## Windrush Day 2023 - 75th Anniversary

Windrush Day takes place on 22nd June, remembering the day when more than 800 passengers from the Caribbean arrived at the Tilbury Docks in 1948. Yesterday marked the 75th anniversary of this historical event, a symbolic moment in the history of Black British contribution to the UK.

During this time, the UK needed workers to come and build up the country after the destruction of the war and many different jobs were advertised to people from the Caribbean and other parts of the world. Many of these men and women had served in the British Armed forces because at the time their countries were still ruled by Britain and were not yet independent.

On 22nd June 1948 the Empire Windrush ship left the Caribbean to travel thousands of miles to the UK, the first time many of them had left their homes. For many, a very scary time but also slightly exciting. However, When the passengers arrived they didn't get the friendly welcome they had hoped for. Many of them experienced racism and discrimination and found it hard to get homes to live in or to find work. Some companies and landlords said they did not want black people working for them or living in their properties, they even displayed very racist signs like this one. Eventually acts like these were made illegal, but unfortunately these laws didn't always stop all racism and discrimination, but were an important step in reducing it. Unfortunately some people are still subjected to racism of different levels today.



The contribution that the Windrush generation and their descendants brought to the UK cannot be underestimated, it is invaluable. Finally In 2018 the UK government announced a day to celebrate this contribution - Windrush Day - that would be held annually on 22nd June.

## Helping you feel well this summer



<b>STAY SHADED</b>	Stay shaded and out of the sun from 11am and 3pm, wear a hat and light clothing to cover up.
<b>STAY SENSIBLE</b>	If you are having a summer BBQ, ensure that food is stored and cooked safely.
<b>STAY AWARE</b>	Be a good neighbour and look after those who may need a helping hand during the hot weather.
<b>STAY SAFE</b>	Pharmacies can be found locally. Your local pharmacist can give you medicine to help with hayfever.
<b>STAY PROTECTED</b>	Always make sure you are protected from the sun, choose a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher.
<b>STAY HYDRATED</b>	Keep yourself hydrated, by drinking plenty of water and avoid excess alcohol and caffeine.

As the weather is changing and we are seeing more sunny days, children will be exposed to the sun and we would like to share some sun safety tips. Please make sure that:

- children come to school with a water bottle
- a hat
- wearing sun screen - and have sun screen in their bag -
- particularly on swimming days (Y3/Y4 only)

In addition, the NHS states that you should take extra care in the sun if:

- have pale, white or light brown skin
- have freckles or red or fair hair
- tend to burn rather than tan
- have many moles
- have skin problems relating to a medical condition
- are only exposed to intense sun occasionally (for example, while on holiday)
- have a family history of skin cancer

## London Action Climate Week: Art Competition for schools:

**Title:** Create for our climate! Tell us what you're doing to tackle Climate Change at your school

**Date of competition: 12<sup>th</sup> June – 29<sup>th</sup> June**

Kensington and Chelsea Council will be celebrating London Climate Action Week (LCAW) running from 24 June – 2 July 2023. As part of this, the Council is inviting schools across the borough to be part of an Art Competition to showcase the impactful and inspiring climate action you are delivering in your school and the wider community to work towards a more sustainable future.

School pupils in RBKC are invited to design a creative piece of their choice (for example, an art piece, video, poem, or poster) demonstrating how the school is making a difference to the planet and the local community by tackling climate change and other environmental issues.

You can base your creative piece on one of the five themes of the [London's Schools Climate Summit](#) (Campus, Curriculum, Community, Careers and Finance) or just create your own piece showcasing the great work your school is doing!

This provides an opportunity for children and teachers to discuss what action they've been taking to address the climate crisis and achieve the borough's carbon neutral targets by 2040; and also have their voices heard.

