Led by Miss Edgeworth, Head of School and Miss Martin, Behaviour Lead. This is a workshop for parents in Years 1 to Year 4, designed to explain The Zones of Regulation, an internationally renowned intervention which helps children to manage their emotions, used by our Holy Trinity Team. We will also explore children's emotional needs, different types of behaviour and how to redirect them in a positive and constructive way.

By the end of the workshop you will: understand regulation and how we support it, gain a basic understanding of The Zones of Regulation, begin to understand behaviour as a form of communication and understand the different types of behaviour a child might present and how to redirect them using positive and encouraging strategies.

Why Do We Celebrate Black History?

'People from African and Caribbean backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British history for centuries. However, campaigners believe their value and contribution to society is often overlooked, ignored or distorted." It is therefore a time for us to



centre these contributions and ensure that we remember and celebrate the contributions of black individuals to our society and put a spotlight on their lives and stories. The theme for this year's Black History Month is, 'Celebrating Our Sisters'.

The Sanctuary Foundation explains, 'This year, Black History Month will be dedicated to honouring the achievements of Black women and the crucial role they have played in shaping history, inspiring change, and building communities. The Great Big Live Assembly is delighted to help showcase some of those women to a future generation, and make those links showing how they relate to our lives and learning today.

Black History Month offers schools an opportunity to consider and affirm: - how inclusion of all children helps them to thrive in a diverse environment - how they can help children overcome feeling excluded or picked on because of their race - how children from all backgrounds can feel welcome and supported in our schools - how diverse role-models and figures of influence can inspire children in their learning and relationships - how Black history and cultural diversity values can be embedded into their curriculum and school life.'



The choice of schools for parents from Year 7 onwards across both state and independent sectors can be bewildering. With so many schools offering such a high standard of teaching provision we will aim to unpack the myths and guide you on how to get started with school selection and the subsequent admissions processes involved. This evening will give you the confidence to get your child's admission to secondary school up and running in earnest.

The talk will provide parents with an introduction on how to choose the right independent school for your child, an outline of the various admissions tests employed by schools, what you can do at home to help your child and an overview of the timelines involved. We will also touch on single sex vs coeducation as well as a brief look at the different qualifications on offer in sixth form; A-level vs. IB.

There will be a significant Q&A session and more Bonas MacFarlane staff on hand to help get all your questions answered.

WHAT DOES THE GOVERNING BODY DO?

60verning Bodies play a vital supporting and strategic role in the effective planning and decision making of the school.

They are responsible for different aspects of the school such as Finances, Premises, Staffing and Curriculum.

WHO CAN BE A PARENT GOVERNOR?

Any person who has responsibility for a child on roll at the school.



HOW MUCH TIME DOES IT TAKE?



The full governing body meets twice a term.

Meetings take approximately two hours.

Governors also attend a committee meeting twice a term and at least one monitoring visit during the school day.

TRAINING FOR NEW GOVERNORS

New governors receive induction training explaining the role and responsibilities of governors. There is a designated helpline, website, newsletter and training courses which keeps you informed. Your fellow governors will also support you in your new role.

WHAT QUALIFICATIONS DO I NEED?

Parent governors do not need formal qualifications and need not be experts in the field of education. What they do need is an interest in the school and in the welfare of our children and the time and willingness to get involved.

- Read papers/documents thoroughly which are circulated in preparation for meetings
- Maintain confidentiality in and out of meetings
- Commit to governor training as arranged by the clerk
- Visit the school and the class with which they become partnered

Alphabet Code - this week's sounds are /p/ /i/ /n/

We have focused on:

Recognising the codes for the sounds /s/ /a/ /t/ /p/ /i/ /n/ Spotting the initial sounds in words. "What's the first sound in the word nut?" Forming letters correctly.

English- Reception listened to the story 'Odd Dog Out' by Rob Biddulph. They learnt about:

- -Rhyming words.
- -Labelling the different parts of the body.
- -How to write their name.

Learning in Year 1 at Holy Trinity

Friday 29th September 2023

Dear Parents,

What a fantastic, fun and fabulous week we have all had. We have all really come together as a team this week, showing many adults around the school how we line up sensibly, move around the school quietly and treat each other with respect.

In English, this week, we continued to look at the book *The Tiger Who Came to Tea*. We continued with a drama focus by trying out hot seating. This is where one person assumes the role of a character and is interviewed by the rest of the class. We thought of two questions each, one for the Tiger and one for Mum. Then we wrote simple sentences and focused on including adjectives and using the conjunction and to join two sentences together.

In Maths we looked at writing numerals in words, counting on from a given number and counting backwards within 10. In our maths meetings, we have been reviewing subitising, which is the ability to instantaneously recognise a number of objects in a small group without the need to count them.

In Alphabet Code we looked at all the different codes for /igh/. We discovered igh as in high, ie as in tie, i as in tiger, i-e as in bike and y as in fly. Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for /aa/ as in gaat.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2 Friday 29th September 2023

Thank you for a beautiful week! We have been so impressed with Y2's kindness and teamwork this week!

In English this week, we have been planning our own stories set at the beach, we drew our own story maps, planned using a story mountain, and then began to write each section. We are trying to use a range of expanded noun phrases to provide more detail for a reader. When is a finalised next week we will publish our stories and send home a copy for you to enjoy together.

