A Message from Mrs. Hawkins regarding Internet Safety:

Gaming and Social Media

As you know, we have a no phone policy at school and have had for the last three years. This has had a positive effect on reducing the issues around cyberbullying and problems with phones being used inappropriately on journeys to and from school. It has also had the effect of encouraging more parents to drop off and collect their children rather than getting them to do that alone, which also causes lots of problems if they are not ready. What all my teachers and learning support assistants still report on is the worrying amount of time many children seem to be on screens at home, either gaming or using social media, which is not appropriate for their age. Many children seem to be going to bed late because they have been on a screen, and this is not good for them and certainly will not help their reading attainment if this is a substitute for reading a book. Just to remind you that What's App age is 16 +, and that makes so much sense as being able to navigate the problems around group chats is hard enough for adults, let alone primary school children. It will undoubtedly cause problems that children are not experienced enough to deal with. Children need to learn how to communicate and deal with friends face to face before they can do it virtually. Please think very carefully about how you are parenting your child and the access you give them to both gaming and social media.

We are running an Internet safety meeting with Childnet on Monday 29th April at 7pm in Cadogan Gardens. Please put it in your diary and come along.

We all need to think more about how our children are accessing screens at home.

REMINDER—WE ARE A NUT FREE SCHOOL!

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop mild or potentially life-threatening allergic reactions. If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

Some foods, especially after school snacks, need to be checked for their ingredients. Snacks for break time should be FRUIT or VEGETABLES only. NO SWEETS or CHOCOLATE

allowed at school or after school clubs. Please can you check that you have no nut products in the lunch boxes or brought into the school:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Granola bars
- Cakes
- Biscuits / Cookies

This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely. We appreciate your help and respect with this and know that you understand the importance of this rule in place.


SATURDAY 20th APRIL FUNDRAISING FOR CCHT

TCS will give £10 to our school for every child under the age of 17 who completes their distance!

The TCS Mini London Marathon invites schools to bring their children and young people to run, jog, walk, or wheel one mile or 2.6K in the heart of the capital.

The event is free to enter, and what's more, our title partner, TCS, is giving schools £10 for every participant aged 17 or under who finishes the event! Participants cross the iconic TCS London Marathon Finish Line and receive a TCS Mini London Marathon medal.

The 2024 event will take place on 20 April, and we want as many children as possible to be able to take part, so there is a one-mile event for children in Reception to Year 7 and a 2.6K route for those in Years 4 to 12 who can go a bit further.



Money for schools!

For every participant aged 17 or under who finishes the TCS Mini London Marathon, our title partner TCS will donate £10 to their school to spend on PE or IT equipment. So, the more children who take part and get active, the more money your school will raise!


WE ARE LOOKING FOR PARENT VOLUNTEERS TO ACCOMPANY THE CHILDREN IN THE TCS MINI MARATHON

CHRIST CHURCH HAS BEEN SELECTED TO TAKE PART IN THE TCS LONDON MARATHON, IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO JOIN THE CHILDREN WE HAVE SPACE FOR 20 ADULTS TO JOIN THE 2.6KM START (WE NEED TO MEET THIS RATIO) AND 40 ADULT SPACES ARE REQUIRED FOR THE 1 MILE STARTING POINT.

Our participants' safety is our top priority. The event takes place on a closed, secure route (see maps above) with stewards and a dedicated Welfare Team on the course to make sure all children have a safe and enjoyable experience. All participants need to be escorted to a safe and secure 'drop off' zone at the Start Area.

Children in Year 3 or above on Event Day can complete the route on their own, while children in Reception to Year 2 need to be accompanied on the course, with a minimum ratio of one adult for every eight children. Participants will also need to be collected from a safe and secure zone by the Finish Line.



T's & C's

- There is a £50 non refundable deposit to secure a selling table (it is possible to share tables with other parents to reduce cost but please ensure payment for the table is made by one of you and sort out split costs amongst yourselves)

- 20% of your profits are to be donated to the schools within 48 hours
- Entrance donation fee on the door $\pounds 2$ minimum
- Each table holder is responsible for set up and set down, all items must be removed from the premises. Tables can be loaned by the school with prior arrangement.
- Each table holder should have their bank details printed ready to take bank transfers for payment if they so wish; alternatively, they can accept cash but they are to manage their own petty cash

Donut Feed the Squirrels (ages 6-8 & up)

When Norma and Belly spy a donut truck near to the forest, they desperately want a sweet, delicious donut for breakfast. Yet when the grumpy donut seller sprays the hungry squirrels with water instead of giving them what they want, Norma and Belly hatch a plan to get inside the donut van and help themselves – and add some chestnuts into the mix for extra yumminess.

