Easter Assembly

Pupils at Holy Trinity told the Easter story today at our end of term Collective Worship Assembly. 6JD led the service as each year group reenacted key events in Holy Week, such as Maundy Thursday, the Last Supper, when Jesus was betrayed, crucified, died and was buried. With props and dress, the service was both moving and powerful and we were reminded of the true meaning of Easter.

Can we please remind you we are a nut free school

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop mild or potentially life-threatening allergic reactions. If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

Some foods, especially after school snacks, need to be checked for their ingredients. Snacks for break time should be **FRUIT** or **VEGETABLES** only. **NO SWEETS** or **CHOCOLATE** allowed at school or after school clubs. So please can we ask that you have no nut products in the lunch boxes or brought into the school:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Granola bars
- Cakes
- Biscuits / Cookies



This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely.

We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it.

A Message from Mrs. Hawkins regarding Internet Safety:

Gaming and Social Media

As you know, we have a no phone policy at school and have had for the last three years. This has had a positive effect on reducing the issues around cyberbullying and problems with phones being used inappropriately on journeys to and from school. It has also had the effect of encouraging more parents to drop off and collect their

children rather than getting them to do that alone, which also causes lots of problems if they are not ready. What all my teachers and learning support assistants still report on is the worrying amount of time many children seem to be on screens at home, either gaming or using social media, which is not appropriate for their age. Many children seem to be going to bed late because they have been on a screen, and this is not good for them and certainly will not help their reading attainment if this is a substitute for reading a book.

Just to remind you that **What's App age is 16 +**, and that makes so much sense as being able to navigate the problems around group chats is hard enough for adults, let alone primary school children. It will undoubtedly cause problems that children are not experienced enough to deal with. Children need to learn how to communicate and deal with friends face to face before they can do it virtually. Please think very carefully about how you are parenting your child and the access you give them to both gaming and social media.

We are running an Internet safety meeting with Childnet on Monday 29th April at 7pm in Cadogan Gardens. Please put it in your diary and come along.

We all need to think more about how our children are accessing screens at home.

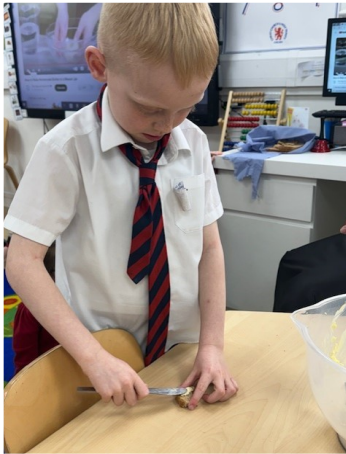

- Tea, coffee and homemade baking stand with all proceeds directly going to the schools

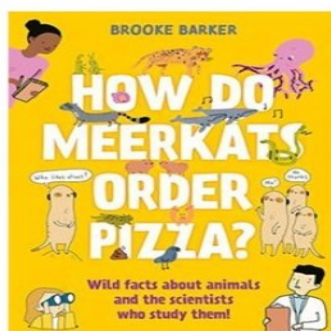


Recommended Read



How Do Meerkats Order Pizza? (ages 6-8 & up)

Author: Brooke Barker Publisher: Faber



This fascinating, highly-illustrated non-fiction book explores the work of 17 scientists from around the world, each of whom has focused their research on a specific animal or region.

Readers are presented with a wealth of fun facts about a range of animals, from dogs and roosters to humpback whales and Antarctic midges. They will also find out about some of the ingenious methods scientists have devised to study their subjects.

For example, when researchers wore a series of masks while interacting with crows, they learned that the birds could remember human faces and were able to communicate details about these humans to other crows.

And when scientists discovered that jaguars love the smell of certain perfumes, they sprayed the scent near hidden cameras, which enabled them to capture rare images of the elusive cats. The scientists hope that by learning more about jaguar behaviour, they'll be able to better protect these endangered creatures.

Each glossy page is packed full of colourful, amusing illustrations, while a useful glossary at the end explains some key concepts and terminology. A fabulous book for budding scientists and anyone with an interest in animals.

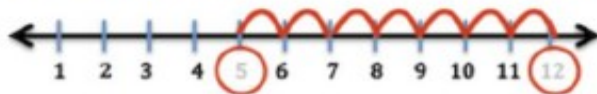

This week, in English, the children watched a short film called *Bubbles* and retold the story in their own words. We focused on using a story starter as well as using adjectives to describe the setting and the main character. Some children challenged themselves and used adverbs in their writing: carefully, slowly, nicely. Other children wrote repetitive sentences and described the different scenes from the story.

In Maths, we reviewed place value and worked on some foundation skills like counting to 100 forwards and backwards, writing and recognising numerals to 100 and spotting numbers on a 100 square.

In History, the children had so much fun making butter the Victorian way. We placed thick double cream in a jar and shook it until it became solid. Then we added some salt.

Well done everyone for working so hard this term. Enjoy a well-deserved break and I look forward to seeing you very soon again. Please continue to read and practise how to spell tricky words correctly.

