Dear Christ Church and Holy Trinity Primary Schools,

THANK YOU for kindly choosing to donate for Glass Door Homeless Charity and those who depend on us.

Your support will contribute to our year-round casework service, which at this time is busier than ever. Due to the cost-of-living crisis, we are finding the demand for our services increasing as more and more people face the prospect of homelessness for the first time. Since June 2022, more than 1,550 people have visited our daytime centres across London to meet with a Glass Door caseworker who have provided them with tailored advice and guidance to support them at a time where they need it the most.

Between early December and the end of March, we provided emergency shelter each night across our three winter night shelter circuits in and around Kensington & Chelsea, Hammersmith & Fulham and Wandsworth. Each of the 3 circuits was formed of 7 churches who each hosted the shelter one night a week. This past winter, a total of 293 individuals received a warm welcome, a safe place to sleep, a nutritious evening meal and ongoing support from our casework team. Our caseworker's support consists of many things such as opening bank accounts for our guests, assisting guests registering with a GP, helping guests into employment, and working towards finding our guests a safe place to call home.

One guest described how much our support meant to her: 'the whole team at Glass Door have been amazing. Their kindness and support are something I'll never forget. They are a lifeline to so many people facing homelessness in London.' At Glass Door, we ensure that our guests are treated with compassion, dignity and respect. This would not be possible without your generosity, and belief in our vision for a future where no one has to sleep on the streets of London.

THANK YOU so much again for your support. Together, we will help more people to get off – and stay off – the streets of London.



Dear Parent/Carer,

As the new term begins, I wanted to share some fantastic news about my Universal Free School Meals programme – it's extending until the middle of 2025!

As the Mayor of London, I'm so proud we've funded more than 17 million free school meals for around 287,000 primary school children in London since September.

However, I know times are still tough for many Londoners and I am committed to doing all that I can to support families through these difficult times.

I am now extending funding for Universal Free School Meals for another academic school year between September 2024 and July 2025. This means that primary school aged children who attend a state funded school in London will continue to receive a healthy, nutritious meal so that no child goes hungry in the classroom, and all pupils can better concentrate on their studies.

I am also increasing the amount of money boroughs and schools receive to £3 per meal. The grant that I provide is now 18.5% higher than the offer from national Government for Universal Infant Free School Meals.

This extension will provide a safety net for families and could save parents and carers up to £1,000 per child across the two years.

Eating a nutritious meal everyday is hugely beneficial to children and families both in the short and long term. As someone who received free school meals myself growing up, I know they can be a lifeline, helping children to reach their full potential.

As Mayor of London, I also fundamentally believe that feeding our children shouldn't be an optional luxury but should rank as one of our society's top priorities. Making sure our children are properly fed and healthy is vital to building a better London for everyone — a city that is fairer, safer, more inclusive and more prosperous for all. This is why I will continue to call on the Government to step forward and provide the funding needed to make our Universal Free School Meal programme permanent.

Even though your child is receiving their free school meals automatically, it is still vitally important — if you have not done so already — to complete your school or borough's short registration form in case your child is eligible for extra funding for their school from the Government, worth over £1,300 per year. That's more money for extracurricular activities, teacher development and support for children who need it most. This will ensure you'll also receive any other benefits you may be entitled to, like food vouchers during the holidays. Ask your school for more info or visit your borough website.


A busy week in Reception class, this is what we have been up to:

English- English- This week, the children listened to the story of Jack and the Beanstalk and completed the following activities:

- -Retold the story using actions.
- -Acted the story out using props.
- -Sequenced the story.
- Wrote a holiday recount.

'Over the holiday... I went to my nan's.'

Maths - In Maths, the children have been introduced to the concept of addition by adding two different parts together (two amounts). As you might have seen on this week's homework, the children have also been working out how many different ways there are to make 10. For example: my whole is 10. How can I make 10? One part is 1, one part is 9 and my whole is 10. 1 + 9= 10. We have worked out the answers by giving the children 10 cubes and letting them share the 10 cubes between the two parts (the two circles).

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 1

Friday 12th January 2024

Happy new year and welcome back to school everyone!

In English, we started our new topic of Traditional Tales, looking at the story of The Enormous Turnip in particular. We discussed what a traditional tale was and thought of lots of examples we already knew. Next, we had great fun acting out the story, focusing on our facial expressions and body language to show how much hard work it was to pull the turnip out. We finished the week by writing a letter to one of the characters asking for their help. We recapped the format and purpose of a letter and then learnt how to use persuasive language to engage and encourage the reader.

