


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WORLD BOOK DAY®



- Tea, coffee and homemade baking stand with all proceeds directly going to the schools



WHAT IS HAF?

The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF)
Programme provides free activities and food
for children aged 4 to 16, and to 18 for those
with SEND, who are eligible for
Free School Meals (FSM) during the Easter,
Summer and Christmas Holidays.

Some of the fun activities available include sports camps (football, basketball, boxing, table tennis), music, dance, arts and crafts, adventure play, gardening, cooking, youth clubs and offsite trips!



You have to apply for income-related Free School Meals – it's not an automatic scheme.

This is different to other free lunch offers that are available universally.

If you think you could be entitled, please contact your school.


If you are FSM eligible, you'll also receive supermarket vouchers during all school holidays!

Friday 1st March

Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- Revisited the sounds the sounds /qu/ (queen) and /th/ (thorn). We also learnt another code for our previously taught sound, /ur/ (church). We learnt the er code, as in summer. Both codes make the same sound, but ur is usually found in the middle of words, whilst er is usually found at the end of words.
- Continued to practise the counting on method to solve equations in Maths.
 Some of us used our fingers to count on from the greater number, whilst some of us drew dots to visualise the parts, then counted them all to find the whole number.
- Read the story of Palm Sunday. We learnt that Christians believe Jesus
 is a special king and we thought about how we treat people who are
 special. We drew palm leaves and recorded the things that we would say
 to Jesus if he came into our school.
- Enjoyed our trip to the Saatchi Gallery. We saw lots of interesting artwork and made our own pieces of art in the workshop.
- Began our Understanding the World unit, Toys from the Past. We read
 The Toymaker by Martin Waddell and learnt how toys used to be made.
 We thought about the differences between old-fashioned toys and
 modern day toys.
- Wrote sentences containing adjectives to describe animals and fruit. We also read Handa's Hen by Eileen Browne. We ordered the stages in a lifecycle of a hen and wrote sentences to describe the changes that happen from egg to hen.

Next week, we will:

- Visit St. Luke's Church with Year One on the 7th March.
- Explore subtraction in Maths.
- Read The Magic Paintbrush by Julia Donaldson.


Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 1stMarch 2024



Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 1st March 2024

Year 2 have already made great progress in their latest english unit - Dread Cat and have thought carefully about interesting adverbs, conjunctions and noun phrases to make their writing more exciting. They spent the last part of the week writing an explanation text for Mice to help them escape dreaded cats.

Together we have started reading The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch – trying to develop prediction and inference skills as well as enjoying the story together with children reading to the rest of the class. We have also nearly finished reading The Bible together and now have an excellent understanding of the Bible Timeline, and the Easter story which is our focus in RE this term. We have talked a lot about symbolism in the Bible and in the Art around us.

Year 2 planned Kandinsky inspired landscapes of our local area — and will start painting there A3 sketches next week by using only the primary colours to mix up new colours and shades of paint!

We are developing our understanding of multiplication and division — with a focus on division. It's important to use the same language at home with your child to help them visualise the equation.

For example:

2 x 3 = 2 'lots of' 3 or 2 'groups of' 3

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

In English we have been exploring the genre of persuasive writing. As a class we have been learning about features such as formal tone, rhetorical questions, emotive language and adverbial phrases. We have been looking for these features in persuasive letters before we start to plan our own.

In Maths, we have started our topic on length and perimeter. We have revised mm, cm, m and km and have used our prior knowledge to make estimates of measurements. For example, is the door most likely to be 2mm or 2m in length?

On Monday we went to the Natural History Museum to participate in a 'Dino Dig' workshop. Students learnt about what being a paleontologist involves and even dug out their own dinosaur fossils. Year 3 had to carefully brush off dirt and debris to reveal a fossil and then identify the dinosaur using measuring tapes. It was great fun, and we learnt many exciting facts such as:

hirds are dinosaurs!