### How can schools participate?

Paper art pieces, poems, posters should be A4 or A3 size, hand drawn, painted or computer generated. Videos should be no longer than 5 minutes and no bigger than 10 MB. Scan your pupils' paper entries and email all entries to [environment@rbkc.gov.uk](mailto:environment@rbkc.gov.uk) or alternatively post them to the following address:

All entries should include the name of the school, the name of the student/s and/or class that created the work and should be submitted no later than the **closing time and date: 5pm Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> June 2023**. For any extensions, please do contact us.

The three best creative pieces will be awarded a prize and all works received will be displayed at an exhibition at the end of the competition to raise awareness of climate change and the solutions envisioned by children and delivered by schools. We will provide more information on the exhibition and location soon and invite all schools, pupils and parents to attend.

## London Action Climate Week: Climate Change Assemblies:

A tailored climate change assembly will be offered to schools by Kensington and Chelsea's Climate Change team throughout London Climate Action week and throughout the year as part of a wider Climate Education Programme. This will be to inspire action locally about what schools can do to tackle climate change through sharing information on actions, projects, grants and support available to schools to be able to provide them with the resources they need to take action on climate change.

Your participation in any of the activities for London Climate Action week will receive support, guidance and publicity from the Council. The Council's Climate Change Team will

assist you in any way that it can and can offer you climate change materials/guides that you could use to help inspire and educate your students.

Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity

Dear Reception Parents,

This week, in **English**, we have listened to the story of The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch. The children used adjectives to describe what Mr. Grinling had for lunch. We also focused on using different types of verbs: made, baked, cooked, prepared etc.

*Mr.s Grinling made a delicious lunch. She prepared a tasty seafood salad.*

In **Maths**, we reviewed subtraction. The children used different methods to work out their calculations. They used the crossing out strategy by drawing circles and crossing them out; cubes and their fingers.

In **Understanding the World**, we reviewed the concepts of floating and sinking.

They loved playing in the **outdoor area** and making bubbles using thread, soap and water. Some children discovered they could also make bubbles using their hands! Very clever!

We have been preparing the children for their **transition to Year 1!** This week, we had some little visitors in our classroom (the new Reception children starting in September). The children showed resilience and adaptability, as we were required to use other classrooms during our mornings! They all looked so grown and ready for this new chapter to come!

*Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1*

*Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2023*

*In English we looked at another suffix this week which was -ed. We looked at how to add it to the verb and then had a go at using verbs with -ing in our own sentences.*

*On Tuesday we were lucky enough to have a 'Metal Bashing' workshop where we created some beautiful scales and fish. We drew designs, bashed them into metal, twisted metal into 2D or 3D fish and above all, had lots of fun. We loved being allowed to use the tools and lots of us showed how resilient we were even when our fingers felt like they might drop off!*



*In RE we were introduced to the Parable of the Lost Sheep and spent the first part of our lesson finding some lost sheep in our playground. Unfortunately, one was not found and this created the debate whether we should carry on searching or give up. We learnt that the shepherd in the parable left his 99 sheep to look for the 1 lost sheep and then celebrated with his friends.*

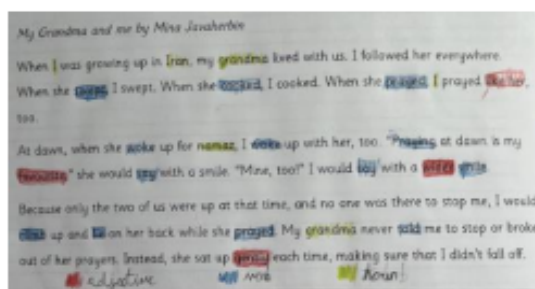
Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2  
Friday 26th May 2023

Thank you for a beautiful week! We have had so much fun! A big thank you for my incredible drawn cards- I will treasure them always. Our class cake was delightful! A very big thank you to Laura, we all ate lots of delicious cake! It was wonderful to celebrate with your beautiful children.



In maths, we have been using dienes, know number facts to develop our understanding of place value and have, and started to look at numbers to 100. We have used dienes to identify one, tens and hundreds along with adding and subtracting using our place value chart. Next, we will focus on addition strategies with three digits.

