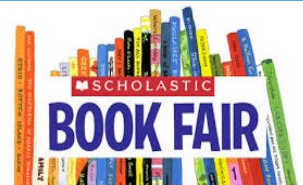

Children In Need

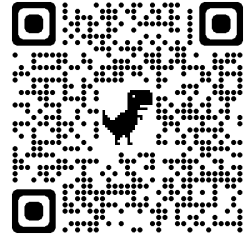

Is Today's Financial Literacy Education Fit For Purpose?

Tips And Ideas For Parents, Based On Granular Interactions With Teachers And Students, To Help Empower Children To Navigate An Ever More Complicated Financial World

Background:

Children are entering into an ever more complicated financial world ill-equipped to make educated decisions. How has financial literacy education kept up with the shift to a cashless society where children hardly ever touch a bank note, where the majority of the next generation do not trust institutions such as banks or where cryptocurrency is begging the question of what is "money"?

The answer quite simply is that it hasn't, and the ramifications are dire for those leaving school without effective financial education as it puts them at high risk of financial abuse, fraud, and debt from an early age.

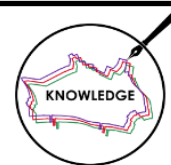
There could not be a more important time for financial literacy education given the backdrop of the cost-of-living crisis as well as the stark statistics of youth indebtedness. Leveraging on his granular interactions with over 20,000 students in the UK and on working with the two largest school districts in the US, Quentin will provide a grassroots perspective of how financial literacy education needs to adapt to all the changes in the new economy as we accelerate towards a cashless society.

A study by the Money and Pensions Service confirmed that money habits and behaviours that will stick with children for life are formed by the age of seven which means that early year interventions are critical. He will provide some helpful tips to parents on how to navigate the evolving landscape and to better empower the next generation in making more informed decisions.

Speaker:

Quentin Nason is a seasoned financial professional whose career in investment banking and asset management spans over thirty years across four continents. While he has been at the forefront of the international capital markets and the development of new financial products, his true passion really lies in the field of education.

As a parent himself, Quentin saw first-hand the lack of financial literacy education in schools. Together with a group of volunteers, he decided to do something about it and created his educational charity **City Pay it Forward**.

This is a glorious collection of funny poems spanning subjects and poets galore. From animals to family members, to school to feelings and many more, children will find something that they recognise and that makes them laugh. It is thoughtfully organised – beyond the daily and monthly divisions, similarly-themed poems are also grouped together, so that the fabulous illustrations are relevant to all the poems on the double-page spread. After all, if you're in the mood for one funny poem about a dog, you're in the mood for more!

Featuring familiar names such as Michael Rosen, Joseph Coelho and Valerie Bloom, as well as lesser-known poets, this is a treasure trove of humour. As the anthologist says, some poems are cleverly funny, others might make your lips twitch or raise a wry smile. Others might make you laugh out loud. All have children and their sense of humour at their heart.

The book itself is a large format hardback with a yellow ribbon place marker, and it's joyously illustrated in colour throughout. These 366 poems are a delight to read aloud and to share, and it would make a wonderful gift as it also rewards poring over alone.

A busy week in Reception class, this is what we have been up to:

In English this week, we have been learning about Holi Festival. The children listened to the story, 'The Festival of Colours' and completed the following activities:

- Letter formation
- Sentence building: 'Holi is messy and fun.' and 'Holi is in the Spring.'

Next week, we will be learning about Hanukkah.

In Maths, we have focused on 2D shapes: circle, triangle, square and triangle.

- Recognising the shape
- Counting the number of sides.
- Making patterns.

Some children learnt: oval, semicircle, pentagon, hexagon and octagon.

In Alphabet code, the sounds we know are:

In RE, we thought about how Mary knew she was going to have a baby. We listened to the story of the Angel Gabriel visiting Mary, discussing how Mary might have felt when the angel first appeared and the news that they brought, what the angel meant when he said that the baby would be called the Son of God. We then made our own paper angels.

