

Can we please remind you we are a nut free school

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop mild or potentially life-threatening allergic reactions. If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

Some foods, especially after school snacks, need to be checked for their ingredients. Snacks for break time should be **FRUIT** or **VEGETABLES** only. NO **SWEETS** or **CHOCOLATE** allowed at school or after school clubs. So please can we ask that you have no nut products in the lunch boxes or brought into the school:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Granola bars
- Cakes
- Biscuits / Cookies



This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely. We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it.

- We ask you to support and extend the children's learning by accompanying them on this expedition. The children will get most out of the trip by adults speaking and listening and pointing out areas of interest.
- When walking with the class/group, please ensure that you are on the road-side.
 There will be designated road crossers and you will be informed if this is part of your job by the member of staff in charge.
- Please be aware we walk in a crocodile with a staff member at the front and the rear.
- Be aware of children's safety at all times, and if in doubt check any concerns with the member of staff in charge.

- From Year 1 onwards parents must not be expected to be paired with their child.

Without you this trip would not be able to go ahead. Thank you for your time, support and kindness.




SATURDAY 20th APRIL FUNDRAISING FOR CCHT

TCS will give £10 to our school for every child under the age of 17 who completes their distance!

The TCS Mini London Marathon invites schools to bring their children and young people to run, jog, walk, or wheel one mile or 2.6K in the heart of the capital.

The event is free to enter, and what's more, our title partner, TCS, is giving schools £10 for every participant aged 17 or under who finishes the event! Participants cross the iconic TCS London Marathon Finish Line and receive a TCS Mini London Marathon medal.

The 2024 event will take place on 20 April, and we want as many children as possible to be able to take part, so there is a one-mile event for children in Reception to Year 7 and a 2.6K route for those in Years 4 to 12 who can go a bit further.



Money for schools!

For every participant aged 17 or under who finishes the TCS Mini London Marathon, our title partner TCS will donate £10 to their school to spend on PE or IT equipment. So, the more children who take part and get active, the more money your school will raise!

Since the London Marathon started in 1981, its participants have raised more than £1 billion for good causes – so why not make your TCS Mini London Marathon a fundraising event and raise money for your school or our charity partner <u>WWF-UK</u>.

Our participants' safety is our top priority. The event takes place on a closed, secure route (see maps above) with stewards and a dedicated Welfare Team on the course to make sure all children have a safe and enjoyable experience. All participants need to be escorted to a safe and secure 'drop off' zone at the Start Area.

Children in Year 3 or above on Event Day can complete the route on their own, while children in Reception to Year 2 need to be accompanied on the course, with a minimum ratio of one adult for every eight children. Participants will also need to be collected from a safe and secure zone by the Finish Line.

Keedie (ages 9-11 & up) Author: Elle McNicoll Publisher: Knights Of



Teenagers Keedie and Nina are twins. But that doesn't mean they are alike – in fact, right now, it feels like they've never had less in common.

With their 14th birthdays approaching, Nina is more interested in fitting in, vlogging and her first boyfriend. Whilst for neurodivergent Keedie, it's a time of powerful realisation. She's tired of having to try to conform, and of witnessing injustice and hypocrisy. Above all, she's had enough of seeing people who are different getting picked on.

It's time to fight back against a bully-infested school and the narrow-minded attitudes of their small town of Juniper. So Keedie sets up an anti-bullying agency, resolving to stand up for all those who need it – none more so than her beloved little sister Addie.

This middle grade novel embraces universal themes of family, friendship, love and acceptance, with pitch-perfect nuance and sensitivity. It's a powerful but accessible book about what it really means to be brave and kind. We are reminded that bullying doesn't just involve physical punches also culpable are those who follow, snigger, whisper or ignore.

It's all very well for a school to declare that it doesn't allow bullying and to urge every pupil to 'be yourself' but this heroine calls for actions as well as words, and reminds us of the uncomfortable truth that adults can be guilty of bias too.

This is a prequel to <u>A Kind of Spark</u>, but also works as a stand-alone novel. Touching and lyrical but never sentimental, this is storytelling at its best – authentic and compelling.




Friday 15th March 2024




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 15th March 2024

In English this week, we wrote our short stories inspired by the events in 'Arthur and the Golden Rope.' We worked hard to include the features of good storytelling such as, adjectives, adverbs, alliteration, and we tried to vary our sentences by starting with a verb and using subordinating conjunctions.

