The symbolism of Christingle

Each element of a Christingle has a special meaning and helps Christian's to remember God's love for them:

- The orange represents the world
- The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ
- The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations
- The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.

The orange represents the world.

The Snow Girl (ages 9-11 & up)

Tasha and her parents move to the mountains to take care of Grandpa and his fam. When winter arrives, Tasha is delighted to see snow for the first time, and quickly sets to work sculpting a snow girl. Tasha wishes the girl was real, as she finds it difficult to make friends and is desperately lonely. Incredibly, the snow girl, Alyana, comes to life and whisks Tasha away on exciting moonlit adventures, night after night. When Alyana explains that she will disappear with the arrival of spring, Tasha makes a wish that the winter will last forever, as cannot bear the thought being alone again.

As the harsh weather conditions worsen, Grandpa falls gravely ill, but the doctor cannot reach him through the snow. Tasha knows that she must ask Alyana to bring winter to an end, but will this mean she will lose her only friend forever?

Beautifully written, this is an enchanting story about facing fears, reaching out to make new friends and knowing when to let go. The novel is interwoven with folk tales of snow spirits and enhanced by magical illustrations in wintry blue tones.

Dear Parents,

This week in English, we started looking at our new text - Owl Babies. We listened to the story and then made some creative story maps, with beautiful illustrations and a great bank of adjectives. Then we made puppets and role played the story in groups. The room was filled with lots of "I want my Mummy!"

In Maths, we have continued to explore addition and subtraction using part-part-whole and recording the different fact families. We have also focused on understanding number problems and using the correct strategy to solve them.

In Alphabet Code we looked at all the different codes for /e/. We discovered **e** as in **leg**, **ea** as in **head**, **a** as in **any** and **ai** as in **said**. Next week, we will be investigating all the different codes for /er/ as in **letter**.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 2
Friday 24th November 2023

A big thank you for all of your efforts in making last Friday so successful. We had a brilliant time in our pyjamas raising money for Children in need.

This week we have been considering all of our beautiful differences. We have explored how our families look using the 'invisible string' to discuss our 'love lines'. We have also discussed the range of religions we celebrate in our homes. We thought about our similarities using a beautiful story 'I am Human' and later considered how we learn differently using 'Bear Shaped'.

In our English lessons, we have used our research to begin to plan, write and alter publish our own non-chronological reports of ocean animals. There has been great enthusiasm to share and learn new animal facts. We identified the key features of a report and ensured we used them in our own.

Within our Maths learning, we have been consolidated our understanding of exchanging using column method addition strategies. We are now exploring subtraction, with and without regrouping. This relies heavily on our understanding of place value. Please continue to practice this at home.

In History, we used a range of artefact to learn more about A. A Milne, a local significant figure. Thank you for the wider reading you have been doing at home around his Winnie the Pooh series. These have been retold in great detail and have brought great humour to our class.

During our Science lessons, we are developing our understanding of materials and their properties. This week we learnt how plastic bottles are made and compared their benefits with risks. We also compared plastic with glass and explored their density within a floating/ sinking test.

In Music, we have been developing our repertoire of songs, rhythms and notes. During these lessons we have used great teamwork and have many talented musicians.

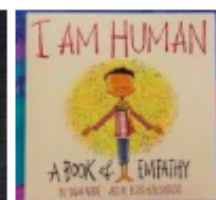
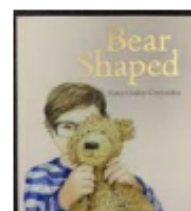
In PE, we have been developing our ball skills. This week we enjoyed a rage of throwing skills in order to knock over skittle cones.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 24th November 2023

In English, we wrote our non-chronological reports on our made-up fictional creatures. We used subheadings, factual language, sentence starters and synonyms to make our reports more interesting. We also began reading Fantastic Mr. Fox. We listened to the first two chapters and drew our own versions of Boggis, Bunce and Bean based on the descriptions we heard from the text.

In Maths, we learnt about inverse operations and how using the inverse can be a good way of checking our answers. We know that addition is the opposite of subtraction and so we can use both these methods to check an answer.

In RE this week, we looked at how the gifts Jesus was given by the 3 kings symbolised his life in different ways. We also found these clues in our Christmas song 'We Three Kings.'

We made button families, religious symbols out of pipe cleaners, and we recreated our self-portraits with symbols of different communities which we belong to.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 24th November 2023

Maths

Within our multiplication and division unit, we focused on factors and factor pairs. Children learnt that when they multiply two whole numbers to give a product, both the numbers that they multiplied together are factors of the product. For example, $3 \times 5 = 15$, so 3 and 5 are factors of 15.

Children also explored equivalent calculations using different factors pairs, and then practised calculating with them to identify which factor pair produces the easiest calculation to complete mentally.

English:

This week, we identified and created rhetorical questions. We learnt that rhetorical questions are asked to make a point, rather than get an answer. Examples included: Why is half the class still talking? (this means half the class should stop talking!). What time do you call this? (this means that somebody is late!).

History

This week we travelled to Hooke Court Residential Study Centre based in the small village of Hooke, West Dorset. At this stunning historical, rural location we brought learning to life through a series of workshops. Year 4 learnt about life as a child in the schoolroom, cooking in a Tudor kitchen with spices from travels abroad, candle making, boat making and, on our final evening, sat down to a formal Tudor Banquet. The children will tell you the rest!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

Friday 24th November 2023

This week in English we revisited extending our sentences by using an embedded clause, fronted adverbial and -ing verb to make our writing varied and more interesting. We were able to implement this when we had a go at a shared piece of writing in groups. This has prepared us well for our independent letter home that we will write next week.

In maths we continued to look at long division, this time with remainders. We realised that remainders aren't scary and that all we need to do is follow the long division process and then we will get our answer, with a remainder.

In SPaG we looked at the four different types of nouns; common, proper, collective and abstract.

In science we continued to look at electricity and making circuits. This week we looked at how we could make a bulb brighter and dimmer by changing the circuit. For example, we used longer wires and put the bulb in different locations within the circuit.

As part of our 'we are all different' week we took part in discussing how we, our families and how we learn are all different. We made button family pictures after reading 'A Handful of Buttons', used pipe cleaners to make different religion's symbols and read 'I am Human'.



We have begun practising for the Christmas assembly this week and have spent a lot of time reading over the scripts with expression.