A reminder that as some of us are enjoying longer chapter books please don't rush though. It may take two weeks or more to complete our schoolbooks along with books we are reading at home. We advise that you aim for 20 minutes a night. Return your schoolbooks on a Tuesday when you are ready for them to be changed.

Within our maths lessons we have been introduced to the symbols more than < and less than > to compare to quantities of number. We have been practising this using a range of resources such as cubes and dienes.

In science, this week, we have explored how animals are adapted to their habitats. He focused on the adaptations of a fox, frog, and crab. We reflected on how a habitat provides food and shelter.

A very big thank you for your fantastic research of our key artists! We had a wonderful time sharing our fun facts, looking at Lilah's O'Keefe inspired photographs and reading Ophelia's Van Gough books!

We explored the cool colour tones of van Gogh's landscapes and created our own inspired artworks. We looked at our brushstrokes and focused on making notable dashes rather than smoothing our painting. Next week we are going to compare Van Gough's landscapes to O'Keefe's close perspective flowers!

Our drama sessions with Mr Tolley have been going brilliantly, everyone has performed their practices piece to the class and theses have been received with great kindness. We have been practicing our tone, projection and entering the stage to ensure the audience can see us clearly.

This afternoon, we are very excited to head to the Chelsea history festival. A big thank you to the parents and carers who are able to accompany us. 

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 29th September 2023

In English this week, it was our first big write of the year! We tried our best to use all of the skills we have learnt so far in Year 3 to write a retelling of Taking Flight. We worked incredibly hard to use fronted adverbials, adjectives, conjunctions and even some paragraphing!

In Maths, we continued our unit on place value. This week, we looked at comparing and ordering numbers up to 1,000 and we practised counting in 50s. We even noticed some similarities when counting in 5s and counting in 50s.



In RE, we thought about what is meant by people of God. We used three stories from the Bible to learn about the type of people God chooses. We discovered that God doesn't choose people who are perfect, but often chooses people who have made mistakes in their lives.

In History, we compared the life of children today to the life of children in the Stone Age.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 29th September 2023

Maths

This week pupils:

- Rounded numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.
- We ended the week with a place-value mini assessment to give the children a chance to see what they could recall from the past 3 weeks of learning in Maths.

When rounded to the nearest 10, there are 350 children in a running club.



How many children could there be?

English

This week pupils:

- Learnt that synonyms are two or more words that have the same, or nearly the same
 meaning to each other. Children sorted their own lists of synonyms and included 'appealing
 and charming', 'adjoining and bordering'. Year 4 also explored antonyms and suggested
 that 'near and far' and 'hard and soft' had opposite meanings (antonyms).
- Planned and wrote a diary entry retelling the story of Tadeo Jones. Year 4 used the first
 person, the past tense, described Tadeo's thoughts and feelings and placed his day in
 chronological order using fronted adverbials. In addition, they created engaging and
 exciting sentences using adverbs, adjectives and conjunctions. No small task!

Art:

Preparations for the holiday season came early this week as Year 4 got the paints out and designed and created their Christmas cards. Watch this space for news of when these wonderful creations will be available to order.

History:

During History this week, Year 4 compared at what age and the way in which children worked in the Victorian period and the Medieval. There were mixed opinions about which period was better for children. However, the whole class agreed that they are lucky to have been born in the 21st Century.

Science:

We continued our Living Things unit by exploring the idea that environment change and that this can present dangers to living things. This, in turn, has led to animals, such as polar bears and pandas being categorised as endangered animal. We learnt that the dodo and Tasmanian tiger became extinct due to human activities.



Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 29th September

We have had a very busy week here in year 5!

This week in maths, we built up our knowledge of place value and numbers up to 1,000,000. We explored looking at the difference between number lines that start at 0, and number lines that start at larger numbers like 200,000.

We have nearly finished Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, and are now creating our own sweets. Hopefully we can persuade Mr. Wonka to sell them! We are about to undertake a big piece of narrative writing about the short film *The Swing of Change*, and have looked at creating a backstory for the main character. We will develop this over the next few weeks.

In Science, we fingerprinted ourselves using real fingerprint ink, and analysed the patterns of them. We then compared our own to another that we were given - which turned out to be Miss Pollard-Brown's thumbprint!

For art, we completed our Christmas Cards, and we cannot wait to show you the results. We took our inspiration from Victorian Era Christmas Cards and the imagery on those, such as robins, angels, and Santa Claus (who didn't always wear red!).

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

Friday 29th September 2023

This week in English, we wrote our openings to the story of Great Expectations. We focused on using all the features we have learnt so far in Year 6. We focused on using adverbials, personification, pathetic fallacy and embedded clauses. We then really enjoyed reading our openings aloud to the rest of the school in Special Mentions. We are looking forward to looking at a new story opening next week from The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins.

In maths we finished our topic of place value. We looked at rounding numbers to the nearest thousand, ten thousand etc. which tested our knowledge of multiples of these numbers. Then we moved onto looking at negative numbers and remembering when our answer is a positive or a negative number, Next week we start our next topic, looking at the four operations and putting our understanding of place value into practise.

In SPAG we continued to look at verbs and this week we looked at using the active and passive voice. We identified the different types and worked well together to change sentences in the passive voice into the active voice and vice versa.

In history we learnt about why WW2 started and which countries around the world were involved. We discussed what we noticed about the distance between the countries, who was next door to who and which country was invaded which then caused Britain to announce it was at war.