Things are going very well until the donut machine explodes, and the donut seller catches Normal and Belly cake-handed. Fortunately, the squirrels escape – leaving the donut seller with a huge mess to clear up, and inspiration for a new donut flavour...

Mika Song's sweet, amusing and simple graphic novel about two naughty squirrels features large panels and brief text, meaning that this is a suitable read for

younger and middle primary readers, especially any young reader who enjoys animal friendships and gentle humour. It's a quick read which is also arranged into chapters, which adds a layer of ease and accessibility to the reading process. Plus, there's donuts. What else could you really ask for?



Friday 22rd March

Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- Revisited the long sound /oo/ (boot), the short sound /oo/ (cook) and /oa/ (boat) in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Used mathematical language to compare objects by their height and length. We found objects around the school which were taller or shorter than us. We painted our hands and compared who had the longest and shortest fingers. We also ordered the class by height.
- Read The Great Race by Emily Hiles. We learnt which Chinese zodiac
 animal we are and wrote sentences to describe our attributes. The
 children born in 2018 are the year of the dog, whilst the children born
 in 2019 are the year of the pig. We also took part in our very own great
 race around the beach and wrote a recount about it.
- Read the Easter story and learnt about the symbolism of the cross for Christians. It is a symbol of God's love. We went on a hunt to spot crosses around our school and covered our beach in chalk crosses. We also discussed the importance of saying sorry. Christians believe that God loves us and will forgive us if we apologise for our mistakes.
- Became toy-makers from the past and made toy rabbits from old socks.
 The children really impressed me with their perseverance ©
- Made imaginary creatures using wool and glue. It was very tricky and required lots of concentration, but we had lots of fun and tried our best.

Next week, we will:

- Revisit the codes /ar/, /or/ and /ur/.
- Explore mass and capacity during our Maths lessons.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 22nd March 2024

In English, we have continued our unit on 'The Clock Tower'. We thought about the main character the little girl and wrote some descriptive sentences about the little girls face, clothes, movement, job and feelings. We then explored the feelings of the characters in The Clock Tower and how the little girl must have felt going outside to darkness and the world frozen.

In Maths this week, we have been looking at length and height. We have measured things using centimetres and blocks.

For Alphabet Code this week we have been looking at the /w/ code and writing sentences using this code. Next week, we will practice our spelling using the different codes.

In Guided Reading we have been reading 'Zog' by Julia Donaldson. We have identified rhyming words and repeated phrases and thought carefully about why an author repeats certain sentences and words throughout a story.

In Science, we have continued looking at our unit on 'Sustainability' we have thought about how we can help and care for our planet. We thought about how we must stop using so much single use plastic for things and instead use reusable bags and water bottles.

Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 22nd March 2024

This week, Year 2 visited the National Gallery to explore Art further – using their super power of looking to think about texture, colour and to try and understand why people, and objects, have been depicted in a certain way. They behaved exceptionally well throughout the afternoon and represented the school brilliantly. I am very proud of them all.







Throughout the week, we have been reading lots of books and finished the Bible on Wednesday morning. We were able to link our school virtues to the stories in the Bible and have been able to visualise the bible timeline alongside learning about Easter in RE. Next week, Year 2 will be acting out the part of The Last Supper in our Easter Assembly.

Year 2 are writing their last extended piece of writing for the term and will be editing and publishing these stories next week. We have been reading 'The Dark' by Lemony Snicket, and have used this story to write our own versions of a character who overcomes a fear. As mentioned in their whole class special mentions, they are continuing to shine as mini authors. As a collective, they use such ambitious adjectives and verbs, interesting descriptive phrases and even some descriptive techniques like onomatopia and similes.

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

This week Y3 continued with Spyfox in English. We looked at a range of newspaper articles to understand how witnesses are introduced, what questions are asked of them and how to use quotation marks correctly.





In Maths, we looked at perimeters and how to calculate them. Y3 went outside to measure the perimeter of the piazza with different measuring tools such as trundle wheels, measuring tapes and meter long rulers.

learning about

In Computing we have been databases and how to display

information. We have been using a program called J2Data to use the branching tool to organise information by criterion. For example, we sorted insects based on appearance, colour or ability ('Does it have legs?' 'Can it fly?'). It took critical thinking and creativity to sort all 15 insects into branches. Students can have a go at this free program at home.

KS2 athletics on Wednesday was a great day out! Y3 loved having the opportunity to compete. Swimming will recommence next week.



Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 22nd March

This week in English, we continued to read 'The Firework-Maker's Daughter'. We revised using fronted adverbials at the beginning of a sentence. We wrote a short description of the full moon ceremony using exciting adjectives, fronted adverbials and subordinate clauses. We then used our green pen to review our writing and check our punctuation was accurate.

