




Fashion Club - Visit to the Design Museum

Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity 13th October 2023

A busy week in Reception class, this is what we have been up to:

In English this week, we listened to the story 'The Colour Monster' by Anna Llenas. The children sorted the emotions: happiness (yellow), sadness (blue), anger (red), fear (black) and calm (green) into different jars.

We had a circle time where we talked about our emotions and what made us feel a particular way 'I feel yellow/happy because/when...'. Then we planned what materials could be used to make a 'sensory bottle'. Cutting out or drawing different materials such as glitter, petals, pompoms etc and stuck them on a bottle. The children had a go at labelling the different materials. Some wrote their initial sound in words and others challenged themselves to write the words.

"p' for petal"

"I can hear 'p..t..l' in the word 'petal""

We have worked on building CVC words (pig, mat, dog) In Maths this week, we have compares quantities to 10 using the following vocabulary: more than, less than, greater than, smaller than, fewer than, the same.

They made 'number trains' using cubes to compare two quantities.

'5 is greater than 3'



"Can you make a number train with fewer than 7?"

Learning in Year I at Holy Trinity

Friday 12-October 2023

Dear Parents,

This week in English, the children had a go at writing their own version of the story The Tiger Who Came to Tea. They changed the main characters as well as the animal who visited for tea. The children have started using their writing targets and are excited get ticks as they work towards them.

Some of our targets are:

-To begin to use the correct codes when spelling words.

-To write on the line and near the margin.

-To use adjectives.

-To use joining words: but, and, because, so.

In maths, we have been comparing numbers within 10. Some of the questions the children completed this week were:

"Can you think of a number greater than 5 and smaller than 7?"

"Can you think of a number **smaller than** 8 but greater than 6?"

"Is 7 less than, greater than or the same as seven?"

Circle the number greater than 8 on the number line.

Circle | less than 5 on the number line.

In Alphabet Cade we looked at all the different cades for **ao**. We discovered **so** as in m**ao**n, **ew** as in ch**ew**, **se** as in gl**ue**, **s**-**e** as in June and **o** as in **to**. Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for **J**.

This week we have begun to explore an interpretation of the princess and the frog. We started our week by acting out and retelling known fairy tales and noted the repetition of traditional language. I hope you enjoy retelling tales for your homework. We then retold our own version of the Princess and the frog add expanded noun phrase, time adverbials and conjunctions. We will be completing these and publishing them next week.

In maths we are using our known number facts to complete addition and subtraction equations. For example if 7 + 3 = 10 then 70 + 30 = 100. We have also used our tens frames to apply the 'making ten' strategy, 5 + 7 = 10 + 2

In Art we have completed our beautiful Georgia O'Keefe inspired flowers. A very big thank you to Grandparents and carers who helped us with our painting, this week we added another layer of paint and later outlined using oil pastels. I have sent a photocopy home for you to enjoy and the originals are going on display around our school.

In our RE lesson we explored temptation, we discussed how Jesus was tempted and why Christians ask God for help in the Lord's prayer. In our lesson we were tempted not to eat a delicious sweet! Later we reflected on how this felt and why Christians ask for God's help. We thought about who we might ask for help if were tempted to make a sad choice.

Thank you so very much for your kindness and support on our Geography trip to learn more about where food comes from! It was brilliant to have so many parents with us to enjoy the diary farm.




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 13th October 2023

In English this week, we continued our 'Bedtime Stories' unit. We reread The Dragon's Egg and identified the key features of the text such as, alliteration, onomatopoeia, adjectives, questions and adverbs. We then thought about which of these features we would like to magpie for our own bedtime story and why. As a class, we contributed ideas to create a bedtime story opener which will be the beginning for each of our stories.

In Maths, we looked at adding ones to a 3-digit number and crossing ten, and adding tens to a 3-digit number and crossing 100. For this method, we need to be confident with our multiples of 100 and counting in tens with larger numbers.



In RE, we looked at the meaning of the word 'Gospel' and we looked at how Jesus used parables to teach important lessons. We then came up with some of our own parables in small groups to teach important lessons for today's world.

In History, we worked in small groups to research what life was like for people in the Neolithic period. Some questions we tried to answer were: What were their houses like? What animals did they keep? What crops did they grow? Why was farming so important?




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 13th October 2023

Maths

This week we focused on subtraction of numbers with up to 4-digits. This included using the column method and involved 'exchanging'. Year 4 also answered word problems using subtraction. We finished the week learning how to use 'efficient subtraction' by 'counting on' and applying the concept of 'constant difference' to working out subtractions.



English

We continued our unit on The Storm, a descriptive text. Children worked in pairs to answer retrieval questions by taking turns to retrieve information from The Storm and then their partners scribing the answers. Children then went on to generate their own retrieval questions for the rest of the class to answer.

We also considered how personification has been used in The Storm and identified examples of this. Verbs used to personify objects included 'crept', 'howled', 'screamed'. We finished the week by consolidating our understanding on how to answer retrieval and inference questions when answering 'comprehensions.

History:

Year 4 took a trip to the Museum of London (Docklands) to discover how the trade in enslaved Africans and sugar shaped London

We learnt that the museum's building is central to this story. It was built at the time of the transatlantic slave trade, to store the sugar from the West Indian plantations where enslaved men, women and children worked.



Science:

Having researched an endangered animal, Year 4 took turns to present their findings to the rest of the class. This exercise reinforced the importance of conserving habitats for animals if we are to ensure their survival.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

13th October 2023

We started the week with our insightful trip to the Bank of England to visit to their exhibition of 'Slave Trade and the Bank'. We learnt about how the bank played a role in slave trade, why slave trade happened for so long

Following on from our trip, in history we learnt about the segregation and treatment of black troops in the US during WW2. We learnt about the meaning of 'segregation' and what this meant for black soldiers when the US joined WW2. They were not allowed to fight on the front line and were in separate regiments from white people. By the end of the war, some of this has changed. Black men were allowed to fight and were allowed to be in the same regiments as white people.

This week in English, we dived deep into personification. We started the week with writing poems about the fire, describing it moving, sounding and looking like a living thing. Then we moved onto deconstructing a text, looking at how the author has created suspense and used several writing techniques to describe the fire scene. As a class, we were able to recognise the use of personification of fire (and how this made for a more exciting read), adverbials and 'show not tell'. Then we had a go at writing our own section describing what our character might have been able to hear whilst being chased by the fire.

In maths we looked at prime numbers and the rules of divisibility. We discussed what numbers were often confused as prime numbers or not and what prime factors were. In our maths meetings this week, we focused on rounding numbers. We look to the column on the right to help us decide whether we round up or down.

In SPAG we continued to look at using the simple and progressive tenses. We looked at identifying what tense sentences were in, past present or future. Then we discussed whether they were in the simple of progressive and how we knew this.
