On **Thursday 20th April**, ChildNet will be running a parent workshop at **Christ Church in the School Hall at 7pm** for anyone who wishes to attend.

This session will focus on the key areas of online risks whilst offering practical tips and useful tools to support young people online. It will begin with conduct: the kinds of behaviours we see from young people online, including screentime and sharing. They offer specific advice around privacy settings and time management strategies. Then they consider online content including topics like fake news, adult content and the perfect lives children might see online. The advice incorporates guidance around parental controls, critical thinking and age ratings. Finally, they explore contact with others online including online bullying and grooming. The sessions will finish by highlighting key reporting tools and signposting to sources of further help and information.



Think you know about space? Think again! You might not have read about it in quite this way before...

The book features three sections: The Solar System, Outer Space and Space Travel, each containing a plethora of information within them, presented in the form of comics, comic-style illustrations and Secret Diary and A Day in the Life Of... features.

The Secret Diaries are a particular joy, showcasing the key movers and shakers in the realm of space travel, technology and science. If you expect these all to be humans, though, think again: we get an except of the diary of Miss Baker, one of the first monkeys in space, A Little Bit of Sunshine, A Hairy Star and Rosetta, a Comet Catcher built by the European Space Agency.

Plus, we get an insight into A Day in the Life of space features such as copycat planets, UFOs, a Galaxy and a Northern Star among many other fascinating things.

The third in the series from Mike Barfield and Jess Bradley (The first in the series, A Day in the Life of a Poo, a Gnu and You, won the Blue Peter Awards 2021 Best Book with Facts), A Day in the Life of an Astronaut, Mars and the Distant Stars is just as zany, smart and fun as the previous two titles, and guaranteed to entertain even the least bookish kid with its immersive cartoons, clear layout and brilliant sense of humour.

Friday 24th March Reception Class Newsletter

<u>This week we:</u>

- Revisited the long sound /oo/ (boot), the short sound /oo/ (cook) and /oa/ (boat) in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Read The Great Race by Emily Hiles. We learnt which Chinese zodiac animal we are and wrote sentences to describe our attributes. The children born in 2017 are the year of the rooster, whilst the children born in 2018 are the year of the dog. We also took part in our very own great race around the beach and wrote a recount about it.
- Explored numbers to 20 in our Maths lessons. We practised forming the numerals correctly and counting up to 20 objects. We also ordered the numerals from 0-20 on a number line.
- Used mathematical language to compare objects by their mass. We used pan scales to find objects that were heavier than an apple, or lighter than a ruler. If the scales were balanced, we knew that the objects were an equal weight.
- Created our own toys from the future using Lego and junk modelling.
- Read Matthew's Dream in our Art lesson. When Matthew visits an art gallery, he is entranced. That night Matthew dreams about walking hand in hand through 'playful patches of colour'. We created 'playful patches of colour' by doodling with pens and making patterns.
- Read the Easter story and learnt about the symbolism of the cross for Christians. It is a symbol of God's love. We went on a hunt to spot crosses around our school and covered our beach in chalk crosses.

Next week, we will:

- Revisit the codes /ar/, /or/ and /ur/.
- Introduce the greater than and less than symbols in our Maths lessons < >

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 24th March 2023

In English, we have continued our unit on 'The Clock Tower'. We thought about the main character the little girl and wrote some descriptive sentences about the little girls face, clothes, movement, job and feelings. We then explored the feelings of the characters in The Clock Tower and how the little girl must have felt going outside to darkness and the world frozen.

In Maths this week, we have looked at shapes and patterns. We used our problem solving skills to work out the missing parts of the patterns. We then recapped 2D and 3D shapes and looked at their properties.

For Alphabet Code this week we have been looking at the /g/ code and writing sentences using this code. Next week, we will practice our spelling using the different codes.

In Guided Reading we have been reading 'Zog' by Julia Donaldson. We have identified rhyming words and repeated phrases and thought carefully about why an author repeats certain sentences and words throughout a story.

In Science, we have continued looking at our 'Treasure Island' unit, we created shelters and thought about how we would make our shelter and how we could test it to make sure it would last. We thought about making it windproof, waterproof and strong.

Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

We were very lucky to have both Mrs Hermes and Miss Lang in the classroom team teaching this week! We said a special goodbye to Mrs Hermes and look forward to seeing her and the new baby to come visit soon.

This week in Year 2 in Maths, we have been looking at addition and subtraction strategies with work on inverse operations. We have been using part-part-whole models to work out the answers to problems and then checking our answers using the inverse operation. We have also been using our number lines to help us solve larger equations. Next week we are going to review all the wonderful things we have learnt this term in Maths.

In English, we have been reading Flat Stanley and using his adventures to learn about subordinating conjunctions, suffixes, and different types of sentences (such as questions and commands). We have been applying these grammatical skills in our writing and have started to plan an alternative ending to one of Stanley's adventures. Next week we will write, edit and publish our stories to display in our classroom.

