


Can we please remind you we are a nut free school

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop mild or potentially life-threatening allergic reactions. If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

Some foods, especially after school snacks, need to be checked for their ingredients. Snacks for break time should be **FRUIT** or **VEGETABLES** only. NO **SWEETS** or **CHOCOLATE** allowed at school or after school clubs. So please can we ask that you have no nut products in the lunch boxes or brought into the school:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Granola bars
- Cakes
- Biscuits / Cookies



This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely. We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it.





Gaming and Social Media

As you know, we have a no phone policy at school and have had for the last three years. This has had a positive effect on reducing the issues around cyberbullying and problems with phones being used inappropriately on journeys to and from



What all my teachers and learning support assistants still report on is the worrying amount of time many children seem to be on screens at home, either gaming or using social media, which is not appropriate for their age. Many children seem to be going to bed late because they have been on a screen, and this is not good for them and certainly will not help their reading attainment if this is a substitute for reading a book.

Just to remind you that What's App age is 13, and that makes so much sense as being able to navigate the problems around group chats is hard enough for adults, let alone primary school children. It will undoubtedly cause problems that children are not experienced enough to deal with. Children need to learn how to communicate and deal with friends face to face before they can do it virtually. Please think very carefully about how you are parenting your child and the access you give them to both gaming and social media.

We are running an Internet safety meeting with Childnet on Monday 29th April at 7pm in Cadogan Gardens. Please put it in your diary and come along.

We all need to think more about how our children are accessing screens at home.

Comic Relief Red Nose Day 2024




TCS Mini London Marathon

- Tea, coffee and homemade baking stand with all proceeds directly going to the schools



Donut Feed the Squirrels (ages 6-8 & up) Author: Mika Song Publisher: Pushkin Children's Books



When Norma and Belly spy a donut truck near to the forest, they desperately want a sweet, delicious donut for breakfast. Yet when the grumpy donut seller sprays the hungry squirrels with water instead of giving them what they want, Norma and Belly hatch a plan to get inside the donut van and help themselves – and add some chestnuts into the mix for extra yumminess.

Things are going very well until the donut machine explodes, and the donut seller catches Normal and Belly cake-handed. Fortunately, the squirrels escape – leaving the donut seller with a huge mess to clear up, and inspiration for a new donut flavour...

Mika Song's sweet, amusing and simple graphic novel about two naughty squirrels features large panels and brief text, meaning that this is a suitable read for

younger and middle primary readers, especially any young reader who enjoys animal friendships and gentle humour. It's a quick read which is also arranged into chapters, which adds a layer of ease and accessibility to the reading process. Plus, there's donuts. What else could you really ask for?

English- We have continued with our journey around the world and this week we have listened to the story 'Tortoise's Dream'.

Maths - In Maths, we have focused on mass and capacity.

Vocabulary introduced: heavier, lighter, the same balance full, nearly full, half-full, nearly empty and empty.





Friday 22nd March 2024

Dear Parents,

This week, in English, we have commenced a new story book: Alan's Big, Scary Teeth. The children used adjectives to describe the alligator from the story, they used the conjunction 'and' to join two sentences together and they wrote non-chronological report based on facts about alligators.

In Maths, the children learnt about length and height. They compared objects and used the vocabulary: long/ short, tall/short, the longest, the shortest, the tallest, longer than, shorter than, taller than. They measured objects using other objects such as cubes, paperclips and rubbers. They also measured objects in centimetres using a ruler. They learnt that objects need to be aligned with 0cm for the measurement to be accurate.

"The book is 15 cubes long"

"The highlighter is 7 paperclips long"

"The water bottle is 18 cm long"

This week Year Two have produced incredible stories based on the text 'My Grandma and me'. Year Two worked incredibly hard to use a range of similes, conjunctions and questions. Sofia wrote, 'One peaceful morning as the birds were singing my Grandma pulled the curtains as soft as a pillow.' Hannah wrote, 'When is the bread being delivered? I can smell it already!' We are hoping to get a copy of these to you very soon.

In Maths, we have been developing our understanding of measure. We

have been using rulers and metre sticks to measure a range of items around our school. Later we challenged ourselves to answer a range of operations questions using measure units.

As part of our computing unit, we have been learning about presenting data through pictograms. This week Alona visited us and shared more about her job as a Data Analysis. We learnt that questions could be presented through data and graphs. We created a bar chart to work out which month would be the busiest for birthday parties and a pie chart to show which is the largest producer of car parts.

In our Art lesson, we created a beautiful portraits practicing our shading and sketching skills.

Ophelia and family have shared a beautiful tradition of Persian New Year. We explored the symbolism of the beginning of spring and even got to try some delicious Lavashaks!

