

How to I buy a ticket?

What do I need to bring on the night itself?

Do I need to pre-book the creche?






Recommended Read



Carrie and the Roller Boots (ages 6-8 & up)

Sidney has been practising his tap-dancing routine every day, in preparation for his performance at Friday Fun assembly. His best friend Carrie decides to perform alongside him, and devises a spectacular roller-skating act, complete with elaborate spins and cartwheels. However, Carrie has never roller-skated before and her new hobby proves difficult to master. Sidney suggests she performs at next month's assembly instead, to give her more practice time, but Carrie wants to be good NOW and won't accept any help or advice. As the day of the performance approaches, she becomes increasingly anxious.

This delightful chapter book demonstrates that it takes time, hard work and perseverance to develop new skills, and also highlights the importance of supportive friendships. It sensitively explores Carrie's feelings of frustration and apprehension, as well as Sidney's concern for his friend. Colourful illustrations accompany the gentle tale, which is ideal for dyslexic or reluctant readers. A dyslexia-friendly font and uncluttered layout makes reading easier, while thick, off-white pages help to reduce visual stress. Children can enjoy further Sidney and Carrie adventures in Sidney Makes a Wish.

<u>Friday 3rd November</u> <u>Reception Class Newsletter</u>

This week we:

- Learnt how to read and write the sounds /ck/ (rock), /e/ and /u/ in our Alphabet Code lessons. We are starting to read and write words with four sounds in them!
- Focused on sentence building in our English lessons. We need to use a
 capital letter at the beginning of our sentence, finger spaces between
 our words and a full stop at the end. The children were very resilient
 and did not give up.
- Had our very first music lesson. It was so much fun!
- Learnt how to read and write the tricky words the and is.
- Compared amounts and numerals, saying which was worth more. We can
 say greater than and equal to when describing numbers.
- Looked at number patterns and identified what should come next (finding one more than a given number.) For example: what is one more than 7?
- Talked about the birth of baby Jesus as a sign of hope in our R.E. lesson. Today, people celebrate the upcoming arrival of a baby with a baby shower. We imagined that we were going to throw a baby shower for Jesus and thought about all the things that we would need.

Next week, we will:

- Learn how to read and write the sounds /r/, /b/ and /h/.
- Compare quantities and numerals to identify which is worth less.

This week, we have welcomed our lovely student teacher, Miss B. She will be staying with us until Christmas. She has many years of experience as she has been a teacher at an International Baccalaureate school in India. We are so lucky to have her. Please do say hello if you see her around!

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 3rd November 2023

In English this week we have continued looking at The Great Fire of London and have sequenced the events of the fire. We thought carefully about what happened using pictures to help us sequence the events of The Great Fire of London in 1666.

In Maths, we have been looking at addition using the counting on strategy. We thought carefully about how we use a part-part-whole model in addition.

For Alphabet Code this week we have been looking at the /oi/ code and writing sentences using this code. Next week, we will start the /or/ code.

In PSHE, we continued to look at the zones of regulation and thought about the strategies we could use to help ourselves manage our emotions.

In Science, we have been learning about our sense of touch. We thought about different things that we like and don't like touching and gave reasons as to why we felt that way.

In History, we have started learning about the 4th of November and why it is such an important historical day. We made our own bonfire night display pictures using wax crayons to colour and then went over the top with a black crayon for the night's sky.


In Computing, we have been learning about different types of computers. We have been practicing our mouse and keyboard skills by logging onto our computers and using the Paintz application to create different pictures in the style of David Hockney.



Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 3rd November 2023

This week, Year 2 have started their new english unit by ordering events and using complete sentences to summarise key points. They've thought about capital letters in SPAG — considering which nouns should be capitalised. In maths, they have used different methods to add and subtract 2 —digit numbers. Can your child explain the different methods we have used? Some examples include:



To kick-start our history unit on historical figures, Year 2 will be going on a walk around Chelsea with historian Nadia Merchant to learn about Bob Marley and other key people who lived in the local area. Next week, they'll be visiting the Chelsea Physic Garden to complete their science unit on habitats.



Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

In English we have started a new topic on Bedtime Stories. We had a discussion as a class about different types of bedtime stories and the genre of story typically used before bed. We started a story called The Dragon's Egg which took us on a journey of a young boy finding a baby dragon and helping it fly. Our focus this week was looking at intonation and how our tone and expression can affect how the story sounds. Practice using intonation when you read aloud at home!

In Maths we started the week looking at number bonds to 100 and problemsolving questions. We used different strategies to find complements of 100, such as using number bonds to 10. We also started our new topic on





In Science we started our new topic on nutrition and the digestive system! We had a lot of fun sorting out different bits of food onto our food chart plates that we made. We talked about how to spot healthy foods in the grocery store and what to look for on food labels

In Spanish the students are learning about feelings. They read the Colour Monster and discussed the Zones of Regulation in Spanish which ties into our PSHE topic this term on Friendships.



Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 3rd November

This week in English, we began a new unit looking at a fiction text called 'The Storm'. First, we looked at the title of the short story and made predictions about what it may be about. Then, we listened to an audio clip of the story. We made inferences about the genre, style, setting, characters and purpose of the story. We worked in groups to retrieve key information from the text and answer literal questions.

In Maths, we have continued our unit on Addition and Subtraction. We have been using number lines and rounding to help us solve calculations. Rounding to the nearest multiple of 100 or 1000 is a useful way of estimating the answer to an addition or subtraction problem. We then reviewed our learning by completing our end of block assessment on Addition and Subtraction.

Year Four have had an exciting week learning to touch type! We have practised where to place our fingers and how to move to various keys. We now know that the most important thing is to never look down at your hands! We will continue to consistently practise touch typing for the rest of the term.

In Art, we continued to learn about the artist L.S Lowry. We look at different paintings by L.S. Lowry and then created our own landscapes in the same style. We used pencil to complete the painting 'Going to Work'. We paid careful attention to the matchstick style figures.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- What are the 'home' keys on a keyboard when touch typing?
- What mathematical operation could you use check your answer when solving an addition calculation?
- What features are common in L.S Lowry's artwork?

Learning at Christ Church Friday, 3rd November 2023

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, Year 5 have started a new unit called 'The Lighthouse' which is about a lighthouse breaking down as a boat approached a rocky cliff. Children learned about features of a newspaper report such as the heading, the orientation and quotes. Children devised open ended questions to interview people who were at the scene of the incident and used the answers they got to create quotes which are going to be added to their final piece of writing: a newspaper report.

In Maths, Year 5 learned about square numbers, factors and common factors. Children learned how to identify if a number is a square number or not and they learned that $2^2 = 2 \times 2 = 4$. Furthermore, children learned how to identify all the factors of a given number, who to work out if a number is a factor of another given number and how to work out common factors between two numbers.

In Science, children completed their learning brief on the topic of Scientist and discussed the learning brief of their new topic: forces. Children learned that they are going to be learning about gravity, water and air resistance and friction.

In RE, children started a new unit which examines the role of art in depicting the story of the birth of Jesus. Children read the Gospels of Luke and Matthew and compared the similarities and differences between these two accounts of the birth of Jesus

In History, children learned about the industrial revolution and how it brought about major societal and technological changes to the day to day lives of Victorians

In Art, children considered the concepts of symbolism and composition and created a sketch of the word 'wonderful' within a container.

Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church

Friday 3rd November

English: This week we have continued our journey on "Story openings" using *The Hungar Games* written by Suzanne Collins and its 2012 film adaptation as a source of inspiration. Students have started writing about an action-packed scene from the film where the main protagonist, Katniss Everdeen, is caught in a wild forest fire. The class are using personification, embedded clauses, fronted adverbials, and a variety of different sentence types to create a detailed and engaging piece of writing.

Mathematics: This week, students have continued learning about multiplication division, focusing on prime numbers, squared numbers, cubed numbers, common factors, and common multiples of numbers. All students have been working hard to improve their mathematical skills and understanding of multiplication and division.

History: In History this week, Students learnt about Rationing in its impact in World War II. The class watched old television adverts about how to ration and how rationing affected Britian. They also learnt about how much food an average adult would receive each week from their rations. Students were surprised about how little people ate and what foods and products were classified as exotic, and how people turned vegetables into desserts during World War II (carrots on a stick). They were shocked to discover that rationing officially ended ten years after World War II had finished.



PSHE: In PSHE this week, students were learning about trusted people in their lives. The class talked about people in their lives who they can trust and talk to if a problem ever arises. Students created a hand representation and wrote/draw in people or things in their life which they can talk to or seek help from. Students also learnt about their circle of control. A circle of control is someone's ability to predict or manipulate things in their daily life. For example, students can control their likes and dislikes, while they cannot control the weather or traffic. This week's lesson was about managing your life (anxiety and stress) and identifying people who students trust.

Science: To finish our Science Unit of last term, the class conducted an experiment about microorganisms. The goal of this experiment was to show how microbes spread and grow. Students were paired up and handed a slice of bread, zip lock bag and tasked to handle the bread any way they wanted and placed somewhere in the classroom. Some groups decided to step on their bread (with their shoe), add moisture to their bread or even just touch it with their hands before they were labelled and sealed. Mr Williamson also made a control sample which was not touched by human hands. After the term break, the class exampled their bread......Students were utterly speechless! Here are some samples.