In English, we have a new book called Grandma and Me. It follows the story of an Iranian girl and her special relationship with her grandma. We have been exploring the characters and describing their traits using expanded noun phrases. Over the next few weeks, we will look more at the setting of the story and learn more about Iranian culture. If you have any art or artefacts at home that would help bring our story to life, please let me know.



In RE we have been exploring Christianity and what it means to belong to a community. We learnt about baptism and the symbols associated.

In DT, we started a new project making Joseph's technicolour coat. After understanding the story, we continued to practice our running stitch and cross-stitches. We also designed our own coats in preparation for next week! It will take some patience and persistence but I know the final products will be amazing!



This week we have revised our taught skills using Scratch junior as this half term we will be creating our own quizzes. Feel free to download scratch junior free online.

In Science, we wrote detailed recounts of our trip to Pizza Express, it was wonderful to learn from the chefs and make our own delicious pizzas. This week we also had a visit from Laura who shared about her job as a chef and talked us through a wonderful Ghana coke recipe and taster!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 23rd June 2023

### Highlights of this week include:

#### Maths

This week we:

- Learnt how to round numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.
- Converted roman numerals into numbers and rounded these to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.
- Answered reasoning questions on rounding numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.

#### English

We started the week by writing a diary entry of a cracker being eaten(!). Year 4 combined their diary-writing skills with their knowledge of the digestive system. This involved writing in the first person, in chronological order, using time-conjunctions and thinking of powerful adjectives and adverbs to set the scene. The children did a fantastic job of providing rich descriptions using anatomical terms and knowledge of physiological processes within the digestive system. There was also plenty of humour included!

#### Art

On Wednesday, we were joined by Lara Hailey, an artist who specialises in felt making. We started the day with pieces of merino fleece which the children transformed into their own felt designs. During the afternoon, pupils collaborated on one large piece using the theme 'migrating butterflies'. See photo (right) for this collaborative piece.



#### RE

This week we learnt about the key steps of Hindu wedding rituals and explored the idea that marriage is not just the joining of two individuals, but also of two families (communities). Pupils drew the 'seven steps' each couple takes before being married. The meaning of each step was also included in the drawings.

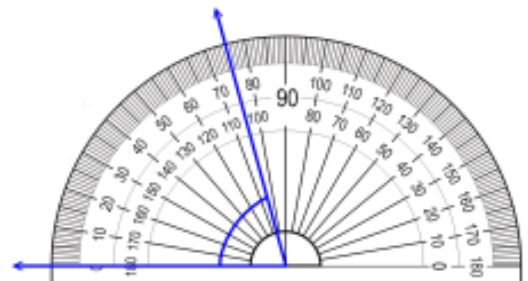

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity  
Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2023

This week in English, began planning our innovation of our model text *How to Catch a Minotaur: A Step-by-Step Guide*. We changed our creature from the Minotaur to the Griffin, and had to make changes to the equipment needed and steps to follow.

In Maths, we have moved on to learning about angles. We started by recapping our knowledge of angles and identifying acute, right and obtuse angles. Then, we learnt how to measure angles using a protractor - we made sure to identify the type of angle first, then we would know whether to read the inner scale or outer scale.



In Art, we were introduced to an art style called Batik which originated in Indonesia. In Batik art, wax is used to create a pattern on fabric, which is then dipped in colourful dye. We then practised drawing patterns and making thoughtful choices about the colours we use. We will use this knowledge and skills when doing our art project later this term.

In History, we explored different aspects of life for the ancient Greeks including food, education, houses and how life was different for children, women and men.

This week we caught up on our Science by reviewing our research on gestation periods in animals. We created and tested the hypothesis that the bigger the animal, the longer the gestation period. We linked our learning to prior learning in Maths by plotting our data on a graph and finding a line of best fit. We then used our data to draw a conclusion.

In Computing we developed our learning of conditional coding segments and tried different conditions to see what effect they would have on a simple gaming program. We then began to customise our own games.
