human geography of the Jurassic Coast - all in preparation for our trip to Osmington Bay next term.

In Computing, we built our doorbells using a switch and a buzzer and designed a program that would make them turn on and off at the touch of a button.

On Wednesday, we all attended the Easter Service at Holy Trinity Church where all the classes acted out part of the Easter Story from the Last Supper to Jesus rising on Easter Sunday.
