

In particular, I thank her for coming to join Holy Trinity in 2019 when I was first helping at the


school. Carol brought with her all her wonderful traits of keeping calm and patient. Little did I know that she would stay this long, and I am very grateful to her.

To the Children, Staff, Governors and Parents of Holy Trinity School

Friday 20 October 2023

Dear Friends

As you may know I retired as Rector of Holy Trinity Church, Sloane Square at the beginning of this month on my 63rd birthday. It was a very difficult decision to make but the effects of Long Covid on my physical and mental health since my Covid-19 infection in 2020 have made it hard to continue in the way I would wish. Also, both my parents have died in the past year and as an only child this has been very tough emotionally and practically although I continue to give thanks for a beautiful mother and father and for the long and healthy lives they lived.

Since I came to Holy Trinity in 2015 I have been privileged to work alongside three fabulous headteachers in Deryn Welbourne, Debbie Lloyd-Wright and Avis Hawkins. I have been involved in the life of six Church of England primary schools since I was ordained in St. Paul's Cathedral in 1987 and I have learnt so much from the children, staff, governors and parents of them all, and, of course, the staff of the London Diocesan Board for Schools. I am very conscious, in the fast-changing world of education, how many challenges those who lead our schools face on a daily basis and I am grateful for the opportunity to have played my part.

Since our Federation came into being it has been an additional joy to be a partner in the life of Christ Church School and I have every confidence that both Holy Trinity and Christ Church will go from strength to strength in the years ahead. You can be certain that I will be keeping a close eye on the weekly Newsletters and praying for you all in wherever God's future takes you.

It is unlikely that a new Rector will be appointed and begin work before Easter or Summer next year so, in the meantime, do support our Assistant Priest Fr. Yaroslav Walker in all that he has to undertake.

I am not yet sure what God's future looks like for me. However, I do expect to be living in and around Sloane Square for the coming year or so and therefore please say 'hello' if you see me out and about. I am finding that there is something quite exciting about waiting on God for what comes next and I am inspired by these words by the great Brazilian Archbishop Helder Camara which might also speak to you:


"Pilgrim, when your ship





The Oak Tree (ages 4-6 & up)

Author: Julia Donaldson Illustrator: Victoria Sandøy Publisher: Alison Green Books



A thousand years ago an acorn began to grow.... This is the story of an oak tree, which lives through many changes. The land around it is taken over by Normans and Tudors, then Victorians and finally, in modern times it's toppled by a gale. Over the years, it's sheltered and fed woodpeckers, wasps, squirrels, birds of many varieties and even a king! It's grown tall, dropped leaves and acorns, turned hollow, and been a place for children and animals to play. Even lying at rest, it welcomes ants and spiders.

Told in Julia Donaldson's trademark rich rhyme, this story is engaging and informative. There are facts about oak trees at the end, too. But it's the rhyming text that pulls you through the life of the tree, which is always shown with children playing around it. The details of both history and tree are pitched perfectly for pre-schoolers, and there are lots of areas for discussion. The illustrations are warm and beautiful and reflect the diversity of human and animal life in and around the tree. A delight.

Clubs

Please find attached a copy of the timetable for Autumn Term 2. Changes of note include: There will be an additional French Club for KS2. This will be on Monday and Rec & KS1 French will move to Tuesday. We have done this because we currently do not offer a club for Reception children on Tuesdays.

Rec & KS1 Yoga will replace Gardening on Fridays KS2 Table Tennis will replace Badminton on Fridays.

Please can I ask all Childcare bookings to be made before attendance because we are having an unprecedented number of children off register which is a safety concern as we are exceeding our adult to child ratio on occasions. It also means that we may not have sufficient snack for everybody. This is done by first booking the date required through 'Clubs' and then making a payment via 'Payments'. The same applies for Breakfast Club.

We have been in consultation with parent representatives about clubs parents would like to see on the timetable. We welcome all suggestions and will endeavour to add anything which we feel will enhance our programme and interest the children. Dance and band are two clubs which we previously offered, however dance fizzled out due to low demand and band had to be removed because the teacher left and we could not find a replacement. These are two clubs we are looking to reintroduce at some point I the future. If you have any suggestions please email Mr Border at nborder@ccht.rbkc.sch.uk.

Clubs will be available to book via School Gateway on Saturday 21st October. A reminder that there are limited places and it is on a first come first served basis. If no places are available when you attempt to book, please let me know and I will put your child on a reserve list and if nothing becomes available I will give your child priority for that club the following term.

Learning in Reception at Holy Trinity 20th October 2023

A busy week in Reception class, this is what we have been up to:

In English this week, we continued to listen to the story, 'The Colour Monster' by Anna Llenas. We made our sensory bottles and worked on building CVC words. Some of us have even begun building and writing sentences!

In Maths, we have continued to compare quantities to 10 and have used the following vocabulary, more than, less than, greater than, smaller than, fewer than, the same. They have been ordering numbers from smallest to largest.

The sounds we know in Alphabet code are: /s/, /a/, /t/, /p/, /i/, /m/, /d/, /g/, /c/, /k/ and /o/ /ck/ /e/ /u/.

Tricky words (words that we have to remember): I, the.

In RE, we started off by looking at our winter finds, thinking about how special and interesting each of these items are. we have been thinking about what makes us unique, identifying similarities between ourselves and our friends as well as how each of us is changing. We focused on how each of us is unique and no two people are the same - how special is that!

Learning in Year I at Holy Trinity

Friday 20- October 2023

Dear Parents,

This week, in English, the children had a go at retelling the story of The Tiger Who Came To Tea completely independent. It was brilliant to see the children applying their knowledge without the teacher's guidance. They used different story starters such as A lang, lang time ago or On a bright, sunny marning and adjectives to describe the main characters.