In RE we have reflected on our visit to St Pauls Cathedral and begun our preparations for the Easter Assembly next week.




Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 3

Friday 22nd March 2024

This week in English, we finished writing our own short story based on the adventures in Arthur and the Golden Rope. We then planned and wrote a diary entry as one of the characters. We numbered the main events of the story before getting into character. We needed to think about our character's emotions as well as their actions.

In Maths, we have continued learning about fractions. This week, we learnt about unit fractions (a fraction with a numerator of 1), the meaning of the numerator and the denominator and ordering and comparing unit fractions.



denominator the larger the fraction.

In RE, we wrote our diary entries retelling the events of Easter Sunday. To prepare us for this, we sequenced and retold the events of the Easter story. We then thought about how Mary mother of Jesus and Mary Magdalene would have been feeling at different points on Easter Sunday.

In Science, we continued our topic of fossils. Last week, we learnt what fossils are and discovered that fossils can include the remains of animals, plants and footprints! This week, we learnt about how fossils are formed through fossilisation.

In Art, we created our own printing blocks using polystyrene to create a printed repeating pattern.

On Wednesday, we took part in the KS2 Athletics Afternoon. Thank you to everyone who escorted us there and back, and to everyone who came to watch. The children had such a fun afternoon!


Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 4

Friday 22nd March 2024

Highlights of this week include:

Maths

We completed our fractions unit with learning how to subtract from mixed numbers using bar models and number lines. Firstly, we discovered what happens when a whole number is subtracted from a mixed number and then a fraction that does not cross a whole from a mixed number. Once this was secure, children completed subtractions that cross a whole number, using different methods. We spent the next lesson consolidating understanding of fractions by identifying common misconceptions



surrounding learning about fractions. Children then carried out an end of unit assessment, to identify target areas through marking the assessments as a class.

English

Children continued to work on their modern tales by writing their introductions to their pieces. This included using a range of conjunctions, describing the setting and using fronted adverbials. Year 4 then wrote their first drafts, which included work carried out last week (their plans) and their introductions. Many children shared their drafts with the class by reading out their tales and then received feedback from the audience (their friends!).

PE.

On Wednesday, we attended an athletics event at Battersea Millennium Arena. This involved sprint races and included children from KS2 within the federation. Year 4 were noticeable for their terrific approach to the whole event; the way they entered with enthusiasm, integrity and generosity of spirit.

Science

This week's lesson began with a recap of knowledge from our Sound unit. These involved children ordering a sequence of statements describing how sound travels from a source to our ears. After this, we explored our new science topic Electricity by looking at the Learning Brief. This helped children understand what we would be learning about in this new topic.

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 5 - Friday 21st March 2024

Year 5 have turned themselves into poets this week!

This week in RE we learned about Palm Sunday and Maundy Thursday. On Palm Sunday, people hold palm crosses to remember when Jesus went to Jerusalem. On Maundy Thursday, a ceremony takes place to remember the last supper. - Nomin

In PSHE this week we did a quiz on eligible jobs for us. A lady also came in and told us how to recognise anxiety and depression. Last but not least, we had a lesson on stereotypes and how we would respect each others' dream jobs. - Maya

This week in Athletics, we had some races and relays. There were finals too! Some people did not make it but that's okay, we also went against Christ Church. - Annabel

In Maths we have been learning how to add, subtract, divide and multiply fractions. - Marcus

This week in Reading, we have been reading a book called Holes. In Holes, there is a boy named Stanley and he is sent to Camp Green Lake. - Teo

In Science, we have been learning about how long mammals go through gestation. Our class made a graph to represent this. - Elena

In Drama we are learning and practising scripts that we are going to perform in the cellar theatre. So far we are practising **The Bog of Cats**, **To Be or Not To Be**, and the mystery item. - Celeste

In English we have planned a poem all about change. We got to start writing our poem. - Maddie

Learning at Holy Trinity in Year 6 Friday 22nd March 2024

This week in maths, we continued looking at algebra. We looked at solve equations where we didn't know one or two amounts given. It was a tricky concept to get our heads around but with hard, we did it! We are moving onto looking at decimals next week.

In English we wrote our plans for our dialogue piece where Kotler speaks to three different people. On Thursday we started to write these up, making sure we used 'show not tell' when describing character's and making an obvious change in Kotler's tone and register when talking to the Commander, the soldiers and Bruno.

In history we learnt about the main reasons believed to have made the Vikings leave Scandinavia. We discussed the five main reasons and investigated the evidence supporting each reason. We came to the conclusion as there was no definitive evidence, so maybe all five reasons were valid. Then we learnt about how far and wide the Vikings travelled and which of those locations they settled in and which they only raided.

In computing we continued to look at using spreadsheets. We learnt how to use formulas to produce calculated data and how to create our own formula.