In Maths, we have been measuring and calculating the perimeter of rectilinear shapes. We explored the strategy of adding double the length to double the width to work out the perimeter of rectangles. We know that a know that a rectilinear shape has straight lines that meet at right angles. We also learn that standard units are commonly used units of measurement, which help us measure length, height, weight, temperature, mass and more. These units are standardised, which means that everyone gets the same understanding of the size, weight and other properties of objects and things. We measured the rectilinear shapes in centimetres and metres.

In Science, we explored patterns by altering circuits and making comparative tests. Our goal was to test what happens to the brightness of one bulb when more batteries are used. We then wanted to see what happens to the brightness of each bulb when more bulbs are added. Year Four systematically planned their investigation before building their circuits. After finding out what happens to the brightness of the bulb(s) in each case, they drew a picture of their different circuits.

Year Four had a brilliant time at the athletics afternoon in Battersea Millennium Athletics Arena on Wednesday. They participated in the sprint and relay races, showing amazing resilience and motivation. Well done to the whole of Year Four for supporting all your friends at Christ Church and Holy Trinity!

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- In a circuit, what happens to the brightness of one bulb when more batteries are
 used?
- What units of measurement would you use to measure the length of a book?
- What might cause a break in a circuit?

Learning in Year 5 at Christ Church Friday, 22nd March 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. Thank you to all the adults who came to Kew Gardens with us. We had a lovely time orienteering ourselves across the grounds and we had a lot of fun visiting attractions such as the giant treetop walkway and the log trail. This Wednesday, Year 5 also took part in an athletics tournament, in which the children showed great enthusiasm, team spirit and sportsmanship.

In English Year 5 wrote a poem about the four seasons inspired by Karl Nova. Children brainstormed important milestones that repeat themselves every year such as having to wrap up in thick coats in winter or celebrating the end of a school year in summer and incorporated these ideas in their poems. Children also carefully considered how to make their poems rhythm and used hyperboles, personifications and similes to create vivid descriptions.

In Reading, Year 5 have been reading chapter 8 and 9 of Kensuke's Kingdom and analysing the text, focusing on inferencing questions and summarising skills.

In Maths, Year 5 learned how to estimate the area of a shape using a scale and squared paper. Year 5 also started a new unit focusing on statistics. Year 5 learned how to interpret line graphs and how to record data in a line graph, making decisions about scale and labels.

In Science, Year 5 learned about the gestation period in mammal. The gestation period is the number of days the unborn baby spends in the mother's womb. Children learned that most of the time, the bigger the mammal, the longer its gestation period. Children compared and contrasted the gestation periods of a variety of mammals using a timeline and they created a bar graph to visualise how the size of an animal can impact the length of its gestation period.

In Computing, children learned how to use the 'and' and 'or' functions to refine searches in a database.

In Art, children learned about an artist called El Anatsui, a sculptor from Ghana who transforms simple, everyday materials into large-scale sculptures. Children learned that this artist uses materials such as discarded water bottle caps to touch upon broader topics such as climate change for example.



Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church Friday 22nd March 2024

English: In English this week, we have continued our newly started English unit: Tales in a Historic Context. This week, the class has learnt about how to authors add intricate details to character to add extra depth to the overall story. These details can be simple adjectives, language of clothing or actions or even using metaphors to describe the character. The class used this knowledge to find evidence from the text about many characters from a text.

Maths: This week in Maths, we started our next unit of Decimals. The class has learnt about place value, decimals places and rounding (of tenths, hundredths, and thousandths) this week.

Swimming Trials and Athletics afternoon:

On Wednesday, Year 6 had an extremely sporty day. Ten students volunteered to attend swimming trials. These students needed to be confident and strong swimmers to participate. Congratulations to everyone who swam!

Later that day, KS2 from both Holy Trinity and Christ Church had an Athletics afternoon. Year 6 left at 12:30 and walked to Battersea Park Millennium Arena. The students participated in a range of running races (sprints and relays) competing against their peers. It was an enjoyable day of fun and fitness.



Trip to the Royal Courts of Justice: On Monday, Year 6 had a deeply engaging day at the Royal Courts of Justice in Temple. In preparation for the trip, students were assigned roles such as Judge, Juror, Solicitor, Witness, Barrister, Usher, or Clerk. We arrived at the Court house and escorted through the courts into an unused court room. The class had many questions about the court room and how they are used. After the questions, the class became actors and embodied the roles which they had been assigned. Some students wore black gowns and wigs when in their roles, while others had to read scripts and answer questions. All students played important roles to determine if the person was guilty of Cyberbullying. Using evidence and beyond reasonable doubt, the person was found guilty.
