

Mac loves music. He plays guitar in the school rock band and often rocks out with his mum, who's obsessed with rock. His favourite lesson is music with the uber cool Ms Fox. But he has a secret. He loves musicals. He can never tell his mother. Or anyone else. Musicals aren't cool, are they?

But when the arts programme at school is going to be cut, and his favourite teacher out of a job, Mac knows he has to do something. And when he lets slip his knowledge of musicals, he's invited to a secret musicals appreciation society, where he meets Flynn. Flynn is a year older, he writes amazing music and he has various physical and verbal tics, due to his Tourette's. Together, can Mac and Flynn write a musical to save Ms Fox?

This is a brilliant story about true friendship, the importance of the arts, and the astounding things a community can do when it pulls together. Written with guidance from someone with Tourette's, this gives a clear-eyed view of the potential challenges Tourette's brings, and information on how it can differ from person to person. Importantly, Flynn is far more than his Tourette's. Uplifting and heart-warming.

Dear Parent/Carer,

I'm delighted to inform you that City Hall is ensuring all primary school children who attend state schools in London will receive **free school meals** for the full academic year, starting this September.

As Mayor of London, I know parents/carers are really struggling with the cost-of-living crisis right now. That's why I've taken the decision to provide funding to expand on the Government's limited existing free school meals offer. This means all state funded primary school children in London are now eligible for free school meals.

The funding we're providing will help up to 270,000 primary school children in London, like yours, access free school meals and could save your family upwards of £440 across the year.

Your child will receive their free school meals automatically, but it's vitally important that you still complete your school or borough's registration form in case your child is eligible for extra funding for their school from the Government, worth £1,300 per year. That's extra money to spend on enrichment activities, teacher development, and targeted support for the children that need it most. Depending on how schemes operate in your borough, it may also entitle you to other benefits like food vouchers during the holidays. There is more information about registration in your borough here:

MAYOR OF LONDON

Those parents/carers whose children already qualify for free school meals under the Government's existing offer must also continue to apply for free school meals as before.

My administration has taken the unprecedented step of providing this funding because we're deeply concerned by the number of primary school children going hungry in London's classrooms. Eligibility criteria for the Government's existing free school meals offer is strict, which means many parents/carers and children who need this helping hand have been missing out. But from September – thanks to our intervention – that will all change as part of our effort to build a better London for everyone.

As someone who received free school meals myself, I'm incredibly proud that we're able to step up and provide this crucial lifeline to London's families during such tough economic times. I firmly believe that every child deserves the chance to be able to grow up healthy and thrive, regardless of their background or circumstances. But for this to happen, children must be able to access healthy, nutritious meals.

GRENFELL IN THE WORDS OF SURVIVORS

Grenfell: in the words of survivors

Staring an ex Christ Church pupil and Mr Tolley's son,

Keaton Guimaraes-Tolley

13 July - 26 August 2023

It was my safest place. It was home.

A powerful new verbatim play from the testimony of residents at the heart of the Grenfell Tower tragedy.

Six years on, interviews conducted with a group of survivors and bereaved reveal the impact of the multiple failures that led to a national disaster, asking: how do we stop this ever happening again?

Created from these interviews by Gillian Slovo (Another World: Losing our Children to Islamic State), the play is co-directed by Phyllida Lloyd (The Donmar Shakespeare Trilogy) and Anthony Simpson-Pike (The P Word).

Startling and deeply moving, it explores the courage and resilience of an ill-treated community and their continued campaign for justice.

Grenfell: in the words of survivors is part of a multi-year programme of National Theatre <u>creative</u> activity in North Kensington, delivered in collaboration with local community organisations.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 14th July 2023

In English we recapped our learning of suffixes, in particular adding -ing. Then we moved onto looking at poetry, starting off with looking at the features of a poem. We talked about verses, rhyming words and what makes a poem, a poem. We worked so hard we were introduced into two new words, onomatopoeia and personification. We were experts at identifying these themes in poems by the end of the week.

In maths we started to look at position and direction. We learnt what a half, quarter and threequarter turn are and made some great connections with telling the time. We made sure to know which was our left and our right hand too! We realised this was an important life skill to know!

In RE we were looked at the Parable of the Good Samaritan. We discussed the message - treat your neighbour as you want to be treated. We discussed what neighbour means and thought about a time when a neighbour had helped us. We wrote them a card, ending with a wish that one day we can repay the favour or pass the good deed on.

On Thursday we had a final trip of the year to the Princess Diana Memorial Playground. We were lucky enough to have the whole place to ourselves and had an amazing time celebrating all our achievements throughout our time in Year One. Then we were joined by some of our parents for a delicious picnic lunch afterwards. What a fantastic way to finish our amazing year!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 14th July 2023

Thank you for a beautiful week! A very big thank you to all our parents and carers who were able to join us this week on our beach visit. The day was a huge success. Thanks to your help, kindness and picnic supplies. It was such a joy to all be together and celebrate the wonderful year we have had. We so enjoyed our sandy games and ocean swims!

Following our trip we wrote a detailed recount of the natural and man-made features we spotted at the beach. For example, we found Mariam grass which supported the structure of sand dunes. Along with groynes that prevented the beach sand from moving.

In maths, we have been consolidating our understanding of telling the time to a five minute intervals. We are very happy with o'clock, quarter past, half past, and quarter to. Any things to do to continue to practice is at home would be very helpful.

We have finished our beautiful Joseph's coat and will begin to evaluate our design and technology project. We incorporated a range of appliqué using over and running stitch. Along with buttons and pockets. We are now evaluating our design and discussing our favourite parts and points of improvement.

During a computer lesson, we created a quiz, using scratch Junior and can transition between slides, generate an algorithm and answer a range of questions.

In **English**, we started our unit on traditional tales with a twist. We thought about what we remembered from the story 'The Three Little Pigs' before reading a story called 'The Three Little Wolves and the Big Bad Pig'. We then compared the two stories looking for the similarities and differences. We then looked at different versions of Little Red Riding Hood.

In **Maths**, we finished our Geometry unit by identifying the properties of 3D shapes and making 3D shapes. We then began our next unit 'Mass and Capacity' where we began by looking at scales.

In **RE**, we looked at another of Jesus' I am statements. This time we analysed the statement 'I am the way, the truth and the life.'

For **Reading** this week, we practised our comprehension skills. We practised identifying key information within the text and using this evidence to answer questions carefully.



In RE, we continued our local religions presentations, ready to present them next week,


In Computing we made our programmable quizzes that we planned last week. We decided what our sprite would do if the answer was correct or incorrect.
