Dear Parents and Carers,

This meeting costs a lot for us to host and that is why we do have just one meeting a year and the venue swaps between Christ Church and Holy Trinity. All parents and carers are very welcome to join us. I have attended many of these meetings and I still learn new things each time.

If lack of childcare stops you from being able to come please let me know and we will try to arrange a creche <u>ahawkins@ccht.rbkc.sch.uk</u>.

If you have a child in Year 4,5 or 6 in particular I think it is really important that you come to this meeting and get up to speed on all things online. If your children are younger still come if you can so you can think ahead of issues presenting themselves.

I feel passionately that primary aged children are not ready for any kind of group chat online. They are still learning about the dynamics of being in a group of friends or classmates face to face. They are very unlikely to be ready to navigate the nuances of group chats. When children mess up, it is permanently recorded.

As you will know adult groups, What's Apps can be a problem with messages being sent without thought for how they will land with others. Think how hard all this is for children under 12!

When my dad taught me to drive he said "I am not worried about your driving, I am worried about the other drivers!" This resonated with how we should think about our children on group chats.

Thank you for all following our strict no mobile phone policy in school it has massively decreased the number of online issues we have to deal with.

Its so important you as the adults take charge of your children's online experiences when they are so young, vulnerable and impressionable.

Here is what the evening aims to cover:

Speakers from Childnet will explore the experiences young people are having online and cover topics relevant to them including social media, gaming, digital wellbeing, screen time and online friendships and relationships. The session will explore the different risks young people face online alongside practical tips, advice, and guidance around what you can do to manage them. They will also signpost to further resources and support. Throughout the session, there will be an emphasis on the positive aspects of the internet so that you can best support your child in enjoying these benefits while staying happy and safe online.

Girl on the Fly (ages 9-11 & up)

Author: Nansubuga Nagadya Isdahl Publisher: David Fickling



13-year-old Kamaria likes rhythm and routine. They help her feel safe and in her proper place in the world. So when she finds out that Aunt Rose is coming all the way from Tanzania to stay with the family for an unspecified length of time, it throws her off-kilter.

Kam is already unsettled by a fall-out with her best friend Odie, but at least she has support from the other three girls who make up the 4×100 -metre relay team. Perhaps that's what she needs to focus on? If they can win the state championship, it will be a fitting end to the school year.

But there are a lot more obstacles in the way than Kam had anticipated. Can she cope or will she crumble?

Set in Philadelphia, USA, in 1992, this coming-of-age story is packed with cultural and musical references from the era and explores themes of family, resilience and the evolving nature of friendships.

Once Kam opens herself to new experiences, she finds that Aunt Rose is something of a kindred spirit who teaches her, little by little, to know herself, be herself, and trust herself.

A great read for anyone unwilling to leave their comfort zone.

Friday 19th April Reception Class Newsletter

This week we:

- · Revisited the sounds /air/ (chair) and /ear/ (dear) in our Alphabet Code lessons.
- Explored doubling within 10 during our Maths lessons. We were challenged to double towers of cubes. We also rolled a dice and doubled the amount using counters. Finally, we had a go at drawing double the number of dots on a ladybird. We recorded our answers as number sentences e.g. 2+2=4
- Read Percy's Bumpy Ride by Nick Butterworth. We designed and labelled our own flying machines. We described a park scene and painted the main characters. We also retold the story in our own words and used conjunctions to extend our sentences.
- Read the story of Jesus calming the storm when his disciples were out on a lake. We thought about how the disciples were feeling and how they turned to Jesus for reassurance in their time of need. Christians pray when they are afraid so God can take their fears away. We shared things we might be afraid of and blew them into bubbles, then watched them pop.
- Read If Picasso were a Fish in our Art lesson. We created our own fish characters and combined different materials, such as paint, collage, pens and oil pastels.
- Enjoyed a fabulous trip to Pizza Express. We learnt about the role of a chef and how to prepare delicious pizza. We were then lucky enough to have our pizzas for lunch!
- Began our new unit in Understanding the World, which focuses on drawing and reading simple maps. We learnt that maps are pictured from a great height, or what is also known as a 'bird's eye view.' We drew a large map of our classroom.

