- Toilet Paper and Sanitary products (pads preferred)
- Personal toiletry products (deodorants; toothpaste/brushes; shampoo; shower gel; shaving materials)

If you prefer to make a financial donation, add HTSS in your reference so they know it comes from us.

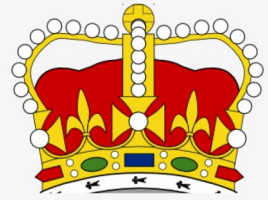

We will be walking a total of 13 miles but there will be 3 starting points to choose from along the way so please do come along, wave us off and take part, everyone is welcome

We will be raising funds for our **Creative Classrooms**, to enhance and enrich our pupils' education and complement the curriculum. Items we will purchase will include digital cameras, annual subscriptions, playtime equipment, art, drama, music and gardening resources as well as funding class trips, specialist artists and visitors. Outstanding classrooms are central to the happiness and success of all children. Creative environments revolve around excellent teaching and learning but the importance of resources is paramount. The inclusion of a range of exciting books, interactive toys and IT ensure the lessons are interactive, engaging and accessible for all learners and that the learning opportunities will be imaginative, innovative and collaborative. You Don't Know What War Is: the diary of a young girl from Ukraine (ages 9-11 & up)

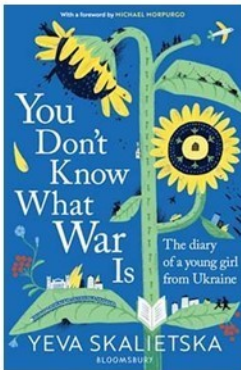

Yeva lives in Kharkiv in eastern Ukraine. For her twelfth birthday she has a bowling party with her friends. But ten days later, the Russian army invades Ukraine and Yeva and everyone in her city find themselves at war.

This is Yeva's diary during the first few months of the conflict between Russia and Ukraine, beginning in February 2022. She describes listening to shells explode, and the fear of hearing planes fly overhead. She and her granny flee to the basement of their building, along with their neighbours, and try to survive down there for hours on end. They are cold, hungry and terrified, never knowing if it's safe to leave to search for food.

Yeva and her granny eventually move out of Kharviv, out of Ukraine, and finally to Dublin, Ireland. Her diary tracks their journey as they leave everything they've ever known.

Moving and at times heart-breaking, this diary tells an important story – of what war does to ordinary people. The excerpts of messages between Yeva and her friends are particularly moving, as are the photographs of their bombed-out flat. Also included are three hand-drawn maps by a Ukrainian illustrator, Olga Shtonda, daily headlines from around the world, and a foreword by Michael Morpurgo.

Alphabet Code	<p>This week, the children learnt the different codes for the /ee/ sound.</p> <p>/ee/- what can you see?</p> <p>/ea/- a cup of tea</p> <p>/ey/- a monkey with a key</p> <p>/y/- happy!</p> <p>Other children focused on blending, segmenting and writing sentences. This week we reviewed: /ai/ /ee/ /igh/</p> <p>In Alphabet Code, we follow a reading scheme. The children need to secure the sounds previously taught <u>before being introduced to new ones</u>. Equally, it is important that they continue to practise blending short words and building/writing sentences.</p>
Literacy	<p>This week, the children have focused on the life cycle of a duck. On Monday, they used adjectives to describe our cute, fluffy ducklings. On Wednesday and Thursday, they wrote down the different stages in the life of a duck.</p> <p>Next week, our story focus will be: 'Vicky the Vet'. We will continue to learn about animals and how to care for them.</p>
Maths	<p>In Maths, we have been learning about halving.</p> <p>The children shared up to 20 apples between two plates and counted how many each person would get. A few challenges came up when they had to share odd numbers, like 9. They suggested leaving one apple out of the plate or even cutting it in half! We introduced the concept of odd and even numbers.</p>
Understanding The World	<p>Our new topic is Land and Seas. Last week, the children learnt about some of the nearest parks in our local area and the job of a park keeper. This week, the children designed their own maps and describe their routes to school.</p>

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 28th April 2023

This week in maths, we looked at subtracting, both with regrouping and without. Then we moved onto looking at subtracting a 1-digit number from a 2-digit number without regrouping. This was a tricky concept to get our heads around but with some role play and a few regrouping games we began to get the hang of it by the end of the week.