In Shepherds and Sheep, we have been practising our needlework skills.

Year 1

Friday 17th November 2023

Dear Parents,

This week in English, the children used a story map to plan for their own stories. They chose their own main character, setting and thought of a dilemma and resolution for their stories.



We have also been learning about different types of words. The children are beginning to understand that an adjective is a describing word, a noun is the name of a person a place or an object and a verb is a doing or action word. The children came up with a bank of words, which they had to sort into the three different categories. They also know that conjunctions are joining words: and, so, but, because.

In Maths, we have continued to work on the concept of addition and introduced subtraction this week. We have used the part-part-whole models and ten frames/counters to work out number problems.

Example:

There are some red and blue crayons in a box. 6 of the crayons are red. There are 8 crayons in total.
How many crayons are there? Draw a part-whole model to help you work it out.



In Alphabet Code we looked at all the different codes for /ow/. We discovered ow as in cow, ou as in shout. Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for /e/ as in leg.

Thank you all for attending our parent meetings, it has been wonderful to talk through the great learning your lovely children have been doing and share our next steps. I have put some high frequency word mats and flashcards in with the homework this week as we are noticing that most are confident to read these but it would be great to spell them more consistently, these can be kept at home.

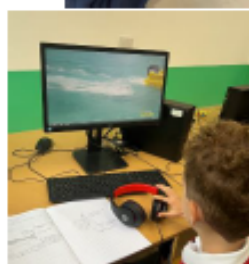


In our English lessons, we enjoyed publishing our something fishy stories and sending these home, we hope you enjoyed reading these together. Our next step is to research and write our own non-chronological report. To do this we are researching animals under the sea using fact files, books, leaflets and information online during our Computing lesson. You are welcome to find out even more at home, so far we have researched Sharks and Sea Turtles.



Within our Maths learning, we are learning the using our dienes and place value chart to add two 2-digit numbers (not across ten). This skill has been developed through our use of column method addition. Next we will be exploring regrouping and later subtraction strategies.

In RE, we shared understanding of symbols and which symbols we feel are important. Later we looked at the symbols within a Christingle. We labelled our own and considered why each part is so important to Christians celebrating Christmas.



In Art, we have explored a new artist Kurt Schwitters who is known for his use of abstract collages. We created our own textured rubbings and make a collage using these, tissue paper and news paper.

In PSHE we are exploring the power of words, we read a few books on the importance of kindness to yourself and others and later we created our own word map. Each child wrote a kind word to describe their friend and these were then given to celebrate and enjoy at home.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 17th November 2023

On Monday, we visited Fulham Palace to take part in a Stone Age workshop. We learned about the significance of Fulham Palace for Stone Age people, explored artefacts, made cave paintings, shelters and so much more. Thank you to our parent volunteers, we could not go on these wonderful trips without you!

In English, we created our own creature by merging three animals. We thought carefully about our creature's features, its habitat and adaptations, and its diet. Next week, we will write our own non-chronological reports on our hybrid animal.

In Maths, we continued practising column method for subtracting 2-digit and 3-digit numbers. We also looked at complements to 100. This is where we find two numbers which add together to make 100. For example, 23 and 77 are complements to 100. Below are some strategies we used to discover these complements quickly.

<p>33 and 67 are complements to 100</p> <p>We can add 7 more ones to make 40.</p> <p>We can add 60 to make 100.</p> <p>$60 + 7 = 67$</p>	<p>What is the complement to 100 of 52?</p> <p>We can also use a number line.</p> <p>We can add 48 more ones to get to the next multiple of ten.</p> <p>We can add 48 more tens to make 100.</p>
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This week, we started DT and we looked at the history of sandwiches. Do you know who the sandwich was named after?

In RE this week, we thought about Mary's role. We discussed how Mary might have been feeling when the Angel Gabriel told her what she was going to do, and we talked about why God chose Mary to be the mother of Jesus.

In History, we recounted our trip to Fulham Palace. We tried to include how we got there, what we did, and what our favourite part of the trip was.