We were lucky enough to go on another trip on Thursday to the V&A museum for a Pattern workshop. In Art we have been looking at patterns from different cultures and how people use colour, contrast and detail to express their identity. The workshop was a great opportunity to learn more about Islamic Middle Eastern art and how patterns are used within this culture

Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 1st March

This week in English, we started our new fiction text: 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' by Philip Pullman. We read the first chapter and shared our thoughts about what is interesting about the author's style and language. We noticed how

In Guided Reading, we have started reading 'Stig of the Dump'. We looked at the front cover and read the blurb to make inferences. We used impressive sentences stems including; 'I predict', 'I deduce' and 'I observe' and then used subordinate clauses to add more detail to our sentences, such as, 'From what I and observe,' and 'Since there is a cave boy on the front cover, I think'

In Maths, we have been learning how to multiply 3-digit numbers by 1-digits with exchanging. We used the formal written method, ensuring the digits are in the correct place value columns. We then moved on to divide 2 and 3-digit numbers by 1-digit numbers using place value counters, base 10 and partitioning using a part-whole model.

In Computing, we started our unit on Data and Information Logging. We will considered what data can be collected and how it is collected and about data being collected over time. We then generated questions that can and can't be answered using available data, and reflected on the importance of collecting the right data to answer questions.

In Science, we have started our new unit called 'Power it up!' where we are

Learning at Christ Church Friday, 1st March 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. Year 5 are going to Westminster Abbey next Friday to visit a place of worship in line with our RE curriculum. Thank you to the adults who have signed up to come with us.

In English, Year 5 have started a new unit about poems. Children learned to discuss poems using vocabulary such as meter, rhyme, stanza and verse. Children compared and contrasted a classical poem with a modern poem written by Karl Nova. They considered how poetry can be influenced by other art forms such as rap. Finally, children have been analysing poems and their meaning and performing poems focusing on variations in intonation, speed, actions and volume.

In Maths, Year 5 learned about percentages. Children learned how to convert percentages into fractions and decimal numbers. Children learned how convert fractions into equivalent fractions over 100 in order to convert them to decimal numbers and percentages. Children have been using these skills to solve multistep reasoning problems.

In Science, children started a new unit about life cycles, focusing on humans. Children learned about the stages of the human life cycle and considered the significant changes that happens in each of them. For example, children explained that babies learn to walk and start talking and children go to school and develop friendships.

In RE, children learned about Sikh Weddings. They learned that Sikh weddings are called the ceremony of bliss and usually involve many traditions such as the bride wearing a red sari, the use of a chunni (scarf) to symbolise the union between the bride and the groom and the ceremony being performed in the Gurdwara in front of the Guru Granth Sahib.

In Geography, children started a new unit which focused on coasts. Children learned about erosion, the process of moving dirt and small pieces of rock from one place to the other (usually by water). Children found out about how erosion created the Grand Canyon and where rivers get most of their water from (aquifers and melting glaciers).

In Computing, children have been programming their crumble devices and used selection (an 'if...then...' statement) to direct the flow of their program.

In DT, children finished designing and building their musical instruments out of recycled materials.

Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church

Friday 1st March 2024

English: In English this week, we have continued our newly started English unit: Tales in a Historic Context. This week, students have learnt more about specific events of World War 2 and how it shaped the authors perspective. Students investigated significant events of that period, such as Kristallnacht, and using that as a source, students wrote a diary entry from the perspective of a Jewish or German child during that time.

Maths: This week in Maths, we have started our new Maths topic of Algebra. This week the class has learnt about One and Two Step function machines. Students have been challenged to follow and create function machines to solve equations with unknown variables.

RE Trip: On Monday, Year 6 battled the wind and had a trip to Wimbledon Buddhist Temple (BUDDHAPADIPA). The Buddhapadipa temple was the first Thai Buddhist temple to be built in the UK. The inside of the temple is a beautifully painted mural which spans all four walls, and it is painted from floor to ceiling! During our visit, students learn about Buddhism from a real Buddhist monk. The class had some interesting questions about Buddhism and the monk's restrictive life. Did you know that Buddhist monks live by a set of 227 rules that they must follow.

Immersive Performance: I want to say thank you to Mr Tolley who organised and instructed the drama performance this week. The kids had fun and I hope the parents enjoyed it too. It is great to see students dive into the dramatic arts as it gives children an avenue to express and challenge themselves. Well, done everyone!