In English we started our new topic, all about alligators. This week we started looking at what a non-chronological report was and what their uses are. We learnt the difference between fiction and non-fiction texts and some of the things you might find in a non-fiction text, such as subheadings and captions.

In RE we were introduced to a very important person in the Islamic faith - Prophet Muhammad (pbuh) and how his teachings help Islamic people lead good lives today. We looked at the story of the boy who threw stones at trees and discussed the character's viewpoints and what lesson the story was trying to tell us.

In history we were lucky to have a visit from chef Katie who helped us make sippets! We wrote out the recipes, followed them carefully and then tested them (the best bit). This was part of our 'how has food changed through the years?' topic.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2
Friday 28th April 2023

Thank you for your time and effort in supporting our trips and learning this week! It has been fantastic to have you with us. Last week we were so touched by your support and kind feedback! We also enjoyed tasting a range of fruits and even some sugar cane from Andre's family, it was delicious.

This week we visited London Central Mosques to develop our understanding of Islam. It was a great opportunity to learn how some Muslims worship, pray and follow key teachings. We had an interesting talk outlining the five pillars of Islam. Later we visited the education center to deepen our understanding and ask key questions before witnessing the beautiful call to prayer and watching Salah (prayer).

In our English lessons we have been using our senses to describe the key features of 'The Dark's' house. These included Harrison's recount of 'old, creaking stairs that echoes as you take step.' and Isaac's 'chirping birds heard through the crack in the old window.' We explored an example text and wrote our own success criteria such as using a question, range of conjunctions and clear adjectives. Next week we will begin to plan and write our own story based on the structure of 'The Dark'.

In Mathematics, we are consolidated our arithmetic skills and focusing on which strategy to use for different equations. Please continue to practice your multiplication facts at home through [TTRS](#) to support this.

Today we are enjoying a visit to Jamie Routley's art studio, to explore how artists use colour, tone, shape and composition to create portraits. We are asking our key questions and deepening our understanding of a range of techniques.

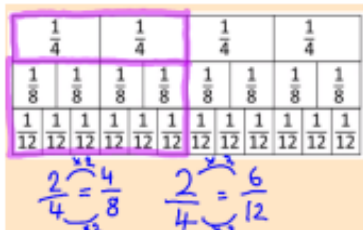


Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 28th April 2023

This week in **English**, we wrote our letters to Mr. Lace to convince him to give us (Ruskin) the role of the hero in the school play. We tried very hard to use emotive, persuasive language and to use cause and effect conjunctions within our letters. We then read each other's letters and gave each other two kind comments and one suggestion.

In **Maths**, we continued learning about fractions. This week, we have continued to explore equivalent fractions. We have looked at using bar models, fraction walls and number lines to show equivalent fractions, as well as learning how our multiplication and division facts can help us identify equivalent fractions. We also learnt how to add fractions with the same denominator.

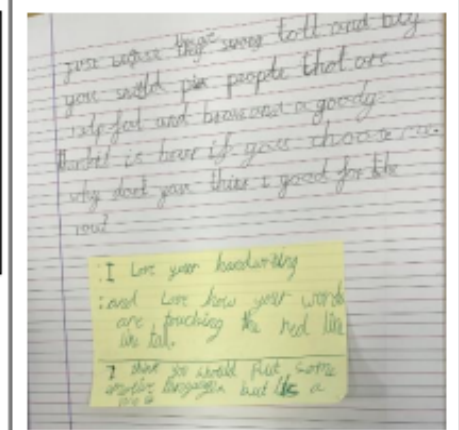

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

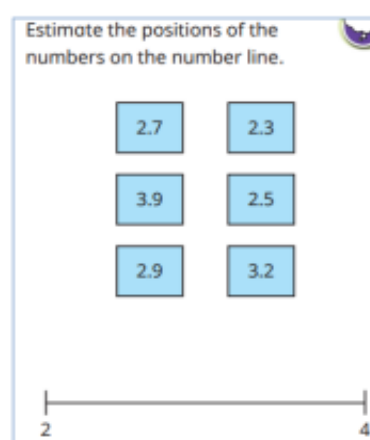
Friday 28th April 2023

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week we:

