

When is St David's Day? Today. St David's Day is celebrated on 1st March


What is St David's Day?



- There is a £50 non refundable deposit to secure a selling table (it is possible to share tables with other parents to reduce cost but please ensure payment for the table is made by one of you and sort out split costs amongst yourselves)
- If you require a hanging rail please mention to Katie Rose
- 20% of your profits are to be donated to the schools within 48 hours
- Entrance donation fee on the door £2 minimum
- Each table holder is responsible for set up and set down, all items must be removed from the premises. Tables can be loaned by the school with prior arrangement.

WHAT IS HAF?

The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme provides free activities and food for children aged 4 to 16, and to 18 for those with SEND, who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) during the Easter, Summer and Christmas Holidays.

Some of the fun activities available include sports camps (football, basketball, boxing, table tennis), music, dance, arts and crafts, adventure play, gardening, cooking, youth clubs and offsite trips!

AM I ELIGIBLE FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

You have to apply for income-related Free School Meals – it's not an automatic scheme.

This is different to other free lunch offers that are available universally.

If you think you could be entitled, please contact your school.

If you are FSM eligible, you'll also receive supermarket vouchers during all school holidays!

I'M NOT ELIGIBLE FOR FSM, CAN I STILL ATTEND?

This week the children have learnt:

Please continue to go through the tricky words in their tricky words book, thank you.

Maths - we introduced the concept of subtraction.

They have been playing subtraction games and understanding that when we subtract, the quantity gets smaller.

'There are 10 people on the bus, two get off. How many are left?'

History – We have started a new topic 'Toys from the Past', we begun by reading the story 'The Toy maker'. We looked at some toys from the past and discussed the similarities and differences to toys the children have at home.

Extra homework:

Interview a family member or friend (adult) about toys.

Children to make a recording of the interview: 2 questions and answers

Upload film or Show and Tell in class

Focus on the language and vocabulary that they use- pick out key words and start to make a word bank.




Dear Parents,

It was nice to see some of you on Tuesday and discuss your child's progress.

This week, in English, the children watched a short clip of a story called The Clock Tower. It's a clip without words that shows the story of a ballerina who lives in a clock tower. When she stops dancing, the clock freezes and the town becomes gloomy. The children worked in teams to sequence the story and though of adjectives to describe the main scene.

In Maths, we worked out number problems and completed addition and subtraction sentences by finding out the difference.

In maths this week, we are using the multiplication symbol to represent equal groups along with sharing equally. We have been representing these using arrays, please continue to practice this for this week's homework.

Following our trip to the National Gallery, Year 2 had fantastic facts to share. Thank you for your research that you completed for homework! It was incredible to read and the inspired art looks fantastic on our WOW wall. This week we began to explore the work of Kandinsky. We listened to his favourite classical composer and thought of the shapes and colours we felt through the music. We then created our own inspired abstract art.

In Geography, we explored the continent of Australasia and learnt lots about Whale Sharks that swim nearby.

In RE we are beginning our unit on Easter and started by recounting the Easter story. Through this unit, we will reflect on key symbols and enjoy a visit to St Paul's Cathedral.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3


Friday 1st March 2024

In English this week, we began writing our newspaper articles about the events of Spyfox. We worked hard to lay out our pages carefully, form a eye-catching headline, and to include an introduction, good content and quotes.

In Maths, we have been learning about measurement and equivalent lengths. We know that there are 10mm in 1cm, and 100cm in 1m. We have used this information to solve problems and make conversions.

You do

Mrs. Hawkins measures the length of her desk. It is 250cm long. How long is Mrs. Hawkins' desk in cm and m?



In Science, we thought about how rocks are used in every day life. We looked at how some rocks can be man made and then we explored rocks around our school.

In RE, we began our Easter unit. For our first lesson, we thought about the role of Judas in the Easter story. We discussed why Judas did what he did and how he may have felt once he betrayed Jesus.






Highlights of this week include:

Maths

This week children developed their understanding of mixed numbers through partitioning mixed numbers in different ways. Part-whole models and bar models were used as key representations that allowed



children to see how a mixed number is being partitioned. Children also labelled the fractions on number lines by picking out the number of intervals between each of the whole numbers. The positions of mixed numbers on blank number lines were also identified. We finished the week comparing and ordering mixed numbers and exploring improper fractions.

English

We continued our unit on Phillip Pullman's The Firework-Makers Daughter. Children reenacted a scene from the book where Lila has an argument with her father. Doing this, the children were able to explore both character's feelings and intentions. We then used this work to plan and write a letter to from Lila to her father, explaining why she was leaving home.

Geography

In Geography this week, children added information researched from their home learning to their posters which they created last week at school. The posters were developed by children in pairs and each pair presented their posters to the rest of the class.

Science

For this week's lesson, children explored the processes that occur within the water cycle. To begin with, they completed a diagram of the water cycle by labelling the name of the processes (such as evaporation, condensation and transpiration). Children then went onto 'hot seat' one another - testing their knowledge of the processes that happen within the water cycle.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 5 - Friday 1st March 2024

What a busy week in Year 5!

We are learning about the story Wonder. We are learning about how Summer sat with August at lunch [and what that means for August]. - Toska

In maths we have been learning about multiplying by 1, 2, 3 and 4 digits. Using different ways such as column method, area model and place value. We have different opinions on which one is easiest. - Dina

Coasts are when water meets the land and the Jurassic Coast is what we are learning about. It is where we are going at Osmington Bay. - Leo

In art this week we are learning about textiles and fabrics. We looked at the boat in a bottle by an African artist Yinka Shonibare. Afterwards, we made our own 4th Pillars. - Chryssa

We have read seven chapters of the book so far. In class we have tried to read Stanley's mind on how he thought the lake at Camp Green Lake looked. - Sanidhya

In science this week, we have been learning about the younger stages in life. We also said that we change a lot from when you're a baby both physically and inside yourself - Isabella

In spelling and handwriting we have been practicing our words and testing each other. - Abigail

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

Friday 1st March 2024

This week in maths, we continued looking at ratio. We looked at using a ratio sign, the similarities between ratio and fractions and how to use scale drawings.

In English we started our new topic by recapping the differences between informal and formal language and style of writing. We discussed when both formats would be used and the features that are specific to each one.

In DT we completed our 'shelters' topic by writing a set of instructions on how to make a tepee. We focused on using imperative verbs, different sentence starters and following the format of a non-fiction, procedural piece of writing.

On Tuesday we had our trip to the beautiful Buddhapadipa Temple. We were shown around the temple, recapped our understanding of the religion and learnt about the history of the building.



Thank you to all the parents who I met with this week, thank you for your time and it was great to celebrate how well your children are doing!

Year 6, today is the day you find out which secondary school you are going to. Regardless of the news you receive today, please remember that each of you are brilliant, kind, hardworking and wonderful human beings.