In Maths, we also completed our assessments on Place Value. Next term, we will begin our new topic on Addition and Subtraction.

In Alphabet Cade we looked at all the different codes for /11/. We discovered 1 as in leg, 11 as in shell, le as in battle, el as in camel and o as in to. After the half term, we will be investigating all the different codes for /s/.

The children also enjoyed some well-deserved extra Golden Time and they loved decorating some cardboard boxes using various materials.

Well done Year I for working so hard this half term. It is a pleasure to continue to see you grow, learn and flourish!

Thank you so much for such a beautiful start to the year. We have so loved getting to know and work with your beautiful children! They are curious, kind and wonderfully eager to learn. We hope you have a restful half term and enjoy the week together.

A big thank you for our parents and careers who were able to join us on Friday. We had an incredible time at the farm!

In RE we have been learning about the Lord's Prayer and how it is used to guide Christian's lives. We reflected on our learning and shared during special mentions assembly. We also interviewed Father Nicolas as he said his goodbyes before his retirement. A draft of our Christmas cards have also returned, we are very sorry for the misprint of some names, hopefully these will be resolved soon.

In English we have been finalising and publishing our fantastic stories based on the Princess and the frog. These are full of interesting vocabulary and a range of time adverbials. 

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 20th October 2023

In English this week, we have been planning our own bedtime stories. We have been practising generating ambitious adjectives to describe the different features of our dragons, and using these adjectives in expanded noun phrases. We also began writing our bedtime stories, making sure to include ambitious vocabulary and paragraphs!

In Maths, we continued adding at subtracting, crossing ten and a hundred. To use our strategies this week, we needed to be confident on multiples of ten and a hundred with larger numbers.



In RE, we looked at the last two concepts of the Bible's Big Story, Salvation and Kingdom of God. We thought about how these concepts fit into the Big Story and how Jesus taught Christians to live in the Kingdom of God. We then illustrated these messages in art, some of which can be seen on the right.

In History, we planned a diary entry from the perspective of a child living in the Neolithic period of the Stone Age.

The children worked very hard to complete their reading assessments this week. A big well done to all the children for another super week of learning.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 20th October 2023

Maths

We ended our addition and subtraction unit by looking at the inverse relationship between addition and subtraction. Bar models and part-whole models were used as

representations to help establish families of facts that can be found from one calculation. Children used inverse operations to check the accuracy of their calculations.

Which additions can be used to check the subtraction 3,265 - 823 = 2,442?

3,265 + 823 823 + 2,442

3,265 + 2,442 | 2,442 + 823

We also began our unit on 'area' and used the strategy of counting the number of squares inside a 2D shape to find the area. Children also made rectilinear shapes using a given number of squares and learnt that a rectilinear shape is a shape that has only straight sides and right angles.

English

This week included a reading assessment which involved reading a piece of text and answering 'retrieval' and 'inference' questions. We also compared two pieces of text, The Storm and The Cat Storm. Children explored how to 'magpie' ideas to use for own pieces of writing. Finally, we worked in groups to write a short description.

History:

This week we explored how Lord Shaftesbury and Dr Barnardo campaigned for better working conditions for children living in the Victorian era. We then explored the UN Charter of Children's Rights, created more recently in 1989. Year 4 then considered what a child from the Victorian era would think of the list of rights that children have today (compared to their own rights).

Science:

We spent this week's lesson reviewing learning from our 'Living Things' unit and children completed their 'Endangered animals' presentations.

Learning in Year 5 at Holy Trinity Friday 20th October

We saw four paintings and four photographs, and analysed each one. We thought about how each portrait made us feel and considered the wider impact of these portraits. Mrs Davies was really impressed with our sensible behaviour when taking the Tube and at the workshop, and Miss Pollard-Brown is really pleased with the amazing observations we made.

This week, we have been doing a couple of assessments to help show Miss Pollard-Brown how much we have learned. We completed our maths place value end of block assessment, which we felt very comfortable with as it covered all the things we been learning this half term. We also did a tricky reading assessment, but we tried our best! Now that we have finished our English unit *The Swing of Change*, Miss Pollard-Brown will look at those to help us choose some writing goals going forward.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

Friday 20th October 2023

We have been working hard this week in completing our assessments. We have been getting familiar with the format of a SATs paper and showing how much we already know at this point in Year 6. Well done everyone for all your hard work and focus.

This week in English, we started our action openings based on the fire scene from the Hunger Games. We broke down our writing paragraph by paragraph, ensuring that we varied our types of sentences with the use of fronted adverbials, 'ing' verbs and personification. The use of senses and interesting sentence structure have made for some very exciting and gripping reads! We will be then working on finalising our writing, reading our openings out loud to each other to check for sense and interesting features.

In maths we completed our assessments to show much we have learnt so far in Year 6 and what we can recall from previous years.

In history we became codebreakers for the day. We used our previous homework and other sources of information to find out what happened at Bletchley Park during WW2. We shared our own research, such as by the end of the war 75% of the people working there were women, the war was reduced by about 2 to 4 years because of the Enigma code being broken and who Alan Turing was. For the second part of our lesson, we were given a coded letter, which had been intercepted and had the whereabouts of one of the German Generals. We had to decipher it using the methods we had learnt in the lessons and lots of trial and error occurred.

In SPAG we continued to look at using the simple and progressive tenses. We looked at identifying what tense sentences were in, past present or future. Then we discussed whether they were in the simple of progressive and how we knew this.