Next week, we will:

- Explore halving in Maths.
- Read The Secret Path by Nick Butterworth in our English lessons.
- Revisit the sound /ur/ (surf) in Alphabet Code. We will also learn how to write another code for this sound, the er in ladder.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 19th April 2024

In English, we have started a new unit and have read the storybook, 'Alan's Big, Scary Teeth'. We used adventurous adjectives to describe different body parts of an alligator and then used the conjunction 'and' to join two sentences together.

In Maths this week, we have been looking at mass and volume. We have used scales to work out the mass of different objects. We then looked into volume and how different objects hold a different volume of liquid.

For Alphabet Code this week, we revising the /g/ code. Next week, we will be revising the /z/ code. In Guided Reading we have been reading 'Handa's Surprise' and have been using the clues in the illustrations and text to make predictions about what might happen in the story.

In History, we carried on learning about the history of chcolate. We were lucky enough to take part in a chocolate based cookery class with our head chef Katie Dance. We made some delicious chocolate pastries that we got to take home and eat!

In RE, we concluded our Easter unit. We thought about all we had learnt about the Easter story and the important events that happen. In particular; Palm Sunday, The Last Supper, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. We then started our new unit on Islam and learnt about the holy book, the Qur'an.



Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 19th April 2024

This week, Year 2 settled quickly into our class routines and have made a massive effort in all subjects. They started their new English unit – When Ocean Meets Sky which is a narrative unit. They began by predicting who the characters are and what they did using a story box with shells, photographs and fishing wire. They wrote complete sentences using coordinating and subordinating conjunctions. It's important they're using a variety of conjunctions in their writing.

In Maths, we started reviewing volume and capacity which can be confusing to get your head around – I would like them to explore this further in their homework by measuring different volumes of water in measuring jugs using mI and I. Some children were also able to convert mI into L which is great. At our class meeting, some parents asked me what method to use in division – we are still working at a level which requires children to use their times tables knowledge and sharing an amount into groups. We use blocks and objects to share equally and our understanding that, for example, 5 x 4 = 20 therefore 20 ÷ 4 = 5. We do not use the 'bus stop method' in Year 2 that gets taught in Year 3.

In RE, we started learning about Islam and thought about the commitment people make to their religion and the commitments we make daily. We looked at some works by Matisse including *The Snail, The Horse, The Rider and The Clown* and *The Sheaf.* We then practised our cutting skills and contributed to a whole class collage inspired by *The Sheaf.* We will hopefully be able to see some of Matisse's work on a gallery trip next term.

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

Welcome to Summer term! This week we have started new units in all subject areas.

Y3 have started to prepare for the pop-up restaurant happening in early May. We have taken a deeper look at the cuisine: Indian and made some beautiful designs for night. Next week we will start to prepare the meals, keep an eye out for the food order form that has been emailed.

In English we started a unit exploring the story Athur and the Golden Rope. This lovely story looks at an unlikely hero. It explores many themes, including bravery in all its forms. We have started to build a short story based upon the character Arthur and will present these stories to our peers in class.

In Maths we have started our topic on Mass and Capacity. We have explored grams and kilograms, converting between these units, and how to use a scale. We had lots of fun weighing different items in the classroom using kitchen scales. If you have scales at home, have a go at measuring different items in your house.

In History we have started our topic on the Romans and who they were. It was great to see so many wonderful diagrams and pictures of the Romans in homework books. We are really looking forward to exploring this topic more!

Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 19th April

In Maths, we continued learning about fractions. We explored partitioning a mixed number into its whole and fractional parts using part-whole models and bar models. We then practised partitioning a mixed number into a whole number and a mixed number. We also looked at how mixed numbers are represented on a number line and label the fractions on any given number line by identifying the number of intervals between each of the whole numbers.

