

<u>Friday 21st April</u> <u>Reception Class Newsletter</u>

This week we:

- Revisited the sounds /air/ (chair) and /ear/ (dear) in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Explored doubling within 10. We were challenged to double towers of cubes. We also rolled a dice and doubled the amount using counters. Finally, we had a go at drawing dots on a ladybird to match the spots on one side.
 We recorded our answers as number sentences e.g. 2+2=4
- Read Percy's Bumpy Ride by Nick Butterworth. We designed and labelled our own flying machines. We described a park scene and painted the main characters. We also retold the story in our own words and used conjunctions to extend our sentences.
- Read the story of Jesus calming the storm when his disciples were out on a
 lake. We thought about how the disciples were feeling and how they turned
 to Jesus for reassurance in their time of need. Christians pray when they
 are afraid so God can take their fears away. We shared things we might be
 afraid of and blew them into bubbles, then watched them pop.
- Had an incredibly exciting delivery... our duckling eggs! Next week, they
 will be strong enough to go for a swim in the water tray.
- Read If Picasso were a Fish in our Art lesson. We created our own fish characters and combined different materials, such as paint, collage, pens and oil pastels.

- Read Tessa the Teacher in our English lessons.
- Revisit the sound /ur/ (surf) in Alphabet Code. We will also learn how to write another code for this sound, the er in ladder.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 21st April 2023

In English, we have started a new unit and have read the storybook, 'Alan's Big, Scary Teeth'. We used adventurous adjectives to describe different body parts of an alligator and then used the conjunction 'and' to join two sentences together.

In Maths this week, we have been looking at fractions and learnt about halves and quarters. We learnt that when we divide an object in half, we will have two halves and that these fractions must be of equal size.

For Alphabet Code this week, we revising the /ai/ code. Next week, we will be revising the /u/ code. In Guided Reading we have been reading 'Handa's Surprise' and have been using the clues in the illustrations and text to make predictions about what might happen in the story.

In Science, we have been finishing our topic on 'Desert Islands', we looked at the different parts of a plant. Focussing on the key words, such as; root, stem, flower, soil and fruit. Next week we will begin our new topic on 'On Safari'.

In RE, we concluded our Easter unit. We thought about all we had learnt about the Easter story and the important events that happen. In particular; Palm Sunday, The Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. We then ended our lesson by trying Hot Cross Buns, which are an Easter treat that has been enjoyed by Christians and people for many years to celebrate Good Friday!

Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

A warm welcome back, I hope you all had a lovely break. This week we started our exciting Summer Term topics.

In English we started the book 'The Dark' by Lemony Snicket. It is a beautiful story about a young boy called Lazlo overcoming his fears of the dark. We spoke about how we all have fears and worries and how we can face these with bravery like Lazlo did. We have used this book to improve and extend our descriptive writing.

In Maths we have been busy revising all our Spring topics before moving on to our new ones. We measured some objects around the classroom with our rulers, estimated what would measure more or less than a metre and thought about how important it is to measure objects correctly. We also revised our knowledge on shapes and explored lines of symmetry. We were very good at guessing the shapes by using clues about their properties.

In History we started our topic on explorers, and we talked about the different explorers we know. We also looked at a map from the 1500's and compared it to a map from 2023. These are some of the great questions we brainstormed:

Are there any more countries or islands yet to be discovered?

How do you become an explorer?

Is it scary being an explorer?

Elsewhere, in Science we visited our garden to see how our shoots were growing. We also discussed all the needs of plants- air, light, warmth, water and nutrients. By the end of this term, I think we will all be little green thumbs!



Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church


Friday 21st April 2023

This week, Year 3 started their latest english unit which involves writing to persuade. They have been thinking about different persuasive techniques used in writing such as rhetorical questions, cause and effect conjunctions, persuasive sentence starters and powerful adjectives. Their homework focuses on this and in the next week, they would have written their own persuasive letter using the story of The Krindlekrax to inspire them.

In maths, Year 3 reviewed finding fractions of amounts – including finding non-unit fractions which involves multiplying. See below:

Find % of 20.

- 1. The denominator shows how many equal parts the whole has been split into (in this case, 5) so divide the whole amount by the denominator (in this case, $20 \div 5 = 4$)
- 2. The numerator shows how many of those parts we need to find (in this case, 3) so multiply each part by the numerator (in this case, $4 \times 3 = 12$)



This term, PE will continue to take place on Tuesday afternoons and Swimming on Wednesday mornings at 10:30am. Please ensure your child is wearing the correct kit on these days and in school uniform on the others.

Look forward to seeing lots of you on Monday 24th April for our class meeting.