- Recognised tenths as decimals
- Learnt that a decimal point is used to separate whole numbers from decimals.
- Learnt how to place tenths on a place-value chart, a number-line and saw that 10 tenths are equivalent to 1 whole.
- Explored how to divide 1-digit by 10.



English

This week we made a plan for an information leaflet about a room within 'The Museum of Extraordinary Objects'. Having studied the map of the museum, children chose which room they would like to describe. They then generated subheadings, a title, and used bullet points to note down relevant information. At the end of the week, the children wrote out their final pieces using accurate vocabulary, powerful adjectives and used the correct tense and tone (which was 'formal').

Trips

We took a trip to Southwark Cathedral for a guided tour highlighting Christian symbols and took part in a candle-making workshop. Year 4 also went to the Science Museum to consolidate learning from our States of Matter and Electricity unit.



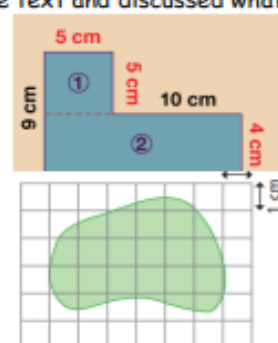

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity
Friday 28th April

In English this week, we boxed-up our text, Perseus and Medusa. This meant that we thought about what happens in each paragraph of the story, so that we understand the structure of a myth and can follow this when we write our own myth. Later in the week, we analysed the language choices used in the text and discussed what they suggest e.g. He didn't expect him to return → The king sent Perseus on a dangerous mission because he hoped he wouldn't return.

In Maths, we started to learn about area. Area is the space inside a shape and this can be calculated by using multiplication. We then applied this knowledge to find the area of compound shapes by splitting the shape into different rectangles and calculating the area of each of these before adding them together. Then, we calculated area of irregular shapes where we had to estimate when some boxes were not completely filled.



In Science, we became experts in different ways plants can reproduce asexually. This means that plants can make copies of themselves without a male and female sex cell. Once we were experts, we shared our knowledge with our group.

This week for PSHE we welcomed Darren, who came to talk to us about consent: what it is, why it's important, and who we should give it to. We also discussed who we could talk to about it.

In RE, we looked at the seventh Sikh Guru, who cared for all of God's creation: people, animals, plants, and the planet Earth itself.

In Computing, we continued our work on creating Vector Drawings, using Google Drawings, and developed our skills of generating multiple images and combining shapes to make pictures.

**Learning at Holy Trinity
Friday 28th April 2023**

In Maths this week, we have continued with our learning on fractions, revising adding and subtracting fractions within 1, where the denominators share a common multiple. On Geometry Tuesday, we focused on finding the area of a triangle using the formula, $A = \frac{b \times h}{2}$. We have also been revising our knowledge on time and converting measure. In addition to this, we have learnt about radius and circumference in a circle and how to calculate this.

In English this week, we have been busy writing an alternative ending to the Boy in Striped Pyjamas. We are taking out time with this piece, paragraph by paragraph to ensure this is a strong piece of writing, reflective of all we have learnt this year.

In RE, we have been learning about how the Early Church protected the Christian message and discussed the Apostles Creed.

In History, we continued our learning on the Vikings, discovering when, where and why the Vikings settled in Britain. We looked into two particular locations where the Vikings settled, York and Repton. We used the iPads to investigate further and will share our findings to the rest of the class next week.
