

Christmas Assembly take place at **2.30pm on Thursday 14th December**, all parents welcome to attend with the whole school involved.


Christmas Jumper Day & Christmas Lunch for the children will take place on **Friday 15th December**.

Reverse Advent Calendars - Christmas 2023



Is Today's Financial Literacy Education Fit For Purpose?

Tips And Ideas For Parents, Based On Granular Interactions With Teachers And Students, To Help Empower Children To Navigate An Ever More Complicated Financial World

Background:

Children are entering into an ever more complicated financial world ill-equipped to make educated decisions. How has financial literacy education kept up with the shift to a cashless society where children hardly ever touch a bank note, where the majority of the next generation do not trust institutions such as banks or where cryptocurrency is begging the question of what is "money"?

The answer quite simply is that it hasn't, and the ramifications are dire for those leaving school without effective financial education as it puts them at high risk of financial abuse, fraud, and debt from an early age.

There could not be a more important time for financial literacy education given the backdrop of the cost-of-living crisis as well as the stark statistics of youth indebtedness. Leveraging on his granular interactions with over 20,000 students in the UK and on working with the two largest school districts in the US, Quentin will provide a grassroots perspective of how financial literacy education needs to adapt to all the changes in the new economy as we accelerate towards a cashless society.

A study by the Money and Pensions Service confirmed that money habits and behaviours that will stick with children for life are formed by the age of seven which means that early year interventions are critical. He will provide some helpful tips to parents on how to navigate the evolving landscape and to better empower the next generation in making more informed decisions.

Speaker:

Quentin Nason is a seasoned financial professional whose career in investment banking and asset management spans over thirty years across four continents. While he has been at the forefront of the international capital markets and the development of new financial products, his true passion really lies in the field of education.

As a parent himself, Quentin saw first-hand the lack of financial literacy education in schools. Together with a group of volunteers, he decided to do something about it and created his educational charity City Pay it Forward.

Tasha and her parents move to the mountains to take care of Grandpa and his farm. When winter arrives, Tasha is delighted to see snow for the first time, and quickly sets to work sculpting a snow girl. Tasha wishes the girl was real, as she finds it difficult to make friends and is desperately lonely. Incredibly, the snow girl, Alyana, comes to life and whisks Tasha away on exciting moonlit adventures, night after night. When Alyana explains that she will disappear with the arrival of spring, Tasha makes a wish that the winter will last forever, as cannot bear the thought being alone again.

As the harsh weather conditions worsen, Grandpa falls gravely ill, but the doctor cannot reach him through the snow. Tasha knows that she must ask Alyana to bring winter to an end, but will this mean she will lose her only friend forever?

Beautifully written, this is an enchanting story about facing fears, reaching out to make new friends and knowing when to let go. The novel is interwoven with folk tales of snow spirts and enhanced by magical illustrations in wintry blue tones.

Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- Learnt how to read and write the codes /ss/ (hiss), /ll/ (pull) and /j/ in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Explored repeating patterns in our Maths lessons. We continued patterns, created our own and corrected errors in patterns. We used combinations of 2D shapes, letters, numbers and colours.
- Continued our unit, Festivals and Celebrations. This week, we explored
 the Jewish celebration, Hanukkah. We played with dreidels and won gelt
 (gold coins.) We listened to traditional Jewish blessings and lit candles
 on the menorah each day. We made and decorated the Star of David
 using playdough. We also had a feast of doughnuts, as is traditional! The
 children set up the tables themselves, including napkins, knives, forks,
 jugs and cups. We focused on our table manners and also on our fine
 motor skills, as we cut up the doughnuts to share.
- Read Hanukkah Bear by Eric A. Kimmel in our English lessons. We wrote speech bubbles for the characters, wrote a list of objects that we need to celebrate Hanukkah and we also wrote a recipe for doughnuts.
- Continued to learn about the Nativity story in R.E. We wrote a card to announce the birth of baby Jesus.
- Celebrated our differences for 'We Are All Different Week.' We discussed our family units, our religions, how we have many things in common and neurodiversity.

Next week we will:

- Learn how to read and write the sounds /v/, /w/ and /x/ in our Alphabet Code lessons
 - Learn about 3D shapes
 - Go on a trip to The Chelsea Theatre to watch a pantomime with our lovely shepherds

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 24th November 2023

In English, we finalised our stories on The Great Fire of London. We correctly used all of our senses to describe the terrible fire that took place in 1666. We then began our unit on 'Owl Babies' and first familiarised ourselves with the story.

In Maths, we have been looking at subtraction and addition as well as fact families. We have learnt that when looking at part-part-whole models in subtraction we always start our subtracting with the whole.

For Alphabet Code, this week we have been looking at the /or/ code and writing sentences using this code, Next week, we will start the /ow/ code.

In Science, we have been thinking about different materials, such as:
Transparent, Translucent and Opaque and how these material let differing
amounts of light through. We thought about how light travels in straight lines and
predicted which materials we thought would be transparent, translucent and
opaque. We then put these to the test to see if our predictions were correct,

In RE, we continued looking at the nativity story and thought about the roles of Mary and Joseph in the story and how important they are.

In Computing, this week we have been looking at the paintz application, where we have been creating pictures in the style of different artist. This week we focussed on the artist Wassily Kandinsky. We are now more confident when logging onto Google Classroom and typing in our usernames and passwords using our keyboards and mouse to help us.

Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 24th November 2023

Well done, Year 2, for working incredibly hard with your report writing this week. They've written fantastic first drafts of a shark report making sure to include headings, subheadings, diagrams and captions as well as using technical vocabulary like 'species' and 'habitat'.

In Maths, they've continued with addition and subtraction using the expanded/partitioning method. It's really important they're taught a variety of methods so they feel confident using one that works for them. This method involves partitioning of the ones and tens of 2 numbers, and adding the total to find the answer. Please go over quick recall of adding tens – e.g. 10+60 = 70 (because you know 1+6 = 7) at home!

For example:

67 + 14 = 81

Add the ones: 7+4 = 11

Add the tens: 60 + 10 = 70

Find the total: 81

We've really enjoyed celebrating the 'We Are Different' week in school and have read lots of books to explore how our differences make us special – families/religions/cultures and have also found that we are all similar also in many ways.

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church



On Monday, we went to the Natural History
Museum to take part in a Mission to Mars
workshop. The students had to create a rover
made of Lego and then use a coding program to
make the rover move. Their first mission was to
work as a team to make the rover travel forward.
Their second mission was to add an element on
the rover that would help their mission to Mars
and the NASA researchers, such as a 360 camera
or a rock collector. Then, they had to program
the rover to move over rocky terrain and reach a

specific point and turn back to base. The children loved participating in this workshop and used fantastic problem solving and teamwork all day!

In English we have started to write our first drafts on our story about dragons. We are editing our drafts and adding in ambitious adjectives, paragraphing, fronted adverbials and punctuation! We have lots to think about when creating stories and the students are doing a great job.

In RE we have started our topic on Advent learning about different prophets and how different cultures celebrate the time around Christmas. This lesson tied in well with our overall theme this week 'We are all different', where we looked and celebrated all the ways in which we are different at CCHT. We spoke about how equality looks in and outside the classroom and how to behave using our Christ Church virtues.



Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 24th November

Year Four have been having a wonderful time in Hooke Court this week. They have been experiencing what it was like to live as a Tudor! As well as attending a Tudor school, baking traditional biscuits and making candles, they have learnt Tudor dancing and even attended a Tudor banquet!









Learning at Christ Church Friday, 24th November 2023

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, Year 5 have started a new unit focusing on tales from other cultures. They have been studying a Brazilian tale called 'How Brazilian Beetles Got Their Gorgeous Coats'. They have been analysing the personalities of two of the main characters: the beetle and the rat. They have been brainstorming ambitious synonyms to describe their personalities such as humble, arrogant, self-important and considerate. Year 5 have been practicing their inferencing skills and quoting from the text to justify how the rat and the beetle can be described with the previously listed words.

In Maths, Year 5 learned the difference between an improper fraction, a proper fraction and a mixed number. They learned how to convert a mixed number into an improper fraction and how to convert an improper fraction into a mixed number. They also learned how to compare fractions with the same numerator, denominator and how to use their knowledge of equivalent fractions to compare fractions with different denominators.

In Science, children learned that it is the size of an object (and not its mass) and how much air resistance acts against it which determines how fast or slowly an object falls to the ground. Children found out that if they dropped a feather and a bowling ball from the same height in a room with no air, both feather and bowling ball would hit the ground at the same time.

In RE, children studied a painting depicting the story of Christmas called the '4am Madonna'. Children identified the sacred objects featuring in that piece of art and discussed the artist intention: to depict Mary and a unique, yet ordinary mother.

In History, children discussed some of the technological, social and day to day life changes brought about by the industrial revolution during the Victorian Era.

In Computing, children learned about story boards and how they are used to plan filming. Children practiced filming using a story board.

In Art, children started their shadow boxes and cut the opening to their cardboard boxes.

Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church

Friday 24th November

English: In English this week, Year 6 continuing our English topic about Letter writing. During our lessons this week, students have studied and investigated letters, specifically a letter from a World War 2 evacuee, named Maureen. Students have started to draft an evacuee letter, imagining they are writing home after being evacuated during World War 2, adding in events and details which children from World War 2 lived through such as being separated from their families, wearing a gas mask, and even moving into the country.

Mathematics: This week, students finishing our unit about multiplication and division. Students have been learning about long division, multi-step problems and worded problems involving multiplication and division. The class has been persistent and focused, learning all they can about this topic before we move onto our next topic, next week.

History: For History this week, Year 6 went on our school trip to Poppy Factory. The trip started with the class walking to Sloane Square before catching the District Line to Richmond. After arriving at Richmond, it was a quick walk to the factory. The students enjoyed their time at the Poppy Factory, learning about its past and its contributions to both the World War 1 and World War 2, and how the factory supports veteran soldiers and their families now. The class also participated in the creation of Poppies badges and Poppy Wreaths which the factory produces every year for Remembrance Day. The factory was extremely impressed with the number of poppies badges and wreathes created by the class. During our short visit, the class created 16 poppy wreaths and more than 150 poppy badges!



Spanish: In Spanish this week, Year 6 have been investigating Pablo Picasso. The class have been learning about Picasso's life and have focused on his famous 1937 painting called **Guernica**. Guernica is an oil painting depicting the German bombing of Guernica and is considered one of the most moving and powerful anti-war painting in history. Next week in their Spanish lesson, students will be tasked to redraw/recreate this artwork. Here is a picture of Guernica.



Once again, I want to thank all parents who volunteered their time to attend the Poppy Factory this week. You made this trip seamless and efficient, and the entire class is thankful for your support. Have a wonderful weekend.