Friday 21st April

This week in English, Year Four have been continuing with the story, 'Mr Penguin and the Lost Treasure'. We have used the map of the 'Museum of Extraordinary Objects' to choose a specific room we are most curious about. Then, we planned an information text all about the exhibits in the room. We used subtitles, paragraphs and multi-clause sentences to present our writing in a clear way. We also remembered to use technical vocabulary and write in a formal style to ensure our museum guide was appropriate for any visitors.

In Maths, we have been measuring area using metres squared and centimetres square. We drew and cut out a paper one-centimetre square and a paper one metre square to compare them. There was a very big difference! We then used these to help us estimate the areas of objects around our classroom and school. We even estimated the area of the football pen in the school playground using our paper metre square.

In History, we completed our unit on ancient Egypt by looking at the religion or the time and the importance of the gods and goddesses. We learnt about the creation story, beginning first with Nu and then its shadow, Atum. From here, all the gods and goddesses where created. We chose a specific god or goddesses to research and then created a fact-file. We wrote their name in hieroglyphics, the writing system used in ancient Egypt.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- Would you measure the area of our classroom using cm2 or m2?
- What is the name of the gas used to make soda drinks fizzy?
- Why do we use subtitles in an information text?
- Reminders:
- Swimming is on Wednesday mornings.
- Homework is sent home on Thursdays. Homework club takes place on Thursdays.
- Please bring Reading Records and Homework books in on <u>Tuesdays</u>.
- P.E. is on Monday and <u>Tuesdays</u>. Please send your child in wearing their P.E. uniform and trainers.
- Word of the week: sanguine- optimistic or positive, especially in an apparently bad or difficult situation.



Learning at Christ Church

Friday 21st April 2023

Welcome back to school! It is lovely to see everyone after the Easter holidays and Year 5 are already working very hard. This week, Year 5 went to Westminster Abbey to visit a place of worship in link with our RE curriculum. Thank you to all the parents who came with us. Trips would not be possible without you!

In English, Year 5 is starting a new unit and we are learning about the history of Lego. We have been researching facts about Lego such as who created the little brick, where, and how the business slowly grew over the years. Year 5 created a timeline to sequence the key dates and events that led to the creation of Lego.

In Maths, Year 5 started a new unit on the topic of decimals and fractions. Year 5 are learning about tenths and hundredths and how decimal numbers are parts of a whole. Year 5 have been learning how to exchange between ones, tenths and hundredths and we have been focusing on converting fractions into decimal numbers and vis versa.

In Science, Year 5 learned about the gestation period (the length of time mammals carry their babies in the womb for) of different animals. They learned that usually, the larger the animal, the longer their gestation period. They plotted this correlation between size and gestation period using bar graphs.

In RE, Year 5 are learning about the last 5 Gurus in Sikhism. They learned about Guru Hargobind, who was a spiritual leader but who also created an army to defend the Sikh community from persecution. Children in Year 5 considered the following question: Is it possible to be religious and a warrior? Children argued that the two are compatible if the purpose of the fighting is to protect saints and peaceful communities. However, they highlighted a contradiction: armies sometimes harm people, which does not seem compatible with some religious values such as peace and love.

In Computing, Year 5 created programs with selection processes on Crumble.




Learning at Christ Church

Friday 19th April 2023

This week in Maths, we have been learning about angles! First we learnt about the properties of angles such as 'angles on a straight line add up to 180°' and 'isosceles triangles have two angles that are the same size'. We then used all of these properties to solve for missing angles. We then used a protractor to measure the size of angles focusing on having the correct technique so that the measurements were precise. Finally, we used the protractor to draw angles of varying size and constructed right-angled triangles which had specific angles and length of sides.

Look at this diagram.



Calculate the size of angle x and angle y.

Do not use a protractor (angle measurer).

Because angles on a straight line add up to 180°

$$X = 180^{\circ} - 90^{\circ} - 35^{\circ} = 55^{\circ}$$

Because angles in a triangle add up to 180°

In English, we have been planning our biographies on characters from Wolf Brother. We decided on what our sub-headings would be and made bullet points for each paragraph. Then we added in fronted adverbials, embedded clauses, indirect speech and quotes into our plans. Finally, we wrote our biographies which were interesting and informative!

In Reading, we have been looking at 3-mark inference questions and focusing on how to lay out our points with the evidence behind them. In Art, we designed impactful posters for the advertisement of Romeo and Juliet. In Science, we have started our new topic on light and learnt how light rays from a source bounce off an object and into our eyes. In PE, we have been playing dodgeball and practising our hand-eye co-ordination.