In English, we looked at an animated film and a short story based on traditional fables. We compared these stories to 'The Firework Maker's Daughter', noting how they were all fiction and featured a lead character's quest to overcome a problem. We moved on to analyse the structure of these stories using a Story Mountain. Then, we identified and described the beginning, the build-up, the problem, the resolution and the ending of each story. This helped us to plan our own tales about the mysterious character of Razvani. We began writing our own stories and included subordinate clauses, ambitious adjectives and fronted adverbials.

In Computing this week, we started our Creating Media Unit on Photo editing. First, we thought about the different images we see in our daily life. Then, we used our observational skills to analyse different photos and compare them with photos that have been edited. We noticed how colour, size and lighting can be changed. We looked at how you can use the cropping tool to zoom in on a specific aspect of a photograph and that this can change the impact it has on the viewer. Using the Paint.net program, we experimented with cropping different parts of an image.

In RE, we are looking at Hinduism again and this time focussing on 'How Hindus live'. We reviewed our learning from the Spring term, recalled what we already knew and then wrote questions about what we were curious to find out about this term. We learned two new terms: *Moksha*, which refers to liberation for the soul from samsara, and *Samsara*, which is what Hindus call the unsatisfactory cycle of life, death and rebirth.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- · What Photo editing tool did we use in our Computing lessons this week?
- · What is a Hindu place of worship called?
- What is a mixed number?

Learning in Year 5 at Christ Church Friday, 19th April 2024

Welcome back to Christ Church! We hope you have had a wonderful Easter break. The children came back to school ready to learn and another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English Year 5 started a new unit on the topic of Lego. At the end of this unit, children will be writing a non-chronological report about the History of Lego, from how the toy was created and when it became a worldwide sensation. In order to gather facts for their non-chronological report, children have been learning about the founder of the company, Ole Kirk Christiansen, his son Godtfred and the idea of a system of play. Finally, children learned about adverbials of time and how to identify them and use them in a sentence.

In Reading, Year 5 have started a new book called Varjak Paw. Children have been practicing their reading comprehension skills such as inferencing and summarising.

In Maths, Year 5 learned to read two-way tables and timetables. Children also started a new unit about angles. Children learned that an angle is a measure of the amount of turn between two lines. Children also learned to read maps and orientate themselves using directions such as a full or a half turn and clockwise and anticlockwise.

In Science, Year 5 learned about the reproduction of plants. Children learned that some flowers have male (anther and filament) and female (style, stigma, ovary) organs and reproduce when the male (pollen) and female (ovule) genetic information fertilises to form a seed.

In History, children started a new unit about Ancient Greece. Children learned about city states and how each city state had their own laws and rules. Children learned about city states such as Olympia, where the first Olympic Games were held.

In Computing, children learned how to draw images on a computer using the programme Vector Drawings.

In Art, children learned about an artist called El Anatsui, a sculptor from Ghana who transforms simple, everyday materials into large-scale sculptures.

Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church Friday 19th April 2024

Welcome back to summer term!

English: In English this week, Year Six English focused on concluding our current topic of Historical Fiction using the novel, The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas by John Boyle as the text source. Students spent the week learning, understanding, and developing characters from the text which has helped students when they began planning (using note taking, storyboards and mind maps) their alternative ending to the story.



Maths: This week in Maths, the class started our next Maths unit of Percentages. Students this week have learnt about how to convert between decimals, fractions, and percentages, and how percentages are used in relation to other numbers and problems. It is important for students to have a solid understanding of percentages as they are used often in society in advertisement and marketing.

Sheperds and Sheep: This week for Sheperds and Sheep, year 6 and Reception came together to create Elmer the Patchwork Elephant art. Sheperds and their Sheeps were task to create Elmer the Elephant using milk containers, cardboard, markers, and coloured paper. All students from both classes had a wonderful time creating their own patchwork elephants.



SATs Practice: During the holidays, in preparation for SATs, Year 6 students had homework in the form of revision workbooks. This homework was comprised of six workbooks for the three main SATs subjects: Maths, Reading and SPAG; totalling over 120 pages of homework! Students who completed this work should be proud of their efforts and used the Easter break to consolidate their knowledge of the three main SATs subjects. Year 6 will be using these books over the next few weeks as homework or additional revision tasks in the classroom.
