

Rajiv has feelings for everything. But today he has thrown his lunar rover at the wall and shouted at his sister, andhe doesn't know why. Luckily, his dad has a suggestion. Together, they climb a tree in the park and look at the stars. If they take their time, they can see their own shyness, their anger and their happiness in pictures in the stars. There's Rajiv playing catch! There's Dad cooking curries for dinner! Dad suggests that, just like astronauts use the constellations to navigate, Rajiv uses his emotions to guide his actions. The stars are always there, to show the way.

This is a gentle story about identifying your emotions, and learning to accept them. There will be much to discuss when reading this with a child aged 3 and older. The relationship between Rajiv and his father is warm and loving – it's great to have a dad character role-modelling talking about feelings. Beautiful illustrations echo the warm, loving conversation and could inspire many stargazing moments. A gorgeous book that would be lovely to share with pre-schoolers.

Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- Learnt how to read and write the sounds the sounds /ch/ (chip), /sh/ (lish) and /ee/ (teeth.)
- Continued to explore number bonds to 10 in our Maths lessons. We dropped double sided counters and counted the red and blue parts. We also used numicon pieces to add two parts together and find the whole number.
- Continued to use Jack and the Beanstalk as a focus for writing. We wrote a recount of the story and drew pictures to match sentences that we had read.
- Read The Big Orange Splot in Art. It is about a man who decides to change his grey, dull house to one which is covered in beautiful colours and patterns.
 We designed our own dream houses. Next week, we will design the inside.
- Listened to the story of the Lost Sheep in our R.E.
 lesson. It taught us that God is like a shepherd
 and He Looks after us, like a shepherd looks after
 his sheep. We role-played and took turns pretending
 to be the shepherd and the lost sheep. We also
 created a large sheep, each adding one cotton wool
 hall.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 19th January 2024

In Maths, we looked at numbers to 20. We have been focussing on our place value (tens and ones) and looking at one more and one less than a given number within 20.

In English, we have read the traditional story "The Enormous Turnip", which is a traditional tale in Russia. We then discussed how the story teaches us an important lesson of how we have to work together and keep trying to succeed. We then wrote a letter to a character from the story.

In Alphabet Code, this week we have been learning the /oi/ code, Next week we will learn the /j/ code,

In Science, we started our new topic of animals! We talked different kinds of animals and thought about mammals and birds. We learnt that mammals are animals with hair or fur on their bodies.

In Geography, we continued learning about The United Kingdom. We learnt about the capital cities of England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. We then thought about key landmarks in all of these cities, such as:

In Spanish, we have been learning about the Spanish numbers,

In Computing, we have learnt how to give our BeeBots different commands. We decided to command our BeeBots to move in a circle and as a class discussed how we would make this happen.

Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 19th January 2024

A massive well done to Year 2 for their BRILLIANT behaviour and engagement on our trip to the Marble Arch Synagogue on Tuesday morning. This was our first lesson on Judaism where they taught by the inspiring Rabbi Daniel about the parts of a synagogue – and were introduced to key words such as Torah, Bimah, Rabbi and Hebrew.

They then wrote a recount of their visit on Wednesday morning. As well as revisiting noun phrases in their new english unit which is a story from a different culture. They wrote some beautiful phrases using ambitious adjectives and we thought about the meaning of the prefix – de, found in the word dehydrated.

In Maths, Year 2 started their money unit – counting in pence and pounds by adding the greatest values first. Some children started to compare amounts by using the mathematical symbols < > = Can they complete the problem below?

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

In English we have been continuing with Fantastic Mr Fox. We have been looking at features of newspapers in preparation for our own news reports. In addition, we have been exploring present perfect tense, which can be a bit confusing at times!

In Maths we have started our new topic on fractions. We have been looking at denominators and how fractions can be represented. It's important we understand how fractions are used in the real world so year 3 have been keeping an eye out for fractions all around them. Let me know if you spot any fractions on the weekend!

In Geography we have been learning about latitude and longitude lines, including the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn. We also looked at the 'true size' of each of the countries. Did you know Australia is the same size as the whole of Europe?!

In Science we got to explore different types of rocks and crystals. We loved investigating all the sparkly and shiny crystals and describing their different properties. If you find any interesting rocks, please bring them into class for us to investigate.

Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 19th January

This week in English, we wrote our own advertisements using rhetorical questions, superlatives, the conditional tense and exciting adjectives. We also designed our own logos and slogans to help persuade the customer to purchase our products. We then started our new unit where we are looking at animal documentaries. We worked collaboratively to research facts about gorillas, crocodiles, giraffes and zebras. We presented our interesting facts to the class.

In Maths, we have been reviewing factors and factor pairs. We know that factor pairs are a set of two integers that give a particular product when multiplied together. We then used this knowledge to help us reorder numbers and find more efficient ways to multiply three or more numbers.

In PSHE, we continued to learn about managing our feelings and emotions. We thought about how we could support our well-being. We learned how various strategies, including; taking deep breaths, moving our bodies and socialising with our friends help us to feel happy and calm. We then created our own self-care plan where we came up with specific ideas that we know work for us.

In RE, we had a fascinating time on our school trip to Neasden temple where we learned how Hindus worship in a mandir. We watched a documentary about the history of the mandir and learned how it was build over several years. We were amazed by the different murti (statues and images of deities) in the temple.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- Why does the Hindu god Ganesh have an elephant head?
- What does the term 'area' mean?
- What the outermost layer of the earth called?

Learning at Christ Church Friday, 19th January 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, Year 5 have started a new unit based on the book 'Wonder'. Children have studied passages of the book and practiced their reading comprehension and inferencing skills. Children revised how to answer questions by quoting from the text and including a short explanation in their own words to show they can interpret what they read. Children have also contrasted the book with the movie and brainstormed ambitious words to describe some of the characters of the story. They used these word banks to write descriptive paragraphs.

In Maths, Year 5 learned how to divide a 4-digit number by a 1-digit number using the bus stop method. Children also learned how to use factors to solve divisions by breaking up the divisor using its factor pairs. For example, $368 \div 4 = 368 \div 2 \div 2 = 184 \div 2 = 92$. This allows children to calculate divisions mentally. Finally, children used these skills to solve reasoning and multistep problems.

In Science, children learned about two new properties of materials: magnetic and hard. They learned that an object is hard when it does not change shapes when a force is applied to it, and it does not easily scratch. Children studied a variety of objects in the classroom and recorded what types of materials they are made from and what properties these materials have.

In RE, Year 5 children learned about Guru Granth Sahib, the religious scripture of Sikhism. They also learned about the naming ceremony and what Sikh names mean.

In Computing, children worked in groups and started filming their movie about our past science topic: forces. They film six different scenes which will be assembled into a longer movie.

In DT, Year 5 started a new unit which will teach them how to make their own instruments out of recycled materials. Children learned how sound is made, the main types of instrument families and tested out the different types of sounds produced by a variety of different instruments.

Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church

Friday 19th January

English: In English this week, Year 6 have continued our English unit about Balanced Arguments. This week the looked at a variety of sources identifying the key features needed to write a successful Balanced Argument. Students have been tasked to highlight and identify the key features of a balanced argument.



Mathematics: This week, students continued our new maths unit; Fractions. This week specifically, students have learnt about multiplying and dividing fractions of whole values and groups of objects. Year 6 should be finishing this unit early next week, moving onto our next unit: Ratios.

Geography: This week in geography, year 6 went into the computer suite to research Flora and Fauna found in the Amazon
Rainforest. Students had a blast, researching animals like Puma or Jaguars, Red belied Piranhas, or plants such as the Amazonian
Giant Lilly, Orchids and Cacao trees. Year 6 is keen to head back into the computer suite next week for my researching fun.

Science: This week in science we started our new Science unit. This unit is all about Dinosaurs! This week year 6 examined the timeline of the Mesozoic era and if specific dinosaurs are from either the Triassic, Jurassic, or Cretaceous period. Fun Fact, the film Jurassic Park made the Tyrannosaurus Rex (T-Rex) famous, however, the T-Rex is actually from the Cretaceous period, not the Jurassic.

Design and Technology: This Term Students are starting our first DT unit of the Year. This unit is all about shelters. This unit ties in with our Geography unit as we have explored how civilisations/tribes used shelters over the course of history. Students learnt about the Inuit people who use snow to make Igloo's, Native American people who built Tipi's (Tepee) out of hide and wooden logs; and Amazonian tribes who built their shelters from wood, bamboo, and straw. The class has also investigated to purpose of materials and their properties when building structures. Like why we use Nylon or plastics for umbrella rather than paper or silk.