In Maths, we finished our unit on length and perimeter. We looked at calculating perimeter and using the perimeter to work out the length of a side of a shape. Next week, we will be learning about fractions!




As part of RE week this week, we visited Westminster Cathedral. We were very lucky to be given a tour of the different chapels, and to see lots of the beautiful mosaics. We tried to spot different animals within the mosaics and we learnt about the significance of these animals.

All week, we have had the wonderfully talented Adam Stanley working with Year 3 to make their mosaic, which is based on their designs. 
Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 15th March 2024

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

We continued our fractions unit by exploring adding and subtracting fractions with the same denominator. First, we added and subtracted proper fractions and then did the same with fractions and mixed numbers. We used number lines to support adding and subtracting by



counting on (adding) and backwards (subtraction). Next, children went on to combine knowledge of adding and subtracting two or more fractions with their understanding of mixed numbers to add fractions and mixed numbers. Finally, we added and subtracted from whole amounts.

English

We started the week learning how to analyse a story structure using a Story Mountain. This approach asks children to segment a story into an 'introduction', the 'build up', the 'problem' (climax), the 'resolution' and finally the 'ending'. Children went onto use this structure to plan a modern tale based on the character Razvani, from the Firework-Maker's Daughter. After this, children gave feedback to their peer's story structure which included www (what went well) and ebi (even better if). Each child had to explain their feedback and then the children worked to improve each other's plans.

History

This week we answered the question, 'Why was the River Nile so important to Ancient Egypt?'
Answers included the floods that left soil by the riverbanks ideal for growing crops, the
Egyptians ingenious irrigation systems and the use of the Nile River to support trade and
transport.

Art

We began our unit 'Journeys' which explores three famous artists Marc Chagall, Leonora Carrington and Emily Kame Kngwarreye, all of whom are significant figures within the art movement Surrealism. In this unit, we will be learning about these artists' cultures, lives and artwork; how an artist's life affects their art and understand the importance of fantasy, symbolism and communication within art. Children will learn to look and talk about how and why these artists use composition, scale, colour, line and perspective. Also, throughout the unit we will compare and contrast their use of different techniques for drawing and painting.



Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 5 -Friday 14th March 2024

Year 5 have turned themselves into poets this week!

We've started a new English unit, looking at a poet named Karl Nova. We first watched him recite his poem, Poetry?, which talks about his changing experiences with poetry, from thinking it's boring to understanding that poetry can be anything you want it to be. We then watched his poem Change, and are now going to start writing our own poems based on it! Together, we created a big class brainstorm, collecting everyone's ideas on one page. Then, we started planning our own poems. We will write them next week!

Whole Class Brainstorm:

- Changes moving through school (e.g. from reception to year 5)
 How our school work gets harder
- Seasons (autumn, summer, spring, winter)
- From baby to adult (like we've been learning in science puberty)
- Moving houses
- Global warming
- How a city/town changes
- Likes and dislikes
- Pandemic to now
- The environment





In maths, we have started applying everything we have learnt in our multiplication and division unit to some word problems. This is an example of the types of questions we've been doing!

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6

Friday 15th March 2024

This week in maths, we started our new topic of Algebra. We looked at forming expressions and equations, substitution of information and how to use formulae. We used the 'say what you see' phrase to support our understanding and we are looking forward to solving algebraic equations next week.

In English we looked at how a character's tone will change depending on who they are talking to.
We focused on using 'show not tell' in our writing by describing the character's body language and facial
expressions and using speech verbs to show their feelings.

In history we started looking at the Vikings. We learnt about what happened on the 8th June 793 AD at Lindisfarne but in particular at the evidence and whether we could trust it. We recapped the differences between primary and secondary sources and agreed that we shouldn't believe everything that one source says. Instead, we should read several accounts and gather as much evidence as possible.

In art we started looking at Pop Art. We started by learning about when pop art first started, the main artists associated with that time and the messages this type of art was trying to portray. We used the iPads to research the main artists, what inspired them and what mediums they used.

On Monday, as part of RE week we went on a trip to St Batholomew the Great. We saw some fascinating pieces of art by Damien Hirst, learnt about the history of the church (which is now 901 years old!) and sketched some of the artwork or architecture that caught our eye.
