Positive Behaviour Workshop Monday 2nd October, 9.10am Sedding Street

Led by Miss Edgeworth, Head of School and Miss Martin, Behaviour Lead. This is a workshop for parents in Years 1 to Year 4, designed to explain The Zones of Regulation, an internationally renowned intervention which helps children to manage their emotions, used by our Holy Trinity Team. We will also explore children's emotional needs, different types of behaviour and how to redirect them in a positive and constructive way.

By the end of the workshop you will: understand regulation and how we support it, gain a basic understanding of The Zones of Regulation, begin to understand behaviour as a form of communication and understand the different types of behaviour a child might present and how to redirect them using positive and encouraging strategies.


Mrs Wordsmith



Author: Rachel Faturoti Publisher: Hodder Children's Books




Isaiah is clever, popular and resourceful, but life has been tough recently. His dad had a serious accident and cannot work, so they're struggling financially and are being threatened with eviction. Isaiah feels ashamed when he goes to the food bank for supplies and worries that his friends will shun him if they discover he's poor.

Determined to make some money, Isaiah sets his sights on a prize fund for representing his school at a Victorian exhibition. When he finds out that his tower block was a former Victorian workhouse, he explores the basement for clues from the past. Isaiah is startled when he sees a boy in the old fireplace. Realising that it's a time portal, he learns that Jacob lived in the workhouse in the 1830s. Through his research, Isaiah suspects that Jacob is in grave danger, but should he try to change the past to save his new friend?

Featuring Black main characters, this multilayered time-slip novel explores poverty from both a historical and contemporary perspective. It also highlights the strain children can feel when caring for a parent or dealing with financial worries. Gripping and thought-provoking, the tale celebrates resilience, friendship and a touching father-son relationship.



WHO CAN BE A PARENT GOVERNOR?

Any person who has responsibility for a child on roll at the school.

WHAT DOES THE GOVERNING BODY DO?

60verning Bodies play a vital supporting and strategic role in the effective planning and decision making of the school.

They are responsible for different aspects of the school such as Finances, Premises, Staffing and Curriculum.



HOW MUCH TIME DOES IT TAKE?



The full governing body meets once a term.

Meetings take approximately two hours.

Governors also attend a committee meeting once a term and at least one monitoring visit during the school day.

TRAINING FOR NEW GOVERNORS

New governors receive induction training explaining the role and responsibilities of governors. There is a designated helpline, website, newsletter and training courses which keeps you informed. Your fellow governors will also support you in your new role.

WHAT QUALIFICATIONS DO I NEED?

Parent governors do not need formal qualifications and need not be experts in the field of education. What they do need is an interest in the school and in the welfare of our children and the time and willingness to get involved.

As a parent governor, you'll work with the board to ensure it carries out effectively the duties referred to above. You'll also play a vital role in ensuring that the board is connected with, and is aware of, the views of parents and the local community.

To be a parent governor you should have:

- · A strong commitment to the role and to improving outcomes for children
- Good inter-personal skills, curiosity, and a willingness to learn and develop new skills
- The specific skills required to ensure the governing board delivers effective governance

Expectations of governors

Parent governors should expect to be willing to:

- Attend meetings regularly, including any committees to which they may be appointed
- Read papers/documents thoroughly which are circulated in preparation for meetings
- · Maintain confidentiality in and out of meetings
- · Commit to governor training as arranged by the clerk
- Visit the school and the class with which they become partnered

In Maths, the children were introduced to Numicon shapes (1-10). Working on our counting and number formation skills.

Alphabet Code - This week's new sounds are:

/a/ for apple

/s/ for snake

/t/ for tower

The children have worked on recognising the codes for the different sounds, practising their cursive letter formation and spotting the initial sound in words.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year I

Friday 22- September 2023

Dear Parents,

In **English,** this week, we started to look at the book *The Tiger Who Came* to *Tea* by Judith Kerr. Quite a few of us were familiar with the story so we discussed what the word familiar means and whether we knew of any other familiar story settings. Then we read the story and acted it out in groups.

In **Maths**, we continued looking at number bonds, in particular bonds to 10. We explored different pairs of numbers that make 10, represented them using cubes and pictures and finally put them into part-part whole models.