Thank you to all those who came with us on our trip to St Paul's Cathedral. We had a great time exploring the building and recapping our knowledge of the Easter story. Next week we will be acting out part of the story in our Easter Assembly. We look forward to seeing you there (Wednesday 29th 2:30pm).



Earlier this week we had a fun Science quiz to test our knowledge of the human body and learnt some very interesting facts (did you know your ears never stop growing?!). We have been practising our computing skills by making some rhythmic beats using Chrome Music lab (well worth a practice online at home if you have headphones available) and have been working hard on our spelling skills using a few new strategies. Do keep practising your spelling words at home too!




Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

Friday 24th March 2023

Year 3 have been editing, and publishing, their alternative endings to *The Black Hat* this week so expect to see a copy of their final piece in bags ready to read over the weekend! Well done Year 3 for working so hard on your descriptive writing unit. Next week, we will be starting a unit based on *The Krindlekrax*. This unit will involve persuasive writing and writing a recount and will be completed after the Easter holidays.

In maths, Year 3 have been finding fractions of amounts using beads and blocks to contextualise their learning. To find a fraction of an amount you first need to divide the amount by the denominator, and then multiply that amount by the numerator. Some might need extra help with their maths homework this week so please refer to the below:

Friday 23rd March

This week in English, Year Four we have been retelling the ending of the film. We used time adverbs and expanded noun phrases to create an engaging recount. We have been practising the skill of editing our work carefully and have spent time reading our writing back to check it all makes sense. We then used mind maps to plan an alternative ending to the film. We structured our ideas using paragraphs and used interesting subordinate clauses to add more detail to our story.

In Maths, we have learned about angles and how to tell if an angle is a right angle. We folded a piece of paper to make a right angle (this is where 2 perpendicular lines meet) and used this to check the size of various angles. We then drew our own shapes on grid paper and drew symbols to show where the angles were.

In Computing, year used their photos from last lesson to create captivating adverts. They added text, borders and retouched their photos to persuade their audience to visit a fictional location. In History, we looked at the mummification process and learned how ancient Egyptians used canopic jars to store dead people's organs in after death! We then begun created our headdresses!

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- How can you tell if two lines are perpendicular?
- Why did pharaoh's wear headdresses in ancient Egypt?
- What is a prepositional phrase?

Learning at Christ Church

Friday 24th March 2023

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. Year 5 visited the Chelsea Physics Garden this week to learn more about plant hunters in the Victorian Era (link to our History curriculum) and about how plants reproduce (link to our Science topic).

In English, Year 5 focused on two new poems written by Karl Nova called 'Peer Pressure' and the 'Misinformation Age'. Children discussed the messages Karl Nova communicates through his poetry and children were encouraged to formulate opinions and justify if they agree or disagree with these key messages. Furthermore, children learned about haikus and wrote their own haikus.

In Maths, children have been going over some of the content covered during the Spring term. We have been revising how to interpret and draw tables, bar graphs and line graphs and we have been revising how to calculate the perimeter of rectilinear shapes and composite shapes.

In RE, children have been learning about Maundy Thursday which commemorates the night of the Last Supper. Children discussed the significance of washing other people's feet during Maundy Thursday celebrations in Church and children discussed the reactions of the disciples when Jesus announced that one of them would betray him in the Bible. Children reflected that the main message of the Last Supper story is one of forgiveness: even though Jesus knows Judas is about to betray him, he tells him he understands and that he must do what he must do.

In Geography, we have been learning about erosion and the different rock formations that can be created through erosion over a long period of time: caves, stacks, arches and stumps. Most of these rock formations can be found along the Jurassic Coast.

In DT, children have started a new unit on the topic of making their own bread. This week, children brainstormed what they already know about bread: ingredients, how to make it, different types of bread across the world....

This week in Maths, we have been continuing our work on percentages. We have now learnt how to find 50%, 25%, 75%, 10%, 5% and 1% of a number. Using these percentages, we found out how we could find out any given percentage of a number using two different methods.

Find 35% of 400

Method 1: Partition 10% = 40 30% = 40 x 3 = 120 5% = 40 ÷ 2 = 20

35% = 120 + 20 = 140

Method 2; 1%

1% = 4 35% = 4 x 35 = 140

In English, we have started our new topic on biographies. We discussed the type of information that you would find in a biography and how they are different to autobiographies. Then the children chose out of Torak and Wolf from Wolf Brother for their biographies. We then looked at a real biography of in order to pull out the features and writing techniques when we write our own. We looked at how quotes, anecdotes, dates, adverbials and embedded clauses can be used to make a biography factual and interesting to read.

In Science, we conducted an experiment where we investigated how different sized beaks could lead to a survival advantage for a bird. Based on Charles Darwin's theory of evolution, we learnt how specific types of beak would lead to the finch being more likely to live and reproduce. In Drama, the rehearsals are beginning and the children are auditioning for their roles. In Dance, the children have been practising their routine ready to show to Reception class!
