

Alex only moved to Shiver Point a few months back because his Mum had to relocate for work. She does long shifts as a nurse and money's tight.

So, when a bright light streaks across the night sky and seems to land somewhere in Howlmoor Forest, Alex sees a potential opportunity to make some quick cash. His geography teacher says that pieces of fallen meteorite can fetch good prices which is the only reason he is trekking through a wood in the middle of the night.

But four other kids have had the same idea. And they are not alone.

A sinister, shadowy figure with huge teeth and a terrifying screech for a voice is watching them and, although they run, the kids can't hide for long.

At about 150 pages, this is a short, snappy rollercoaster of a horror story with a skilful build-up of tension from 'This sleepy town is so bland, nothing ever happens here' to 'Aargh, we're all going to die!'.

Populated by mysterious exploding slugs, black goo and zombified townsfolk, this tale of five misfits who must work as a team to defeat the invaders will have wide appeal.



Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity 15th September 2023



What a lovely second week we have had! Well done everybody - children and parents!

It's exciting to see your little ones becoming big, independent children.

They have been settling in nicely, building new friendships and exploring their new setting. We have focused on understanding and following classroom rules and boundaries as well as learning about new routines.

In RE, we have been talking about what is precious to us, explaining why something is precious to us.

In Art, we completed our self-portraits from last week, creating some beautiful water colour backgrounds for our pen drawings of our faces.

Next week we will begin our **Alphabet Code** lessons and we will learn the following sounds: /s/ /a/ /t/. The children will focus on identifying the initial sound in words and they will start practising their cursive letter formation. Exciting!

In **Maths**, we will continue to focus on reciting numbers to 10, recognising numerals to 10, forming numbers correctly to 10 and matching numerals to quantities.

Skills to practise at home:

-Taking off their jumpers and putting them back on.

-Packing their school bags and zipping them up.

- -Putting their coats on and zipping them up.
- Using scissors effectively.

Learning in Year I at Holy Trinity




Dear Parents and carers,

What another great week! Year One have continued to settle into the busy way of school life and they have continued to impressed us all with their hard work and resilience.

In English this week, we started to look at labels and captions. We look at the differences between them and why we would use them. We were very quick to identify a caption as a short sentence giving information about an image and a label was more one word naming an object.

In Maths we continued looking at numbers to 10. The children practised forming numbers correctly and writing numbers with words up to 10. They worked out different ways of making 10 using a ten frame. We focused on identifying numbers on a ten frame. For example, a ten frame with a missing counter is 9. A ten frame with just one row of counters is 5.





We continued with our Alphabet Code lessons where we looked at the different codes making the /ai/. We found ai as in rain, ay as in play, a-e as in make and a as in baby! Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for /ee/.

Thank you for a wonderful first full week of learning, we are so enjoying teaching you as you have such great enthusiasm for learning!

A very big thank you to all parents and carers who are able to join us for a parent meeting, all the information has been sent home and also emailed for your reference.

This week we have focused on describing the setting of a beach using our senses. We bought the beach into our classroom and explored different aspects through or senses for example, we felt the soft, grain of sand, ate some salty crisps and listened to the sounds of rolling waves as we were exploring the feel of water. Later we use this experience to write our own setting description which were full of detail. Thank you to those that sent on your beach photos allowed us to picture ourselves at the beach. We are practising the skill as part of our homework task as we are trying to extend a sentence using conjunctions. We also described our characters and began to reflect on their emotions as well as their appearance.

In mathematics, we have been using concrete resources to develop our understanding of place value. This week we made two digit numbers, using counters, dienes and beat strings. We are now able to state how many tens and ones are in a two-digit number and represent this in a range of ways.

We ventured to Sedding Street to enjoy our first computing lesson! We are exploring new technology around us and used Google classroom to sort a range of technologies found within our school.

During our PE sessions, we have been developing our ball skills and have been practising controlling a football using one foot.

We have really enjoyed creating our own self-portraits for our class display- we hope you enjoyed seeing the photocopies of these! We were blown away by the detail and keen observations. These will soon be proudly on display in our classroom.

During our RE lesson we revised our school virtues of patience, kindness and love as we considered and how this links to our school parable of the sower and the seed.

We have had a very busy week so please rest well. I look forward to seeing you after the weekend :)











Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 15th September 2023

One whole week of learning completed in Year 3 and what a week it was!

