




International Women's Day

Can we please remind you we are a nut free school

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop mild or potentially life-threatening allergic reactions. If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

Some foods, especially after school snacks, need to be checked for their ingredients. Snacks for break time should be **FRUIT** or **VEGETABLES** only. NO **SWEETS** or **CHOCOLATE** allowed at school or after school clubs.

So please can we ask that you have no nut products in the lunch boxes or brought into the school:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Granola bars
- Cakes
- Biscuits / Cookies



This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely. We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it.





- We ask you to support and extend the children's learning by accompanying them on this expedition. The children will get most out of the trip by adults speaking and listening and pointing out areas of interest.
- When walking with the class/group, please ensure that you are on the road-side. There will be designated road crossers and you will be informed if this is part of your job by the member of staff in charge.
- Please be aware we walk in a crocodile with a staff member at the front and the rear.
- Be aware of children's safety at all times, and if in doubt check any concerns with the member of staff in charge.
- You will receive information concerning the trip before departure either by verbal/written communication.
- Please do not use mobile phones, carry hot drinks or smoke whilst children are in your care.
- 7. We ask you to encourage children to be responsible for their own belongings.
- Never buy or give treats to children due to mild and life-threatening allergic reactions. This includes your own child. The only food that children are allowed to eat is their school packed lunch or one provided from home.
- We expect a high standard of behaviour from the children, if you have any concerns please consult a member of staff in charge immediately.
- From Year 1 onwards parents must not be expected to be paired with their child.
- If you have an Oyster Card please could it be used on the trip for public transport.



Ramadan is a very special month that is observed by 1.8 billion Muslims all over the world. It falls on the ninth month of the Islamic calendar. It is one of the biggest religious events on the planet.

What do Muslims do during Ramadan?

- Give more to charity.












SATURDAY 20th APRIL FUNDRAISING FOR CCHT

TCS will give £10 to our school for every child under the age of 17 who completes their distance!

The TCS Mini London Marathon invites schools to bring their children and young people to run, jog, walk, or wheel one mile or 2.6K in the heart of the capital.

The event is free to enter, and what's more, our title partner, TCS, is giving schools £10 for every participant aged 17 or under who finishes the event! Participants cross the iconic TCS London Marathon Finish Line and receive a TCS Mini London Marathon medal.

The 2024 event will take place on 20 April, and we want as many children as possible to be able to take part, so there is a one-mile event for children in Reception to Year 7 and a 2.6K route for those in Years 4 to 12 who can go a bit further.

Our participants' safety is our top priority. The event takes place on a closed, secure route (see maps above) with stewards and a dedicated Welfare Team on the course to make sure all children have a safe and enjoyable experience. All participants need to be escorted to a safe and secure 'drop off' zone at the Start Area.

Children in Year 3 or above on Event Day can complete the route on their own, while children in Reception to Year 2 need to be accompanied on the course, with a minimum ratio of one adult for every eight children. Participants will also need to be collected from a safe and secure zone by the Finish Line.



- Tea, coffee and homemade baking stand with all proceeds directly going to the schools




Recommended Read



Habitats ages 6-8 & up)

Author: Hannah Pang Illustrator: Isobel Lundie Publisher: Little Tiger



Nature is full of a variety of natural habitats — places where plants and animals coexist. Yet, those habitats are changeable, and often contain different sections or layers that feature different types of life, according to how much light, moisture and air there is, among other factors.

Demonstrating these layers—whether that's the sunlit zone, twilight zone and the deep sea layer of the ocean, or the emergent layer, the canopy, understory and forest floor of the rainforest—this beautiful picture book shows readers some of the plants and creatures that can be found at

the different parts of a habitat. In ancient woodland, badgers can share their setts with foxes and rabbits, and the black-chested buzzard-eagle lives high on the rocky screed of the Andes mountains in South America.

Isobel Lundie's colourful, eye-catching collage-style illustrations show delightful details, such as a pelican eel's huge jaws, or the pattern on a fly agaric mushroom. This is a charming book with a good level of text to picture, suitable for mid-primary readers, and the paper craft used in the book – pages that are cut short in the different sections to make flap pages of graduated sizes – demonstrates the idea of layers to the reader in a clear and interactive way.

WHAT IS HAF?

If you think you could be entitled, please contact your school.


If you are FSM eligible, you'll also receive supermarket vouchers during all school holidays!





Dear Parents,

This week, in English, the children have continued to work on the story: The Clock Tower. They compared the two different scenes in the story. Next week, the children will work on retelling the story.