We continued with our **Alphabet Code** lessons where we looked at the different codes making the **/ee/** sound. We discovered **ea** as in t**ea**, y as in happ**y**, **ey** as in mank**ey**. Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for **/igh/**.

In **Science** this week, we looked at our skeletons. We learnt that without them we would look very different and that it protects our vital organs. We then had a go at making our own skeletons!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 22nd September 2023

Thank you for a fantastic week of learning. It has been so wonderful to see everybody settle into a year two routines and make the most of the week. We have been so impressed with Y2's attitude to a 'new' friend of the day. It has been beautiful to see the class form a range of friendships and try different activities during playtimes. This week we practiced our team work skills as a we made a class boat!

In English this week. We worked extremely hard to write character descriptions. Thank you so much for all the effort put into your homework, the use of adjectives and conjunctions fantastic to see. Please continue to sign up for our parent reader slot. It is a fantastic time to share your favourite stories from home with us. A big thank you to Margot and family who read a chapter from 'Fantastic Mr Fox' to us this week.

In maths, we have been looking at the flexibility of partitioning numbers beyond tens and ones for example, partitioning, 52 into 31 + 21 we explored commutative law to understand a whole does not change if it is participant in a different way. We also began to consider missing values within a number line by finding the intervals and spotting patterns.

In RE, we discussed what a prayer is and linked it to The Lord's prayer. We thought about how prayers are present in a variety of religions and some Christians use it to communicate with God. We reflected on who we talk to and who we have to help us in our lives. Our art focus this week has been to create our beautiful Christmas cards. We have carefully sketched painted and outlined our own nativity scene percent and a draft will come to you soon.

In Geography, we considered where our food comes from and what processes it undertakes, this week we looked at the journey of a crisp. We sequences the events from farm to packet and even tried some crisps of our own.




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 22nd September 2023

In English this week, we started looking at how to correctly punctuate direct speech within a sentence. We use the Speech Sandwich to help us remember the key parts. We also began planning our retelling of Taking Flight and next week we start our first big write in Year 3!



In Maths, we continued our unit on place value. This week, we have been comparing numbers up to 1,000, learning how to identify and estimate the position of numbers on a number line and finding 1, 10 and 100 more or less than a number.



In Science, we continued learning about skeletons. This week, we looked at the skeletons of different animals. We thought about how we group and classify animals and we looked at the similarities and differences between different animal skeletons.

In History, we looked at the three periods of the Stone Age in more detail.

In RE, we continued our unit 'What is the Bible's Big Story?' This week, we looked at the first three concepts of the Bible's big story: Trinity, Creation and the Fall.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4



Highlights of Year 4 this week include:

Maths

This week pupils:

- Labelled, identify and found missing values on number lines.
- Estimated values on a number line.
- Compared and ordered numbers to 10 000



English

This week pupils:

- Learnt what the features of a diary entry comprise.
- · Wrote a diary for themselves, describing what happened over one day.
- Practised using a thesaurus to find synonyms.

Handwriting:

Pupils continued to practise their handwriting skills with a focussed session on this art. We are using 'high frequency' words to practise handwriting. This means pupils refine their spelling skills at the same time.

Science:

As part of our Living Things unit, we visited Chelsea Physic Garden to explore an exciting range of habitats, including a pond and log pile. Year 4 learnt to identify a variety of plant and animal species and discovered how different species have become well suited to unique habitats. Part of the workshop involved making a 'bug' hotel.

We have had a very busy week here in year 5!

Some excellent, out-of-the-box thinking happened during our unplugged computing session. We thought about inputs, processes, and outputs, and brainstormed some ideas about how we could create a teddy bear with movement and noise.







We delved deeper into Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, using evidence from the book to answer some comprehension questions. We used inferencing skills to 'read between the lines' and imagine how the characters thought and felt.

PSHE had us thinking about ways to look after ourselves when we are in each colour zone, and we created a class toolkit of ideas for things that we can do when we feel a certain colour. We can't wait to make our own, more personal ones for homework. We also used these zones of regulation to imagine how the characters in A Swing of Change feel in different parts of the short film.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

This week in English, we continued to look at story openings and how we as writers can make them more interesting and gripping.