In English, we have been using the animation 'Taking Flight' to help us construct exciting sentences. We have learnt about using fronted adverbials, compound sentences and we began looking at how to construct paragraphs. We will be continuing to practise these skills throughout the year.

In Maths, we continued our unit on place value. This week, we focused on partitioning numbers to 1000 and identifying the number of hundreds, tens and ones, representing numbers to 1000 in different ways and finding 1, 10 or 100 more or less than a number up to 1000.

In Science, we continued learning about skeletons. This week, we learnt about the functions of the skeleton and jobs of different bones.

In Art with Miss Edgeworth, we began our unit on sculpture. We thought about what sculptures are and identified different sculptures around the UK.

In Computing, we began looking at digital devices. We discovered that all digital devices have an input, process and an output.

In RE, we began our new unit 'What is the Bible's Big Story?' This week, we looked at the Bible in detail and discovered that there are 66 books in the Bible. We thought about who wrote the Bible and why people still use it today.

This week, the children had their first swimming lesson! Thank you for sending them to school so prepared 😳

Thank you to everyone who attended the Parent's Meeting this week. It was so lovely to see so many of you and to welcome you all to Year 3.

Friday 15th September 2023

Maths

This week pupils:

- Counted forwards and backwards from any given multiple of 1,000.
- Recognised the place value of each digit in a 4-digit number (thousands, hundreds, tens and ones).
- Partitioned numbers to 10,000.
- 'Flexibly partitioned numbers to 10, 000

English

This week pupils:

- Identified key events from the animated film 'Tado Jones'.
- Sequenced these events in chronological order and then went on to write a
 recount of these ordered events.
- · Learnt how to order paragraphs for an existing piece of writing.
- Learnt how to create compound and simple sentences and incorporated coordinating conjunctions.

Art:

This week, children started self-portraits and created mini self-portraits that we will use for our Year 4 Writing Targets display.

Science:

We continued our Living Things unit by grouping 12 animals into a Venn diagram that had three criteria: lives in water, lays eggs and breathes air. We also learnt about the life processes that organisms all have. Ask your child what the acronym MRS GREN means (hint: the seven processes of life).

History:

Year 4 reviewed the idea of 'childhood' as opposed to 'adulthood'; plotted significant events in their lives on a timeline and considered age restrictions for children and what they can do legally. The lesson was finished with analysing children's rights as proposed by the UN (Rights of a Child).

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 15th September

This week, Year 5 has enjoyed jumping into the swing of things.

We started our English topic, based on a video called *The Swing of Change* and have had some wonderful discussions about the short film and the world that it is set in. We have used a range of tools to write descriptions of the setting and the main character, including using our senses and adding dialogue.

In maths, we have started our place value topic and are looking at numbers up to 100,000 soon changing to numbers up to 1,000,000!

Art and PSHE have both had us looking inwards at ourselves and our identities, as we complete superhero self-portraits and think about what makes us unique.

On Thursday, we went back to Battersea Park and played some fun football games, working together in pairs.

We are looking forward to seeing you all on Tuesday for our class meeting.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

Friday 15th September 2023

This week in English, we started looking at 'Story Openings' and their importance in creating atmosphere in both stories and films. We focused on Great Expectations by Charles Dickens and how in the 1947 film in less than two minutes creates an atmosphere to set the story. We watched Pip run through the marshes and into a graveyard, with the wind howling and branches smashing into each other. This instigated interesting conversations around what pathetic fallacy and personification are.

We finished the week with finding ways we could use personification to describe the wind and clouds from the scene in Great Expectations.

In maths we continued to look at place value, moving onto 8-digit numbers and the power of ten. We looked at what happens when we multiply and divide by 10, 1,000 and 10,000 etc. We continued to compare numbers, the value of certain digits within a number and what would happen if we added or took away digits.

In reading we started reading The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas by John Boyne. We were introduced to Bruno who came home to find he had to leave his home and friends behind. This sparked some interesting conversations about why we think Bruno had to leave and where he might go.

On Tuesday, we had an exciting afternoon meeting our sheep for the very first time! What fun we had meeting our sheep, enjoying squash and cake in the sunshine. We are looking forward to our fortnightly activities with Reception class!

We also had our first swimming session this week which went very well. We all looked confident in the pool and enjoyed swimming length after length. Well done everyone!