Thank you so much for your time during our parent meetings this week! It was wonderful to get to talk through all the wonderful learning and achievements of your beautiful children. I have provided a few opportunities to practice key skills such as reasoning questions. For homework this week please try a few reading comprehension challenges. Remember to read these through together to find and underline the answers.

Thank you for watching our sharing in special mentions this afternoon, we are so proud of all our learning.

This week we have enjoyed reading My Grandma and Me. We thought about some similies to describe Grandma some of our favourites included 'she was as wise as an elephant'.

In maths we have been using out understanding of multiplication and division facts to complete a range of activities.

In RE we thought about the key symbols we see within the Easter story. We then tried our own hot cross buns noticing the cross on the top.

We had an incredible time celebrating world book day! We had a webinar from John Patrick Green to hear about his investigator books- with your world book day tokens you can collect one of his books! 


Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 8th March 2024

In English this week, we finished our newspaper articles! We then began our next unit where we started looking at one of the main characters from our new story. We thought about what makes this character an unlikely hero. Then, we wrote some character descriptions of an unlikely hero of our choice. We used language such as however, even though, and although to show contrast.

In Maths, we have continued to learn about measurement. This week, we continued practising converting equivalent measurements and used this knowledge to add and subtract lengths and heights.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4 Friday 8th March 2024

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week, children converted mixed numbers into improper fractions.

This concept was taught predominantly with pictorial representations such as bar models and number lines, which are useful representations to allow children to see the links between mixed numbers and improper fractions. We also looked at fraction families to cement understanding of equivalent fractions.

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English

To celebrate World Book day, Year 4 walked to the National Army Museum to attend a workshop of storytelling and creative writing. The children went on a time travelling tour of the museum then wrote their own stories inspired by pieces from the museum's handling collection. We also celebrated World Book day by sharing our favourite books. Alongside all this, we continued with our Firework Maker's Daughter unit which involved summarising chapter 3 and planning a chapter for the character Razvani.

History

We began our new History unit on Ancient Egyptians. For the next few lessons, we will consider what they did and discuss whether Ancient Egypt deserves its reputation as one of the most important early civilisations. We explored the Learning Brief, which outlined the approach to the Egyptians we would be taking over the next few lessons. Year 4 considered what they know already and what more they would like to know about the Ancient Egyptians. RE

Year 4 took the tube to Southwark Cathedral to discover the symbolic features of the building with an emphasis on the symbolism of baptism and the Eucharist. We also learnt about the significance of different Christian symbols including light, water, the cross and the dove and their significance in Christian life, worship and ceremonies.

In the afternoon, Year 4 worked with clay to make either a clay tile linking to Christian Symbols or a clay pilgrim souvenir, which connects with the content of our Pilgrimage and Journeys trail.



Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 5 - Friday 7th March 2024

This week, we have been busy bees here in year 5!

English has had us doing a whole host of activities - writing letters based on the text Wonder (both the movie and the book) and really diving deep into the world of Holes. We used the descriptive language in the text to create pieces of art, and now we have yellow-spotted lizards crawling all around our Literacy Working Wall!

We have moved onto division in maths, and are tackling the big job of dividing 4-digit numbers by 1-digit numbers. We are doing this using two main methods: using place value counters to visualise the equation; and using short division (also known as the 'bus stop' method).

In geography, we made open-flap books about erosion and the different types (glacial, waves, wind and rivers) and thought about how this affects coasts. In science, we covered adolescence and reminded ourselves about what happens during puberty - Miss P-B was very impressed to see everything we know!

On Wednesday, Year 5 went on an amazing trip to Westminster Abbey. We learned all about the different parts of the Abbey, saw the Coronation Chair, the Poets Corner, the area of the building where coronations take place, and the choir seats.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6 Friday 8th March 2024

This week in maths, we continued looking at ratio, in particular scaled diagrams and using scale factor to enlarge shapes. We practiced drawing our own shapes, using multiplication and division to solve ratio and proportion problems and identifying similar shapes.

In English we returned to our learning about WW2 as part of our historical context topic. We looked at the lead up to the war, in particular, from the German side. We talked about where the dislike of the Jewish people came from and how awfully they were treated before and during the war. We also learnt about some key vocabulary that we need to know for our extended writing, that we shall do later.

In computing we started our new topic of Data and Information (including spreadsheets). We looked at collecting and organising data in a format of our own choice. Then we explored how data can be structured in a table. We finished the lesson by looking at inputting data into a spreadsheet.

Thursday was world book day where we celebrated by discussing and recommending our favourtte books to each other, took part in a reading and football themed quiz and designed our own book voucher.
