INSET DAYS TO ACADEMIC YEAR 2023/24


CHANGE OF




Recommended Read

12	STAY SHADED	Stay shaded and out of the sun from 11am and 3pm, wear a hat and light clothing to cover up.
Ŷ	STAY SENSIBLE	If you are having a summer BBQ, ensure that food is stored and cooked safely.
	STAY AWARE	Be a good neighbour and look after those who may need a helping hand during the hot weather.
	STAY SAFE	Pharmacies can be found locally. Your local pharmacist can give you medicine to help with hayfever.
STR.	STAY PROTECTED	Always make sure you are protected from the sun, choose a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher.
	STAY HYDRATED	Keep yourself hydrated, by drinking plenty of water and avoid excess alcohol and caffeine.

Sun Safety

As the weather is changing and we are seeing more sunny days, children will be exposed to the sun and we would like to share some sun safety tips. Please make sure that:

- children come to school with a water bottle
- a hat
- wearing sun screen and have sun screen in their bag particularly on swimming days (Y3/Y4 only)

In addition, the NHS states that you should take extra care in the sun if: • have pale, white or light brown skin

- have freckles or red or fair hair
- tend to burn rather than tan
- have many moles
- have skin problems relating to a medical condition

are only exposed to intense sun occasionally (for example, while on holiday)

have a family history of skin cancer

<u>Reception Class Newsletter</u>



Friday 16th June

<u>This week we:</u>

- Used The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch as a focus for our writing. We use adjectives to describe the delicious food in his lunchbox. We thought about what it would be like to live in a lighthouse and if we would like to live somewhere unusual, such as an igloo, a treehouse, a cave or a castle. We also wrote a recount of the story in our own words.
- Classified animals by their habitats in our Understanding the World lesson.
- Revisited the /ai/ sound in Alphabet Code. We read and wrote words containing the codes /ai/ (rain), ay (play) and the split code, a-e (bake).
- Explored different methods of subtraction during our Maths lessons. We subtracted using our fingers, on a number line, by counting back, by crossing out and by taking away the counting cubes. We were given the option to rotate around the different stations and to choose our favourite method.
- Read the Bible story about how Adam was asked by God to name all the animals that He had created (Genesis 2:19-20). We also thought about how God made sure that every type of animal was inside Noah's ark. This was because they are all special to Him. We discussed which instructions we would give to people looking after different animals and why it is important that animals are looked after carefully.

<u>Next week, we will:</u>

- Revisit the /oa/ (goat) sound in Alphabet Code.
- Write about different types of summer holidays and travel in our English lessons.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 16th June 2023

In English, we have concluded our 'Hibernation Hotel' topic. By writing a recount of the story. We included adjectives, expanded noun phrases, capital letters, full stops and fingers spaces to make our writing even better.

In Maths this week, we have been looking at fractions. Last week we looked at halves but this week we have been looking at how we make quarters. We learnt then when we put something into quarters we split it into fur equal parts.

For Alphabet Code this week we finished looking at the /oi/ code and have been revising all the codes.

In RE, we have been learning about Islam. This week we learnt about what it means to be Muslim. We explored different items that are from the Islamic faith and carefully thought about why they might be important.

In Geography, we continued with our new topic: 'What will we see on our journey around the world?' We learnt about a country in Africa, Mali. We looked at pictures of a mosque in Mali and learnt that it is made of mud and sand. We then compared that to the buildings in England and what they are made of.

In PSHE, we thought about 'kindness' and how we could be kind to our friends. We sat in a circle and gave compliments and comments of appreciation to our friends and classmates.




Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

In Maths we have started our topic on mass. We had a chance to estimate and then find the weight of items using kitchen scales. Sometimes our predictions

were close to the actual weight, other times we were well off! It's a hard skill to be able to predict the correct weight of objects. We will be continuing exploring mass next week and looking at problem solving questions.

In English we spent the first few days this week recounting our half-term break. It sounds like everyone had such a wonderful holiday! We made sure to use first person and past tense in our recount. We also tried to use adverbs to extend



our descriptive writing. Some fabulous examples ' I tried to walk carefully along the stone wall' (Florisa) and 'I didn't like my ice cream so thankfully I got to eat my dad's chocolate ice cream.' (Sofia).

In Geography this term we have started our new topic 'Do you like to go to the seaside'. This is in preparation for our very exciting trip to West Wittering at the end of term.

In Science we have started to explore our topic called 'Mini Masterchefs'. We are learning how to keep proper hygiene practices in the kitchen and what foods our body needs to survive.


Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

Friday 16th June 2023

Year 3 have made the most brilliant effort to plan and publish their own newspaper articles reporting on the adventures of Spyfox – they've had to use descriptive devices to create catchy headlines, punctuate witness statements and write in detail to explain the 5 W's.