In Maths, we have been learning about place value. We looked at the composition of teen numbers by identifying how many tens and ones. We also looked at finding one more and one less than a given number.

In Computing this week we started our new topic of working with robots. We were introduced to Beebots, we looked at their buttons and what each one might do. Then we learnt about the different commands and importance of each button. Then we had a go at making our own sequences and even tested our partner's button knowledge by making secret sequences!




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3 Friday 12th January 2024

Happy New Year and welcome back. It was so lovely to welcome the children back to school this week and to see so many smiling faces ready to learn!

In English this week, we began our new unit called 'The Black Hat'. In our first lesson, we looked at carefully choosing appropriate vocabulary to describe the boy in our story based on the information we have from watching a small clip. In our second lesson, we looked at prepositions and prepositional phrases. We practised using these and then wrote a short first-person piece about walking through the woods where we tried to include at least two prepositions.

In Maths, we explored the 8 times-tables, looking closely at the relationship between the 2, 4 and 8 times-tables. We discovered that if we double a number, and then double it again and again, that is the same as multiplying by 8!



In RE, we began our unit on Judaism. Our big question for this unit is 'what does it mean to be Jewish?' This week, we looked at the difference between a promise and a covenant, and then we looked at the first covenant made between Abraham and God.

In Geography, we started our unit all about where we are in the world. We looked at maps of different scales and thought about how we can identify and locate where we are on different maps.




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4 Friday 12th January 2024

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week we learnt how to solve division problems and the concept of sharing between equal groups. This included dividing two and three-digit numbers a one-digit number. To do this we partitioned the number being divided (the dividend) using a place-value table and part-whole models. We explored, also, dividing when the answer also included a remainder.



English

Our lessons this week involved researching information about animals and their habitats. Pupils were given information sheets about one type of animal and were set the task of choosing the 3 most important facts. They had to justify why they felt their chosen 3 were the most relevant. Year 4 went on to practise retrieving information from a text while answering retrieval and inference type questions. Finally, pupils had the opportunity to generate their own questions of this type.

Geography

For our new unit 'Earthquakes and volcanoes', we studied the structure of the earth by identifying the 'core', the 'mantle' and the 'crust'. Year 4 also learnt about tectonic plates and the way in which they cause earthquakes. We finished the lesson by cutting out model tectonic plates, and arranging them into place.

RE

We started our new RE unit 'Hinduism' and explored what Hindus believe about God, the Aum symbol and simple patterns used in Hindu art.



Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 5 Friday 12th January 2024

Happy New Year - welcome back to Year 5!



This week we have started our fractions maths unit, and have spent lots of time looking at equivalent fractions. We have used multiple different strategies to work out equivalent fractions, and have been multiplying the numerators and denominators by the same number to find equivalent fractions. This question was on our do now this week and let us practice this skill!

We have also started our first English unit of the Spring term, which is all about our culture and stories from

cultures around the world. As a class we read the story of how the Brazilian Bettles got their coats, with many of us volunteering to read aloud. It was so nice to hear the lovely reading voices in our class!

Swimming was very fun and we had a great time at Queen Mother Sports Centre. I was so impressed to see almost everyone giving it a go! Swimming is a great part of the PE curriculum and everyone had so much fun - it's so exciting that we have to opportunity to do this weekly.

In DT this term we are looking at musical instruments and how they work, with the goal to eventually create our own out of recycled materials. We started off this week by looking at the four different types of instruments (percussion, woodwind, brass and strings). We then watched Peter and the Wolf performed by an orchestra so that we could see these instruments in action.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6 Friday 12th January 2024

Happy New Year everyone and welcome back!

We have had an excellent first week back. In maths we continued looking at fractions, adding subtracting them and how to add, subtract and convert mixed numbers into improper fractions.

In English we looked at creating a balanced argument, using persuasive writing and making sure we followed the PEE format (point, explain, expand). We debated whether children should be allowed phones in school, and we are looking forward to writing our own points into an extended piece of writing next week.

In RE we started looking at a different faith - Buddhism. We learnt about the fact that they do not have a god but more of a teacher, named Buddha.

We started our new topic of 'Shelters' in DT this week. We explored lots of different types of shelters from all over the world, from different communities and climates. Although they were made of different materials, we noticed they all had a few things in common. Most of them were a triangular shape and they all offered some sort of protection. We finished the lesson with a challenge to make the strongest bridge we could, out of limited resources.

We also started a new topic in geography, which is the 'Amazon'. We discussed where in the world the Amazon is, what it is and what the climate there is like. We challenged ourselves to label the continents and sea without an atlas and then used one to help us name the countries surrounding the Amazon in South America.