Friday 28th March 2024

Over half term please continue to read widely, it is so valuable to extend our vocabulary and encourage ambitious word choices in our writing. I have given out 'Bronze Multiplication books', these are fantastic ways to practice our 1's, 2's, 5's and 10's. I have also printed some comprehension and maths practice papers. This week we performed 'The Last Supper' section of the Easter story in our Easter Assembly. As not everyone was able to be a disciple, we have all created our own inspired art which is displayed on our Last Supper Table cloth.

In English, we completed our stories inspired by 'My Grandma and Me'. These are proudly displayed on our English display in our classroom and a copy has been sent home for you to enjoy. Inspired by our story we made our Persian flatbread!

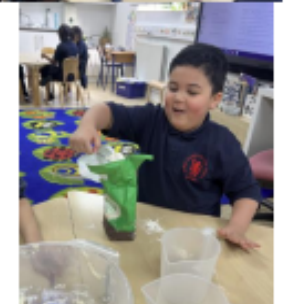

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 28th March 2024

This week in English, we wrote a persuasive letter to Joe Todd-Stanton (the author of Arthur and the Golden Rope) to try to convince him to make us the hero in his new book. We thought about the qualities that make us a hero, and tried to include these in our letters.

We have continued learning about fractions in Maths. This week, we looked at understanding fractions and scales, and looking at fractions on a number line.

We do

Miss Verity has some ribbon. She measures her ribbon using a metre stick.

Let's work out what fraction of a metre her ribbon is.

The metre stick has been divided into 2 equal parts.

The denominator is 2.

The ribbon is at the half way mark.

We do

The number line has been divided into 5 equal parts.

The denominator will be 5.

Each interval is one section of the number line.

Each interval is worth $\frac{1}{5}$.

Let's label the number line.

In RE, we concluded our Easter unit by thinking about the role each key person played in the story, and thinking about what we can learn from each of them. For example, we discussed how Peter's part taught us that it can sometimes be hard to stand up for what you believe in.

In PSHE, we thought about the many ways families can be different. We then looked at different festivals and celebrations and thought about the different things we celebrate with our own families, and how some of these may be similar.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Thursday 28th March 2024

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

We continued our unit on decimals by exploring tenths as decimals, on a place-value chart and a number line. Children looked at a variety of representations of tenths as decimals, up to the value of 1 whole. This led to adding the tenths column to a place value chart for the children to see how tenths fit with the rest of the number system and to

understand the need for the decimal point. Then, using a place value chart children extended their previous learning to include numbers greater than 1.

What number is shown on the place value chart?

Ones	Tenths

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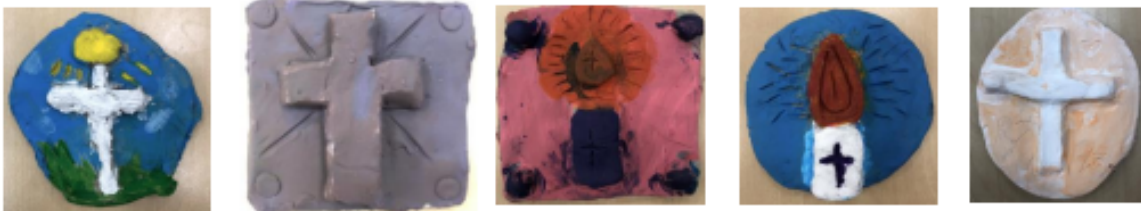
We also learnt that 10 tenths are equivalent to 1 whole, and therefore 1 whole is equivalent to 10 tenths. Children used this knowledge to count both forwards and backwards in tenths. When counting forwards, children learnt that 1 comes after 0.9, and when counting backwards that 0.9 comes after 1. Finally, we explored tenths on a number line. We found missing decimal numbers in a sequence; deepening their understanding of the value of 1 tenth. The sequences initially went up and down in steps of 1 tenth and then in varying intervals, including crossing the whole.

History

This week we learnt about how and why the ancient Egyptians built the pyramids. We looked at the artefact plumb bob, line and square and theories surrounding how the Egyptians managed to move such large blocks to such heights. We also learnt that pyramids were giant burial tombs used for the most important people in society, the pharaohs.

RE/ Art

Following our visit to Southwark Cathedral, Year 4 embarked on a creative journey to paint the religious symbols they had previously moulded from clay. By mixing PVA glue with poster paint, they were able to add vibrant colours and depth to these meaningful designs. The classroom was alive with creativity and reverence, as children carefully brought their symbols, steeped in religious significance, to life. See below for the fantastic results:

This week in maths, we started to look at multiplying and dividing decimals. We used a Gattegno chart to help us when we multiplied or divided by 10, 100 and 1,000 and then made sure when using the column method, the decimal point stayed in the same place.

In English we finished our extended pieces of writing focusing on Lt. Kotler's conversations with different characters. We spent the final lesson assessing our work by reading it through, making any corrections in green pen and colour coding any correct use of dialogue, the passive voice and 'show not tell'.

In history we looked in detail at some of the Viking settlements in the UK. We discussed why some settlements were short term or winter settlements and why the Vikings moved inland from the east coast. We then split into two groups and researched two settlements in particular - Repton and York. We researched when and why these settlements were situated where they were, what their main use was and how long the Vikings stayed there.

On Monday we went on a trip to the Natural History Museum, to take part in the Kensington and Chelsea Junior Citizenship Scheme. We had a brilliant time, talking to and learning from people from the police, fire brigade, Thames Water, TFL and the ambulance.
