### Positive Behaviour Workshop Monday 13th November 9.10am

Led by Miss Kennedy, our CCHT Personal and Social Education Lead and Miss Martin, our CCHT Positive Behaviour Lead, this workshop is for parents in year groups 1 to 4. It is designed to explain The Zones of Regulation, which helps children to manage their emotions, used by our Christ Church Team. We will also explore children's emotional needs, behaviour and how to redirect them in a positive and constructive way.

- gain a basic understanding of The Zones of Regulation
- begin to understand behaviour as a form of communication
- understand how different types of behaviour a child might present and how to redirect them using positive and encouraging



### What do I need to bring on the night itself?



# The Oak Tree (ages 4-6 & up)

Author: Julia Donaldson Illustrator: Victoria Sandøy Publisher: Alison Green Books



A thousand years ago an acorn began to grow.... This is the story of an oak tree, which lives through many changes. The land around it is taken over by Normans and Tudors, then Victorians and finally, in modern times it's toppled by a gale. Over the years, it's sheltered and fed woodpeckers, wasps, squirrels, birds of many varieties and even a king! It's grown tall, dropped leaves and acorns, turned hollow, and been a place for children and animals to play. Even lying at rest, it welcomes ants and spiders.

Told in Julia Donaldson's trademark rich rhyme, this story is engaging and informative. There are facts about oak trees at the end, too. But it's the rhyming text that pulls you through the life of the tree, which is always shown with children playing around it. The details of both history and tree are pitched perfectly for pre-schoolers, and there are lots of areas for discussion. The illustrations are warm and beautiful and reflect the diversity of human and animal life in and around the tree. A delight.



# Reception Class Newsletter

### This week wer

- Revisited the sounds /s/, /a/, /t/, /p/, /i/, /n/, /d/, /m/, /g/, /o/, /c/, and /k/ in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Perfected our numeral formation in our Maths lessons. We also labelled a numicon number line.
- Focused on reading and writing CVC words in our English lessons. The children are making fantastic progress.
- Went on a fantastic trip to the Chelsea Physic Garden for Black History Month. We learnt all about Dr. Caesar, who invented a natural antidote to treat rattlesnake bites.
- Read the Colour Monster by Anna Llenas and drew how we felt in the different zones. The blue zone is tired, bored or sad.
  The red zone is angry. The green zone is happy and calm. The yellow zone is excited or anxious. We also made our own calming bottles, which we filled with glitter, paint and beads.
   We wrote a list of the materials we used.

After half-term, the children's reading books and homework book will be sent home every Wednesday. Please return the books by Tuesday morning. ### Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

# Friday 20th October 2023

In English, this week started our new unit on 'The Great Fire of London'. We read an account from someone who lived through the great fire and then began to generate questions we could ask them about the fire. Remembering to using question marks as the end of our questions.

In Maths, we have been completing our maths assessments on place value and now we will start our new topic on addition to 10.

In Science, we thought about our five senses. We focussed specifically on our sense of smell. We then smelt 4 different covered food items and had to guess what we thought they were. We then thought about adjectives we could use to describe the different smells.

In PSHE, this week, we have been talking about our feelings and linking them to the zones of regulation as well as focussing on 'Kindness' and what being kind looks like!

In RE, we thought about how we were all created in Gods image and are all unique in our own special ways. We then decorated clothes pegs for our talk partners to show our partners how they are special and unique.

We have had a fabulous half term in year one and can't wait to get stuck into the next half term where we will be learning even more new things! Have a fantastic break!

# Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

# Friday 20th October 2023

This week, Year 2 started to retell the story of the Princess and the Frog through diary entries and story maps. It's been great to see so many children editing their work more independently with green pen and be more thoughtful with their spelling endings of past tense verbs.

In Maths, we moved on from place value and started our new unit –
Addition and Subtraction. Year 2 revised their number bonds to 10 and
100 and used their numbers bonds to 10 to help them add/subtract two
2 digit numbers. They also added two 2 digit numbers using related
facts. For example:

If I know that... 4 + 6 = 10 Then 40 + 60 = 100 If... 10 - 8 = 2 Then 100 - 80 = 20

Throughout the term, Year 2 have been finding out where our food comes from and have learnt about the different processes plants/animals can go through before it ends up as a meal on our plate. They got to explore this topic further on Thursday when we visited Goodwood Farm. Next term, they will be learning about local heroes in History and have a walk around Chelsea with Blue Peter badge holder, Nadia Merchant, booked in the diary.

# Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

In Maths we finished our last few lessons on addition and subtraction with exchanging. We worked extra hard on this topic and made great progress as a class. We finished off our week playing race to 100 where we roll a die and continue to add the numbers until we reach 100! This is a great game to play at home during the break. See if you can reach 200 or even 400!

In History we finished our topic on the Stone Age. We became Stone Age artists and made cave paintings. We had to scrunch up the paper to make it look old and worn out and then used charcoal to create images of animals and tools. We have really enjoyed learning about this period in history.

In RE this week, we created plays based on parables. We know Jesus told many parables to teach us lessons, and we used this knowledge to come up with parables of our own. We either chose a parable about caring for friends or a parable about caring for our world. Year 3 had lots of creative ideas and were fabulous actors!

In Art we made sculptures based on Antony Gormley's piece 'Field'.

These figures were made using terracotta clay. We have 30 figures that we will place around the school. If you see these sculptures, think about how they change the space around you.

### Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

### Friday 20th October

This week in English, we re-watched the film: 'Egyptian Pyramids' and thought about the structure of the animation. We used a story mountain to review the introduction, the build-up, the problem, the resolution and the ending. Then, we chose a range of fronted adverbials, co-ordinating conjunctions and exciting synonyms to use in our writing. We remembered to include the features of a diary entry, including; date, greeting, paragraphs, past tense, writing in the first person and sign off. Our finished diary entries are impressive and capture the hilarious and unusual day of an archaeologist in Egypt in 1920!

In Maths, we have continued our unit on Addition and Subtraction. Before subtracting each column, we asked: "Do you have enough ones/tens/hundreds to subtract?" If not, an exchange is needed. We have been subtracting from the "smallest value column" first, rather than referring to it as the "ones column". We have also been using place value counters to represent different questions.

In Art, we continued with our unit: 'Viewpoints' and looked at the artist L.S Lowry. We learned about L.S Lowry's life and experiences and pondered on how these influenced his artwork. We learned how L.S Lowry is a British painter who spent much of his life in Manchester. He focussed on painting industrial scenes and had a distinctive style of painting stickmen.

Thank you so much for all support this term! 

What a brilliant start to the year we have had.

# Learning at Christ Church Friday, 20th October 2023

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, Year 5 have been working on their final piece of writing about the short video, 'The Swing of Change'. Children used their planning and drafts to write about the barber's background, why he doesn't like Jazz and how an encounter with a magic trumpet makes him change his mind about this type of music and allows him to become a better person. In their writing, they evidenced skilled they have been learning about this term such as building suspense, using personifications, and using dialogue to add momentum to their plots.

In Maths, Year 5 have been learning about multiples. Multiples of a given number are the products you can make by multiplying your given number by a whole number. Children also learned how to work out the common multiples of 2 given multiples (the multiples that both numbers share). Children used their knowledge of multiples to solve multistep problems. We also focused on our reasoning skills this week.

In Science, children have been learning about forensic science which allows scientists to solve crimes by collecting and interpreting clues from a crime scene. Children learned about a variety of forensic techniques such as fingerprint and handwriting analysis.

In Computing, we have been learning about how computers communicate with each other. We have been using Google classroom and its chat function to create a presentation about how to take care of a pet without talking to each other. They only way children could communicate with each other about their work was through the app.

In Art, we learned about an artist called Jospeh Cornell. We learned about his childhood and realised that many of the objects featuring in his collections represent an important childhood memory. We looked at his collection and created our own collections of 100 objects.

### Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church

### Friday 20th October

English: This week we have continued our journey on "Story openings" using The Hungar Games written by Suzanne Collins and its 2012 film adaptation as a source of inspiration. Students have learnt about the importance of text structure by completing a sorting activity of jumbled up paragraphs from a text. Students had to unjumble and complete activities involving the paragraphs, such as identifying examples of personification and metaphors in the text (see images below). Also, this week, students have been completing SATs reading papers. These involve reading three different texts and answering short and long response questions about each text. The school is using the papers to introduce the class to the format of SATs papers, but also to determine students' current reading comprehension skills.



Mathematics: In Maths this week, students have started the new unit of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. This unit has been postponed due to the class completing three Mathematics SATs papers. One paper on arithmetic and two papers on mathematics reasoning. We are completing these papers to get a baseline of student's abilities, like the English papers.

Sheep and Shepherds: On Wednesday, Year 6 joined up with Reception and had another amazing afternoon. This week, Sheep and their Shepherds create Autumn Artwork. Students used real Autumn leaves to create creatures. Students used paint, glue, glitter and sticks to create their artwork. Both the Sheep and their Shepherds had a great time bonding over their artwork. See below for some photos of their time together.