I've been very impressed with their understanding of shapes and patterns – as well as measuring the perimeter of shapes, they've also been learning about right angles, comparing angles and finding parallel and perpendicular lines. On Thursday, we went on a maths walk around the local area to find right angles. We noticed they are all around us! They were introduced to the names of other angles which they will learn more about in Year 5 but I wonder if they can remember the

names...



Year 3 very much look forward to cooking, and serving a delicious Italian feast on Tuesday evening. They spent some time designing place cards and menus and learnt the name of some Italian dishes.

Friday 16th June

This week in English, Year Four used expanded noun phrases to describe the character of the boy in 'The Selfish Giant' to create a Missing Person poster. We then created sentences using the suffix -sion with words such as; 'division', 'confusion' and 'invasion' to describe the impact of the giant building a wall in the story. In Maths, we have continued to learn about shapes, including a range of regular and irregular polygons. We classified shapes as either; pentagons, hexagons, heptagons or octagons, depending on their properties. We then looked at vertical, horizontal and diagonal lines of symmetry. We used mirrors to check that the reflection on the line of symmetry was identical on both sides.

On Tuesday, Year Four had the amazing opportunity to work with the sculptor, Darcy. They had a busy, fun-filled creating chairs out of tightly rolled newspapers! They learnt different techniques of how to roll the sheets of paper, how to use the rolling machine and different ways of fastening the sticks together using cable ties. The results were extremely impressive! Year Four now have six sturdy, attractive chairs. It was also wonderful to see how brilliantly Year Four collaborated...teamship at its best!

In Art, we looked at the artwork of the surrealist artist Emily Kame Kngwarreye. We analysed the scale, colour and use of line in two of her paintings: 'Earth's Creation' and 'Untitled' (1990). We then explored Kngwarreye's style by drawing a missing section of her painting. In RE, we learnt about how Hindus honour the dead. We focussed on the importance of the samskaras in a Hindu funeral and suggested the difference that the belief in reincarnation and moksha makes to a Hindu. Often, Hindus cremate a person who has died as this allows for their soul to be released swiftly so it can begin its new life. They then scatter their ashes in a river as this symbolises the flow of life.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- In Hinduism, how many days does it take for the atman (soul) of a person who has died to then enter a new life?
- When looking at a painting, what does the word 'composition' describe?
- How many lines of symmetry does a regular pentagon have?

Learning at Christ Church

Friday 16th June 2023

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. Year 5 is participating in Sports Day on Friday 16th June, and we hope they have a lot of fun and enjoy themselves.

In English, Year 5 have been learning about Curiosity's journey to Mars and about the '7 minutes of terror', the 7 minutes it took the rover to safely land on the red planet. Children have been using the passive voice to describe Curiosity's landing on Mars. Children have also been using the dash to add information to sentences which describe the type of messages Curiosity has been sending to NASA about its scientific exploration of Mars.

In Maths, Year 5 have been learning about time. Children have been learning about the different time units we use (seconds, minutes, hours, day, week...) and the relationships between these time units (for example, you need 10 years to make a decade). Children have been solving problems asking them to convert time units. They have also been solving problems involving departure, arrival hours and length of time using timelines.

In History, Year 5 have been learning about democracy. Year 5 acted out an Athenian democracy in class. Some children were members of the Boule and presented ideas of laws to the Assembly. Other children were members of the Ecclesia and voted these laws in or chose to reject them.

In RE, Year 5 are learning about faiths and beliefs in our school and borough. Children in Year 5 conducted an inquiry to find out about the different faiths and beliefs shared by children in our classroom. They then collected facts about these religions and created a poster representative of all the beliefs and faiths in our classroom.

In Computing, Year 5 drew a vector image using the copy and paste tool. They were only allowed to use squares and circles to create their drawing.

In Art, Year 5 continued their Batik project and used wax to trace the outline of their Greek mythical creature on their piece of fabric.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 6

Friday 16th June 2023

Drama:

Rehearsals for our upcoming Shakespeare performance of Romeo and Juliet continued apace. Pupils are now incorporating delivering lines that have been learnt off-by-heart with the indepth stage directions given by Mr Tolley. All class members have been facing this task with determination, skill and humour.

PE:

Class members showed what great sports-people they are during Sports Day. They threw themselves into all the team events with great enthusiasm and made the most of their final Sports Day at Christ Church & Holy Trinity.

English:

The children have written their letter of complaint to an organisation. I was so impressed at how the children were able to take on a persona and use persuasive writing techniques to create a fantastic piece of formal writing. It has been wonderful to see the children develop as writers over this year. We have also been writing our bio for the leaver's book so the children have been summing up their experiences over the year at Christ Church.

Art:

The children continued to design and paint their tote bags with pictures inspired by Jean-Michel Basquiat. They have used posca pens to decorate their bags and the results are incredible!

Maths:

The children have been reading and interpreting dual bar graphs this week. They have been explaining what they show, solving problems about them and even drawing their own.
